## U.N. Appoints Peace Unit for Congo Troubles

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y., Oct. 20 (AP) — Fifteen African and Asian countries were named today by a U.N. committee to establish a Congo peace-keeping force between rival political leaders. Diplomats reported this after a three-hour private meeting of Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld's advisory committee on the Congo, which consists of 18 countries with members in the U.N. force said only 15 of the 18 were available.

The committee decided that the 15 African and Asian members would make up a mission to attempt reconciliation of such countries as President Joseph Kasavubu and Premier Patrice Lumumba and other officials.

Dirksen said a few members of the advisory committee would draw up proposed instructions for the mission and the full committee would probably meet Wednesday to discuss such instructions and discuss when the mission should leave for the Congo.

There were some reports it might leave as early as today, but at the same time the view was said to have been expressed in the committee that the mission should be delayed until the situation was clearer after the best chances for success.

The committee acted under a resolution adopted last week in emergency sessions of the Security Council at its 1600th meeting to seek a speedy solution of their internal conflict.

The committee also included representatives of Asian and African regions, and the Secretary-General's advisory committee on the Congo, in consultation with the Secretary-General for the purpose of consultation.

Delegates said the advisory committee had agreed to put all 15 of its African and Asian members on the roster of the mission, but only because the Africans, who had constituted some 60 percent of the mission, could not agree on a smaller number.

## Flash Floods Drown Eight In Southwest

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 20 (AP) — A major flash flood spawned by a cyclone of cloudbursts in central Texas washed automobiles from roads last night and drowned at least eight persons, including a child, as the water swept away.

Police searched streets where floodwaters had abandoned automobiles early this morning, but found only one body. The bodies of eight persons were found in a shallow stream that rose up to 10 inches during a rainstorm.

A single car, apparently an all-night railway of Austin, that extended 50 miles north, was swept away from 100 miles south.

The weather bureau reported that the water was about 300 million gallons, more than a one-half million gallons, in the area.

About 2,500 homes in the area were out of service, including all those in the city area.

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## Candidates Seeking Voters in Suburbs

Apart from the strong stands taken by both candidates, the campaign remains the opposite.

Young people from the majority of Twin Falls Protestant churches, instead of drifting property or asking for food and candy for themselves on Halloween night, Monday, will collect money for the "Share Our Surplus" program.

The program, sponsored by the Twin Falls Ministerial association and the Church World service, headquartered in New York city, provides food for destitute children and adults in many parts of the world.

Youngsters with yellow identification tags printed with "Share Our Surplus" will from door-to-door accepting donations for the SOS fund. They will carry milk cartons to hold the donations, and will distribute leaflets describing the SOS program.

The SOS leaflets point out that 55 families bread for 4,500 needy persons; \$10 will give cereal to more than 30,000 children, and \$100 will cover the cost of providing a cupful of milk to each of nearly 750,000 persons.

The program is sponsored by churches in the interest of world relief and as a constructive program for young people instead of the usual fire-or-treats.

The money is used to transport surplus foods, donated by the United States government, to areas of the world where there is great need. Every dollar given will provide more than 300 pounds of food, distributed to refugees from communist China, now crowded into cramped quarters of Hong Kong; to people who are suffering in India, Indonesia, Japan, Korea, Okinawa, the Philippines, and many other parts of the world. The food is distributed without regard to church affiliation.

After the children have finished their collection, they will meet in the new gymnasium of the First Presbyterian church for a Halloween party.

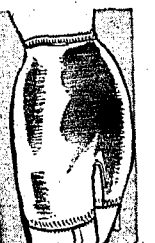

### Servicemen and Women Tell Preferences in Yule Gifts

For Christmas this year, American servicemen and women are preferring "Home Sweet Home," according to word received from Washington, D.C., by A. P. Nelson, chairman of the Twin Falls chapter of the American Red Cross.

Servicemen and women sold American Red Cross wares at their overseas posts this year for the first time for the holidays, the best gift would be homemade cookies and candy. Second best gift would be cash from home in the form of money orders. American currency, they want, often is difficult to exchange and checks almost impossible to cash.

Persons sending gifts overseas should wrap the cookies and candy individually in foil paper, pack them well, preferably in tin, and send them by air mail. A universal and complete overseas correspondence list to get family photographs and hometown newspapers. They say that the papers come by air mail, so as to reach them while the news is "new."

The Red Cross offers a suggestion for families who wish to send their servicemen a more intimate touch of home. Many chapters across the country have a "voices from home" project whereby families can make records to send to the servicemen.

