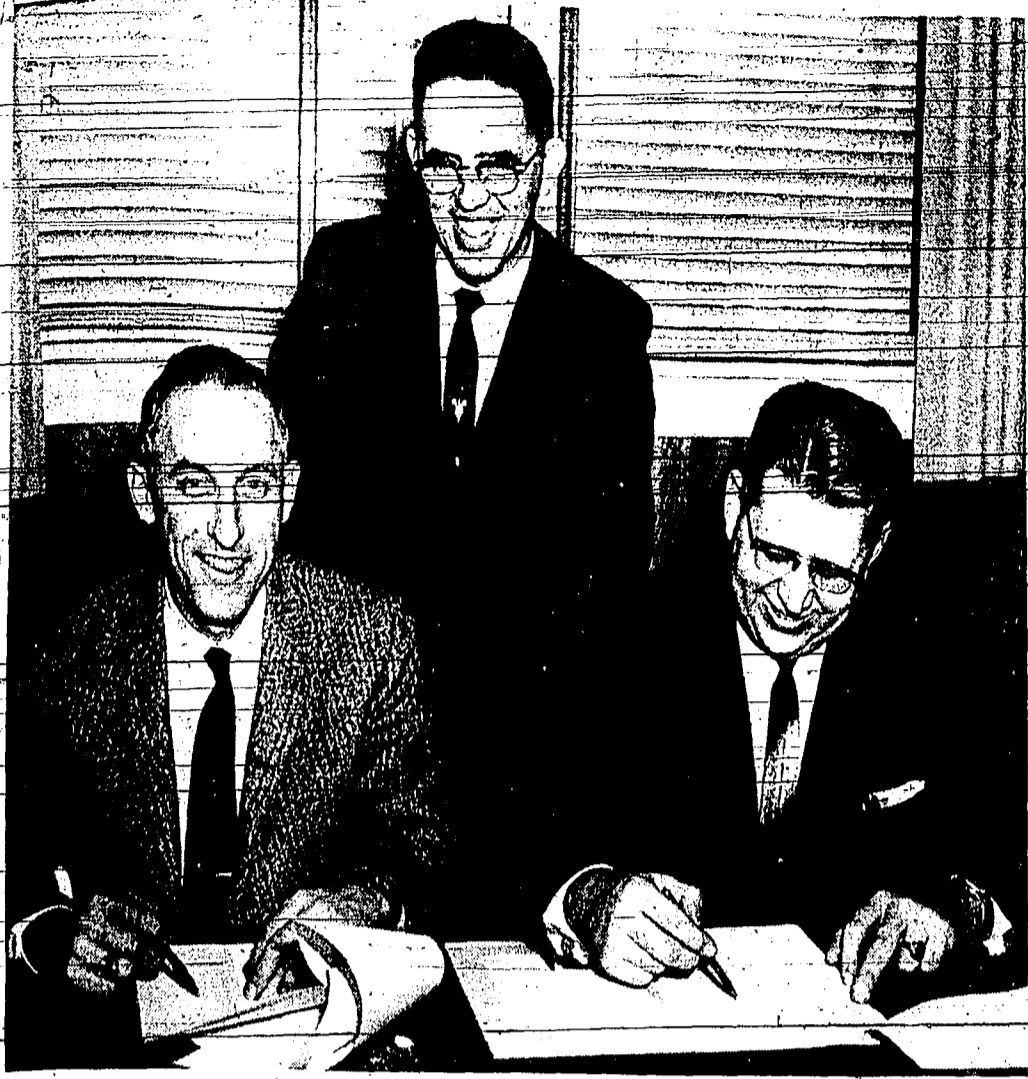


Commercial Division Sets Plans for New Year

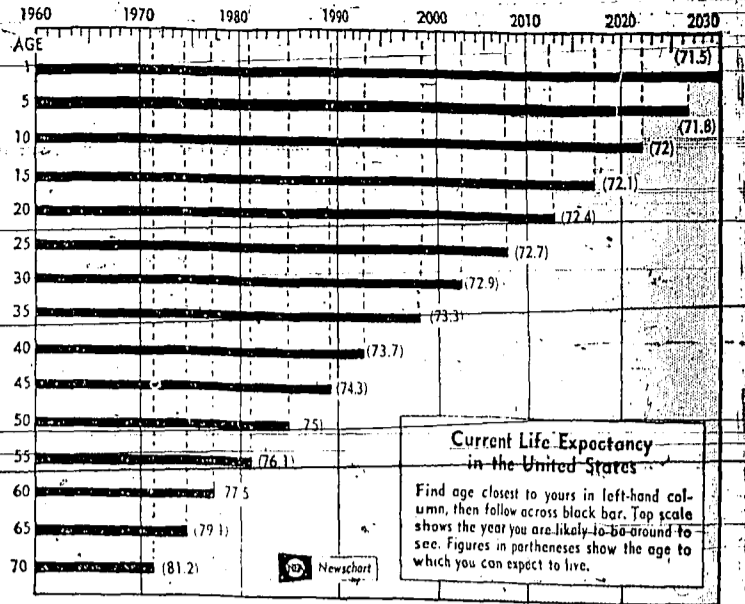

SEATO Meet Fails to Back U.S. Charges

BANGKOK, Thailand, Jan. 5 (AP)—The SEATO council failed yesterday to lend support to U.S. charges that substantial numbers of foreign communist soldiers are aiding troops in Laos. This is the key factor in deciding whether western troops should be sent by the Southeast Asia Treaty organization to aid the pro-western government of Laos. A statement issued by SEATO ambassadors, released on Jan. 4, said Laosian charges that soldiers from communist North Viet Nam are backing the fight against the royal Lao army. Soviet Aid Singled Out The SEATO government did not back U.S. charges that the Soviet Union has been supplying arms to the North Vietnamese. This has been admitted only by the Russians, who claim they are supplying forces of the North Vietnamese government. These forces, in Soviet eyes, are leftist troops drawn from the capital of Hanoi last month by pro-western troops now leading power in the city under Premier Prince Bhum Oun. U.S. Makes Charge The United States, which backs Bhum Oun, issued a statement in Washington Tuesday charging that "substantial numbers of North Vietnamese communist personnel have been parachuted into Laos recently. It gave no troop figures, but said 184 Soviet flights carrying supplies and men have gone into Laos since Dec. 15. A dispatch from Vientiane

Salvador Agron Symbolizes Worst of Failures to New York's Puerto Ricans

(Editor's note: For most American boys, the problems of age 16 are confined to a giddy world bounded by grades on one side and girls on the other with an undecided future shimmering somewhere in between. Salvador Agron's future is fixed; death in the electric chair. By BERNARD GAVZER NEW YORK, Jan. 5 (AP)—There are people who wish Salvador Agron was never born. They say "They call us spics because of his kind." For New York's Puerto Ricans, he symbolizes the worst failures among