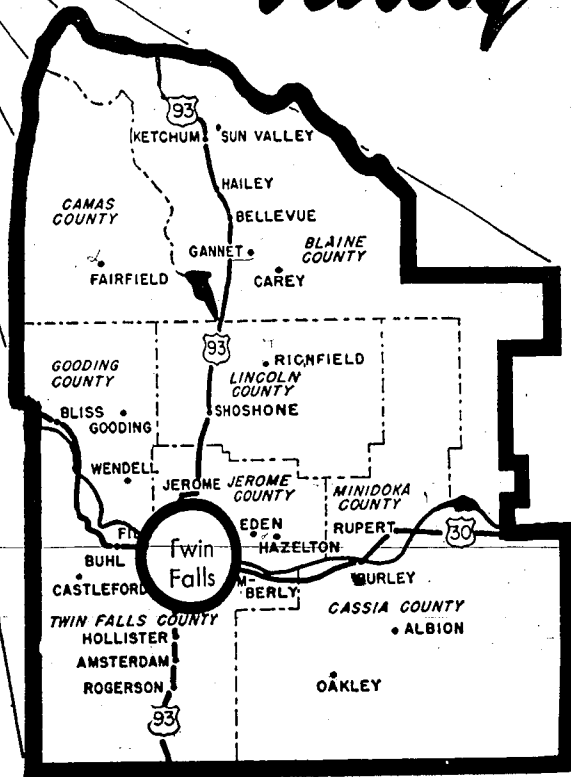

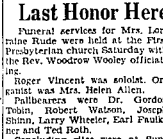

Billion Spent By Army for Faulty Tanks

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 — House investigators have reported the army bought more than one billion dollars worth of medium tanks which required a tremendous amount of maintenance.

The special armed services subcommittee report on the situation followed hearings on an earlier report by the general accounting office that the army bought for about 1.6 billion dollars nearly 17,000 combat and tactical vehicles that had serious deficiencies.

During hearings before the subcommittee the army contended the GAO report contained 229 errors or omissions.

"We were much impressed with the fact that the GAO, in the interim, picked up much of its testimony with official documents of the army or the contractor," the subcommittee said. "The contents and import thereof cannot be ignored."

The report added that modification of about 2,000 M48 tanks costs about 25 million dollars or about \$12,500 per vehicle.

The subcommittee recommended that the army, in view of the regional maintenance in this field, should minutely analyze the scope and vigor of its program of research, to eliminate or substantially decrease this requirement.

Legal Aspects of Interstate Highway Case Are Discussed

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Macmillan to Let Kennedy "Move" First

LONDON, Nov. 19.—Prime Minister Harold Macmillan has decided to let President-Elect John F. Kennedy make the first move in the negotiations the close ties between Washington and London.

It was learned today on Irish authority that the British leader will await an invitation from Kennedy for talks which some compelling international emergency force a revival of the British cabinet forces Macmillan to go to Washington before repatriating.

Beet Farmer Pay in U. S. Is 12 Million

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 19.—Payments totaling nearly 12 million dollars have been made to beet growers in Idaho, Utah, eastern Oregon, Washington, South Dakota and Nebraska.

The payments were announced today by J. Arthur Wood, president of the U. S. Beet Growers' Association.

About five million dollars went to Washington growers, 3 million dollars to Utah, 2.5 million dollars to Idaho and 1.5 million dollars to growers in the Black Hills area.

Wood said the payments are being delivered through Oct. 23 in the Washington-Oregon area and to Nov. 2 in the other sections.

The payments are for 1.2 million tons of beets. Another 250,000 tons are expected.

Wood said that under the federal sugar act growers will get 50 cents per ton and these payments will total about 12 million dollars for the company's producing area.

He said the company is in a favorable position to increase acreage contracts for next year because of the Cuban situation and the recent lifting of acreage restrictions for the 1937 crop.

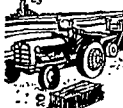

Total Farm Production Expenses for 1961 Expected to Change Only Little

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Total farm production expenses for 1961 are expected to change only a little from the 1950 level, according to a report issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The report was based on the 34th annual survey of farm production expenses, which was completed in 1950. It shows that total farm production expenses for 1950 were \$11.9 billion, or an average of \$12.90 per acre.

