### Delay Urged In Minimum Wages Boost

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—Senate foreign relations chairman J. William Fulbright today said minimum wage hike should be postponed until the Kennedy administration has a "strategic and international perspective."

The Arkansas Democrat today urged the International Labor Office to call for an immediate increase in wages for workers in the business slump which push up prices and generate foreign trade protection against foreign imports thereby "undermining the economic assistance."

He said it would be "poor timing" for President-elect John F. Kennedy and the new Democratic congress to carry out the party's pledge of a minimum wage increase under present economic and foreign conditions.

An increase in the \$1-an-hour minimum wage is one of five legislative proposals given top priority by Kennedy.

Fulbright said he expected to introduce his bill to the incoming president. The senator was one hour under consideration for reelection in the state of Arkansas last week. The post went to Dean Burt.

### Texas Solon's Friends May Make Policies

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—Friends of Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, D. Tex., apparently are going to control the content of the new Democratic policy committee in its new congress.

Democratic leaders are reported to have agreed on the selection of Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, Wash., and John O. Pastore, R-Rhode Island, to fill two vacancies on a group which will advise Johnson on policy to be placed before the senate.

Stable Hired Magnuson and Pastore chairs committees as liberal, but their expected selection may be greeted with something less than enthusiasm by such past critics of Johnson's middle-road course as Sen. Paul Douglas, Illinois, and Joseph P. Clark, D-New York.

As the committee is beginning to pick up, self-styled liberals apparently are going to be in the majority. But they include no former critics of the president on Jan. 20.

Sen. Mike Mansfield, Montana, expected to be promoted from leadership position to top leadership job, will head the policy committee. Other members include Hubert H. Humphrey, Minnesota, will become a committee member in the senate.

### Yugoslavia Plans More West Trade

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Dec. 28 (AP)—Prime Minister Nikola Mirkovic says that Yugoslavia is liberalizing its foreign trade and forming exchange rates.

The aim is closer trade ties with the West. Large-scale aid is also expected from the United States and other western countries.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28 (AP)—Six weeks or less a dozen nations including China will have A-bombs and H-bombs, a note British scientist-writer claims.

"Within, at the most, 10 years some of these bombs are going to be in my hands, that is the certainty," said Dr. C. P. Snow.

"We know, with the certainty of statistical truth, that if enough of these weapons are made by enough different states—some of them are going to show up," he declared.

"Through accident, or folly, or madness—no the motives don't matter."

"We are faced with an either-or, and we haven't much time."

### Shortage Likely

TOKYO, Dec. 28 (AP)—Communists today remained silent about the achievement of its 1960 production targets and there was speculation that the plan had fallen short of fulfillment.

The New China news agency broadcast year-end reports on industry and mining, but they concentrated on preparations for the 1961 plans.

Efforts are continuing to outstrip the 1960 coal production target, one statement said. "A number of big machine tool plants . . . are preparing to re-adjust the production organizations."

### A-Shelter School Plan Under Way

ARTESIA, N. M., Dec. 28 (AP)—A completely underground elementary school designed to double as a community fallout shelter in case of nuclear attack is being drawn up for this New Mexico town in the first such project of its kind.

The \$430,000 prototype school shelter, whose walls will be made of 18-inch reinforced concrete, will be able to withstand all but a direct hit, according to officials, and would ward off more than 99 per cent of outside radiation.

The school will be only 30 miles from the construction site of an Atlas intercontinental missile base which military experts feel would be a prime target of the enemy in case of attack.

Citizens in Artesia have offered mixed reactions about the school, which is expected to be completed in the fall of 1961.

### Red Chinese Grain Failure News Queried

A Red Chinese report of crop failure affecting half of all the mainland harvest on "the day after tomorrow" is being queried by Chinese people.

Even so, the report itself may be a hoax fabled up by Chinese people by a regime anxious to mollify its severe winter grain crop forward.

The report, which said that a national grain shortage is being created, creates the amount available for export.

Natural Causes Hinted

Supporting sources reported that workers on China's Honan and Henan provinces had been moved on reduced rations because of a disappointing grain production. Propaganda said "natural" causes had hit 150 million of the 300 million acres under cultivation.

The report said that 20 million acres suffered serious losses.

The report noted that the government had ordered a 45 per cent increase in 1961 and a 50 per cent increase in 1962 to compensate for natural calamities.

Drought Hits Crops

"This year," the report said, "China was hit by the heaviest drought since the beginning of this century by other serious natural calamities."

The report said it was a miracle that in spite of the severe drought to which they were subjected, not one of the rural people's committees for the year 1960 collapsed.

This is attributed to the fact that the communes have developed their own community welfare services, established a supply system, increased production for self-sufficiency.

