### Cuts for U.S.; Russ Europe Forces Eyed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—Sen. Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., has urged that the United States offer to withdraw some of its troops in Europe if the Soviet Union will cut its forces in the Eastern European satellite countries.

This would reduce the drain on American gold and still maintain the symbol of U.S. commitments to defend Western Europe if it is attacked, Mansfield said.

His statement yesterday emphasized that Mansfield was making a personal proposal rather than one to which the incoming president, John F. Kennedy, is committed. Mansfield became a majority leader of the senate this week.

**Soviet Force Is Big**  
Mansfield said five U. S. divisions now in Western Europe are up against more than 25 Soviet divisions in East Germany, Poland and Hungary.

The numerical imbalance as between the Russians for Europe and our own committed in Europe is overwhelmingly weighted on the side of the Soviet Union," Mansfield said. "From this it is clear that the U. S. divisions in Europe, as such, have lost real meaning in terms of the shield concept of NATO."

### Troops Called Symbol

"Protestations to the contrary, their significant meaning is a symbol of our commitment to join in the defense of Western Europe with all our strength and all our weapons if that area is invaded. "A symbol of this kind would be no less a symbol if the U. S. commitment were to consist of two or three divisions rather than five." He suggested the United States should offer to withdraw two or three divisions if the Soviets agreed to cut their forces proportionately in East Germany, Poland and Hungary—probably about 10 divisions.

### Two Separate U.S. Columns Head to Pole

CHRISTCHURCH, New Zealand, Jan. 2 (AP)—Two American groups are heading separately on the ground to the South Pole at a speed of about 20 miles a day.

An eight-man scientific party which left the American base on Ross Island in McMurdo sound Dec. 10, has now covered 492 miles of the 1,400-mile journey.

The group led by Albert P. Crary, chief scientist of the U. S. Antarctic research program is using two 11-ton snowcats towing sleds and fuel-tankers—large rubber rollers with diesel fuel—and also a smaller snowcat carrying ice-drilling equipment.

A tractor train led by Major Antero Havola, which left Byrd station on Marie Byrd land on Dec. 8 for the pole, has now covered 465 miles of an 800-mile journey and has passed Horlock mountains.

The party has three 37-ton tractor sleds and two weasels. The tractors are being delivered to the South Pole for construction work during the next Antarctic summer. There are 11 men in this group which also is doing scientific work.

Bridges, who heads the senate Republican policy committee, said this was likely to result in increased opposition to foreign aid and other spending proposals in the session of congress opening tomorrow.

Changes Expected  
"In the past our policy largely has been made at the White House," Bridges said. "It was a process of agreeing at the White House and then agreeing in congress. But there are signs to have to be some changes made."

"I think the Republicans in the two houses are going to work much more closely together than they have in the past. I think there is going to be a new independent attitude on foreign aid and some other matters."

"I hope we are going to give the help of Democratic conservatives in stopping some of the wild spending schemes which were pledged in the Democratic platform."

# Utah Holiday Highway Toll Jumps to Six

Three New Year's day accidents killed four persons, including two Salt Lake City teenagers in the spectacular plunge of a station wagon 200 to 300 feet down a jagged mountain side.  
Two other deaths, one on the last day of the year, and another Sunday, increased the holiday week-end traffic fatality to six. The holiday death count ends at midnight tonight.

**7 Rode in Stationwagon**  
The teen-aged victims were 17-year-old Bonnie Bywater and Tom Kent Burrows, 15, both Salt Lake City. They were passengers in a stationwagon carrying seven.

**A 63-year-old Salt Lake City man, Earl Edward Bush, died Sunday of injuries incurred early Saturday in an accident in Salt Lake City.**

Victims in the other New Year's day crashes were 48-year-old Loren Larson, Kearns, killed in a Salt Lake county accident, and 25-year-old Mrs. Catherine Painter, Stockton, killed in an accident near Tooele.

**Cure Missed**  
The stationwagon plunged through a guard rail on a sharp curve overlooking the mouth of Parley's canyon, southeast of Salt Lake City.

Two of the injured, 14-year-old John E. Thomas and 13-year-old Maryann Andrews, were found at the side of the highway looking down into the canyon.

Thomas was muttering, "What happened, what happened." He was missing a shoe and his nose was bleeding.

The other occupants, including the dead, were found strewn about the mountainside. The car was a total wreck and came to rest on a small ledge at the bottom of Parley's creek.

