Survey Describes 17 Million Who Failed to Cast Ballots

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12—You hear a lot about the record number of voters who went to the polls last Tuesday, but what about the millions who didn't?

In an election decided by a margin of less than two votes per precinct, 40 million citizens over 21 failed to vote a ballot.

The situation isn't actually as bad as it appears, however, since a good many of the 107 million listed by the census bureau as voting-age citizens couldn't vote if they wanted to.

That's because, they're convicted felons, inmates of prisons and mental hospitals, disenfranchised residents of the District of Columbia or federal reservations, or are unable for one reason or another to meet state voting requirements.

The best estimate of the number of citizens actually registered to vote last Tuesday is around 84 million, rising that figure to approximately 86 million who did vote makes a more respectable showing—about an 80 per cent turnout.

But that still leaves 17 million potential voters who could have helped pick a president and did not. Who are they?

No one can say for sure about the 100 million. It's still too early to tell who did vote without bothering about those who didn't. But on the basis of past studies, Richard M. Beaman, director of elections research for the government affairs institute, a private organization, has a pretty good idea of the 17 million.

"They are the very young and the very old among the voting age citizenry. They include more women than men. They're people with more roots. They're in trailer courts, big city boarding houses, working on construction jobs, scattered in military camps.

"They come from the less well-educated, less well-paid stratum of the population. A lot of them are Negroes in southern states who aren't able to define a candidate or the constitution—the misfortune of election officials.

"And some of them are voters in other elections who are voting this one out because they don't like the candidates.

"There will probably always be a large number of nonvoters, but the picture is steadily improving.

The census bureau reports the following percentage of voters among the young age population since 1920:

1920, 45.9 per cent; 1924, 43.9; 1928, 51.9; 1932, 52.8; 1936, 57.0; 1940, 59.1; 1944, 55.0; 1948, 51.8; 1952, 52.7; 1956, 60.4; 1960, 62 (estimate).

The steadily improving reflects the growing efficiency of the registration and get-out-the-vote drives of the political parties, the gradual improvement in the income and education of the population and the "wider television" elections through television coverage of campaigns.

Life in MAGIC VALLEY

The special wit of Ervin Condit, HAGGERMAN, is surely one of the things he has reached this age of 80 years. In 1912, he came west by wagon train with his parents in 1881. This was just shortly after the Indian war had been ended and the young men in the train were afraid of Indian attacks. A night with a storm in the air, they made it through without incident. It was an Indian encounter. It took five months to come from Iowa, to Coeur d'Alene, one of the Condit's ancestors, which was the name of the town that is now Hagerman.

Condit recalls that in Cheyenne there were more than 100 wagons and their train and his father and two other wagons decided to take the secret water route, thus leaving the train and coming through Idaho. When they arrived at Coeur d'Alene, one of the Condit's ancestors played out and he was forced to find water until he could make for a team of mules, and go on to Pocatello, Idaho, where his father taught school for three years.

They moved to MALTA, where Condit received the only formal education he was to receive. The father, being a teacher and a lawyer, instilled the love of books into his son, who still is an avid reader and student.

Condit reads without the aid of glasses. One of his daughters who had her master's degree once said, "Father has little formal education but his learning was equivalent to that of a college degree."

Among the jobs that Condit had was starting the mail horseback from Malta to American Falls. The trip was about 90 miles and he would make the trip in two days. Condit hired out as a freighter to a merchant in Malta. The freight had to be hauled from Pocatello, Utah, to Malta, more than 50 miles.

On his first trip, he was 17, and laughs about what a greenhorn he was at the time. The freight wagons were built high off the ground and loading them was quite a job.

