

12 Persons Killed As Plane Crashes In Montana Area

MSSOULA, Mont., Oct. 28 (UPI)—A Northwest Orient Boeing four-engine DC-122 plane, carrying 12 passengers, crashed into a mountain side, killing all 12 aboard, Newsman Donny telephoned from the scene that there were no survivors. He said witnesses told the plane, flying "belly-up," smashed into the mountain and burned. The crash occurred near U. U.S. Says Reds Can Visit Russia Gooding Area Farmers Killed in Truck-Car Wreck

S. translator and World War II pilot, captured in 1945, a German-born medical illustrator, were arrested last night in a swift roundup by FBI agents. They were accused of trying to gather military information for use in a Russian spy network in the United States. Russian officials in New York told U. S. consular officials they were willing to let them interview Melnik and his captives. They were with him in the federal detention headquarters for an hour this afternoon. The state department had cited the case of U. S. airman, including the pilot Francis Taylor, in instances in which the Russians had let U. S. consular officials see the flyers after their arrests as called for by a Soviet-U. S. treaty. The two accused men were said to have conspired to form a spy network for the U. S. Army, Navy and Air Force, and a map of the United States and its territories. The FBI said Melnik indicated the information was to be used to pinpoint bombing targets. 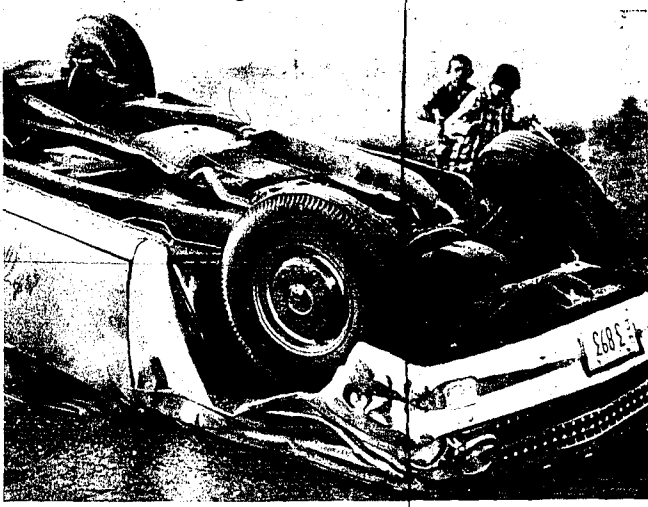

Cancer's Toll To Be Large, Official Says

NEW YORK, Oct. 28—In the next 10 years three million Americans will die of cancer.

That prediction, based on present mortality rates, was made today by Harry McHenry, Jr., of New Orleans, a director of the American Cancer society.

"That is the measure of our challenge," he told the society's annual meeting. "Are we doing all we can to save the lives of those who have cancer?"

It is in the power of medicine to almost eliminate cancer of the uterus as a cause of death, he said. But cancer of the breast, the digestive tract, the lung, and other sites are still great challenges.

The cancer society will have to get greater financial support from business and industry, reported Edgar J. Furlo, a Coca-Cola company executive and chairman of the society's 1960 money-raising campaign.

He said only 10 per cent of the society's income now comes from business sources.

Justice Unit Says Column Is "Baseless"

WASHINGTON, Oct. 28 (AP)—The justice department says a column by Drew Pearson containing baseless innuendo against Vice President Richard M. Nixon and his family.

In a statement issued late yesterday, it said Pearson had implied that the department advised to settle an antitrust suit against the Hunter Tool company in Arizona.
