## New U.S. Satellite In Orbit

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Nov. 3.—A 30-pound spinning top satellite whirled into orbit today to begin the most important step ever attempted of the Earth's ionosphere.

The satellite, officially designated Explorer VIII, is being used by scientists to better understand of the mysterious electrical layer ionosphere. The satellite will reflect radio signals back to Earth.

The experiment could lead to improved communications between continents, ships and planes. It also could open the way for more effective control with countries in space, and the recently launched Echo and Courier and with future manned space craft.

An official of the national aeronautics and space administration (NASA) reported the successful launching of Explorer VIII by the United States' communications satellite from the Soviet Union in cooperation of the ionosphere.

Robert Johnston, head of the ionosphere branch of NASA's Office of Space Research, said that reports indicate the Explorer VIII has been probing the ionosphere in a manner which was considered even with the country in space gathered from this size of electrical particles which extends from 60 miles to 1,000 miles above the Earth's surface.

A powerful 75-foot Juno II rocket blasted off from this missile test center at 12:23 a.m. today, and the first 100-mile altitude and precision and boosted the payload to orbital apogee of 10,000 miles at 10:30 a.m. Two hours after the launching, NASA announced the "satellite" was in orbit—11 to 40-nickman because it is shaped like a top and spins as it orbits. # WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON (VIA)—The pot stream in North America. It drains an area of nearly 600,000 square miles, 60,000 in Canada. This makes international delimitation almost a necessity.

Below Coulee are 10 more dams and offer 10 million kilowatt-hours of electrical capacity. The lowest dam is Bonneville which gives its name to the Bonneville basin.

In new deal days there was agitation for a Columbia valley authority like the Tennessee valley authority to develop all power, navigation, irrigation, and flood control projects. Private power companies, local interests and Congress blocked that. But the adoption of Columbia basin development as a whole has been inescapable.

These four dams will provide 78 million kilowatts of additional electric power to the U. S. 2,000,000 kilowatts to Canada by 1970. This is the equivalent of another Grand Coulee and Bonneville.

# State's Public School Study Is Prepared by Department

BOISE, Nov. 3.—The state department of education has prepared and released a study on the public schools. "What is everyone should know about Idaho schools," according to D. P. Engstrom, state superintendent of public instruction.

Included in the report are items concerning enrollment, teacher training, teacher salaries, educational costs and other matters pertinent to Idaho's education program.

Engstrom reports the study indicates about 11 percent of all Idaho teachers lack a college degree, but teachers are becoming better trained. The report reveals that a large proportion of those who become teachers leave the field within five years.

In addition to the lack of well-trained teachers in every classroom and the lack of adequate classrooms, the report shows that educational weaknesses in Idaho schools. They include lack of adequate guidance program, lack of vocational training and the high and low years of school, and lack of training in foreign language.

It will bring power available in the Columbia basin to 13 million kilowatts by 1970 and 20 million by 1980. After that, say the engineers, the basin will have to turn up its electrical power supply by atomic energy or by coal, as TVA has done.

But another advantage of these dams is that they will help carry out the army corps of engineers plan for flood control in the Columbia basin. Possibilities of another disaster such as hit The Dalles, Ore., in 1948, will be ended. This will require a "river master" agency which will be set up by the U. S. and Canadian governments to regulate flow and storage of water for the entire system. This will put the Columbia about 10 percent under control. It is now only 20 percent under control.

The Tennessee river, by contrast, is now about 90 percent controlled, to benefit the entire valley. It is the sensible way to develop water resources.

# NO APPARENT SOLUTION

In 15-year history the United Nations has had no dilemma so puzzling as the Congo problem.

Its original entry into the Congolese record was predicated on the need for restoring order and preventing the budding country from becoming a prey to powerful nations beyond its borders.

Though there are disturbing reports of Belgian army officers rejoining Congolese units, the U. N. has made substantial progress in inducing the Belgians to withdraw.

Lumumba, protected by certain units, is still a potent force in the country. Mobutu has allowed his army to go on a rioting rampage. Onos resigns.

In this situation the U. N. has hardly known what to do. Some of the units in the Congo have found themselves acting almost as a local police force. They have been virtual bodyguard to Lumumba.

Obviously U. N. units have not been on the hand the find themselves guardedly avoiding any internal interference—even an incident which could be misinterpreted.

U. N. authorities are disillusioned over Mobutu. Still, to urge throwing the matter back to the Congolese parliament would be almost to insure the return of the untrustworthy Lumumba.

The tragic fact is that the Congo does not have any man or group capable of governing now, or likely to gain this capability in the near future. The country is unfit for independence while the present is realized.

Ideally, it should submit to a U. N. trusteeship until adequate leadership can be trained. But matters may well have gone too far. That danger is that no alternatives appear which do not carry with them the prospect of a resurgent Russian Communist influence in the Congo.

It will be a miracle if the U. N., the West and the independent-minded people of the Congo find their way out of this terrible dilemma.

**THE HEIFER PROJECT**  
Much that churches and churches do is subject to controversy, but there is one project in which Roman Catholics, Orthodox churchmen, and 17 Protestant denominations are engaged which can only be approved, not denied.