Most military and ship stores and civilian shops in many foreign countries are pretty well stocked, the servicemen and women point out. With the money from home they will be able to buy many gifts. A tax cost that families can buy them in this country.

The postoffice and defense departments advise Christmas gifts should be mailed early. Parcels going by surface mail, ship, should be posted before Nov. 29. Those going by air should be mailed before Dec. 10. The further a package has to travel, the earlier it should be mailed to assure arrival overseas before Christmas.

Servicemen and women urge persons in the United States to send letters and Christmas cards, too, by air mail because surface mail may take as long as 40 days to reach such far away places as Turkey, Korea or Formosa.

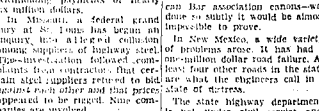

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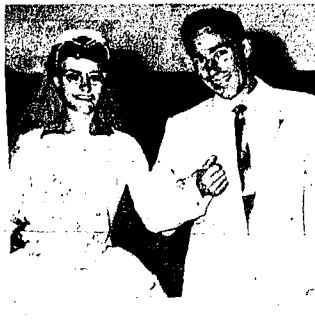

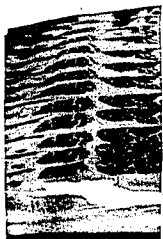

# Tractor-Mounted, Automatic Haystacker Goes Into Operation, Saving Back Work at Haying Time

## New, Easy and Cheap System Used by Farmer in Stacking Last of Hay Crop

Millard Ewing, farmer west of Twin Falls on U.S. highway 30, stacked the last of his hauled hay last week in a new, easy and cheap way of stacking.

Ewing put his hay in the stack with a Farmhand loader, never getting off his tractor seat and not having even a man up on the stack to badge bales into place. The stack he made was 11 bales high and three wide and for as long as he wished.

Ewing has his 6-year-old son Alan Ewing, drive the tractor that pulls the slip through the hay field. There is perhaps nothing too rare about a small boy driving a tractor or about a farmer lifting hay bales on a slip.

The slip, however, is rare. It is so simple that at first sight it doesn't seem rare. Cleats made of pairs of two by six inch boards are nailed down across the top of the slip so that the lines of the tractor-mounted fork lift can slide under the bales of hay Ewing drives slowly between rows of hay on the field.

Near the stacking area Ewing gets on another tractor that has the Farmhand loader on it, and then he drives it broadside to the slip where he can lift up to 18 bales at a time. The bales are lifted to each other on the slip, a job Ewing does as he loads the slip dragged by the tractor. The slip he made was 11 bales high and three wide and for as long as he wished.

Lifting 18 bales of hay, Ewing places them where he wants to on the stack, motivates his hydraulic system so that the bales are shoved off the slip and tightly into position on the stack.

Then he drives back to the broadside of the slip and loads the fork lift again and adds to the stack.

That's all there is to Ewing's method of stacking hay. He does not need another man to help him. If another man is working on the farm, Ewing can have him do other chores or bringing logs.

There was no back work in building the stack and the stack built square enough so that

## Nevada Drought Causing Varied Supply for Hay

RENO, Oct. 20.—An erratic hay condition has been produced by drought, according to Joseph Stein, agricultural extension service, Max C. Fetschman college of agriculture.

A survey conducted by the state Oct. 18 showed that few northern and western counties in Nevada have sizable amounts of hay for sale. ## Spud Harvest Nears End Throughout Magic Valley

Spud harvest should be nearing an end late this week, providing weather stays favorable throughout Magic Valley.

Yields are running below those of last year and in most cases quality is reported down, but not as much as yields.

Paul Hanson, manager of the J. R. Stimplot company, Hebbar, reports the company's 10,000 acres were about 80 per cent harvested with the quality running "pretty good." Yields are down a good 15 per cent, Hanson says. He expects the spud harvest in the Magic Valley will be finished by the middle of next week.

Or-Ida Potato Products, Inc., Burley, is about 80 per cent finished on some 5,000 acres with yields reported as fair. The quality was reported as excellent.

In Jerome, C. J. Marshall thinks the area is about 85 per cent done harvesting but he fears the weather may break at any time. Marshall hears reports the Idaho Falls area is only 75 per cent done harvesting, the weather being warm for so long and the vines refusing to die down.

Harvest is slower, says Marshall, and instead of trucks of yield into the cellar with 40 to 50 tons a day, he is receiving only 15 to 20 loads.