a people struggling to build a new and better life. This slight, black-haired, fuzzi-faced 17-year-old is a boy his mother calls "Sal" and others call "Dracula." He is in Sing Sing. He is to die in the electric chair for committing a bloody, senseless killing of two 16-year-old boys. "I don't care if I burn—my mother could watch me." What kind of boy could say such a thing? He was born in Asilo de Ancianos, a home for the aged, in Mayaguez, a city of nearly 60,000 on the west end of Puerto Rico. His mother, Esmeralda Rodriguez Agron, worked in the home as a domestic. The rearing of Salvador and his sister, Aureo, was largely out of her hands. Esmeralda remembers the day of his birth as being a warm one, but the date escapes her. It was either April 29, Aug. 28, or Oct. 1, 1943. Those are the dates on different records. He attended school. He buried himself in the sand and cried: "Now I am dead, I cannot go to school." When he was dragged there by the ear, the cry changed to "No one loves me." Then one day, when he was 7, he saw his mama put on a new blue dress and a new three-quarter length red spring coat, and slip a pretty pleated dress on Aureo, and pack two shiny imitation leather valises and get in a car and go away. He was left standing in the road, crying. They went to San Juan—and then New York. "Sal screamed all the time," a cousin says. "For four, five months, he screamed, 'Mama, mama!' He ran around like wild. He wouldn't eat, maybe for days, then eat everything, stealing from the plates of others. In the night, it was terrible. 'Mama, mama!' he screamed." In New York Esmeralda met Carlos Gonzalez. Carlos was the man who courted her in Mayaguez, after she divorced Gerardo Agron, the man who married her when she was 15. "I did not want to marry Carlos," she says, "but a woman is no good alone." She gave up her Roman Catholic faith and married Gonzalez, a stern, proud, self-ordained Pentecostal minister who prays on his knees six hours a day and says, "God called me to lead the people."

