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## Ike Orders Buildup in Laos Area

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—President Eisenhower has ordered a stepup in U. S. military readiness in the Pacific because of the crisis in Laos, the White House has announced. The announcement, which stressed an increase in airlift able to fly troops and weapons to Laos in a hurry, was issued following an unusual holiday strategy session between Eisenhower and his top advisers. Attending the hour-long White House conference on the communist military advance in Laos were Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, Undersecretary Livingston T. Merchant, Acting Secretary of Defense James H. Douglas, Gen. Lyman L. Lemnitzer, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Central Intelligence Director Allen W. Dulles.

## Holiday Road Toll High; It Is No Record

The nation's motorists started off 1961 with a disheartening toll of traffic deaths but they apparently avoided setting a new record for highway slaughter over a New Year's holiday, the National Safety Council said today.

"It certainly appears that the toll for this New Year's week-end will fall short of the record established last year when 70 were killed," a council spokesman said.

"Nevertheless, the toll is disheartening and is a tragic way to begin a new year," he added.

When the 78-hour week-end ended at midnight, the traffic toll was close to the 340 predicted by the safety council. Deputy fatality reports could not push the count above the council's estimate.

A United Press International count at 11:35 a. m. (EST) showed these holiday fatalities:

Traffic, 338.

Fire, 67.

Miscellaneous, 96.

Total, 401.

California had the worst highway carnage with 42 deaths. Texas had 28, Illinois 20, Wisconsin 18, Indiana 17, New York 16, Ohio 13, and Florida, Louisiana and Missouri 11 each.

Alaska, Hawaii, Maine, North Dakota, New Hampshire and the District of Columbia escaped death over the holiday.

The highway toll averaged five deaths an hour for much of the holiday. It was boosted by snow and sleet across much of the nation last night.

The toll, had it been, did not approach the 465 traffic deaths of the far more dangerous Christmas holiday. The average for a non-holiday 78-hour period is 310 deaths.

Fires took a heavy toll of life and property over the holidays. Eighteen persons, including 15 children, died in just four home fires Sunday and yesterday.

## Charge Filed On Burglary, Morals Count

BURLEY, Jan. 3.—Charges of first-degree burglary were filed this morning against three Burley teenagers accused of five different break-ins of Burley businesses the past week.

Police Chief George Warrall charged with prosecuting Attorney Norman Nielson. Their appearance had not been set before Probate Judge Vern Carter in juvenile court.

Their arrest Saturday started a chain reaction of arrests. One of the youths told police of a 16-year-old boy who ran away from home in Caldwell and allegedly stole a camera from the Thriftway drug-store here.

When the Caldwell youth was apprehended, he told officers information regarding Horace Kinley, transient, who has been charged here with contributing to the delinquency of a minor. The Caldwell youth is charged with infamous crime, police said.

The three Burley youths, ranging in age from 15 to 17 years old, are implicated in burglaries of the Blue Cross animal hospital, the Russia Equipment company, Idaho Implement company, Merritt's service station and the one-hour "farting" dry cleaners in the husband shopping center.

