## Holiday Traffic Death Toll

### Peak Traffic Fatalities Predicted

The Associated Press Traffic accidents killed at least 385 Americans during the three Christmas holidays. The nation's traffic toll for the holiday was less than last year's 439, but the toll for a three-day Christmas period since 1949 when the total was 413. There were fewer lives lost on the highways than the National safety council had estimated. The example of the holiday warning was that traffic fatalities were expected. Deaths in traffic accidents during the night and day of Christmas increased that by millions of motorists jammed highways heading home from Christmas. The heat and ice made driving hazardous and some accidents and deaths were dropped. The National Safety Council, which had estimated a possible death toll of 510, said traffic fatalities would number 250 on the holiday. It predicted that this time of year, it estimates 200 people may be killed during the holiday New Year holiday week.

## U.S. Regulatory Agencies Flayed

### In Demo Report

PALM BEACH, Fla., Dec. 27 (AP)—President-Elect John Kennedy has released with commendatory comment a scathing report that says federal regulatory agencies are afflicted with outside pressure, political appointees and a "bureaucratic and inefficient" organization. The report, which recommends a massive shake-up and reorganization of the agencies, is the product of James M. Landis, former Harvard law school dean and former member of the Federal Reserve board. Landis, former chairman of the agencies involved in the investigation of "Alice-in-Wonderland" procedures, of drifting and stalling, of costly delays in getting the work done. Kennedy is expected to use the report as the basis for action and reorganization of his own. Legislation will be required. "The report is a human and thorough in its analysis and its conclusions are unmistakably but not by name. It is with regard to the awarding of overseas airline routes that Kennedy is at his worst. There has been a long history of mystery-shrouded approaches to the White House."

It says that in this field there has been in the past two administrations a "total absence of presidential self-restraint in avoiding political influences."

And it criticizes regulatory agencies in general for the fact that they have had no real concern with their operation. A decade covers most of Eisenhower's administration and two years of Kennedy's. Landis surveyed the agencies, picked out what he considers their faults, and proposed remedies. The civil aeronautics board, which Landis once headed, is mentioned in a glowing way.

There is a policy of land retirement probably 60 million acres of cropland would have to be retired immediately by five per cent in the next few years.

Retirement of farm land tends to be the extreme end of the spectrum from agriculture, especially if entire farms are retired. In the United States, the farm population is being reduced by 100,000 a year.

The public agricultural research and educational machinery might be switched in part over to work more intensively on the agricultural development problems of the poorer countries of the world. The United States has a surplus of agricultural machinery and equipment which could be sold to underdeveloped and poorer countries.

This does not mean providing opportunity in farming for all who now live on farms—but opportunity in the economy some who are displaced from farms.

It is evident that the reasons for the disparity of farm income in modern times are overproduction and excess numbers of people in agriculture.

As short-range or intermediate goals, the farm population should be reduced to a point where the movement of people out of farming to more productive jobs in other parts of the economy is possible.

For those who stay in farming, technical assistance, capital and more labor are needed to make them productive farmers.

**LET'S END 'EXCUSE AGE'**

It is interesting to note that a surprising number of leading figures in America think of their country as fundamentally undisciplined today.

One of the latest to voice this view was Conrad Wilson, Chicago police chief and an academic specialist in police and crime matters.

Called to his post to clean up a bad situation in that city, Wilson said he brought his thoughtful outlook to the task. He has some definite notions on how to bring discipline into some aspects of our life.

Naturally enough, he is deeply concerned over the many tendencies found among the nation's youngsters. Many who deal with this problem urge stronger punishment as the best antidote for delinquent behavior.

Wilson doubts that severity is the decisive factor.

In his own judgment there are two crucial elements in effective punishment. One is promptness in applying it. The longer it is delayed, the less effective seems the connection between the offense and the consequences.

The other vital need is that the punishment be inescapable. Wilson sees it is the sure knowledge that some kind of penalty will flow from a misdeed that a vastly more severe deterrent than the prospect that a severe penalty MIGHT result under certain circumstances.

The police and court records of our major cities testify to the fact that a very great percentage of our delinquent youngsters either escape punishment altogether or find its effectiveness minimized by delays and other temporizing.

Wilson appears to be on sound ground. Certainly those thinking in this country, "let's punish" school of thought cannot complain. Nor is he harking a "soft" approach.

Probably most psychologists would agree that what makes for good discipline is the steady, inevitable application of authority. Not only children but most adults respond best when they know exactly what is expected of them, when they may do as well as they wish but do not without reaping unhappy consequences.

When this ceases to be the Age of the Excuse, when misdeeds of whatever degree and kind are punished promptly and severely, then perhaps we will not hear leading Americans speaking any longer of the "disorderly society" in which we live in the 1950s.

**GOERS TO THE NEW FRONTIER**—These three sections, however, have given a lift to the business, industrial and financial communities as they close out the year.

"There is reason to believe that the USSR can achieve a rapid acceleration in its rate of technological progress by an all-out scientific program in the field of automatic control," the report said.

**NO NAPPING, PLEASE**

There have been occasions before to remark upon the emptiness and the paltriness of the liberal thinking in this country.

Since the nation needs the full force of both its liberal and conservative urges at its best, it would be good if it could be reported that the previously noted tendencies were diminishing. Unfortunately this cannot be said.

The biggest weakness shown by the offending liberals is one which seems to extend to a contraction of their very nature. Too often they do not search out the truth. Indeed, there are many times when they do not even display a curiosity about it.

They tend to deal in black and whites, to favor the party they happened later to indulge in her worship which goes well beyond the bounds of reason into the pure emotion.

These things should be the very farthest from their normal intellectual behavior. The true liberal is wedded to the quest for truth, is intensely curious, deals in shades of gray betwixt the complexities of today.

As an example, one of the complaints raised in some liberal circles against the new secretary of defense, Robert McNamara, was that he was a specialist in market research.

**ANSWER TO TEACHER COST PROBLEM?**

When the Pocatello, Idaho, school system found itself in extreme difficulties a few years ago because of the high cost of education, the problem was solved in large part by men and women who volunteered to teach. They reduced the cost of education by teaching to teach but they had chosen other professions.

This Oregon Educationist tells of a somewhat similar program.

An interesting idea in education has been advanced at Orangeburg, N. Y., where the school system "allows" some of its children to go to school on Saturdays. The school is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. through 12 with qualifying children attending voluntarily.

The teachers are scientists, architects, engineers and writers, to name a few. They try to teach the children by using their own professional knowledge and experience. As the courses extend over 17 weeks, the experts can devote their subjects and in the evening of the potential of the students.

These classes are limited to students who have shown "proof of creativity" in their studies.

The Salem school district makes use of local talent and advanced material in its educationally advanced program, but there are many school districts in Oregon that have similar programs.

Saturday morning classes would provide a very inexpensive way of introducing a supplemental educational program for gifted children, one which would not interfere with current class schedules.

School District 10-G (Pendleton and consolidated districts) has tried some variations for this. For weeks last summer, some junior high school students were given the opportunity to attend school three days a week. For the teacher and the students, it was a volunteer program.

The district is now doing what many other districts have come to. The school day had been lengthened to permit those students who want additional work to get it.

A good argument can be made for Saturday classes, but for those who can do more work on their own in five days. Staffing the classes would be a possible solution. The teachers would be on duty taking on another day of classroom work. Perhaps Orangeburg, N. Y., has found the answer.

There is no doubt that many of our students could do more than they are required to do. And they would like it. Every possible way to give them more education should be explored.