# U. N. to Hear Cuba's Claim About Attack

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Jan. 2 (AP)—Cuba's charge that the United States plans an imminent invasion of the island republic will be aired Wednesday morning before the United Nations security council.

U. N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold delayed his planned departure for the Congo and South Africa. He was scheduled to leave early today.

Although no reason was given for the delay, it was believed that Cuba's demand for a council meeting prompted him to remain in New York a little longer.

Cuban Foreign Minister Raul Roa called for an immediate meeting of the 11-nation group. He filed a complaint against the United States Saturday with Soviet Ambassador Valerian A. Zorin, who was the council president for December.

Zorin was unable to contact several of the council delegations when he tried to call a New Year's eve-council session.

The Russian delegate, whose term as president expired at midnight Saturday, passed the Cuban request to incoming January president Omar Loutfi of the United Arab Republic.

# 87 Animals Die In Rabies Case

MOUNTAIN HOME, Jan. 2 (AP)—City police here have killed some 87 animals in enforcing the city's rabies quarantine which was imposed on Dec. 22.

The quarantine will run until Jan. 22 unless more cases of the disease are found.

It provides that all dogs and cats shall be kept confined at all times.

### Show Me, Is Answer for Khrushchev

**PALM BEACH, Fla., Jan. 2 (AP)—**President-Elect John F. Kennedy appears to be taking a "show me" although polite attitude toward Soviet Premier Khrushchev's bid for new and reasonable relations between the United States and the Soviet Union.

Such an attitude seems evident in Kennedy's New Year's day reply to the Kremlin leader, as well as in his remarks at a news conference yesterday.

Kennedy expressed hope that relations between the two nations now gravely strained, will be marked by good will in the months ahead. But he had no comment on Khrushchev's offer to bury the hatchet over the U2 spy plane episode.

**Desire for Peace Cited**

On New Year's eve Khrushchev sent Kennedy holiday greetings in a message which also said, "We hope that the relations between the USA and the USSR will develop in the new year on a new and reasonable basis, the basis of common desire of the peoples of our countries for peace and friendship."

Kennedy said he had sent this reply. "Appreciate greatly your New Year's greetings and express the hope that in the coming months relations between our two countries will be marked by goodwill and a common desire for peace."

**Statement Recalled**

As for the U2 episode, the Soviet news agency Tass said Khrushchev brought up the matter when he "recalled a statement made by Mr. Kennedy during the U. S. election campaign that if he were president he would express his regret to the Soviet government over the U2 plane flight."

In other developments over the week-end, Kennedy:

1. Ignored a protest by Massachusetts Gov. Foster Furcolo and chose Harvard Dean McGeorge Bundy to serve as his White House assistant on national security matters. The governor of Kennedy's home state called Bundy unqualified for the job and said it was incredible that Kennedy even had considered him.
2. Roosevelt Offered Post  
Reported he had offered a position in the new administration to Franklin D. Roosevelt, Jr., son of the late president, but that Roosevelt told him he "has some obligations" and wanted time to think about the offer.
3. Appointed Boisfeuillet Jones to be a special assistant on health and medical matters in the department of health, education and welfare. Jones, vice president and administrator of health services at Emory university, Atlanta, Ga., will serve under Abraham Ribicoff, Connecticut governor named by Kennedy to be secretary of welfare.

### Tent City of Negroes Has Stirred Feud

SOMERVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 2 (UPI)—"Tent city" has become a major controversy in Tennessee.

"I had to get off my place after I registered to vote, and I didn't have no other place to go," says Georgia Mae Turner, a 58-year-old Negro grandmother, who is living there now.

"It's just a propaganda stunt," says Mayor I. P. Yancey, Somerville. "I don't know of any need around here."

**50 Pitch Tents**

The 50 tents, the two diverse opinions is a muddy field near here where 50 Negroes have pitched tents and moved in lock, stock and baggage.

The federal government claims that "tent city" residents are among 700 Negro sharecroppers who faced eviction from white landowners because they registered to vote.

Court orders were handed down Friday in Memphis, Tenn., and Cincinnati, O., temporarily halting the alleged evictions in Fayette and Haywood counties.

**Publicity Stunt Claimed**

A white defendant, who wished his name withheld for fear of "government reprisal," said "all those Negroes want is a lot of publicity."