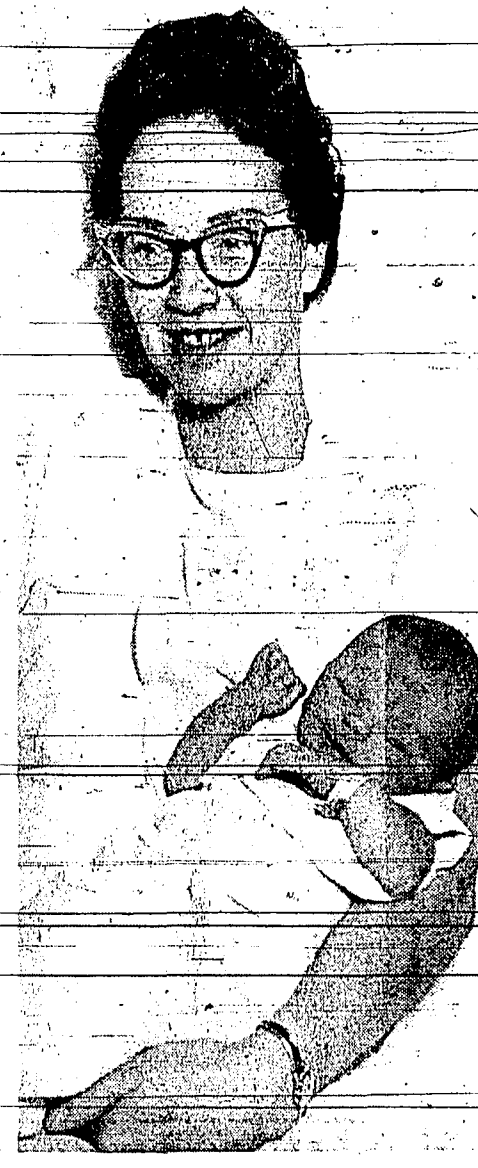
From the hospital, the youths took \$5 in change. One-half of a gallon of 22 caliber shells, a box of shotgun shells and several boxes of chocolates, implement company, two small transistor radios, service station, \$30, and \$2.00 in change and two pocket knives from the dry cleaning store.

The youths gained entrance to each business apparently by breaking through rear windows, according to Burley Police Chief George Warrall.

## Girl Claims Title of First '61 Baby Here

Dorinda Tennant made her debut at Magic Valley Memorial hospital at 2:39 p. m. Monday to claim the title of first baby born in 1961 at the local hospital and a number of prizes donated by Twin Falls merchants. The eight-pound two-ounce girl is the fourth child of Mr. and Mrs. Bennie D. Tennant, 966 Sunrise boulevard, and is the fourth female to win the Times-News First Baby contest in as many years. The tiny miss measures 21 1/4 inches long. With the arrival of Dorinda, girl babies are fast approaching the record established by boys during the five-year period from 1953 to 1957 when the contests were won by males. The 1960 winner was Shellie Dawn Hettenbach, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Hettenbach, Twin Falls; the 1959 winner was Mary Ann Salsbury, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Salsbury, Twin Falls, and the 1958 winner, who broke the boys' streak, was Melynda Dry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Dry, Hansen.

Derrick hopes the weather will turn warmer so the ice will melt, enabling the highline canal to be drained.

## Governor Asks Balanced Budget; U.S. Congress Is Already Starting Battles

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—The new congress convened today already embroiled in a liberal versus conservative struggle such as clearly will be waged over much of President-Elect John F. Kennedy's program. In both senate and house, Democrats who call themselves liberals were bidding for a bigger voice in charting the legislative course to be followed in the next two years.

## Senate Picks Mansfield and Dirksen Wins

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—Senate Democrats today elected Sen. Mike Mansfield, Montana, a moderate liberal, as their floor leader. Mansfield succeeds Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, Texas, vice president-elect. Johnson is to resign shortly from the senate seat to which he was reelected in November while also winning the vice presidency.

Johnston told newsmen Mansfield was elected unanimously by the 63 fellow Democratic senators at the closed-door meeting.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, Minnesota, was elected assistant Democratic leader, a job officially designated as whip, succeeding Mansfield.

Senate Republicans reelected Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, Illinois, as their floor leader today.

The Republican conference also reelected Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel, California, as party whip, or assistant leader, and chose Sen. Styles Bridges, New Hampshire, for another term of chairman of the senate GOP policy committee.

Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, Massachusetts, was reelected chairman of the conference of all Republican senators, and Sen. Milton R. Young, North Dakota, reelected secretary.

## Injuries Are Cited in New Belgian Riot

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Jan. 3 (AP)—Mounted police, charging with drawn sabers, today drove back thousands of rock-throwing demonstrators attempting to march on parliament. Two rioters, one seriously injured by a saber slash, were hospitalized in Brussels. Other casualties were reported elsewhere in Belgium.

