

Burley Delays New Armory Action Plans

BURLEY, Jan. 6 — Action was deferred Tuesday until the next meeting of the city council when further information will be available concerning the possibility of having a new national guard armory building in Burley.

The group discussed the recent meeting with Maj. Gen. John E. Walsh, Boise. It was noted that the city must provide five acres of land for a site and 10 per cent of the building cost while the state would pay 20 per cent and the federal government 70 per cent.

The city's cost for this anticipated \$120,000 structure would be \$12,000. It was disclosed the present building which was built under the WPA will not accommodate the large equipment now used by the national guard. It is desired to have the new building further out of town with adjacent parade grounds, Mayor J. Leonard Salmon stated.

There are four other Idaho towns which have priority over Burley for new armory buildings. They are Rupert, Rexburg, Driggs and Orofino.

A letter was read from Clyde Long, Inc., Colorado Springs, Colo., to the Skyways municipal airport complimenting the people at the airport for fine service during an aerial re-seeding job for the bureau of land management. Spokesman for the company commented on the airport's good location.

The council issued numerous plumber and gas installer licenses during the meeting.

Building permits were issued to the Wright Brothers for new homes in the original townsite for \$11,500 and \$12,000; C. W. Smith, remodel restaurant, \$8,500 in the original townsite and a repair shop for Simplot near the railroad for \$4,000.

Burley Presbyterian Church Hears Bell Silent Two Years

BURLEY, Jan. 6 — The old bell of the Burley Presbyterian church was heard once again on Christmas day after being silent for more than two years, states the Rev. Kenneth Beall, pastor of the church.

"This is the only bell in town, to my knowledge," states the minister. "There are no other church bells, no school or even fire bells." This bell which is three feet in diameter, was purchased at the time the former church was built in 1912, according to Frank Redfield, who was an elder of the church at that time. Most of the persons connected with the church at that time are no longer here. Sam Story was the contractor for the old church.

When the congregation moved to its new building in 1958 the bell from the old church at 15th street and Oakley avenue was taken and hung in the new building in its modern brick tower. However, the architect had made no plan for ringing the bell, so there it hung and remained silent.

Mr. and Mrs. Truman Bradley, members of the church, were visiting in Salt Lake City recently and saw a church bell that was rung electrically, so they started making investigations to see if this arrangement wouldn't solve the situation in the Burley church.

"The electric switch and wiring were soon installed and the two-hammer ring of the bell was heard again."

The Bradleys, along with Mr. and Mrs. John Rue, Graham Daven, and Jack Peterson, presented this gift to the church as a memorial for the Daven family, including Mr. and Mrs. Edward Daven, grandparents of Mrs. Bradley, Mrs. Rue and Graham Daven; Mr. and Mrs. Henry Daven, their parents, and Mrs. Luella Peterson, their aunt and wife of Jack Peterson who died in the fall of 1958. All were active members of the Presbyterian church.

The elder Davens homesteaded above Malta in 1809 coming here from Wisconsin and Greeley, Colo. Their grandmother ran a boarding house for school teachers in Burley for many years. The family lived above Malta in the summer and in Burley during the winters. The grandfather was engaged in

Witnesses Tell of Watching As Airliners Collided in Air

NEW YORK, Jan. 6 (AP) — The United Airlines DC8 jet streak through an overcast sky on Dec. 16 and struck a Trans World Airlines Constellation with a tremendous noise.

While the jet hurtled on toward Brooklyn, he said, the rear of the Constellation fell off and crashed at once, but the front engine-wind portion circled twice wildly before spiraling downward at Miller field, Staten Island.

"I can shut my eyes still and see those four engines going around and around in a circle," Klemm said.

The jet shot on 10 miles to the northeast, crashing in a Brooklyn neighborhood.

Some witnesses, including Klemm, said that when the two planes collided the jet seemed to be at an angle of about 2,000 feet when they level, coming down into the side of the Constellation.

The jet, headed for Idlewild airport, was approaching from the southwest, Warren said, while the Constellation, headed for Laredo, Staten Island sea captain Guardia field, was flying in from the northwest.

