WINDSOR, Ont., Oct. 26.—Ontario provincial authorities today launched a three-day investigation of a disastrous department store explosion that killed 10 persons and injured 25.

Investigators are still unsure how the explosion occurred, but they believe it was caused by a gas leak from a boiler in the basement of the five-story building.

The explosion occurred at 10:30 a.m. on Tuesday. It was the deadliest disaster in Windsor since the 1918 influenza epidemic.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—Governor A. Rockefeller's seeming lack of fervor in the campaign to elect a Republican to the governorship of New York has raised questions in GOP circles about his present popularity, his devotion to the Republican cause and his political future.

CAMPAIGN HAZARDS

In the current presidential campaign it has been rather frantically demonstrated that the candidates are not only large and small, political technicians for the handling of crowds have grown terrifically out of date and inadequate.

As a matter of plain fact, they have not been able to handle crowds effectively. The result has been to expose both the candidates and the enthusiastic citizenry to danger.

Since this campaign began, a governor-nominee has had the lapels of his suit torn, a candidate has had his shirt badly ripped and other men have lost parts of their clothing.

Both nominees have been jerked and shoved and jostled beyond belief. Vice President Nixon, though guarded by Secret Service as well as local police, has been mobbed by a crowd of thousands who do not seem to understand that tightly wedged balls of confetti are virtually weapons.

In Senator Kennedy's slow ride up lower Broadway in New York, his car was rocked, his radio aerial snapped and his car was splashed with mud when he and his wife were pelted with broken.

Women have run smack into police motorcycles as they tried for a "touch" of the candidates, and many have been caught between moving cars and motorcycles. As a motorcade moves, hundreds often press so close they are in peril of falling beneath cars.

Many swirl around and between the cars while they are in motion. Others find themselves jammed between groups of automobiles, in danger of being crushed.

Through all this, police can be seen struggling to keep the roadway clear and to keep both the candidates and the people. Police "barriers" have meant nothing in many places. They are the first things to go as the eager push forward.

No one could pretend this is an easy problem to deal with. It is the mere good luck that no citizen and no candidate has been seriously hurt in this campaign (At Chicago, N. C., two people were killed and one died and one of them was lighted trampled on.)

When the current madness is over, the police authorities of our cities could well come up with means of reducing this dangerous situation in future campaigns. They dare not assume that it is a thing of the moment, resulting only from the special enthusiasms felt for the present nominees.

Persons who have studied the behavior of political crowds in 1930 can see that "education" of the people will not be enough. They are astonishingly careless of both their own and the candidate's features. Their good luck in averting real harm will not last forever.

And communist prestige is sure to suffer among the uncommitted nations. Surely they won't want to imitate a system which has even produced enough in Russia to cause such experiences as famines. In Russia, the "unemployment" is not in the wake is not likely to be one that would make most Americans.

THE HUNGRY REDS From the fact that farm production this year did not meet the quotas, in some products there was a decline, and anticipated gains were not made over all. From China comes the word of a farm production disaster, due in part to natural calamities.

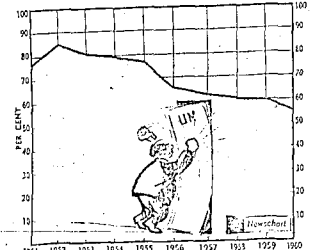