For 1961, the department expects total farm production expenses to be \$12.0 billion, or an average of \$13.00 per acre. This represents a slight increase of 1 percent over the 1950 level.

The report also shows that the average price paid for farm products in 1950 was 100 percent of the 1947-49 average. For 1961, the department expects the average price to be 101 percent of the 1947-49 average.

Hay, Pinto Bean Markets Are Active, Top-Grade Cattle Bring Better Prices

Hay and pinto bean markets showed renewed activity this week, and a few loads of top-grade cattle brought better prices in the trading weeks indicated perhaps the beginning of a new winter marketing trend in fall cattle markets.

Hay is being bought and sold in all directions out of Magic Valley according to hay-brokers, and the price of good quality hay is quoted at \$23 per ton in the market. The demand is being met by an open market with no price differential between buyers.

Some of the hay is going to Nevada and the rest to the States. Hay and raitn the past week, the hay market is not the reason for the renewed demand for hay. It is due to the fact that the market is now open for the winter season when hay is sold and bought in large quantities.

There are no reports of any change in the price of pinto beans. The market is active and the price is steady at \$1.25 per bushel.

Discussed for Meeting

RENO, Nov. 19.—One subject that created great interest among livestock feeders attending the recent seventh annual feed conference at the University of Nevada was "All-concentrate rations for beef cattle."

The subject was discussed by W. Williamson, manager of beef cattle and sheep research division of Ralston Purina company, St. Louis.

Williamson said it was possible to have an all-grain ration because the grains that have been used have a built-in roughage factor. Among these grains, he listed barley, oats, corn and milo with cotton seed hulls. The hulls were found necessary to use with milo to give enough bulk to avert digestive disturbances.

The Purina researcher said two precautions are necessary if feeders are going to be successful in using the low-roughage, high-concentrate ration for beef cattle.

About two weeks are required before the cattle are put on full feed, said Williamson. During this time, forage is offered free choice to the animals. The roughage grain was at the same time increased each day until the animals were on full feed.

Secondly, he warned livestock feeders to keep cattle on full feed for at least 30 days.

First Custom Feedlot in Magic Valley Plans to Fatten 10,000 Head Annually

GOODWIN, Nov. 19 — Fields' custom feedlot, the first custom feedlot in Magic Valley, will fatten 10,000 head of cattle a year as the operation gets into full swing, said Robert Fields, who is co-owner of the enterprise, with his father, Ernest Fields.

A custom feedlot, also called a contract feedlot, is one where the cattle being fattened are owned by people other than the feedlot owner. The type enterprise varies and depends upon whether the feedlot-owners are charging for yardage, feed or whether they are charging on the basis of cost-gain ratios. In the case of the Fields, the costs are based fully on the tons of feed used to fatten the animal.

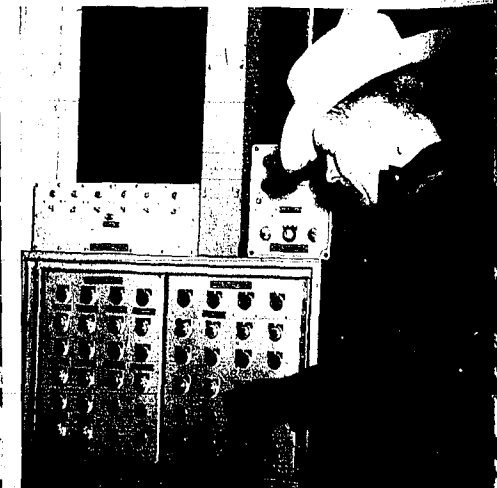
Though some custom feedlots in the valley have fed out other people's cattle before, the Fields' is the first one that is advertising itself as such. It is also the first one of any size and scope that

can be ranked alongside some of the huge custom feedlots that are in business in other western states in the Caldwell area.

The two Fields are better known as owners of the Idaho Horseford ranch, southwest of Goodwin. They have a 600-cow herd that grazes each year in the Fairfield area and also have been fattening about 3,000 head of cattle for a number of years.