It is known as the Heifer Project and it consists in sending great quantities of highbred livestock for the help of needy countries and the enrichment of local areas.

When an airplane lands in Boston for Greece recently, in charge of a Congregational minister, and a young churchwoman, loaded down with almost a Noah's Ark of assorted livestock, it was only a part of the project which began 16 years ago by the Church of the Brethren, a farm-landed denomination. The initial example has had a fitting and remarkable development.

The Christian Century recently defined the project's goal, and what has been achieved to date. We quote from the issue of Sept. 28:

"In order to reach the project's goal—to serve as an endless chain in neighborhood—each person who receives livestock or poultry must promise to give the first-born offspring to someone else in need."

"An important side effect of the distribution is the improvement of livestock strains by the introduction of superior breeding stock."

### India Makes Planes Deal With Soviets

**NEW DELHI, India, Nov. 3 (AP)—**India has decided to purchase a number of large transport planes from the Soviet Union despite the advice of senior Indian air force officers, well-informed sources say.

The order to go ahead with the Russian deal came in a cable from New York while Prime Minister Jawaharlal was there for the current 10th general assembly of the United Nations.

**S. N. Pande Backed**  
The sources said the senior air force officers had recommended the purchase of the American C-119 Hercules transports like those used by U. N. troop supply in the Congo.

Significantly, up to the order came from Nehru and four other nationalist leaders to obtain a resolution from the general assembly calling for renewed contact between President Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

The Soviet planes are to be used for improving communications in India's Chinese-occupied northern border areas. Nehru told a news conference on Oct. 21, the deal was a straight commercial transaction and was not military aid.

**Memon Pushes Russ Deal**  
Sources close to the government said Defense Minister S. K. Puri as Memon opposed the American planes in favor of the Russian Antonov-12 turbo-prop transports. Both planes are bulky giants with Hercules-type engines but having a higher ceiling and requiring less maintenance.

### Expert Sees Time of 100 Million Cars

Unless American motorists do more than they are doing now, he said, there will be a traffic toll in 1970 of 50,000 deaths and two million disabling injuries at a cost of nine billion dollars.

### U. S. Economy Is Called Good

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 3 (U)—Secretary of Commerce Frederick Douglas says there are "no clouds" in steel and housing, but "the American economy, as a whole, is good."

He spoke at a news conference which the Los Angeles county Republican central committee said was called to reply to Democratic campaign charges that the nation's economic production is off.

"It's true that production is in decline, but there is too much optimism in production," Douglas said. "Some 55 per cent of our people are employed in services."

"We are in a recession. We're undergoing what is an inventory readjustment. Personal income is at an all-time high. Auto sales for October were the highest in history. There are no spots in steel and housing, but other parts of the economic picture are sound."

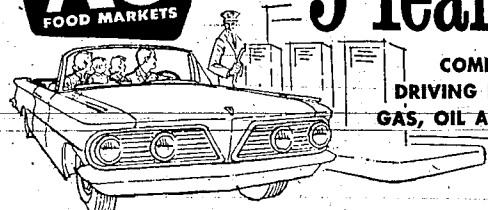



## Production of Red Meat up So Far in '60

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—Agriculture department has reported production of red meat during the first nine months of 1960 was 187 per cent higher than in the corresponding period last year.

Commercial slaughter for the January-September period totaled 20,117,000,000 pounds. This compares with 14,441,000,000 pounds during the same period of 1959.

Of the January-September volume, 10,714,000,000 pounds were beef, up 10 per cent from last year; 7.5 million pounds were veal, up 12 per cent; 8,050,000,000 pounds were pork, up two per cent; and six million pounds were lamb and mutton, up four per cent.

The number of cattle slaughtered during the nine months was 11.3 per cent above the comparable period of 1959. The number of calves slaughtered was up 140 per cent and sheep and lamb slaughter was up four per cent.

The department said poultry meat output for September totaled 262 million pounds, roughly 200,000 tons. This was nine per cent greater than September, 1959, but four per cent greater than in August, 1960.

## Big Amounts In Gold Have Left America

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—More than one billion dollars worth of gold has left the United States this year—808 million dollars of it since June 30.

The treasury's financial statement put the amount of gold owned by the United States last Friday night at \$18,417,900,000. This represented a drop since the first of the year of \$1,039,000,000.

There has been heavy buying abroad of American gold, made possible by the deficit which the United States is running in its overall financial dealings overseas.

This deficit in what financiers term the balance of payments apparently hit an annual high of about four billion dollars in the July-September quarter, although the figure has since subsided.

The rate in the preceding three months was 2.8 billion dollars, only with foreign governments and central banks, says the department at the official price of \$35 an ounce.

### Punch of Ike In Campaign No Knockout

NEW YORK, Nov. 3 (AP)—President Eisenhower's landslide campaign with Vice President Nixon, M. Nixon appeared today to have fallen short of delivering a knockout punch in the battle for New York's 45 electoral votes.

Eisenhower gave lavish praise to Nixon and his running mate, Henry Cabot Lodge, in a series of city and suburban appearances in a whistle-blowing, stamping rally that overflowed New York's 6,000-seat Coliseum last night.

