SALUTE TO EZRA

It seems apparent that Ezra Benson, for eight years a controversial political figure as secretary of agriculture, is about to dip out of that post. He has been indicted for a number of years. November election returns indicate that Benson never was the political liability to the Republican party that he was charged with being. Practically the entire nation's farm areas voted Republican in November and Nixon carried almost every largely agricultural state.

We suppose, too, that few will be the small praise for Benson when he does slip out of the public picture. But there will be a few, already we have noted one, published—or all placed—in a newspaper in South Carolina in the heart of the "deep south."

If he had been an ordinary man or just another politician, Ezra Tait Benson's lot would have disappeared from the Washington scene. Through his term of office, it has been his lot to enforce laws he believed unwise and to administer a program of waste and extravagance, which he could not expect to change. In doing this, he has had to shoulder all the blame, all the congressional fire, for policies which would not work. When he goes back to Utah, the United States will hear the services of a man who was not afraid to think straight in a world of political confusion.

Secretary Benson never had a chance. He had ideas—but congress vetoed them. Before the end he had written to the story of federal bungling in agriculture, we expect that a new report and report for Ezra Tait Benson as a man with a sound program will have emerged from today's sticky thinking—Eastern Idaho Farmer.

THE SNAKE NEEDS ATTENTION

Something had happened to Idaho's Snake River.

Dead fish by the thousands have been found under the ice in the reservoir back of Milner dam on Snake River between Burley and Twin Falls. That hasn't happened before, and naturally it's something that's coming in for concerned attention of the state health department, fish and game authorities—and of Twin Falls officials.

It's a matter of particular concern to Twin Falls because Snake River water is pumped through dam has been the Twin Falls county's main source of domestic, as well as irrigation, water supply ever since that great agricultural empire started.

The best guess about what's the matter seems to be that the fish were killed by lack of oxygen in the water caused by oxidizing action of sewage and waste.

It's a development that emphasizes and brings close to home the urgent necessity for more and better water pollution control.

It's scarcely surprising that Twin Falls may have to find a better source of domestic water supply. That's been under consideration for many years and several plans have been proposed, some of them based on investigations that the city has financed.

A Twin Falls official has been quoted lately to the effect that any Twin Falls citizen who witnessed the situation existing at Milner dam would immediately become an enthusiastic backer of a plan to drill deep wells to provide a new source of water supply. This incidentally would be a very costly undertaking, since these wells would have to be drilled to great depths through solid lava and they would require considerable unexcavated bore holes.

Actually Twin Falls isn't confronted with any great emergency. With its modern and efficient filtration plant, its falls well equipped to convert Snake River water into a domestic supply as safe and wholesome as air, for instance, the city has no problem.

Quite obviously, though, something needs to be done about pollution on Snake River.

Twin Falls shouldn't have to carry the whole load.—Boise Statesman.

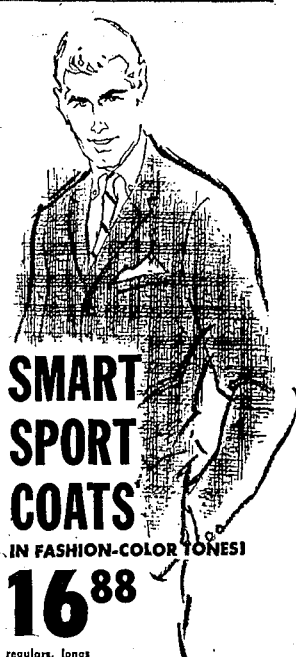

AP Members Select General Election, Mine Strike, Fires as Top '60 Stories

Idaho's general election, which saw the defeat of a veteran GOP congressman but gave Republican control of the state legislature was the Gem state's top news story of 1960.

The rating was given in a polling by newspaper and radio news men throughout the state in a poll conducted by the Associated Press of a possible 100 points — based on 10 for first place, nine for second and so on—the story of the general election garnered 160 points.

Only one of the 16 ballots cast in the poll failed to give it some ranking. It ranged from first place on 12 of the 18 other ballots down

to fifth on one. It got two votes for the No. 2 news event and three for No. 4.

The prolonged north Idaho mine strike, which extended from May to the falling days of the year, was ranked No. 2 news event of 1960. It got 146 points and was ranked No. 11 on four ballots.

