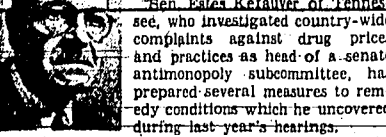

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON — Legislation regulating the price of drugs and providing greater protection against alleged misuse of certain powerful antibiotics will undoubtedly be enacted at the current session of congress, despite a heavy barrage from the industry's lobby.



Sen Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, who investigated country-wide complaints against drug prices and practices as head of a senate antimonopoly subcommittee, has prepared several measures to remedy conditions which he uncovered during last year's hearings.

Several states where deaths from alleged careless handling of certain drugs have occurred, are taking precautions of their own. But medical experts agree that there cannot be 50 different regulatory systems on such a question as the nation's well-being.

STRICTER REGULATIONS — California has taken the most positive steps largely because there have been 400 deaths from a plastic meningitis in that state within the last eight years.

The department of health has started a survey to determine whether any of these fatalities were caused by promiscuous and indiscriminate use of chloromycetin, and by the manufacturer's failure to label the bottle as a warning to patients.

The food and drug administration, under congressional and newspaper prodding, has issued stricter regulations, to become effective during this month.

Food and drug, for instance, has no jurisdiction over prices, which are regarded as exorbitant in many instances. Nor does it pass upon the effectiveness of a medicinal product.

LOWER PRICES SOUGHT — On prices, Senator Kefauver will propose that the exclusive 17-year control of a new drug by its manufacturer through "patent grants" be relaxed.

Although industry men deny overcharging, citing the expense of experimentation, the armed services have complained to the Kefauver body on this score.

Another major Kefauver proposal will require simpler and more specific warnings of the danger of excessive use of certain drugs—on the bottle that the patient buys and places in his medicine closet.

REASONABLE RETURNS — Nobody denies, of course, the tremendous value of the so-called "miracle drugs," or underestimates the number of lives which they have saved since they were developed during and since World War II.

Nobody contemplates a blanket indictment of the drug industry, which deserves a reasonable reward for the life-saving products that have emerged from its laboratories.

Nevertheless, the Kefauver inquiry has indicated that legislation is needed to reduce the cost of this field of medical care, and to protect the public health through greater safeguards.

With its pamphlets, books and extension services, agriculture does more for the physical condition of the nation's livestock and domestic animals than the federal government does for American members of the human race.

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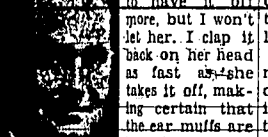
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One Christmas Is Enough, so Henry's Child Must Wear Hat

NEW YORK, Jan. 4 (AP)—Night people know a kinship rare to day people.

As our civilization grows more complex, more and more people have to work odd hours to keep it operating.

To the sailor at sea, the pilot in the air, the fireman on the beach, the professional athlete in the stadium, the lion tamer and most of us sleep. They prepare

our day for living while we slumber.

If you have never worked at night—if you have always worked a 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. day—you have missed a great adventure in living.

The advantage is comradeship on the job. You get the feeling of unity a platoon enjoys in war. There is a free masonry that doesn't quite exist on a day job. In the newspaper world the "night-four" of duty is known as "the lobster" or "the lobster trick." No one knows for sure how the term originated. One theory is that it was coined by a forgotten ironic newsman in

the Gay Nineties who had to arrive at his desk at midnight when the playboys of that era were sitting down to their lobster and champagne.

But whoever works the lobster trick knows a "foreign" to the peasants imprisoned by the sunbeam. For three years long ago I worked from midnight until 8 o'clock in the morning, and never in my life since have I known the same sense of freedom.

Night brings a mystic union to those who work through it together. They are knit by the bond of a king to the hands of a serf as the hands of a king to the hands of a serf. They are separate

from the rest of sleeping mankind. They are alive and awake. They belong to each other and they know it.

There is snail tension and little hurry. The job is there to do, and there is leisure to do it well. No one leans over your shoulder on his hat and coat and steps into the bright sunshine of the new day, as free and proud as a jack tilting at heaven.

He is different from other people. Mexico City's lowest streets are more than a mile higher in altitude than the top of New York's highest skyscrapers.

BURLEY, Jan. 4—Who is responsible for the education of Idaho's children? Ezra Moore, Cassia county superintendent of schools, asked the Burley Rotary club at its Tuesday luncheon meeting at Cousin Roy's.

"Basically, education is the responsibility of the state," he stated. "The constitution and laws of Idaho clearly provide for compulsory education and prescribe the rules and regulations under which a district must operate. He added,

"Almost two-thirds of the cost of public school education in Idaho is provided from property taxes by district and county taxpayers. A little over a third of the cost is appropriated by the legislature from the state's general funds. State money comes from a variety of taxes which include income tax, beer tax, cigarette tax, kilowatt hour tax, licenses and permits, and liquor tax," Moore said.