An estimated 75,000 leftist-led strikers demonstrated against the government in Brussels and other Belgian cities in another day of violence at the start of the third week of a nation-wide strike.

The demonstrations were started by the Socialists in an attempt to force withdrawal of a government bill in parliament calling for austerity and tighter economic controls to make up for the loss of revenue from the Congo.

They now have grown into a power struggle attempting to overthrow the government of Roman Catholic Premier Gaston Eyskens, with the strikers using street violence and police and troops retaliating with force.

In the big port city of Antwerp, two policemen and 10 rioters were hurt when 10,000 strikers raged through the downtown area, attacking streetscars and buses, molesting passersby and smashing store windows.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 3 (AP)—Two 18-year-old Negro youths registered for freshman classes at the University of Tennessee today. They are the first Negroes ever admitted to undergraduate classes at the university.

## Kennedy Names Adviser for His Plans To Boost Hunt for World Disarmament

PALM BEACH, Jan. 3 (AP)—President-Elect John F. Kennedy named John J. McCloy, former allied high commissioner in Germany, to be his chief adviser and policy planner in a stepped-up search for world disarmament. McCloy's duties will assume such importance in the new administration that he is expected to be relieved of the responsibility for negotiating with the Soviet Union and other powers in the Middle East.

In Stamford, Conn., McCloy said of his appointment, "I am flattered that the President thinks that I can make a contribution to such a difficult problem as this.

BOISE, Jan. 3 (UPI)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie asked the 36th Idaho legislature today to balance a record \$8.1 million dollar general fund budget with surplus funds and grant tax relief to the people. At the same time, the chief executive proposed sweeping changes in the structure of Idaho government, a constitutional convention and long-range planning in the fields of industry, education and welfare.

## Highlights of Smylie's Talk Are Reported

BOISE, Jan. 3 (UPI)—Here are the highlights of Gov. Robert E. Smylie's "state-of-the-state" message to the 36th Idaho legislature here today:

**Fiscal**

Proposed general fund spending totaling \$8.1 million dollars in the next biennium and repeal of the so-called 10 head tax or at least removal of its regressive and inequitable features. Revision of the corporation income tax in the form of a franchise tax to eliminate credit for federal income taxes paid or accrued and reduction in the rate of tax imposed to 6.5 per cent from 9.5 per cent.

(Smylie is expected to present a separate budget message to the lawmakers on Friday, at which time he will more fully outline the state's fiscal problems.)

**Legislative Process**

Adoption of some form of legislative council and improvement of the legislative machinery. Provisions for a permanent year-round "skeleton staff" to conclude legislative clean-up work and perform preparatory work for each session, including continued secretariat for the majority and minority parties.

Retained his proposal for a short ballot. The proposed reorganization would provide that the lieutenant governor become a full-time elected officer and assume the duties of secretary of state (Continued on Page 6, Column 1)

# Secret Prank Ruins Husky Bowl Actions

PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 3 (AP)—Pranksters from the California Institute of Technology claimed credit for fouling up three of the Rose Bowl game yesterday.

These gals-on evidently puzzled a certain number of spectators and TV viewers. Later it was reported that a plot was hatched before Christmas vacation and executed with the precision and secrecy of a wartime office of strategic services operation.

170-Hours Needed  
"It took 170 man-hours of work," said one of the perpetrators, who insisted on remaining anonymous. He said it involved the healthy substitution of 2,237 spurious rosters' instruction cards.

On card stunt No. 10, the Washington routing section, cheering the Huskies on in their winning game with Minnesota, were supposed to hold up cards that would show "Husky" in black letters on a yellow background.

Caltech Shows up  
Instead "Caltech" came up. In two other tricks "Husky" was spelled out backwards, and a beaver's head—for Cal Tech—was substituted for the Huskies' dog's head.

Why did they do it?  
"To see if it could be done," said another conspirator. He sketched this plot:

Sample Cards Obtained  
About a dozen Cal Tech students obtained a sample of the small instruction cards to be tacked to the back of rosters' seats and had 2,237 spurious cards printed.

