The U. S. launched a two-stage Thor-Able-Star missile yesterday afternoon in an attempt to orbit a satellite in the Caribbean.

The missile was launched from Cape Canaveral, Fla., at 11:30 a. m. and was tracked for 10 minutes before it was destroyed by a mid-air collision.