U. S. Disarmament Leader Must Devise Test for Russia

One of the first jobs for John J. McCloy and his "department of disarmament" will be to devise a decisive test of Soviet intentions with regard to a ban on nuclear testing.

At the moment the Soviet Union has achieved what she wants—a ban without provisions for enforcement. A considerable section of expert opinion suspects that she is taking advantage of it to develop new weapons while the United States waits still.

President-elect John F. Kennedy has virtually promised that while a major effort will be made to obtain an agreement fair to both sides, this situation will not be allowed to continue beyond a reasonable time. In considering the long-continued evasions already a reasonable time could only be a short time.

And there is no prospect that in a short time, the communists will emerge sufficiently from their primitive attitude toward foreign

weaseling when the chips are down, has made a considerable impression throughout the world just by harping on the subject for the last 15 years.

Even if Kennedy should give McCloy a thousand highly intelligent researchers, of course, it wouldn't mean any agreements unless they produced plans which would give the Soviet Union an advantage over the Soviets will accept no other.

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Talks Varied On Proposed Board Plans

BOISE, Jan. 4 (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie's proposal for a department of natural resources brought varied comment today from Democratic members of the state land board.

U. S. Agency Still Probing '60 Elections

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP)—The justice department's civil rights division is still looking into alleged Nov. 8 voting irregularities in Illinois, Texas and Tennessee.

The head of the division, Assistant Attorney General Harold R. Tyler, Jr., said this in a year-end report to Attorney General William P. Rogers.

He disclosed also that prosecutions have been authorized in some areas where anonymous political literature was circulated in connection with contests for federal office. Tyler declined to identify these areas pending the filing of formal charges.

The justice department announced last week that a federal grand jury in Chicago had indicted two Democratic precinct workers on charges of vote buying in

the general election. The indictment alleged that the inducement ranged from \$1 bills to free dinners.

Tyler said the FBI is now investigating complaints of vote buying in San Antonio and Houston, Tex., and that another investigation is going forward into reported "ghost voting" at Milan, Tenn. The civil rights division received complaints that the total Nov. 8 vote there exceeded the adult population.

Rockefeller's After Bigger State Budget

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 4 (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller called today for increased state spending that would send his budget toward a record 2.5 billion dollars, largely because of added funds for education, highways and the aged.

The Republican governor recommended that the GOP-controlled legislature grant a 10 per cent refund in personal income taxes levied by the state.

Rockefeller, who will seek reelection in 1962, made his recommendations in his annual message to the opening session of the New York legislature.

Rockefeller raised income taxes after taking office in 1959 and instituted a payroll withholding system.

The revenue from income taxes for fiscal 1960-61 is expected to total more than 900 million dollars, compared with 565 million dollars in 1958-59. The refund the governor proposed today would take 90 million dollars.

The governor's plans include: A 100-million dollar program to combat unemployment by attracting new industry to hard-hit areas; a 40 million dollar increase in medical care for the aged; a major boost in highway and other public-works projects; and more scholarships for high school graduates.

2-Pensions Plan For Ike Opposed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP)—An Iowa Republican says a quiet move is under way to push through congress a bill which could allow President Eisenhower to draw two pensions after he leaves office Jan. 20.

Rep. H. R. Gross, without identifying backers of the move, made it clear he feels Eisenhower should get only one paycheck.

The Iowan said Eisenhower should have either a presidential pension or military retirement compensation but not both.

"He should make his own selection," Gross said, "and the sooner the better if he wants to avoid a fight in congress."

Centennial Fund Draws Criticism

BOISE, Jan. 14 (AP)—Rep. H. Grant Gardner, R., Payette, said yesterday he is opposed to the proposed appropriation of \$706,000 to finance Idaho's territorial centennial celebration in 1963.

He noted that \$40,000 was provided by the 1959 session for preliminary expenses of the commission and said, "A \$40,000 mistake at the last session cannot be corrected by a \$706,000 one at this session. I have the feeling that regardless of any planning the observance will not be the success that we have been led to believe."

"In my opinion, the requested money will have to be spread thin making it impossible to do a job that would create national attention even under the most favorable conditions."


Coast Guard to Patrol Key West

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 4 (AP)—The coast guard will establish a regular patrol of waters off Key West, nearest United States point to Cuba.

The coast guard announcement came shortly before President Eisenhower's announcement last night that the United States has severed diplomatic relations with Cuba.

