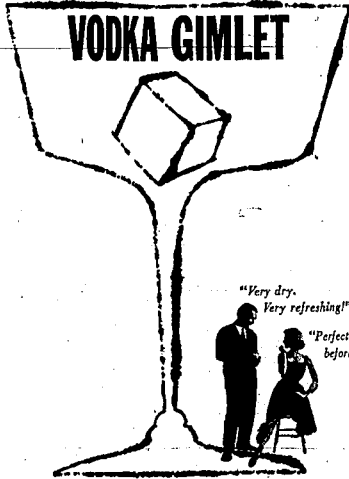

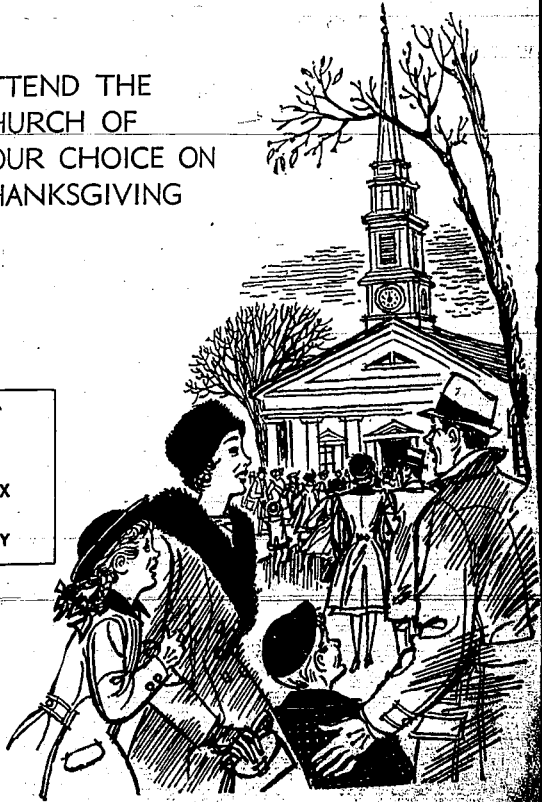

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—The government has banned use of a coal tar color used in maraschino cherries and to color the coatings of transformers.

Announcing the action, the food and drug administration said preliminary experiments have shown the color produces liver damage in test animals and no safe use level has been established.

The color is known as FD-C-10, food-grade-colored No. 1. John L. Harvey, FDA deputy commissioner, ordered further use of the color be eliminated immediately.

### Six Families in Hunt Project Request Better Mail Service

HUNT, Nov. 23—Six families residing in the Hunt irrigation project in Jerome county have petitioned for better mail service. The families are: Jerome and Eden, by the Hunt-Hunter-Budge to aid them in obtaining adequate rural mail service.

Jerome has a station, a "center" half a mile wide and one mile long, all connected by a network of gravel roads. The families are now delivered by a rural carrier on route 3 out of Jerome to a point two and a half miles from the nearest home and four miles from the farthest house.

Noting that most of the group has resided here approximately 11 years, Poole alleges that often the families have assisted important financial loss by not getting their mail daily.

During the first few years before a gravel road was secured, the families cut after their mail by horseback. Now they go by car. The letter notes but points out the time involved makes this a real burden.

The land and names are separate from those of other Hunt settlers, who receive mail delivery to their doors by an unaccepted area two

and a half miles of the home. The note has now been extended half mile nearer to come within two and a half to four miles.

"Our boxes are necessarily placed along an open country road where watching for any kind of protection is impossible. Some of us have sustained important loss also through theft of mail and many of the boxes are literally riddled with rifle holes. The post office department has been unable to protect them or to speed up the law violation," the letter states.

In reducing the requests for rural free delivery within a reasonable

distance of their doors, the post-office department cites a department ruling promising to deliver two families for each mile traveled by the carrier in making deliveries, Poole says.

"With six families for the eight miles, we apparently are a little short of meeting this requirement. But we are informed on several occasions that this department ruling is not a law and that many exceptions have been made to carry mail in isolated ranch families," the group states.

The road over which the rural carrier would travel is graded, regularly traveled by both school buses and milk trucks.

Poole says the group has been informed that within a few days this area will be placed on a rural route out of Eden and will be taken off the Jerome route.

# Junior Loop Will Leave L. A. Alone if National Okays Interleague Slate

NEW YORK, Nov. 23 (AP)—The American League Tuesday night agreed to postpone its 1932 season until 1932 if the National League would expand immediately to nine clubs and consent to start unprecedented interleague play in 1931. Washington was the ninth club in the American league, with the new club getting the majority created by the transfer of Calvin Griffith's Senators to Minneapolis-St. Paul. Cronin appeared to be out front as a possibility for a new team in the National League, but Boston and New York had been mentioned for expansion to 10 clubs in 1932.

However, it was believed the National League would be given a choice if it can iron out its problems with the owners of the National League franchises in that city.

By a second team to enter New York, the major league territorial rights would have to be changed. Both cities would have to agree to the commissioner would cast the deciding vote on an expansion in that city.

Commissioner Ford Frick's insistence on a "fair and equitable" settlement in an appeal to the American League's decision to forego moving to Los Angeles in 1932 as planned.

If the National League should refuse to go along with the nine-club plan, the American League has threatened its decision to enter Los Angeles in 1932.

Joe Cronin, American League president, said the nine-club operation would be for one year only, each team would play a total of 160 games, 144 with each of the eight clubs in the American league and six with each of the nine clubs (54) in the other major league. Cronin said the American League would play in the regular league standing.

The American League asked the National League to play in the American League in 1932. It probably will come at the regular National League meeting Dec. 2 in St. Louis. The American League invited to attend in that city. The American League has been urged to draw up a sample schedule with dates.

Joe Egan, American League president of the National League, said in the office of Frick Tuesday morning for about two hours. Walter O'Malley, owner of the Los Angeles Dodgers and chairman of the American League committee, also was present.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—Senate investigators of mobster influence on professional boxing Tuesday kept the approximately 25 witnesses under wraps for their protection.

The senate antimobster subcommittee said the names of the witnesses kept secret until the start of public hearings Dec. 5.

The subcommittee had announced Tuesday that the approximately 25 witnesses would include James D. Norris, Chicago boxing promoter; Charles (Sonny) Egan, one of the top promoters for the world heavyweight boxing championship; and the alleged boxing racketeer, Frank (Al) Palermo of New York, and Philadelphia.

In a statement, Subcommittee Chairman Estes Kefauver, D-Tenn., said he was withholding the names of some 25 additional witnesses "in order to protect their personal safety."

He said they include an assortment of boxers, one of them former champion, holding promoters, matchmakers, managers and sports chadshady fringe characters. He also Kefauver said have ties with the underworld.