Production Stated Down

Presumably the latter report that the government had ordered a 45 per cent increase in 1961 and a 50 per cent increase in 1962 is noteworthy in two aspects:

- It represents a further acknowledgment of agricultural production which has been in progress since the establishment of the communes in 1958.
- It is an expression of Red China's determination to press ahead with the commune program which has been described as the greatest step in human life and progress for human life and progress since Josef Stalin's massacre of the peasants in 1929.

Estimates Exaggerated

In 1959, the reds admitted to a 10 per cent bumper crop for 1959 had been grossly exaggerated.

They then scaled down 1959 gains in grain production from 525 million tons to 275 million tons, or a drop of nearly 50 per cent.

Their 1960 figures called for an increase of 45 per cent over 1959 and it now is disclosed that the gain will be small, if there is any gain at all.

### Liberals Plan Revised Solon Talking Rules

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—Bismarck for congressional liberal, Democrats and Republicans alike called today for new senate filibusters and suppression of the filibuster's constitution to clear the road for President-elect John F. Kennedy's legislative program.

Sen. Joseph S. Clark, D., Pa., said that unless the filibuster rule and other procedures are changed when congress reconvenes next week, the senate could become the graveyard of Kennedy's proposals.

Rule Called Monkey Wrench

Liberal Republican Sen. Kenneth S. Keating, New York, branded the filibuster rule a "monkey wrench" in the machinery of government which makes it impossible to deal with the issues of a country in a proper and orderly manner.

Rep. James Roosevelt, D., Calif., who is a sponsor of a bill to amend the filibuster rule, urged an end to the GOP-southern Democratic coalition which dominates the powerful house rules committee but withheld support for any specific method.

The lawmakers made the statements in speeches prepared for a one-day conference on "The Changing Majority Rule in Congress," sponsored by Americans for Democratic Action (ADA).

Clark, a leader of a group of two-thirds of the senators voting to out of a filibuster. He hopes to change the rule to permit a majority to end filibusters.

### Kennedy Faces Recession As He Predicted He Would

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—President-elect John F. Kennedy's campaign as a Democrat has inherited a recession, though that may be a harsh word for a decline in sales and profit as most economists now forecast.

An immediate problem confronting the new administration will be one that Kennedy has predicted in the election campaign—serious unemployment.

However, a majority of government and industry experts interviewed for this survey predict privately that recovery will be delayed by midyear. Over the whole of 1961, national output and income should top 1960's all-time high.

If its severity the business day is not expected to exceed one or two per cent. That in total production will not fall more than five to 10 billion dollars below the peak rate of 565 billion dollars annually reached last spring.

In reaction, it may be as brief as the last recession, on a 12-month short on record. The 1957 downturn began in September; the upturn started eight months later, in April, 1958.

Full employment never regained full employment after that recession, and joblessness is expected for the most serious problem of this one. Unemployment probably will exceed five million by February.

By a year from now, the economy's total output—the gross national product, or value of all goods and services produced—may exceed the 1960 peak by 10 to 15 billion dollars as annual rate. This means it could go as high as 1960's level, a feat not predicted for this year, despite the unemployment problem.

In November joblessness rose to 6.7 per cent. Labor market conditions experts acknowledged that, even if business activity does not fall away in February, however, the total probably will move past the million mark at just about the time Kennedy takes his oath of office.

The disappointing employment picture for October—normally the best month of the year for jobs—was the chief cause for concern, although the administration had released them in advance in past two years.

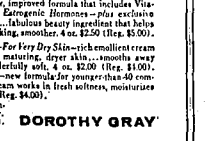

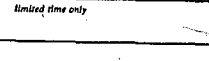

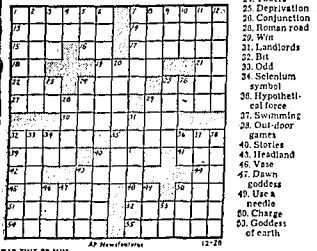

### U. S. Dollar Saving Program Worries Japan Defense Unit

TOKYO, Dec. 28 (AP)—The Japanese defense agency is worried that the United States dollar saving campaign will slow development of Japan's defense forces.

The agency fully expects that the United States will cut its military aid to Japan as part of America's new dollar pinching policy.

This in turn would delay Japan's five-year timetable for development of its own ground, sea and air self-defense forces.

Under the plan, the 1950-51 fiscal year is scheduled to get another 10,000 men reorganized to 12 divisions. Most of these are contemplated to replace present weapons of Korean war vintage.

The maritime self-defense force was expected to reduce the number of tanks it had under construction.

Modernization of the ground force is expected to be delayed as is the plan to add more men to the army.

Lack of military aid, however, could not be blamed entirely on failure to look at the number of men in the ground force.

The defense agency wanted a lower basic appropriation committee that has been facing a tight budget. American flag ships carry only about 10 per cent of U. S. expenses and imports.

### Help Asked

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28 (AP)—Commerce Secretary Frederick H. Mueller has asked American exporters to help stop the loss of U. S. gold abroad by increasing their shipments of American-made ships and planes.