Forest fires which swept wide areas in mid-summer made the No. 3 spot, getting 127 points. The fires were rated the top incident on two ballots.

Following the three pace-setters in order were these:

No. 4 — Atty. Gen. Frank V. Benson's running feud with the state highway board and other state agencies, 98 points.

No. 5 — Primary election, in-

cluding first use of the runoff provision, 73 points.

No. 6 — Mystery slaying of Portland man solved; girl becomes witness against companion, but later is acquitted of murder charge; 71 points.

No. 7 — Vern Law, Methodist youth, wins two World Series baseball victories for Pittsburgh Pirates; 40 points.

No. 8, tie — First illness under new income tax law, including "head tax" controversy, and death of one of the Shinnecotts born to a Parma farm couple; each 33 points.

No. 10 — Controversy over state highway board routing of interstate highway, including district court ruling against board in Magic Valley case; 27 points.

All but one of the ballots listed one of the top three as the No. 1 story of the year. One ballot gave the No. 1 rating to the drought, which this year caused all storage water to be drawn from American Falls reservoir for the first time since the dam was built in 1924. The story got no other votes, however.

Among other stories which rated high, but failed to get into the top 10, were these:

Rep. Harner Buckle, Republican who has represented Idaho's second district in congress for 10 years, was the veteran lawmaker turned out by the voters in the mid-1950s.

In May the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers ordered a strike against Buckler Hill company, the largest of the north Idaho operators, and walkouts against other properties followed.

Negotiations continued sporadically, but without apparent success, and during the late summer months attempts to organize a new union were begun. They climaxed with a national labor relations board election in which 7331 miners voted to substitute the newly formed Northwest Metal Workers union for the Mine-Mill union as their bargaining agent.

Negotiations between Buckler Hill and the new union began immediately.

The north Idaho strike story is a day to day saga, although the contracts with most north Idaho mine operators had expired in the mid-1950s.

Another north Idaho operator, the American Smelting and Refining company, reached agreement on a new contract, ending the strike; 43 and 8 prospects.

During the strike, controversy developed over the handling of public assistance in north Idaho and over operation of the hot lunch program in Ketchikan public schools. High school youths formed an "I Am an American Youth" organization and staged public demonstrations aimed at what they called communist influence in the area.

Drought over a period of several years contributed to the dry condition in Idaho forest lands which resulted in fires that made the state's No. 3 story.

The climax came in late July, with fires sweeping wide areas of the state. Forest officials said the blazes were the most damaging in 30 years. Total cost was estimated, at several million dollars and

Naval Shipyards Take Look At Measures for Fire Safety

U. S. naval shipyards are taking a hard second look at their fire-fighting armament to make sure that the aircraft carrier Constellation will be the last warship disabled by fire before it even puts to sea.

A survey by United Press International showed that no major changes, such as abandoning the use of the criticized wooden plank-deck on most of the warships, are considered by shipyard commanders until a special technical board in Washington makes its report.

The shipyards ordered their own safety investigations even before the special board was appointed, and even before the last body was found in the bowels of the charred supercarrier.

The pattern of any changes is demonstrated at the Newport News, Va. shipbuilding and dry-dock company, where America's first nuclear-powered carrier, the USS Enterprise, is being completed.

Locations of fire-fighting equipment have been reviewed and some changes are being made. City fire officials were invited to inspect the carrier's mass of passageways and a familiarize themselves with the location of fire-fighting tools. They looked over the ship after it was launched Sept. 24, but ordinarily would not have been back again for several months.

At the Boston naval shipyard, where the carrier Albany is undergoing conversion to guided missiles, a temporary fire alarm system is being installed and the ship's own system is being rechecked to insure hot smoke fire on the Albany before the Constellation brought a review and a tightening of safety measures.

New York Fire Commissioner Edward P. Cavanaugh, Jr., criticized the use of wooden planking for walkways on metal scaffolding because, he said, it might become fuel for any of the dozens of small fires that break out during the construction of any ship.

The fire that took 49 lives on the Constellation last May was the aircraft carrier's 42d.

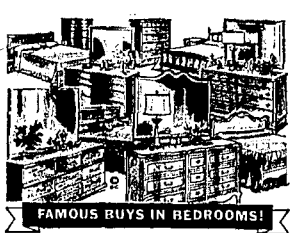
A spokesman at the New York Shipbuilding corporation in Camden, N. J., where the Constellation's sister ship the USS Kitty Hawk is being built, said wooden planking had the advantage of being readily cut to size without standing damage and providing a rough surface for better footing.