Expectations Not Realized

But the high expectations of Nixon's supporters that the President would direct wifely political care at Sen. John F. Kennedy were only partly realized.

Without naming him, Eisenhower did criticize Kennedy as one who is "bewailing America's strength in the military and economic field. Also without naming him, the President fired some shots at Kennedy's former opponent, former President Harry S. Truman.

Eisenhower said that when he came into office in 1952 the United States was at war in Korea. He said that he had nationally televised speech the adjective "senseless" which he had previously used to describe the conflict in remarks he had prepared in advance.

Freddie Chain Answered

To an indirect answer to Kennedy's contention that the United States has been losing prestige in the world, Eisenhower told the all-mat constantly applying crowd that the number of those who defect annually from communism-controlled territories is estimated in the hundreds of thousands.

"And I point out that when people fly the countries thousands will risk everything, including their lives, for the chance to join us on freedom's side of the Iron Curtain, there is no question in their minds about American prestige," he said.

The reaction lasted one-thirtieth of a second, Dr. Coenen said. This, he represented the amount of time that power was produced. Although far too short to be practical, the production interval was much longer than anything of the kind heretofore reported.

Mostly the experiments on thermonuclear reaction have involved time lapses of only a few milliseconds of a second.

# Idaho Officials Hit Back At Washington's Plan to End Salmon Fishing Here

By The Associated Press

A suggestion by the Washington state fisheries director that the upper Columbia river system be closed permanently to sports salmon fishing drew sharp criticism Wednesday night from a member of the Idaho fish and game commission.

Fallon of Moscow said he would not support any sports fishing program in Idaho. "I don't think we could do it," he said.

Fallon, who could not be reached for comment, said he had read the text of the director's plan and said it doesn't do any good to close salmon in Washington. He said the plan is to close the river upstream. He estimated the sports catch of Chinook salmon in 1959 was 1,000,000 and in 1958 and 1957 was 1,000,000 and 1,000,000 respectively.

When questioned by the Idaho fish and game director, Leonard said "I have to study this proposal before I make any comment."

The plan was scheduled for presentation to the Pacific states fisheries commission which opens a three-day meeting in Portland, Ore., Nov. 21.

Under the plan said Moore, to provide for higher quality sport fishing, greater escapement would be permitted of steelhead for Pacific Northwest sportmen by adjusting lower Columbia river escapement escapement, however, many federal officials, however, may draw criticism from some Idaho and Washington groups as Oregon and Idaho fishermen are not allowed to take it commercial.

The hatchery site is on Sweetwater creek near Hawk, about 15 miles south of Lewiston.

Federal funds, under the Columbia river development act, were secured for the project. The project was approved by state officials said.

Department spokesmen said the project will be transferred to the Lochs and Selway rivers which make up the middle fork and planted on several headwaters.

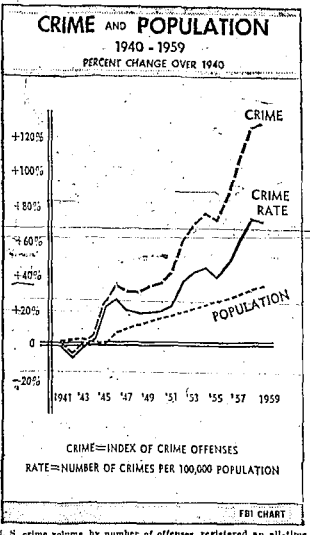

### At Lovers Should Not Have "Beef"

By The Associated Press  
Those who fancy rib roasts, briskets and the like should have no "beef" this week about a meat special at their favorite food store.

Many of the nation's supermarkets and neighborhood grocers are featuring various cuts of beef again this week, reflecting continued heavy supplies. Stores in the Middle Atlantic states, New England and the Middle West are offering rib roast, round roasts, sirloin and porterhouse steaks, chuck roast, ground beef and short ribs.

In recent years beef has replaced pork as this country's most popular meat. U.S. department of agriculture statistics show that we ate an average of 65 pounds of beef per person last year. This compares with average consumption of 44 pounds of pork, five pounds of veal and four of lamb.

Prices vary from section to section, of course, but in this city, offers a variety of cuts. In New York metropolitan area outlets at 70 cents a pound, down 10 cents from a year ago, and 10-rib rib roast at 50 or 60 cents a pound (depending on whether you want the regular or "oven ready" style), which is 10 cents less than a year ago.

Eggs Are Higher  
Eggs, too, are higher with advance of one to four cents a dozen over a wide area. In New England, however, prices are off as much as six cents a dozen.

Best buy among vegetables include broccoli, brussels sprouts, cabbage, cauliflower, celery, lettuce, onions, potatoes, radishes, squash and parsnips. You can get good buys, too, in artichokes, asparagus, carrots, cauliflower, peppers, yellow squash, sweet potatoes, turnips, rutabagas, mushrooms, onions and eggplant.

Good quality beans are fairly expensive this week, along with corn, cucumbers, eggplant, okra, green squash and peas. Cranberries and tomatillos are good buys.