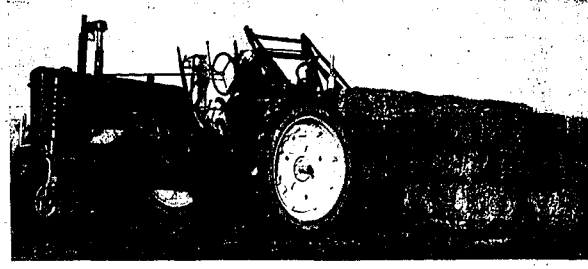
In the Kirtland-Hanson area, the picture is not so bleak as some of the others, according to Wayne Parish, J. H. Henry Produce company, Kimberly. Parish says spud fields are yielding extra, some good and some bad. Yields on the overall average in these areas, are down 20 per cent.

## Sugar Beet Yield Is Under Normal In Burley Areas

BURLEY, Oct. 20.—Sugar beet harvest in the Burley-Paul area is 48 per cent complete with yields averaging about 17 tons to the acre, according to Ernest Blaser, area manager of the Amalgamated Sugar company.

The yield of 17 tons is about 15 tons less than normal but sugar content is running comparable to past years, said Blaser.

The Paul plant handles 20,000 tons of sugar beets in the Burley-Paul area.

## Crop of Alfalfa Seed Predicted Below Average

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The 1950 alfalfa seed crop has been forecast at 129,281,000 pounds. This is only fractionally lower than last year's small production of 130 million pounds, but is 14 per cent less than the 1949-50 average.

Although less acres than last year were harvested for seed in a majority of producing areas, the decline of seven per cent in the national total was more than offset by good yields which were eight per cent higher than last year.

The U.S. yield of 187 pounds per acre was the highest of record—last year's yield was 184 and 29 pounds above average.

TURKEY RECORD SET WASHINGTON, Oct. 20 (AP)—The agriculture department said 182 million pounds of frozen turkeys were in storage on Oct. 1. This was a record for the date and almost 86 per cent above the Oct. 1, 1949-50 average.

# Boys Get Plenty of Exercise Climbing on "Homemade Tree," in Backyard of Twin Falls Home

## "Tree" Constructed in Backyard for Use of Children in New Area of City

If you don't have a tree in the backyard, build one. That's what one Twin Falls resident did to supply his boys with a climbing apparatus when the family moved into a newer section of town where there was a lack of trees.

For about \$50 and a few afternoons of carpentry work, Keith Turner, 206 DuBois avenue, built an odd-looking, but elaborate, artificial climbing "tree" in his backyard.

The structure served any purpose to which the neighborhood youngsters wish to put it, but mostly it serves as a play fort and supplies them with ropes, horizontal bars, trapeze and other items on which they can expend excess energy.

The structure was built by Turner last winter and served as a Christmas present for his two boys, David, 11, and John, 9. It is patterned after a similar structure he built for the boys when they lived in Lynnwood, Calif., four years ago.

Turner explains the structure serves as a game area and a method of giving the boys plenty of good exercise. In order to play the many games they have devised they get a good physical workout, which contributes to sound bodies and is an aid to appetites.

When Turner was a boy he always lived in an area where there were plenty of trees to climb. This is a rarity in some new sections of the city. Turner says using proper climbing tree climbing is always good exercise. Having two boys with plenty of energy, he wanted to design something that would give them the same kind of exercise in the backyard.

So, with a few planks and some nails, he came up with the present design. Turner says there is always the chance the children could hurt themselves on the apparatus, but it is no more dangerous than a tree made of conventional physical structures. The boys use common sense when they play and no one has been hurt yet. On the contrary, he says the structure builds

their shoulder muscles and develops coordination.

One end of the structure is a raised platform, usually serving as a fort for the boys' games. The other end is a combination of trapeze, climbing ropes and horizontal bars. As Turner says, "What they do on the thing is limited only by their imagination. Any child who uses it will develop his strength and agility before he tries something that will hurt him."

Turner says they haven't tried it and he explains this probably is because the children continue to invent new, competitive games to play on it.

Turner's structure isn't modeled after any other and he hasn't seen another like it. He notes that passersby often stop and ask, "What is that thing in your backyard?" He says it is popular with all the children in the neighborhood and their backyard serves as a gathering spot. This is one of the reasons he built it. He explains it keeps the children interested and keeps them off the streets and in the neighborhood.