Last Saturday night, while the Huskies were at Disneyland, two plotters entered the Long Beach State college dormitory where the Washington cheerleader in charge of card stunts was staying. They substituted the forged cards for the satchelful of originals.

One of the perpetrators called it "just a good idea for a practical joke."

# Two Fathers Lose Families In New Fires

Fire piled more tragedy Monday on the holiday week-end's toll of human life.

Two young fathers' families were wiped out in flames while they were at work. Many persons were made homeless by fires.

Dr. Arthur Steffe was on duty at a Cleveland clinic early Monday when fire swept through his home at nearby South Euclid, O.

Wife, Sons Killed  
Firemen quickly put out the blaze but found the suffocated bodies of the doctor's wife, Edith, 28, and her three sons ranging in age from two weeks to five years.

In Milwaukee, Roman Gerber, 24, returned home from his night shift job to find his wife, Frances, 21, an dtheir two small children killed by fire. The mother was dead, and the youngsters, rushed to a hospital, were dead on arrival.

Brother, Daughter Die  
In Brooklyn Mrs. Eugenie Popik, 59, and her daughter, Vera, 24, were decorating a tree for next Saturday's Russian Christmas when fire trapped them in the living room. Both perished.

Working in the cellar, the husband and father, Mychaljo, 62, escaped serious injury but had to be treated for shock.

26 Flew Blaze  
At Portland, Me., a fire in a defective chimney destroyed an apartment building, forcing 28 persons to flee in night clothes, but none were hurt.

A fire in a wholesale liquor warehouse and a refuse service garage in Rochester, N. Y., caused damage estimated at more than \$285,000.

The New York state capitol building in Albany was the scene of another of Monday's fires. A worker's acetylene torch apparently started the blaze, which was confined to the basement of the building.

# Six Die on Utah's Roads in Holiday

The most spectacular holiday accident killed two teen-agers, Bonnie Bywater, 13, and Tom Kent Burrows, 15, both Salt Lake City. They were among seven youths in a stationwagon which plunged down a mountain cliff New Year's night.

BOISE, Jan. 3 (AP)—Boise's municipal airport was fogged in yesterday morning for nearly eight hours, halting all flights from the city.

Four West Coast airlines flights and one United flight were canceled until the fog lifted.

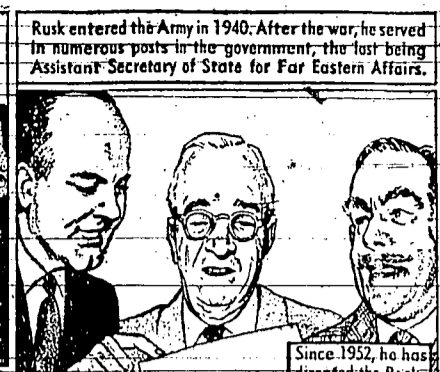
# New State Department Team, Dean Rusk, Chester Bowles and Adlai Stevenson



Dean Rusk, educator and diplomat, was born in Cherokee County, Georgia, in 1909.



From 1934 to 1940, he was associate professor of government at Mills College in Oakland, Calif. Then the war intervened.



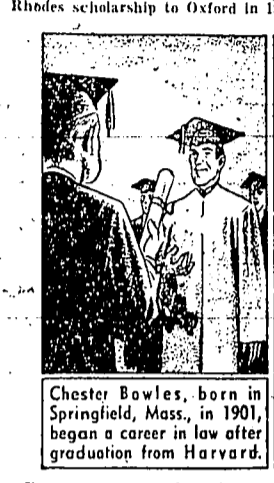
Los Angeles-born (1900) Adlai E. Stevenson has practiced law most of his life.



Now, as U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations, in which he fervently believes, Stevenson is expected to have a hand in the making as well as the carrying out of future American foreign policy.

