Hike in Sugar Production in 1961 Forecast

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—Government experts have predicted that sugar production in the United States will increase during the next marketing year but will decline in 1961.

The foreign agricultural service has forecast a world sugar production of 100 million tons in 1960-61, a record of \$1,722,000,000.

This would compare with 53,239,000 tons in the previous year. The average of the five years prior to 1949-50 was 39,721,000 tons.

The survey said world production from sugar cane in the United States will increase during the next marketing year but will decline in 1961.

BURLEY, Nov. 24 — "Private responsibility and public discussion" was the theme of the annual student council workshop held at the Burley high school Tuesday afternoon.

Dr. Gerald Garff, professor of speech at the University of Utah, addressed the 300 youths during the opening session. "You need to build a better world by building a better you," Dr. Garff declared, setting a goal and going to work to save America for the future.

"Speaking in power, and speaking in the name of the world," he said. He divided his talk into three parts which were "comparative, self-up your goals and objectives and work."

"Complacency is the greatest enemy of leadership," he said, warning cheating and neutrality. One of the people in America are interested in politics.

"Do not be afraid to stand up for what you know is right," he asserted.

"Good living is threatening to return America to a second rate nation. All students should dedicate themselves to scholarship. Most people only use five per cent of the five billion brain cells they have," he said. "It is not so much IQ but the use of it."

"The secret of perfection is persistence," he said. "You can do anything that you set out to do," he said.

Seventy-five per cent of the work is done by 25 per cent of the people. About a fourth of the people do the work and the rest are vegetarians, he declared.

None of the doctors who perform operations on lung cancer use tobacco, he noted. We have about 1,200 new alcoholics a day and women who use alcohol are divorced 32 times more often than women who do not use it, he concluded.

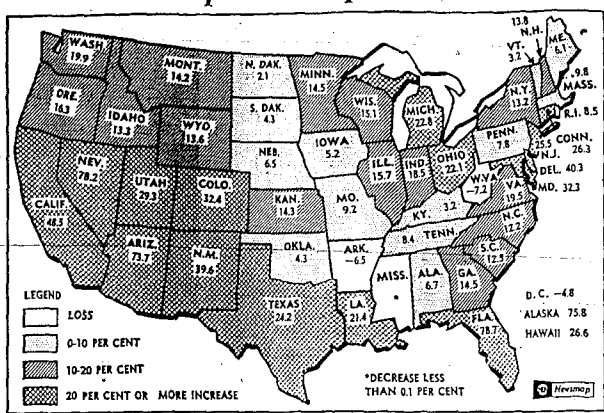

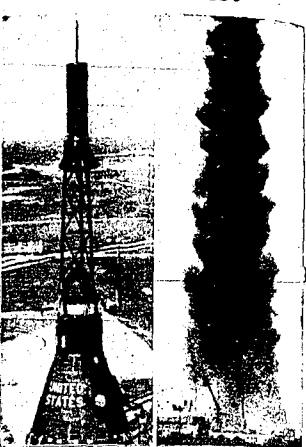

Because incomes for consumers are expected to remain at high levels, demand for food is forecast to be strong. Retail prices are expected to average about the same as the past year.

The nation is expected to eat more meat and poultry in 1961 than in 1960. Beef consumption, said Robert J. Lovell, a market analyst, will reach an all-time high, the year reach an all-time high, as much as 90 pounds per person.

NEW YORK, Nov. 24 (AP)—An American league spokesman indicated today that the National League will not accept a nine-team, interleague schedule offered as an alternative to immediate American league entry into Los Angeles. The AL source told the Associated Press, "They'll (the National League) never go for it. Walter O'Malley would have to be a supergenius to sell it—the others don't want it."

U.S. Getting Down to Brass Tacks on Problem of Gold

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—For more than a year, the Eisenhower administration has been fumbling around the edges of the gold problem. Now it is getting down to brass tacks.

Why the sudden emphasis on emergency action when the dollar will lose 13 billion dollars of gold—about half of the first world's supply?

It's largely a matter of arithmetic. First of all, 11.5 billion dollars of Uncle Sam's gold is tied up by law. One can't leave the country because it backs up part of the U. S. money supply.

That leaves 2.5 billion dollars of gold to meet foreign demand—the amount which the United States must satisfy at all times if it is to remain "as good as gold."

Since Oct. 1, foreign nations have been buying gold at an annual rate of more than a billion dollars.

Nuclear Unit Under NATO Is Due Study

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—The house-atomic energy committee has disclosed plans to investigate control of U. S. missiles sent to Europe and to study the possibility of establishing a nuclear striking force within the NATO alliance.

Five committee members are scheduled to leave during the week-end for an on-the-spot inquiry into operations at U. S. military bases in Europe and talks with military and civilian leaders in London, Paris and West Berlin.

Bomb Transfers Eyed
They will look into arrangements for transfer of nuclear bombs from U. S. custody to allied forces in the event of a Soviet attack also will consider whether changes should be made in the law covering custody of U. S. atomic weapons.

An aide to Sen. Wallace F. Bennett, R. Utah, a committee member, said the inquiry also would provide information for an evaluation of the proposal for establishment of a nuclear striking force within the Western defense alliance.

The proposal was renewed by House Foreign Affairs Committee Chairman Gen. Louis Norstad.

Hope Abandoned
The committee's plans were revealed as high officials reported that the Eisenhower administration has all but abandoned hope of presenting a definite plan for the NATO nuclear task force at a scheduled meeting in Paris on Dec. 16.

The officials said submission of a specific proposal for giving NATO a nuclear war capacity of its own probably will be delayed at least six months. The plan will have to be thrashed out by the main administration if it decides to go ahead with it.

The nation's population stood at a record 173,237,175 on April 1.

Infant mortality rate is 27.4 per 1,000 live births, or every 7 1/2 seconds, death, one every 20 seconds, the arrival of an immigrant every 1 1/2 minutes, and the departure of an emigrant every 23 minutes.
