Legislators Disagree About Size of School Fund Boost

BOISE, Dec. 14 (AP)—There is little hope that the members of the 1961 Idaho legislature think the state should spend more money on public schools but there is wide divergence of opinion on how to do it.

A survey by the Associated Press shows that 76 per cent of the legislators think the state's portion of public school costs should be increased. Only 19 per cent said they think there should be no increase. The rest said they were undecided.

For the current biennium the state is paying 27 million dollars from the general fund into the public school program. It is divided among the counties and school districts on the basis of enrollment and other factors.

That 27 million dollars is a boost of five million dollars from the preceding biennium.

The state department of education says that to maintain the present per cent rate of state participation the state share must be boosted to about 308 million dollars in the two-year period beginning July 1, 1961. Only 30 legislators think the state share larger than that; the department says that the financial position of the schools is improved.

Several legislators who said they thought the state's appropriation should be increased, specified they favored a boost only to cover the normal growth.

Many mentioned no specific figure, but those which were mentioned ranged all the way from two million dollars for the biennium to 12 million dollars.

A number of legislators said they thought the state should provide 50 per cent of the total operating cost of the schools. This is a proposal of the United Educational Association, the Idaho School Trustees Association and the Idaho Congress of Parents and Teachers.

One legislator who said he favored such a plan said he thought it could not, however, be attained this session.

For the 1959-60 school year the total cost of operating the public schools in Idaho was placed by the state department of education at about 40.9 million dollars. Half of that amount would be thought to be paid on schools, predicted Young.

New Defense Chief Rose to Top Job Fast

DETROIT, Dec. 14 (AP)—Robert M. Rosen, selected by President Kennedy to be chief of defense, is a former college professor who learned the secret of a successful business with military aviation.

He appeared on the automotive scene in 1946 with the formation of Ford Motor Company and climbed his rise to the top job in 1958.

Advancement Rapid
The first job at Ford was to establish a planning control department. In rapid succession, he became controller, assistant general manager of Ford division, vice president and general manager of Ford division, group vice president in charge of car and truck divisions and then president.

McNamara, 44, is one year older than Kennedy. He was a Kennedy contemporary at Harvard where he received a master's degree in business administration in 1939.

He is independent.
From 1940 to 1943 he was an assistant professor of business administration at Harvard. As a consultant in the war department he helped plan a statistical control program which later was applied to the complicated logistics operations of the air force.

McNamara, professor to be appointed to the successful 1958 senatorial campaign in Detroit.
Michigan, this year he is competing against the incumbent governor by liberal Republican Ted Bagwell.



WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The federal space agency was told today that America should begin figuring out how to meet the psychological impact of a discovery that intelligent beings live on other planets.

A research report said such a discovery could bring profound changes or even collapse of civilization on Earth.

"Whether or not Earth would be inspired to an all-out space effort by such a discovery is moot," the document said. "Societies are of their own place in the universe have disintegrated when confronted by a superior society, and others have survived even though changed."

Clearly, the better we can come to understand the factors involved in responding to such crises the better prepared we may be.

The 100-page report was the result of a \$9,000 one-year study conducted by the Brookings Institution for the committee on long-range studies of the national aeronautics and space administration (NASA).



Fast Aid for Critical Sites Is Suggested

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—President-elect John F. Kennedy's committee drafting recommendations on aid to depressed areas is expected to propose an emergency program which the chief executive could act in motion the day sales office.

The group will work on the plan a series of private subcommittee hearings scheduled here during the next three days.

Fast relief sought

The committee is exploring methods of granting more aid, possibly to areas with chronic unemployment through a series of presidential orders that would require lengthy congressional consideration or approval.

This plan is being drafted along with a long-range legislative program aimed at reducing depressed areas through industrial relocations spurred by a federal aid and grant plan.

Kennedy set up the committee to redeem a campaign pledge to aid areas where lack of a federal program to fight lingering unemployment was an explosive political issue.

Alternatives Listed

A committee spokesman said the group was considering three alternatives for immediate help to depressed areas. Each could be cited in presidential action.

- Increasing the amount of outlays available to industrial plants.
- Granting additional concessions to firms in these regions bidding for government contracts.
- Launching certain public works projects which have been authorized by congress but not started.

—Releasing a vast reemployment program under existing legislation.

—Revising the federal highway program to get more road projects under way in areas with high unemployment.

The lack of presidential leadership, Reuther said, caused the "massive resistance" that followed in the wake of the historic decision and which has now entered a new phase of "massive resistance."

Minuteman Is Given Praises During Show

SEATTLE, Wash., Dec. 14 (AP)—Deadly, nuclear-tipped Minuteman missiles, rolling through the countryside on special trains, could be fired within 90 seconds of an alert, an air force general said yesterday.

Gen. O. J. Rindland, Los Angeles, commander of the ballistic missile division, told a news conference the solid-fuel Minuteman could be launched from many one of thousands of preselected rail sites.

About 100 of the intercontinental missiles will be carried on trains shuttling over the nation's railroads.

Rindland said each train would consist of 13 cars 70 feet long. Four or five will contain the missiles and their launching equipment. The rest will house the crew and control mechanism.

The mobile commander spoke to 50 U. S. rail executives gathered for their first look at a full-scale mockup of a Minuteman launch train. The Boeing Airplane company here is prime contractor for Minuteman, which is expected to be in combat readiness in 1952.