"They're using you newsmen to drum up sympathy for their cause to help get a lot of contributions from up North."

James Forman, Chicago, coordinator of a committee assisting the Negroes, denied it was a publicity stunt. He said if Mayor Yancey didn't know of any need "let him visit the tents."

But whites, who say they went to the "tent city" to hire Negro workers, claim they were not allowed to enter.



### African Meet Will Eye New Congo Force

CAIRO, Jan. 2 (UPI)—Diplomatic sources said today the African summit conference scheduled tomorrow in Casablanca would discuss the creation of a separate Congo military command to back up imprisoned former Premier Patrice Lumumba.

This proposal was put forward by Ghana's Kwame Nkrumah and was under study by the countries participating in the conference, the sources said.

But before such a proposal could be seriously entertained it would have to meet with approval of a conference of heads of state, the sources said.

Most of the six African governments participating in the African summit conference have condemned the U. N. command in Leopoldville.

They have charged that the U. N. failed to safeguard the Congo's independence and unity. Some of the countries have pulled their forces out of the Congo-U. N. contingent.

When the United Arab Republic pulled its forces out of the Congo last month, official Cairo sources emphasized the withdrawal did not mean that the UAR washed its hands of the Congo crisis.

Instead it warned that "decisive action would be forthcoming to defend the Congolese peoples' rights."

A police car called to the scene by a passerby was struck by another car while the policemen were questioning Friedman. Officers arrested the driver of the car, Evesco-Jordan.

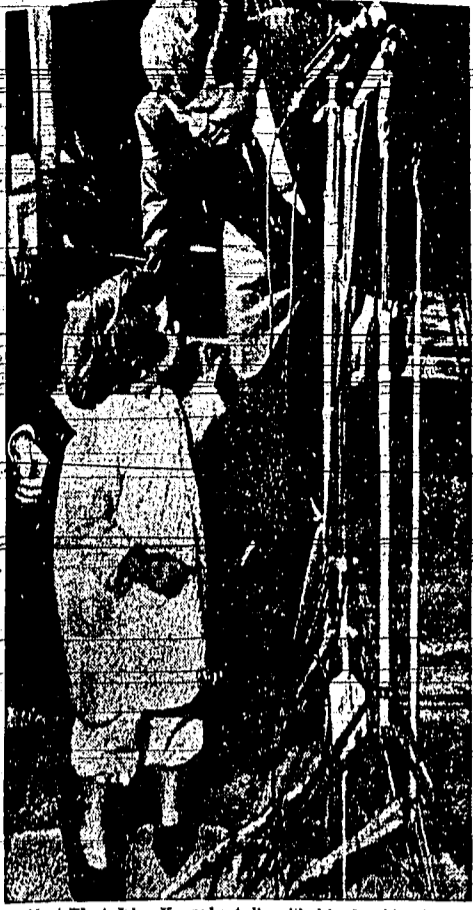

NEW YORK, Jan. 2 (AP)—It is time for our annual fuzzy forecast of what lies ahead, and a peek into the crystal ball shows you'll have plenty of fun in 1961—that is, if you like excitement.

1961 promises to be a stirring year for all, full of adventure for anybody who doesn't take off his hearing aid when opportunity knocks at the door.

Just in jest, here are a few predictions:

Ten thousand Americans will write and ask the new president, John F. Kennedy, if they can have as a souvenir the new silk topper he'll wear at his inauguration on Jan. 20. But Kennedy, with typical New England thrift, will keep it handy on a White House shelf—just in case he needs it for a repeat performance of the ceremony in 1965.

Caroline Kennedy, 3, the president's photogenic daughter, will receive a \$100,000 offer to act as moderator on a TV panel show featuring the views of prekindergarten-age children on world problems.

Harvard university will move to Washington, D. C., so its students can attend classes in the same city where most of Harvard's faculty is employed.

The accent on youth, so evident in U. S. politics, will have some odd repercussions as everyone tries to keep in step with the trend.

Nikita Khrushchev will buy a toupee, Jack Benny will issue a statement saying that a check of his birth record shows that he is really only 38, not 39—and Lennie, who has been showing a few wrinkles around the eyes lately, will undergo a secret face-lifting.

Sophie Tucker will change her act and come on stage rolling a hoop and wearing Mary Pickford curls. Women's fashions will feature "the high school look," and stenographers will come to work wearing bobby sox.