Gonzalez to his in a textile factory. "Stay home. Do not go out," they warned the children, Aureo and Salvador obeyed, huddling at the window and watching the world go by. One day, some boys teased Salvador, saying Aureo was his girl and that they did forbidden things together. Salvador ran into the street—never again to be content with leaning on a window sill. There were rooftops to explore and peck at young lovers and learn about grown-up sex. The roofs were launching pads for bags of water or garbage to dump on Americans—meaning any one not Spanish—walking the street. On the stoops, he stood in open-mouthed awe and listened to the brave talk of older boys about rumbles with Italians and Irish and Negroes. He heard the roll call of gangs—Heart Kings, Dragons, the Enchanters. He laughed wildly as girls in tight leotards paraded on the street. In the first grade at 8—he learned the rage of raising his arm for permission to go to the washroom. Then he'd run away. He was afraid to go home. And then coming home very late, he'd catch hell from Carlos Gonzalez. The truant officer chased him—and so did Gonzalez. At the age of 10, with the family's consent, Salvador went to a special school for troubled boys. He was no worse or better than the others. He got the regular counseling of a psychologist and, for a time, special therapy of a psychiatrist. The day before he turned 13, he came home. Aureo was gone. She hated Gonzalez so much she got married at 14 to make a home of her own. Gonzalez insisted Puerto Rico was a better place for Salvador and packed him off to his natural father. There are no fighting gangs in Puerto Rico, but Salvador brought the "big city" tricks with him and got into trouble. Papa Agron sent him back to New York. In the dreary, dead-end Brook-

lyn factory-tenement street where they now lived, Gonzalez had his store-front Pentecostal church messenger of Christ No. 1. He wanted Salvador to pray and listen to his sermons, but sometimes Salvador would misbehave and Gonzalez would be enraged. Salvador, an outcast, joined other outcasts. Sometimes they had a name, like the Vampires. Away from home, that was where there was a life worth living. There were easy touches like "Bien Pagada"—the good payer—a homosexual who was generous with those he favored. There was stuff to make a man giddy, beer or sometimes something stronger. There were the pushers with heroin and the guys with pot—marijuana. There were girls, too. But the craziest, wildest, best times were with the guys, the Vampires. He was with some of them and some guys from the Heart Kings and the Dragons, the night of Aug. 29. He was now 16, according to police records. But if the date of Oct. 1 is accepted as his birthdate, that meant he was 15. There was big talk. The guys—some 20 altogether—were going to get even with some Irish and Italian guys for beating up a pal. And they were going to get the Italian who tried to sell pot to one guy's mother. Salvador put on a black cape with a red lining—and became the figure of Dracula. He had a 12 1/2-inch dagger. One other had an umbrella. Another, a studded garrison belt. Still others' pipe lengths. A few minutes after midnight, they invaded a playground off Tenth avenue on Manhattan's West side. They were after "American" enemies. They found some neighborhood boys and girls, but not the ones they were seeking. Salvador, off by himself for a moment, was jeered. "They were boozing, boozing," he says. All the aches of the unloved, all the rage of the unwanted, apparently set him in motion. There were coarse words—and then mayhem. The tapered blade of Salvador's dagger went quick and deep into Anthony Krzesinski's chest, piercing his lung and heart; it drove into the back of Robert Young, as his arms were pinned by the boys; it plunged into the stomach of Ewald Reimer. Krzesinski ran a race with death, got to the safety of a ten-

ment hallway across the street, and died there. Young ran, too, with blood flowing from the seven-inch tunnel left by the dagger. He got into a flat in the adjoining building—and died. Reimer lay in agony on the ground, writhing to avoid the stomping feet of his attackers. He lived to face Salvador in court. What does Salvador think about his act, about "the boys" he killed? His answer shows the twisted law by which he lived. "The fellows that got killed shouldn't be in the park at 12 o'clock at night. They should be in bed. Maybe God wanted them, so that if it was going to happen, it was going to happen. It happened." Brundage Told to Quit Plan To Make Athletes Amateurs

BY HENRY McEMORE
ROME, Italy — In considering any proposal by Avery Brundage — his latest is that Olympic gold medalists be barred from defending their championships — it helps to remember that Brundage is a nut. A nut about amateurism, that is. On all other subjects he is as sane as anyone, but when it comes to athletes performing without pay, or without outside financial aid of any sort, he is as one-sided as

a mirror, as unyielding as granite tracked as a one-legged skier. Brundage's beau ideal of an athlete would be one who:
1. Fashioned his own equipment (vaulting poles, skates, hockey sticks, etc.) with his own hands.
2. Taught himself without the aid of coaches.
3. Walked to the scene of competition, refusing even a lift by a passing motorist.
4. Living in his own tent while at a meet, grew his own food, cooked it himself, washed his own dishes, treated his own aches and pains and, if he happened to win a medal, promptly melted it down and gave the proceeds of the gold,

silver or bronze to a worthy charity. Brundage would call such an athlete blessed, as well he might. He would be a true brother of Brundage's — and just as much of a nut.
Brundage's tireless campaign for purity in amateur athletes — it's been going on for half a century or more — would have long ago been successful but for one factor — human beings. For that's what athletes are, as hard at it is to believe sometimes when watching a wrestling match or a rope climb. Human beings like glory, like money and like easy living. Athletic prowess often brings a man all three, and this is not at all in keeping with Brundage's Spartan and Galahad ideas.
The main purpose of this essay on Brundage is to suggest that, after all these years, he abandon human athletes as impossible to

