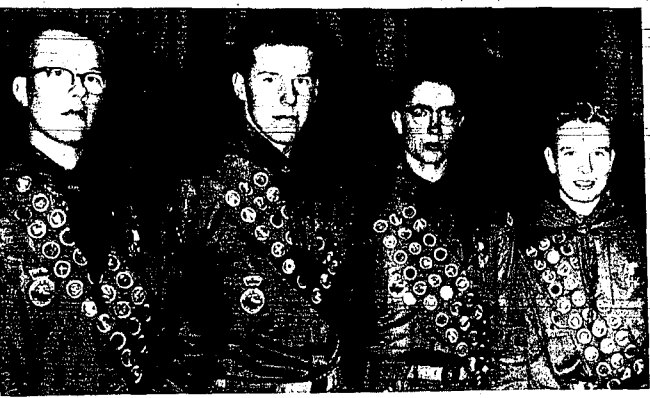

A container is necessary, Ballenger stressed. The second choice is to scatter the leaves along the street by their houses to be picked up by the power sweeper. The street flusher sprays water along the curbs of Twin Falls streets and is followed by the power sweeper. Wet down by the street flusher, the leaves, if they are scattered and not in piles, will then be picked up by the power sweeper.

Ballenger noted that if leaves are scattered slightly away from the curb it is easier for the power sweeper to pick them up. The street department will begin to pick up leaves Monday. When the street department begins work on the leaf gathering job, it will use power loaders and trucks.

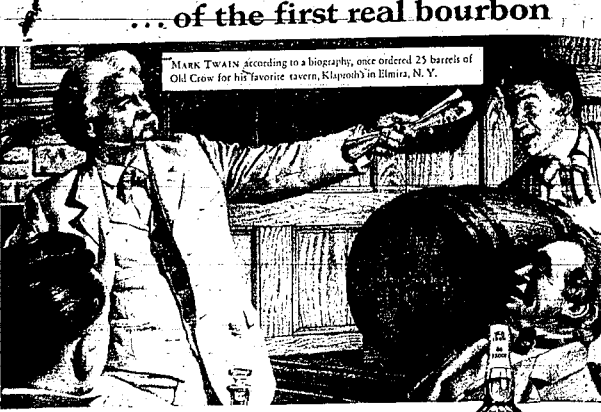

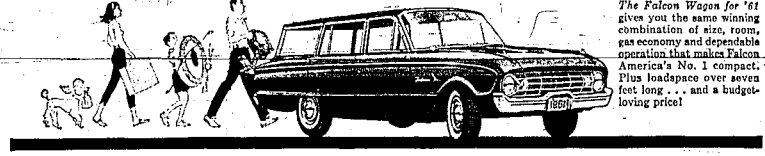