The ailing economy will be bolstered by a 2-billion-dollar boom in the hair-dyeing business. Anyone with gray hair will be lapped an exhibitionist.

Casey Stengel, ex-manager of the New York Yankees, will consider starting his baseball career all over again as a rookie outfielder for the Kansas City Athletics.

A few other developments:

On the international scene, the U. S. air force will pull the bloopers of the year. It will send up a plane to snag the capsule of an American missile and come down instead with a Soviet capsule. This capsule will contain three Soviet dogs, an autographed portrait of Khrushchev addressed to the president of Mars, and an unsigned note from a Soviet engineer saying, "Help!"

The United Nations will publish a cook-book in an attempt to get out of debt.

Throughout most of the world college students will demonstrate against their governments with banners, rocks and home-made grenades. In this country students will demonstrate vacuum cleaners to earn tuition money.

On the home front look for these things:

Science will develop a palatable new food that can't be canned or frozen but has to be kept and cooked in the old-fashioned way. Housewives will immediately boycott it.

Some remorseful woman will start a campaign to give equal rights back to men.

Medicine will develop a marvelous new wonder drug to cure all the ailments caused by the marvelous new wonder drugs of 1956, 1957, 1958, 1959 and 1960. Unfortunately, it, too, will have side effects.

In an attempt to hold the line against rising prices, some bars again will feature the five-cent beer. It will be served, however, in a shot glass.

A producer will startle Hollywood by a radical idea—a picture costing less than \$1 million dollars and running less than five hours.

All in all, we face an interesting and adventurous year.

### U. S. Rocket Launcher Is Being Shown

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—The army has unveiled its Davy Crockett rocket launcher which a GI will be able to use to fire from his jeep or the ground a nuclear warhead packing the destruction of a massed artillery barrage.

In releasing the first pictures of the weapon last night, the army said a foot soldier could fire either from his Davy Crockett across battle lines without danger to himself or nearby civilian populations.

The picture showed a jeep-mounted gun-barrel about five or six feet long topped by a blunt-headed bomb about 30 inches long and equipped with aerodynamic fins.

**Smaller Version Made**

A smaller version of the Davy Crockett can be carried by one man.

A high-army official several months ago referred to the Davy Crockett as a weapon that was "clean" of radioactive fallout. But the army announcement said only that "radioactive fallout danger is minimized."

Built under Project MAN (modern-army needs), the Davy Crockett at one time was described as a kind of mortar. Its odd characteristics, with the bomb outside the gun barrel, were indicated last May when the launching system was exhibited in a display at Ft. Benning, Ga.

The gun barrel is used as a recoilless rifle. Twin explosions are set off simultaneously in the barrel to launch the warhead in one direction and offset the effects of recoil in the other direction.

Army Secretary Wilber M. Brucker said that the weapon "dwarfs in firepower anything we have ever known in the immediate area of the battle line."

"The weapon gives small units a volume of fire power heretofore obtained only from missed heavy artillery," the statement continued.

**2-Man Crew Sufficient**

It said the Davy Crockett can be mounted on a jeep, mechanical mule or armored personnel carrier and can be operated by as few as two men.

The announcement did not say whether the nuclear warhead has been tested. But it is known that the army has cited the need for testing this warhead as one reason for resuming nuclear weapons experiments.

**Farm Plan Action Not Due Quickly**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—The 87th congress goes to work tomorrow, but no early action is expected on farm legislation. Just organizing congress takes a week or two—and this year the house agriculture committee has five vacancies.

Two Republicans and a Democrat on the committee retired from congress since the last session ended—and two Democrats were defeated in the Nov. 8 election.

The committee's makeup has not been settled, but the Republicans are considered likely to get four of the five openings, reflecting greater GOP strength in the new house. Democrats controlled the committee 22-12 in the 86th congress, but this would drop to 20-14.

**U. S. Has Forces Handy if They're Needed to Aid Laos**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—This country has potent military forces standing by near Laos in case the Eisenhower administration decides to help the tiny Asian kingdom repel a reported communist invasion.

The United States presumably will take a number of less drastic diplomatic and military steps before making a decision on whether to plunge into the actual fighting.

But if forces are needed for a Korea-type action, they are near at hand.

A special aircraft carrier task force of the U. S. Far East seventh fleet has been conducting "training exercises" in the South China sea since early December when fighting broke out between pro-communist and pro-western factions in Laos.

