Eastern Oil Blasts Injure Eight People

BAYONNE, N. J., Dec. 29 — A series of explosions caused through a petroleum company in the major oil refinery in the eastern night and early today, killing at least eight persons and injuring 20 others.

Police and fire officials said the blast at the Sun-Ed Production company apparently started about an empty dump truck backed into a four-foot, 100-gallon oil tank. The tank was struck and touched off a series of eight explosions.

The truck theory explains the cause of a viewpoint that the explosion about the aircraft carrier collection tank last week at the Rocky navy yard.

A tank lift truck struck a tank of diesel oil.

Flames from the explosion climbed 500 to 1,000 feet into the sky, and cast an orange glow over the State of Liberty, about five miles away in New York bay.

About 1,000 persons gathered to watch the blazes, which destroyed the tank and the four-foot diameter, high-pressure cylinders. The fire was declared under control about two hours after the first explosion, but burned for several days.

The 200 persons who fled their nearby homes were allowed to return early today.

Teen-Age Driving Report Backs Plan To Raise Idaho Minimum Driving Age

BOISE, Dec. 29 — In an attempt to gain support for proposed legislation in Idaho to raise the minimum driver's age from 14 to 16 years, a citizens' committee to raise the minimum driving age has circulated a Boise Chamber of Commerce report of the teen-age and automobile.

In an accompanying letter, Mrs. Robert H. Smith, executive director of the committee, cites the hope that an awareness of this problem teen-age drivers can be brought about.

Mrs. Smith says a bill will be brought before the next legislature when it meets in January to raise the minimum driving age from 14 to 16 years.

The report made to the Boise Chamber of Commerce board of directors says, in part: "The owning and operating of an automobile has in the past decade become a vastly over-emphasized factor in the lives of teen-agers."

"The hard fact of life is that the youth of today are more sophisticated and more intelligent than ever before. The report was made to the Boise chamber by Dr. H. W. Taylor, Boise.

"The report continues: 'The time has come for the legislature to take a hard look at the adverse effect of the car on the teen-ager and on the state and safety.'

"The report notes that the teen-ager's activity in many of our sister states toward raising the minimum age for obtaining driver's licenses, the report notes that most Western states require the teen-ager to be 16 or 18 years of age at the time of minimum.

"Idaho has a pretty disgraceful record as far as the fatal accidents and teen-agers are concerned," the report continues. The report presents examples of Idaho

teen-age fatal accidents in the past several years.

"Because some teen-agers have a poor sense of responsibility, that is the reason to raise all of the rules for others. Driving is a privilege, not a right," the report declares.

"The student with the sense of responsibility will know that he will also know that he is growing up and it will be long before he will be an adult out in society. Fully qualified to enjoy all of the additional privileges and responsibilities of adulthood."

"As a class, youthful drivers are not to be more accident-prone than older drivers. Young men under 25 years of age, according to the National Society of Casualty and Surety Companies, have the worst record of any group."

"In March, 1939, there were 1.8 million teenage drivers in the United States. Statistics of driving attitude plays an increasingly important role in America's traffic patterns."

"National Safety council figures for 1937 show that while teen-

agers made up 22 per cent of the driver population they had 10 per cent of the fatal accidents and 11.5 per cent of all accidents.

"Many states, including Idaho, are concentrating on the education of drivers' training courses in school as the safe answer to our problem. If we could predict the direct relationship between the knowledge imparted in these courses and the sense of responsibility of the teenage driver, then these courses would have more success."

"The report explains that a restricted license may be issued to a youth of 14, which prevents him from driving at night. However, many 14 and 15 year old children do drive at night with their parents' consent and knowledge," the report claims.

"Our ownership has considerable more effect on grades than permissive use of the family automobile." "The most damaging effect of car ownership was found among those students who formerly ranked in the top one-fourth of their class. Like other students their grades dropped when they became car owners." The facts were based on a study conducted in the Niles Township high school, Skooki, Ind.

"The worst drop is felt by the brighter students. The ownership or availability of a car imposes a double burden upon a free time a student might normally use for study."

Hospitalized are Mrs. Vernon Hazen and Sherry Hazen, 3, a daughter. Mrs. Hazen has a broken right leg and the child has a crushed knee that is still in traction.

Two other members of the Vernon Hazen family were hospitalized after the accident which occurred in California. Hazen and a son, Ricky, 5, were released the day after the accident. Laurie, 6 months, who incurred a broken right leg, has been released from the hospital.

The baby and Hazen remain in Las Vegas and Ricky has been returned to Twin Falls where he is staying with Mr. and Mrs. Jarvis Hazen, 1414 Spruce avenue, Grandparents.

"Two other children in the family were with the Hazens in Twin Falls when the mishap occurred. The family was en route to Twin Falls from California."