Nevertheless at many yards, such as the Bethlehem Steel company yard at Quincy, Mass., a wider use of steel platforms is being made.

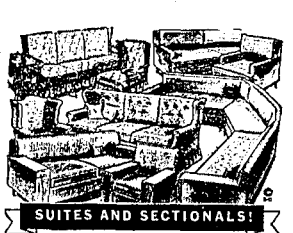

Rockefellers' Overseas Investments Earn Profits, Help Foreign Countries

NEW YORK, Dec. 25.—The Rockefellers' overseas investments are the third-greatest earner of profits for the family, according to a report by the great philanthropist's program, they have raised investments for millions of people in other countries. And they have done it with the idea that they know best a hard-headed, efficient business.

The principal asset of their good intention is the many-faceted International Basic Economy Corporation, which reaches into 100 countries and commands wealth of Puerto Rico.

When as a Latin American venture it has spread around the globe, it has:

- 1. Lowered food prices in Venezuela, Puerto Rico and parts of Haiti and Peru.
- 2. Built more than 7,000 low and medium-cost houses, and 127 in Puerto Rico.
- 3. Made postwar steel a commodity in Venezuela.
- 4. Increased iron fields in Brazil through distribution of hybrid seed corn.
- 5. Organized mutual investment funds in Brazil and Colombia that have raised savings out of millions and into the economy.
- 6. Helped finance a rolling mill in Mexico, an automotive plant in Brazil and mining operations in Southern Rhodesia.

But these accomplishments are not the result of any of the many Rockefeller philanthropies.

"When we are philanthropic," says R. W. Parrish, chairman of the IBEC board, "it simply means that somebody has made a mistake."

Since IBEC pulled out of the stock in 1955, there have been five mergers. Consolidated, it is worth \$754,521 in 1958 and \$2,608,827 in 1959. For the first nine months of this year it was \$2,902,880.

Individual members of the Rockefeller family have invested millions overseas. Nelson has his experimental farms in Venezuela. Laurence has a 1,200-acre resort in Puerto Rico.

But IBEC is their big, cooperative venture.

The brothers—John D. III, Neil, Winthrop, Laurence and David—are the third-greatest earner of profits for the Rockefeller family. Laurence and John D. Nelson outlined the IBEC plan to his brothers in 1947 when he found him served five years as president of Rockefeller's troubled shoe store in Latin America.

Its brotherly benefit has thrived. In an American camp, they shall operate at a profit in a country in such basic fields as food and housing. It would attract competition. Others, particularly nationals of that country, would make similar investments, and the economy would benefit.

Castleford Boy, 3, Is "All Fixed up" After Undergoing Operation on Heart

CASCADE, Dec. 26 — Bruce Wheeler, 3½-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Wheeler, Castleford, who underwent open heart surgery this fall at the LDS hospital, Salt Lake City, was doing well when taken back to the tunnel chest clinic there Dec. 22. The boy had a hole the size of a quarter between the lower chambers of the heart. It was closed with a plastic patch. The block in the valve leading to the lungs was removed.

His mother reports a heart-lung bypass machine was used during the surgery. Physicians made an incision down the center of the boy's chest. Thirteen units of blood were required during the four and one-half-hour operation and during his hospital stay.

Mothers of children who had undergone heart surgery, realizing they must need for blood for out-of-state patients, recruited blood donors free of charge. Mrs. Wheeler says without the help of the mothers, operating that many units of blood would have been almost impossible.

Bruce's blood is type A, B11 negative. Before the operation the little boy would turn pale blue at times, his mother says, adding he always was tired because of

the lack of oxygen. The blockage in his valves forced the blood through the hole between the chambers and out to the body without going to the lungs. He had gained less than a pound in the year before the operation.

Since then he has gained three pounds, eats and feels "so much better," the mother states.

The little boy now is able to run, dress himself and do many other things like normal children of that age. According to Bruce, "he's all fixed up."

Mrs. Wheeler points out in 1957 doctors would have given a child in his condition a 60-80 chance, but now doctors say only one out of every five patients dies as the result of this operation.