Reliable sources report the navy and marine units have returned to the South China sea after spending Christmas and New Years in port.

The task force consists of the aircraft carriers Bennington and Lexington, 1,400 marines and several destroyers.

The air force last night "repositioned" several C-130 turboprop transport planes fromewart Air force base, Tenn., but would not say whether the action was related to the crisis in Laos.

An air force spokesman said he was unaware of how many moved from Sewart or their destination.

He said he could neither confirm nor deny that the movement had anything to do with the reported invasion of Laos by North Vietnamese communists.

But he said that the tactical air command "is always in a state of readiness" to rush troops to world trouble spots.

"Training exercises" is the traditional phrase used by the Pentagon when U. S. forces are sent to a trouble spot area.

For instance, a similar task force from the Mediterranean

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

"I wish you would write about children managing their parents ones in a while. I wish I could live in a house where voices were quiet, and not shouting all the time. I wish my mother would stop nagging about every little thing and forever bring up something that happened long ago. But what's the use? All you'd say would be, 'She's your mother and you must respect her.' It's mighty hard to respect somebody who never has a good word for you but keeps nagging at you. I wish I could get a job and get out of the house for good."

Allowing for the exaggeration of this lament one can sympathize with the young person who feels this way. Houses are not spacious these days and when there are a number of children growing up in crowded space and only the mother to manage them, there is likely to be noise and confusion and irritation. This situation is hard on the adolescent boys and girls and their feelings should be considered.

Grown people have more self control, more of a philosophical attitude toward such conditions and so should be more helpful. No matter how hard pressed one may be one can always find occasion to give the troubled child a word of understanding. It is remarkable how that word can lift the spirit of a troubled adolescent boy or girl.

Surly it is possible to keep one's voice down to a quiet level? A shouting parent or teacher does not get the response he intends. He gets noise and more noise. To gain attention he must speak softly that his hearers have to listen carefully to hear. That makes for quiet, and brings attention.

Showing tires those who shout and those who are shouted at. The human ear is a delicate instrument. It tires easily when attacked by harsh tones and discordant noises. It defends itself by shutting down all activity and so shuts out any message delivered in unacceptable noise. That is why a teacher or parent accustomed to shouting at children can be heard to complain: "He doesn't pay attention to anything I say." Say it

# Houston Oilers Cop First League Championship by Beating Los Angeles 24-16

HOUSTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—The Houston Oilers are the first champions of the American Football league, thanks to the third-down passes of George Blanda and an out-of-character pass defense. Blanda threw three touchdown passes and the Oiler pass defense was amazing—Sunday as Houston took the championship with a 24-16 victory over the Los Angeles Chargers before a crowd of 32,183. All of Blanda's touchdowns came on third down, as did 11 of his 16 completions. The completions were good for 301 yards.

## Chargers May Receive Offer At San Diego

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 2 (AP)—A group of private financiers will offer to build the Los Angeles Chargers a 50,000-seat stadium in San Diego, Calif., in an effort to persuade owner Barron Hilton to move the team to the border city. The information was disclosed by Howard Tullis, owner of four California radio stations—one of them in San Diego—who said Hilton will visit the group in San Diego sometime this week.

Main purpose of Hilton's trip will be to talk with city officials about possible use of the city-owned Balboa stadium, which can seat 27,000 spectators with temporary bleachers. Tullis, a longtime friend of the Chargers owner, said, however, the private group will make a presentation to Hilton regarding the proposed new stadium—to be located at Kearney Mesa, eight miles from downtown San Diego.

The group has already acquired 40 acres of land and has charts showing the feasibility of parking arrangements and other features. Tullis declined to name any of the potential stadium investors, but it was learned from another source that Frank Guthrie and Tom Haynes, midwest auto race promoters, may be interested.

Hilton, who last reported \$500,000 with the Chargers during their first season of the American football league with a division-winning club, will be offered an attractive rental. It was presumed the private group believes it can have a stadium seating 35,000 ready for the start of the 1961 football season and can enlarge it to 50,000 by the 1963 season.

Tullis said Los Angeles cannot make money on the 27,000 capacity at Balboa stadium. But he said he believed Hilton would agree to move the team if he had the promise of a larger stadium. He said Hilton would probably go along with the smaller seating space for three years if the rental is low.