Two flights will be added at the Twin Falls municipal airport, beginning Tuesday, reports Don Cooper, district sales manager for West Coast Airlines.

The added flights will bring to 22 the number of arrivals and departures per day at the airport by West Coast Airlines, Cooper said.

In addition to the new flights, Twin Falls will be made a transfer point for flights originating in eastern Idaho on that date, he added. Passengers on these flights will transfer to the P-21 propeller plane.

"Twin Falls for Boise, Seattle and Spokane."

"This will be the first time Twin Falls has been used as an originating or terminating point for air-train, Cooper noted.

The flight will offer an 8:25 a.m. flight out of Twin Falls which will arrive in Boise at 10:00 a.m. at 11:30 a.m. The other new flight will leave Twin Falls at 1:45 p.m. arriving in Denver at 4:20 p.m. via Salt Lake City. The flight will continue to Chicago arriving there at 7:30 a.m.

This will offer a more "one-line operation" for the Magic Valley area, he explained.

What Khrushchev does about the summit will help Kennedy to see more quickly the shape and of his burdens in 1961.

IMPORTANCE OF LAOS A quick look at the map of Southeast Asia shows how dangerous it would be to have a little country of Laos fall under Communist domination.

It stands as a crucial buffer between free and Communist China and Communist North Viet Nam on the north and south.

A veritable turmoil operation that gave four different, indeed, five different, faces suddenly thrust the leftist into power in Moscow, unable as always to keep hands off in explosive situations, began attacking Laos and ammunition to the leftists.

This action has been speedily and properly challenged by the United States and Western friends. It is bald-faced intervention in the affairs of another country.

The United States, in specific, repudiates the Geneva armistice agreement of 1954, which ended the Viet Nam-Chinese war by partitioning Viet Nam into free and Communist areas.

It is the United States government, and not the United States people, that is responsible wherever possible through the U. N., for preventing Laos from falling under the Communist shadow.

The world should be made to understand again, as it has had the chance to learn through the troubled Congo, that the Soviet Union is bent especially on a course of destruction and conquest.

In the pursuit of this goal in 1960, it has as never before sought to warp and subvert the U. N.

Free men need to be stronger and more united than ever to stand up to this mounting aggression.



Goldfine Back In U. S. Arms After Tussles

BOSTON, Dec. 29 (AP)—Bernard Goldfine, back in federal custody after three days of freedom, underwent mental tests yesterday while his attorneys maneuvered for his release on bail.

The 36-year-old textile tycoon, once the free spending friend of top government officials including former Presidential Aide Sherman Adams, will be examined to determine if he can stand trial on charges of evading nearly \$800,000 in personal and corporate income taxes.

He has been in almost continual federal custody since early in July when he began a jail term for contempt of court. Since his release on Oct. 4 he has been in court or mental hospital.

Goldfine's attorneys requested his release on half year's bail. Federal Judge George C. Sweeney refused. The refusal was filed with the U. S. court of appeals but there was no immediate indication when the higher court would hold a hearing.

Judge Sweeney set Jan. 18 as the date for a hearing to determine if Goldfine is mentally able to stand trial on the income tax charges.

Goldfine was picked up by federal marshals at his hotel suite yesterday after refusing the judge's admittance for over an hour. It took two more hours and considerable arguing to haul the tycoon into his clothes and out of the hotel to the hospital.

U. S. Citizens Set Smoking Record in '60

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29 (AP)—By the end of this year, Americans will have puffed an estimated \$19 billion worth of cigarettes—four per cent more than in 1959 and a new all-time record.

Consumption of cigars (including cigarillos), smoking tobacco and snuff also increased moderately during 1960. But the popularity of chewing tobacco continued to wane, reaching a new low.

Bigger 1961 Expected In its tobacco report, the department predicted that even more cigarettes and cigars will go up in smoke during 1961, with the use of smoking tobacco and snuff remaining about the same and chewing tobacco continuing to decline.

Economists writing in the publication, "The Tobacco Situation," said exports of leaf tobacco in calendar year 1960 probably totaled a little higher than in 1959. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 1961, tobacco exports seem likely to be at least five per cent higher than in the preceding year.

Estimates Quoted Consumption of cigars and cigarillos in 1960 was estimated at close to 7.2 billion, two to three per cent above 1959 and the highest since 1923.

New Try?

LONDON, Dec. 29 (AP)—Western scientists said today the Soviets may race a man into orbit or land a robot laboratory on the moon to coincide with the inauguration of John F. Kennedy on Jan. 20.

New reports said western intelligence indicates unusual activity is currently taking place in Soviet satellite launching bases and that Russian missile monitoring ships are preparing to move out to their stations in the Pacific and Indian oceans.