reform, and turn to animals. Race horses, for example. A champion thoroughbred never gets a penny. No one ever slips him an extra buck for traveling expenses or appearance money. Others make money off him, a lot of it, but not the horse. He begins and ends his life as a true amateur. Even the blanket of roses he wins soon withers and has no resale value, as do the cups, plates, watches, etc. awarded the human champion. Probably as true an amateur competitor as is to be found anywhere in the world are the mice that compete annually in London's huge mice show. The mice come from all over the world, and the competition between them is fierce, and their owners and breeders often fight over the judging, but they are calm and detached. They do not make so much as an extra ration of Stilton for best in show.

Brundage would be happy among horses, mice, dogs and cats. True amateurs all.
I beg him to consider my proposal. It grieves me to see him fight on, year after year, trying to change human beings.



Three years ago the army engineers cleaned the channel of the creek of willows and brush and straightened the channel in some places. Fairfield had been threatened with a flood from the melting snow and subsequent ice jams. At one time the threat was so

great that some families living in the lower parts of town had to be evacuated to the higher parts while the county road and bridge crew and local citizens worked to free the jams. Dynamite was used repeatedly that winter and spring to break up jams and free the channel.

The engineers did such a good job of cleaning the channel that the water flowed too fast and cut away valuable farm land from the banks of the creek in addition to washing gravel downstream. The present project consists of

Break With Castro Outlines Cuba in Red on Map of West

(Two years ago Fidel Castro marched into Havana and received tumultuous acclaim as a revolutionary hero. The United States withdrew recognition, the regime and without him Golaesed. What has happened to change all this? Here is an analysis from an American reporter who has traveled thousands of miles with Castro and observed closely the swing of his government toward the Soviet orbit.)

HAVANA, Jan. 5 (AP)—Washington's diplomatic break with Fidel Castro's fledgling revolutionary regime etches in red on the map of the western hemisphere a Cuba which in two years has been transformed into a communist outpost in the West.

The feeling among educated Cubans is that the Castro regime's future is in Kremlin hands, that its dependence on Moscow is far greater than Cuba's dependence on Washington ever could have been.

Castro's regime in 24 months has virtually destroyed the upper class. It has imposed severe sacrifices upon the middle class and

the labor majority. It has done this in the name of raising up the destitute—but it has raised the most desperately poverty-stricken only to the level of the ordinary poor.

"On the eve of the break with the United States, the consensus of experienced observers in Havana was that Castro had lost perhaps half of the 90 per cent support he claimed two years ago, and that his revolution, supported mostly by fanatic diehard fidelistas and communists, had lost even more.

Castro's own personality seems to be the only cement holding the revolution together.

Cuban and foreign observers say the 34-year-old prime minister has so alienated his western hemisphere neighbors that his revolution has been almost hopelessly ensnared in a Soviet economic net.

Castro's confiscation of more than a billion dollars worth of North American property—his only one of a series of events multiplying his own problems. It

resulted in U. S. retaliation in the form of an embargo on exports to Cuba and an end to U. S. purchases of Cuban sugar.

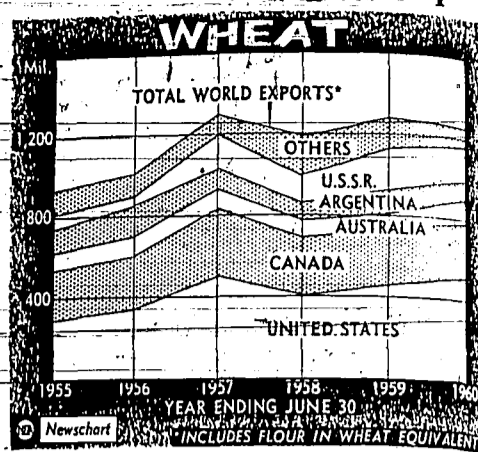
Castro's partisans argue that the revolution still has not had time to achieve orderly functioning, in an island long-plagued by mismanagement and corruption. But the impression is strong that the revolution has lost its momentum and is obliged to waste valuable time and effort explaining and defending itself.

An important factor in this appeared to be Castro's alliance with communism, which Cubans in general seem to fear instinctively. Along with this came a deepening quarrel with the Roman Catholic church and a complexity of economic ills, all ingredients in Castro's gathering crisis. In addition, there are signs of discontent in labor ranks and of armed opposition—still unorganized.

While Castro's position at the top of the heap still is strong, fear appears to have replaced fervor in efforts to keep the whole population in line.

A huge armed force, far bigger than any maintained by dictatorial predecessors, is equipped with modern weapons. A farflung and