The feedlots at the ranch, of course, have been expanded to hold about 4,000 head of cattle at a time. As cattle are sold, new animals will be brought in and fattened. In time, from 500 to 1,000 head will be sold and moved out each month of the year. This is an enormous turn-over and shows that the valley doesn't intend to be an isolated silage feeding. Its ration for the present and for the future, so far as is known now, will include silage, hay, grains, pulp, antibiotics and mineral supplements and all other necessary ingredients.

With these feeds in mind, they built a new automatic feed mixing

Beet Yields Hit 32 Tons Per Acre on Fields Prepared During Fall of 1959

N. W. Arrington, Twin Falls farmer, raised his best crop of sugar beets this year when yields were down generally throughout Magic Valley.

Arrington raised 32 acres of sugar beets and had an average test yield of 32 tons per acre.

Average yields for the Twin Falls district, according to Robert Day, manager of the Amalgamated Sugar company, are 21 tons. Average yields for the Burley-Pala areas, according to Ernest Blauer, are about 15 tons.

The "secret" for Arrington's success this year is in planning his crop in ground that was prepared completely by hand in fall of 1959.

By preparing his land last fall, Arrington was able to plant his beets as soon as the ground was dry enough in the early spring to allow him to enter it and harrow down the small ridges along the

fact that Arrington never had to add nitrogen to these fields during the growing season. Fieldmen for the sugar company watched the green leaves and soil color, checked for signs of disease, but they never found any.

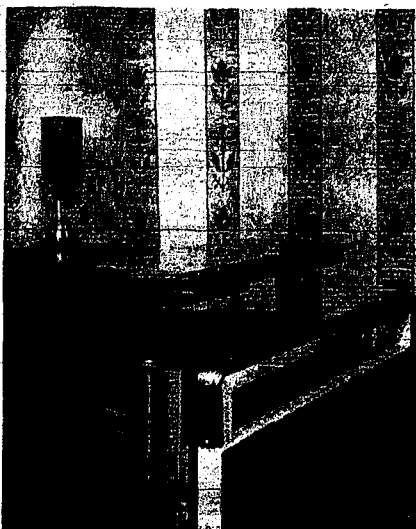

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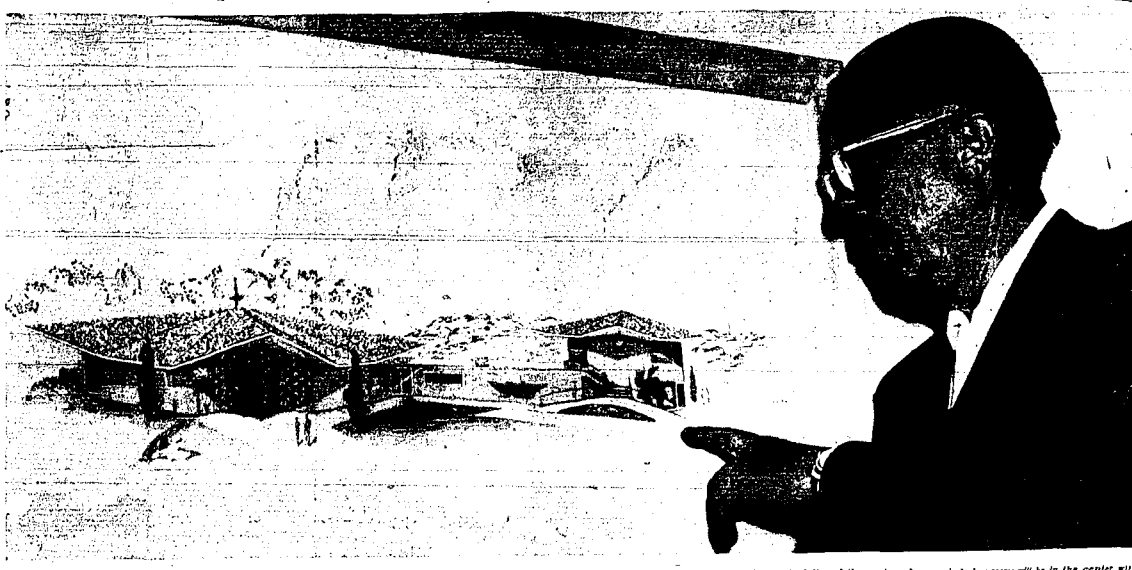