Foes of Cuba Chief Likely To up Action

HAVANA, Dec. 29 (AP)—Premier Fidel Castro is expected to intensify his campaign of sabotage and terror-leading next week, when foreign communists and Soviet satellite launching bases and that Russian missile monitoring ships are preparing to move out to their stations in the Pacific and Indian oceans.

Groups from Russia and Red Germany already are on their way here, and a party from Red China is expected to arrive at any moment. Leftwing students and politicians from various Latin American nations also are expected to take part in the anniversary observance.

The government announced yesterday that Castro will give a party at "Camp Liberty" on New Year's day for 10,000 teachers and 1,000 foreigners to welcome the "year of education" to Cuba.

Anti-Castro saboteurs started a hotel fire and bombed the offices of a national health institute here yesterday, causing considerable damage but no reported casualties.

Harding Busy Preparing for '61 Congress

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29 (AP) — Ralph Harding, Idaho's new 31-year-old house Democrat, is busy preparing for work when the 87th session of congress opens next week.

"But there are a million things to do before now and then," he commented yesterday after a quick look around his quarters in the house office building and an urgent house-hunting trip.

Harding has been on the move since he flew in Thursday night with his wife and their son and two daughters.

Appointments Made
"The family is having a great time, but it is pretty hectic," he said.

Aside from locating his office, the Blackfoot businessman has named two members to his staff: Lynn Broadhead, Blackfoot, will be staff assistant and Betty South, Milad, legislative assistant.

Harding said he intends to have an all-Idaho staff and will fill other positions on the basis of interviews he has conducted in the state.

Hill Listen, Learn
"I plan to do a lot of listening and learning," he said, when asked about his intentions when the house gets down to business.

At the end of his list, however, is reintroduction of a bill to authorize the Bureau of Census to conduct a survey of the nation's population in a house committee last session.

The power-irrigation project "is more sorely needed now than ever," he said, and he will try to co-sponsor the measure with Rep. Grade Platt, D. Mo., a long-time supporter of the Snake river project.

Problems Sought
Harding has no commitment yet on a committee assignment, but he hopes to be named to the agriculture committee.

"Generally I plan to concentrate on the field of reclamation and sugar beet legislation, both very important to my state," the youthful congressman said.

"We need a long-range sugar program to stabilize the industry and help beet producers and processors," he said.

Kennedy Visitors Paying Own Way

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29 (AP) — With few exceptions, officials of the Kennedy administration are paying their own travel expenses in these busy days before inauguration.

The newly named cabinet members and second echelon appointees have been piling up air mileage flying to Washington from Palm Beach, Fla., to confer with President-elect John F. Kennedy and with outgoing Eisenhower administration officials.

Pierre Salinger, Kennedy's press secretary, said in response to an inquiry that "by and large" persons traveling any distance to see Kennedy have paid their own way.

In a few cases, he said, expenses have been paid out of the Kennedy staff fund, which is financed by the Democratic national committee. Frequently these payments were to men who could not personally afford plane tickets, hotel rooms and other travel expenses.

Williams Plans Trips to Africa

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29 (AP) — Michigan Gov. G. Mennen Williams plans to make several trips to Africa shortly after he takes over as assistant secretary of state for African affairs in the Kennedy administration.

Williams' announcement of his travel plans coincided with a statement by Chairman Barrett O'Hara of the house foreign affairs subcommittee on Africa that the new administration will face a "tremendous challenge" to reestablish its leadership in Africa in the face of a "very determined effort" by the Soviet Union.

Williams had been planning to make an African tour before the Jan. 20 inauguration. But he told a news conference yesterday that the press of business had forced him to postpone the trip.

2 Set Record in Political Asylum

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina, Dec. 29 (AP) — Two of Ex-Dictator Juan Peron's policemen set a record last week for the grant of political asylum in a Latin-American embassy.

The brothers, Juan Carlos and Luis Amadeo Carrino, have been living for five years, three months and one week in the basement of the Embassy.

"That is a week longer than the famous stay of Victor Raul Haya de la Torre, leader of the leftist APRA party of Peru, who finally was allowed to go into exile six years from the Colombian embassy in Lima.

The brothers Carrinos were attached to the Peron dictatorship's special section of the federal police. Their job was to extract confessions from politicians and citizens who ran afoul of the Peron regime.

PORTLAND, Dec. 29 (AP) — Sales of Jannet Temple Hill and company's S and Q hardware store division, involving 35 stores in three states, to Coast-to-Coast Central Organization, Inc., has been revealed.

Russell Lippitt, vice president and West Coast general manager of Coast-to-Coast, said the transaction involved 18 S and Q stores in Oregon, 10 in Washington, and five in Idaho.

Lippitt said the purchase involved several million dollars in inventory items and included the transfer of Jannet's trade names.