But a coast guard spokesman said the project "is primarily a search and rescue patrol because of an increase of distress incidents in that area." The 125-foot cutter Travis, based at Ft. Lauderdale, is scheduled to start the patrol today or tomorrow.

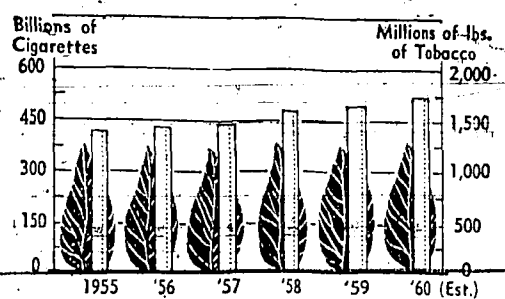

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Cigarette Production Climbs



Although production of cigarettes continues to climb steeply, the quantity of tobacco used does not. U. S. Department of Agriculture estimates some 512 billion cigarettes will be made in 1960—21 per cent above 1955. Tobacco used for cigarettes will be about 1.3 billion pounds, only seven per cent above 1955. This is due to newer methods of processing and the smaller tobacco column in filter tips.

Bill Boosting Allotment of Beets Started

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP)—Rep. J. Floyd Breeding, D., Kans., has introduced a bill to increase the domestic allotment of sugar beets by about 250,000 acres annually.

He said it is essential the sugar act be amended to provide permanent authority for additional acreage for domestic producers.

He said that if changes giving additional acreage to U. S. producers are only temporary, and

can be taken away when foreign relations improve, then private sugar companies would be reluctant to invest 10 to 15 million dollars in a new plant.

Such an increase in acreage, Breeding said, would permit western Kansas farmers in irrigated areas to start growing sugar beets.

VIET NAM BUDGET BIG

SAIGON, Jan. 4 (AP)—South Viet Nam's national assembly has recessed until March after approving a national budget of about 430.6 million dollars, with nearly 40 per cent earmarked for military spending. The budget as finally approved is about 73 million dollars below last year's.

Church Plans To Push Bill Vetoed in '60

BOISE, Jan. 4 (AP)—A measure identical with the lead-zinc bill vetoed by President Eisenhower last fall will be introduced into this congress, Sen. Frank Church, D., Ida., says.

Church said in a message from Washington he would join with Sen. Robert B. Kerr, D., Okla., in introducing the bill designed to provide relief for small lead and zinc miners.

Church said President-Elect Kennedy said during the past campaign that he had been president when the bill was passed last year he would have signed it.

The measure would authorize the secretary of the interior to establish stabilization payments when lead prices fall below 17 cents per pound and zinc below 14 1/2 cents per pound. The payments would be based on the difference between these prices and those received by the producer, Church said.

The Idaho senator added, "I feel that the recent drop in the price of lead and zinc proves that the quota system is inadequate to protect the industry."

Goldwater Is Challenged as Group Leader

WASHINGTON, Jan. 4 (AP)—Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R. N. Y., has raised the issue of unseating Sen. Barry Goldwater, R. Ariz., as chairman of the Republican senatorial campaign committee.

Javits said he asked at a closed conference of all GOP senators yesterday for a similar caucus to discuss whether Goldwater should continue to head a party organization devoted to helping Republican senator candidates.

Another Meet Dug Chairman Leverett Saltonstall, R. Mass., of the GOP conference said he would call another meeting this week. Saltonstall previously had planned to reappoint Goldwater, who headed the committee in the 1960 campaign.

The Massachusetts senator said he would listen to reasons why he should or should not take this action.

Goldwater, an avowed conservative who condemned the party platform but supported Vice President Richard M. Nixon's unsuccessful bid for the presidency, said he is ready for a showdown on any effort to replace him.

Goldwater to Fight "I don't want this job and would be glad to have someone else have it, but they are not going to push me out of it without a fight," he said in an interview.

Javits denied that there was any liberal movement, as such, to force Goldwater out. The Arizona has painted some party members who regard themselves as moderates by such statements as his demand for an end to economic aid abroad.

"I want to discuss the issue of how best we can go about winning a Republican victory in 1962," Javits said. "I know that Senator Goldwater wishes only the best for the Republican party but his ideas and mine may not necessarily coincide in that respect."

Javits is expected to seek reelection in 1962. He probably will be running on a ticket with Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, New York, who has said he will bid for a second term.

Goldwater, who has been mentioned as a possible presidential contender, criticized Rockefeller's role in the 1960 campaign and suggested there was no place in the party for the governor.

COMET CLAIMED MOSCOW, Jan. 4 (AP)—Two Soviet scientists say the so-called great meteorite that fell in Siberia in 1908 actually was the head of a comet.