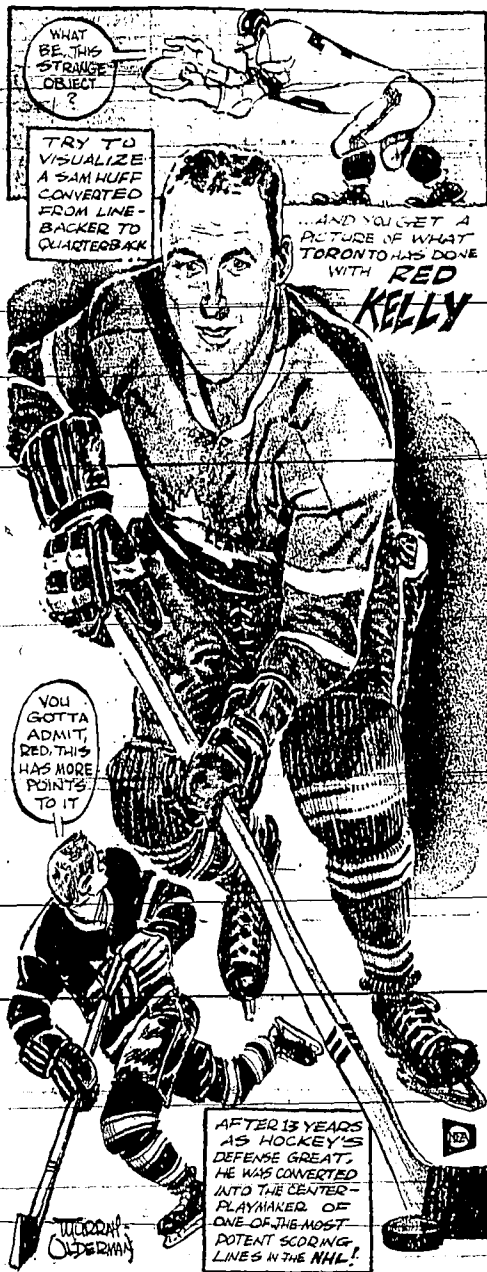

Young Aussie Scores Tennis Tournney Upset

TAMPA, Fla., Jan. 6 (AP) — Unseeded Warren Jacques, a young Australian attending college at Lamar Tech in Houston, Tex., registered the first upset of the Dixie International tennis championships Thursday with the 6-4, 1-6, 6-0 defeat of No. 8 seeded Eduardo Zuleta of Ecuador.

55 Students Try Out for School Play

Farmers' Tax Guide Copies Are Received

Copies of the 1961 Farmers' tax guide are available now at the county farm extension office, announces C. W. Dalgh, Twin Falls county agent.

The guide, prepared by the Internal Revenue and federal extension services, explains how to make out tax returns and gives samples of several specified methods for computing income, Dalgh reported.

Most changes in the tax law since last year are minor with the possible exception of a court decision regarding depreciation on equipment and machinery which will affect many farmers, Dalgh said.

The ruling states salvage value must be considered when figuring depreciation. In the past, salvage value usually has been ignored when using the declining balance method of figuring depreciation, Dalgh noted.

Under the new ruling, salvage value must be considered when using any method. An asset cannot be depreciated below the salvage value. Dalgh explained. Salvage value is not junk value, he added, but takes into account the second hand sale value.

Several changes made in the last few years are still in effect. A 20 per cent allowance on new machinery, in addition to normal depreciation, still applies, he said. In addition, farmers have a three-year "carry back" period on operating losses.

The guide contains sections on assessments and sales, gasoline tax refunds, farm cooperative dividends and capital gains on livestock and machinery, he said.

2-Senators Offer Burns Creek Bill

BOISE, Dec. 6 (AP)—Another Burns Creek dam bill has been introduced in the U. S. senate, Sen. Frank Church, D. Ida., said in a message from Washington yesterday.

Church, who introduced the measure on behalf of himself and Sen. Henry Dworshak, R. Ida., said he reminded the senate that it had passed the bill in both the 85th and 86th congresses.

Bills to authorize the 45 million dollar project on the Snake river below Palisades dam, were introduced in the house Tuesday by Idaho Reps. Ralph Harding and Gracie Post, both Democrats.

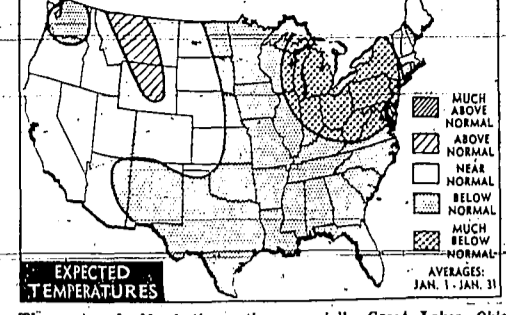

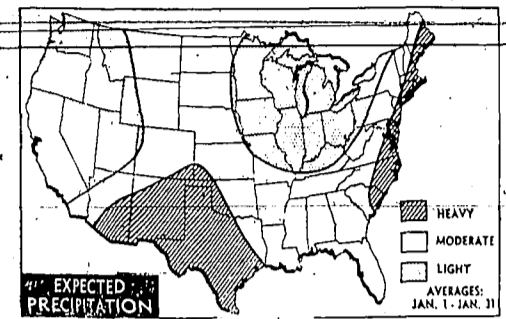

Expansion Program at T.F. Library Discussed at Meet

Possible expansion programs for the Twin Falls library were discussed by library board members at the monthly meeting Wednesday afternoon, Arthur L. DeVolder, library director, reports.

After discussing the feasibility of expansion, the group decided further study was necessary as there appears to be no possibility of obtaining a bond issue at this time.

The possibility of obtaining special grants or endowments from interested individuals was raised by City Commissioner George Bennett, new library board member.

It was suggested some interested person might wish to match city and library funds to erect a balcony to provide room for approximately 10,000 volumes, DeVolder said.

The board was informed the DeMary Memorial library in Rupert was financed in this manner.

DeVolder suggested a study be made to determine the minimum cost for constructing the balcony and installing shelving already on hand. Discussion was terminated pending an engineering study to check if the floors could support the added weight.

In his monthly report, DeVolder reported during December 86 adult, 14 juvenile and 14 youth books were purchased by the library. In addition, one youth and six adult books were donated, for a total addition of 133 books.

There were 43 books worn out and withdrawn—42 adult, nine juvenile and two youth books. Some 283 books and magazines were repaired.

Rise Is Asked in Economic Growth

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6 (AP)—The National Planning association yesterday joined the long list of those calling for a dramatic rise in American economic growth.

"Economic growth is the only painless source of additional tax revenue," the NPA said.

By 1965, the association continued, such growth would mean 40 billion dollars more of tax money for defense, education, health, and city development without raising tax levels and without inflation.

"To achieve the growth," the NPA suggested an array of policies, all aimed at eliminating recessions. Included was one sure to excite controversy: Consideration of a price and wage board. It would analyze proposed price and wage increases in certain industries and report to the president.