Dean Rusk, chosen to be secretary of state by John F. Kennedy, typifies the new "intellectual" look of the state department. A noted student in his youth, he won a Rhodes scholarship to Oxford in 1933. He served in Burma during the war, emerging in 1946 as a colonel. He has worked for both the war and state departments. As director of the multimillion-dollar philanthropic Rockefeller foundation, he has come in contact with leading men throughout the world. Rusk is considered a man of ability.

In 1949, he was elected governor of Connecticut. From 1951 to 1953, he served as U.S. Ambassador to India and Nepal.



His first taste of politics was as a delegate to the Democratic convention in 1940. In 1943, he was appointed head of the Office of Price Administration.



During the war years, however, he was assistant to the Secretary of the Navy and later represented the country in missions to prostrated Europe.



He entered politics in 1949, achieving the largest plurality in Illinois history to become governor. But he was twice defeated for the presidency by Dwight Eisenhower in the national elections of 1952 and 1956.



Nations, he will bring great personal stature that that office and have, as a condition for accepting the appointment, some voice in determining U. S. foreign policy. The respect in which he is held abroad is an added advantage. Divorced, Stevenson has three sons.

Ex-governor, ex-ambassador, ex-congressman, college lecturer and author of several books, Chester Bowles brings a varied background to the post of undersecretary of state. He also headed the economic stabilization board under Harry Truman. Bowles will be Rusk's chief of staff.

# Negro "Tent City" Closed To Newsmen

SOMERVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 3 (AP)—The controversial tent city near Somerville has been closed to the public and press.

Negro leaders said today they will conduct twice-daily news conferences to release information on the city.

The tent city houses about 50 Negroes who moved into the tents because they said they faced eviction from their tenant farms for oversteering to vote in the November general election.

James Forman, Chicago, chairman of the Fayette and Haywood county emergency relief committee, said he will conduct the news conference.

Forman announced the news conference plan after the area was closed to enable the Negroes to turn the area into permanent homes for the sharecroppers.

The Rev. June Dowdy of the Haywood county civic and welfare league, and J. P. Estes, a Negro attorney, Memphis, said "sanitary systems in keeping with the camp requirements" are being built into the tents.

# New Translation Of Bible Ready

LONDON, Jan. 3 (AP)—A fresh translation of the New Testament into modern English, which has taken 13 years to write, will go on sale in Britain this year.

The work, known as the new English Bible, is regarded by church leaders here as the most important translation since James I of England issued the Anglican authorized version 350 years ago.

It was undertaken by a committee of all the churches in Britain, with the exception of the Roman Catholics, under the chairmanship of the Bishop of Winchester.

# New Policies For Africans To Be Asked

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—The 87th congress will be under increased pressure to alter U. S. policy toward Africa.

The session opening today will provide a forum for demands that the United States identify itself more closely with anti-colonialism and side with the newly emerging African nations.

Ranking members of the senate and house foreign affairs subcommittees, on Africa—armed with data gathered on fact-finding missions to Africa—already have called for a close new look at U. S. programs and policies in the continent.

It is probable the new congress will place increased emphasis on economic and educational assistance for African nations.

Somewhat less probable is any agreement on the extent to which the United States should support African independence movements at the risk of offending traditional allies.

# Algerians Are Urged to Vote No in Election

ALGIERS, Jan. 3 (AP)—Leaders of several European settler movements have called on Algerians to vote no in the week-end referendum on President Charles de Gaulle's self-determination policy for Algeria.

They said approval of the policy would lead France toward disaster. They predicted a civil war there if Algeria became independent.

The Moslem nationalists who have been waging the 6-year-old rebellion against France have called on the Arabs and other North Africans who make up the most of Algeria's 10 million people to boycott the referendum.

The European call for no to the referendum clashed headon with efforts of the French army. Its officers have received orders to fight against any boycott, or negative attitude toward the Friday-through-Sunday vote.

Reports of disputes between settlers and European settlers came from several points of the Algerian interior. In a number of areas, European farmers have vowed to refuse to serve as polling station officials or to supply vehicles to transport Moslem voters.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—The foreign agricultural service reports that the Soviet Union has a well-established program for artificial insemination of sheep.