The wholesaler in Ketchikan had been where his supplies were and Condit started to load the freight wagon. It was a huge pile of firewood. He started to load the wagon to load it. Starting out about mid-afternoon for Malta, he was a tired youth. As he started to grow dark, one wheel of the wagon came off and on the other side a rock, causing the load to shift

composed of three buildings, a store, hotel and saloon. All were built of logs with dry rot. In 1880, Condit met and married school teacher at the Rock Creek school in TWIN FALLS county. The newweds moved to Hagerman valley in 1893 and he got a job working on the flour mill. They mostly mining enterprises. He \$125 a day, and only a 12-day day.

Condit says those hours were really a snap compared to what he had been doing and he thought he had a wonderful job. The first year spent in Hagerman valley, they lived with an aunt, Mrs. Sarah Secor, who was one of the first teachers in Hagerman. The site of the aunt's home was just east of Hagerman, but the house is known now as the Harry Farney place.

The Condit lived with the aunt until he homesteaded a place along the Malda river north of Hagerman on the site that is now Idaho Power company land and has two power plants on it. The first winter, Condit helped build the tunnel that brings water to the townsite of Hagerman.

There was one store in Hagerman, with a postoffice and groceries on the main floor and the saloon in the basement. Billy Coltrane was the merchant, having bought the business from a man named Hagerman, who had started the business and ran out of money. This building was a frame building, but was later rock-faced and is now the home of Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Chaplin.

Each summer Condit would haul by team and wagon flour and melons to HARTLEY in the Wood River country. He continued this for about 20 years.

Condit recalls that during the hard times in 1891 a cow and calf were worth about \$10. He recalls making long cattle drives where he would be in the saddle for two days and a night driving to Malta from Hagerman. He spent the night on a blanket in the spot where Twin Falls is now.

Condit recalls Indians wintered in Hagerman valley each winter, and many times came to them for food. Indian Tom, whom many of the early settlers recall, was an especially good friend and got many a slice of bread from the Condit during hard times. He recalls that the Indians lived on deer, jackrabbits and in the spring rock chuck.

The Condit had five children.

New Record High Predicted for Feed Grain for Seventh Consecutive Year

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12 (AP)—The agriculture department estimates today the total feed grain supply for 1959-61 would total 270 million tons, three per cent more than in 1957-59 and a new record high for the seventh consecutive year.

The big supply this year resulted from another generally favorable growing season, with production close to record high last year and record high harvest.

The department's publication, "The Feed Grain Situation," said the number of grain-eating animals on farms in 1959-61 was expected to be a little below the 1957-59 level. The decline from a year earlier will be greatest this fall and winter, as fewer hogs and poultry will be on farms at that time. Feeding rates per animal, however, were expected to continue high and total consumption is expected to equal the record 1957-59 level.

The department said that even with continued heavy consumption of feed grains, the carryover into 1961-2 was expected to be again probably to amount five to 10 per cent above the 75 million tons carried over into 1959-61.

The 1960 growing season turned out favorably for both feed grains and forage crops. Feed grain production was within one per cent of the 1959 record and this year's hay crop was only three per cent below the record output in 1958.

Feed production this year was the best for livestock on farms in most areas of the country, although drought reduced output of both feed grains and forages in areas of the South and West.

Japan also contemplated purchasing more than 100,000 worth of breeding livestock—bulls, milk cows, horses, hogs and sheep. Possible sources would be the United States, Australia, the United Kingdom, The Netherlands, Denmark, and possibly South Korea.

Melvin Jagels, this year's Twin Falls county grassman of the year, has a sheep and sheep-raising operation on his 180-acre farm near the town of Arden. The farm is a model for other sheep raisers who want to develop self-sustaining livestock operations along with crop production.

Each year, Jagels has selected one of the four finalists who will graze on his land on Monday night to hear which will win the title of Idaho Grassman of the Year. This year, Jagels' type of operation has been discussed impressively by agricultural experts at the University of Idaho.

Though half of his 180 acres is in row crops each year, Jagels still manages to support at least 500 ewes the year around and also has room for 800 lambs for six months. This is accomplished without buying outside pasture.

Moller chose that particular art school because of its reputation and its staff members. It is the oldest art school in the United States, founded in 1826.