With artificial insemination, one ram is required for 1,000 to 1,500 ewes, in contrast with one ram to 30 to 50 ewes for natural mating.

Artificial insemination of sheep requires intensive veterinary service and close flock supervision and is practical only where there is a plentiful supply of cheap labor.

Artificial breeding has been used for many years in the important sheep-breeding areas of the USSR. In recent years more than 50 per cent of all ewes have been bred artificially.

Quality improvement has been the most important advantage of the program. In one district 97,000 ewes were bred to fine stud rams. The offspring produced more than two pounds of wool more than their mothers.

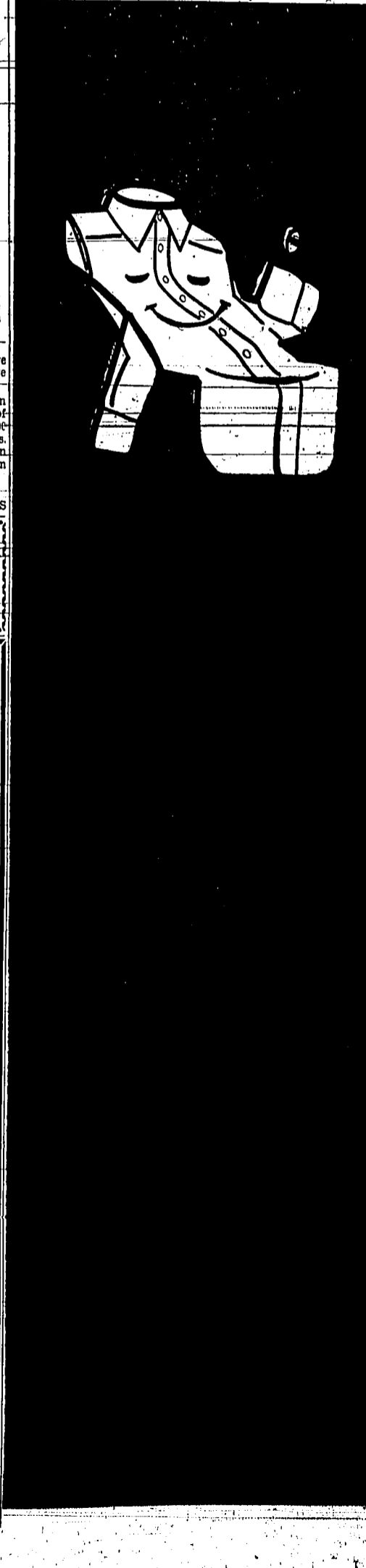

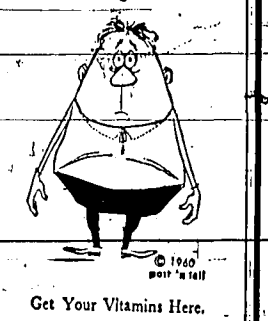

Parents are likely to have a picture of their child that allows them to see him as they would like him to be. It would be a queer parent that didn't think of him that way. It is a good way at that because we are likely to make every effort to make such pictures a reality. But we have to keep a bit of secret doubt in the background lest we deceive ourselves and are suddenly jolted out of our security.

When a neighbor says, ever so gently, "Do you know that Tommy is using some pretty hard words?" the first reaction is to say, "Tommy? Of course he doesn't. I've never heard him use a single bad word in my life."

Better wait a minute. He would not be likely to use bad language at home, perhaps. Maybe he experimented with it outside? Listen, let the neighbor explain. Then hide your time and make certain about the whole matter, and don't let you value Tommy's veracity, ask, "Did you say so and so?"

Wait and watch and listen, and in time you will know. One day a youngster brings home something that he says he found, or was given to him. His mother thinks nothing more about it. He brings something more about one day the telephone summons his mother to hear a neighbor say, "Will you ask Tommy to bring back Ruddle's football? He forgot and carried it home and Ruddle needs it tomorrow." Tommy knows nothing about this but when Ruddle fronts him and insists, the ball is found hidden in the garage.

moved the cards the school sent notifying her parents of her absence. Children under the age of reason, those still immature, need to feel trusted. This is to be expected of the best of children and parents have to keep open minds about them and not be too certain of their strength under stress. General Motors denied Romney's statement at the time. At a press conference Romney had criticized foreign expansion of General Motors and Ford as "economic imperialism." He deplored what he called "excessive foreign investments" by American companies. Yesterday the AMC president said the verbatim account of his press conference showed a "seriously inaccurate statement." "General Motors is charged," Romney said, "with intention to use its facilities abroad for importation of components into the United States and for the purpose of disregarding national boundaries and policies. Such facilities were not established for that purpose and there is no evidence of the intention now," he said in a statement.

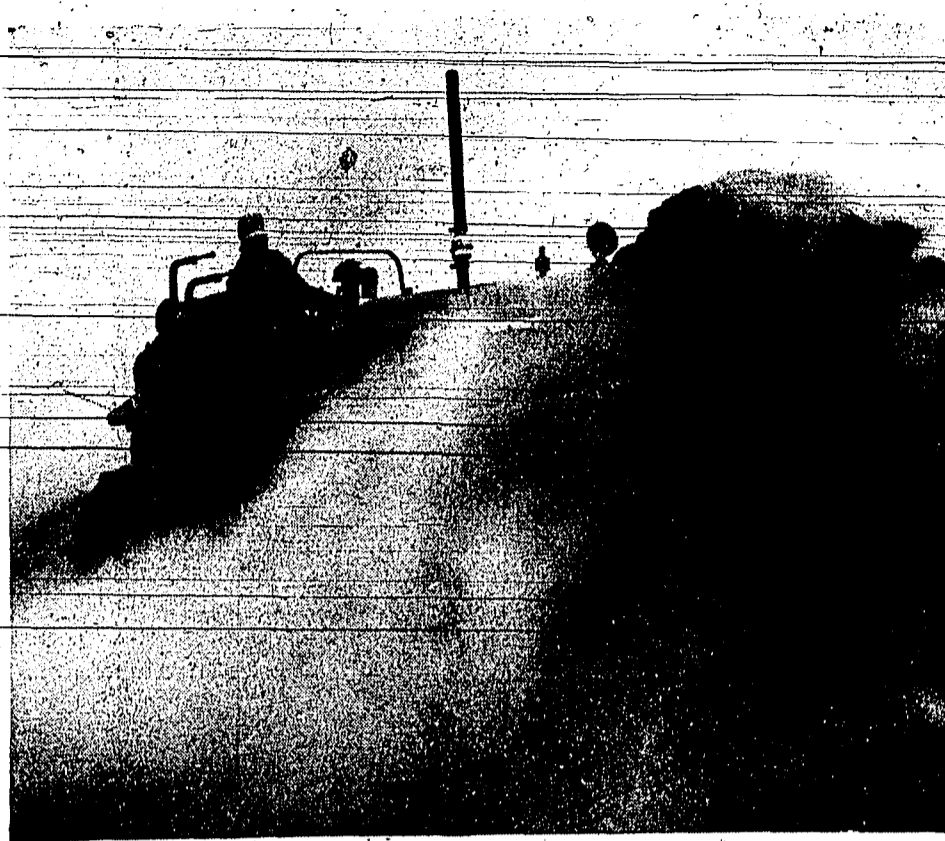

Orval Hansen, while new to the leadership ranks of the Idaho legislature, brings literally a "world of experience" to his job of majority floor leader in the house this session. Mansfield summed up his view of the leadership job this way: "The leader has to represent, insofar as he can, the views of the president of his own party and has to accommodate his personal feelings to that extent. That is one of the difficulties in assuming leadership, because you lose a great degree of personal freedom and take on a great degree of accommodation because you are there to push through the president's program to the best of your ability."
