





### Final Budget From Ike to Be Balanced

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—President Eisenhower's final federal budget, which goes to congress on Monday, will be a balanced, non-political one, Republican congressional leaders said yesterday.

But they added that some of the spending recommendations made to President-Elect John F. Kennedy could throw the new budget into the red, if adopted.

The GOP leaders, speaking to newsmen after their final weekly meeting with Eisenhower, said also that the government will end up in the black during the current fiscal year—which the administration has been predicting all along.

Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, Illinois, and Rep. Charles A. Halleck, Indiana, the senate and house GOP leaders, said the meeting of more than two hours with Eisenhower was devoted largely to the budget.

The budget for the fiscal year starting next July 1 is the one Eisenhower will send to congress four days before he turns over the reins of government to Kennedy.

### As You Please

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—Shunning top hats and striped pants, senate Republicans have agreed to "come as they please" to the inauguration of President-Elect John F. Kennedy.

This means most of the GOP senators will show up in dark business suits for the Jan. 20 ceremony.

Everyone was left to his own devices," said GOP leader Everett M. Dirksen after the weekly Republican policy committee luncheon yesterday.

"I could come either way," he added, "but the decision might be left to higher authority—and you know who that is." He meant his wife.

NEW YORK, Jan. 11 (AP)—John F. Kennedy, the man who won, and Richard M. Nixon, the man who lost, paid tribute yesterday to the man whom they both wanted to succeed, President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

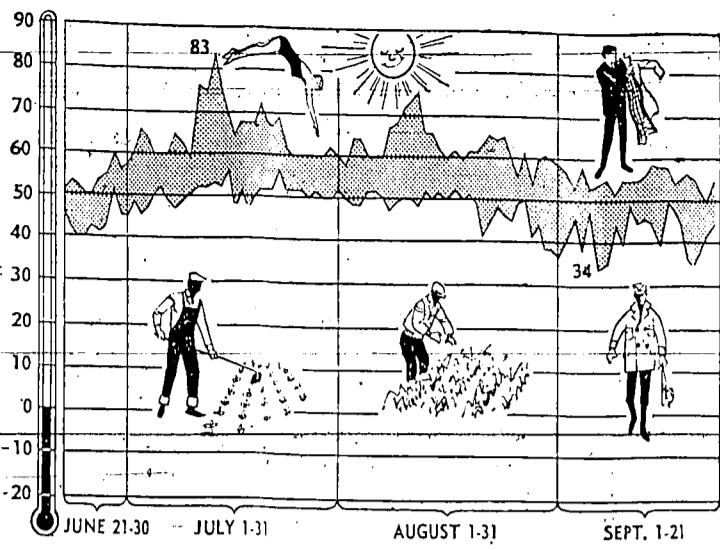
President-Elect Kennedy paid tribute to "the grace and the courtesy with which power has been moved from the Eisenhower administration to the new Democratic administration."

Nixon, retiring Republican vice president, spoke of "the opportunity to be in the presence of and to work with and under a truly great man."

The occasion was a special NBC-TV program, "Tribute to a Patriot," a series of filmed tributes to the outgoing President.

Besides Kennedy and Nixon, speakers included British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan, Indian Prime Minister Nehru and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

**Labor Pushes Pump-Priming**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—The AFL-CIO proposed to congressional leaders yesterday an emergency economic pump-priming that would cost between 2 and 3 billion dollars a month.

In sending the proposals to house and senate leaders, AFL-CIO President George Meany said the labor federation believes "our country stands today on the threshold of the greatest economic crisis since the great depression of the 30's."

Meany offered an eight-point emergency program, plus a series of long-range suggestions. The proposals largely restated prior labor union goals but included some new ideas. Chief of these was a suggested tax cut for small business. Reduced individual taxes were advocated as a prime method of increasing purchasing power.

### Kennedy Has Appointed All Top Officials

PALM BEACH, Fla., Jan. 11 (AP)—President-Elect John F. Kennedy completed organization of the top command of his state department today and settled down for intensive work on his inaugural address.

Kennedy, who flew back to his father's Palm Beach home early today after a hectic round of conferences in the East, announced the appointment of international lawyer George W. Ball as under-secretary of state for economic affairs. Ball is the third associate of Adlai E. Stevenson to be named to the incoming administration.

Ball's law firm has offices in Washington, New York, Paris and Brussels. He is a longtime political adviser to Stevenson who will be ambassador to the United Nations in the Kennedy administration.

William M. Blair, Jr., another Stevenson law partner, is reported in line for a top federal job. W. Willard Wirtz, a Chicago law partner of Stevenson, was named recently as undersecretary of labor, and Newton N. Minow will be chairman of the federal communications commission.

Kennedy flew from Washington to Florida aboard his private plane, the twin-engine Caroline. He was accompanied on the flight by his brother-in-law, Actor Peter Lawford; Matthew McCloskey, Philadelphia, national Democratic treasurer, and Roger Edens, producer of the inaugural gala which the Democratic party is counting on to mend its campaign-injured finances.

### Officials Eye Way to Feed Congo People

ROME, Jan. 11 (AP)—Members of the food and agriculture organization (FAO) were summoned to an emergency conference today on means of feeding 150,000 starving refugees of tribal and political warfare in the Congo.

FAO officials said 200 men, women, and children are dying every day in the Baluba refugee area between Lalouabour and Bakwanga.

The United Nations agency appealed to member nations for three million dollars in aid to start a massive food flow to the strife-torn African republic which has been in turmoil since last summer.

Officials at FAO headquarters here said the appeal was to halt the famine during the next six months, but they added that a giant airlift of food would be necessary to end the immediate emergency.

To start the airlift, FAO sought large contributions by the end of this week.

"Every week we wait, 1,400 more men, women and children will die," warned Dr. K. V. L. Kesteven, a top FAO official who just returned from the Congo.

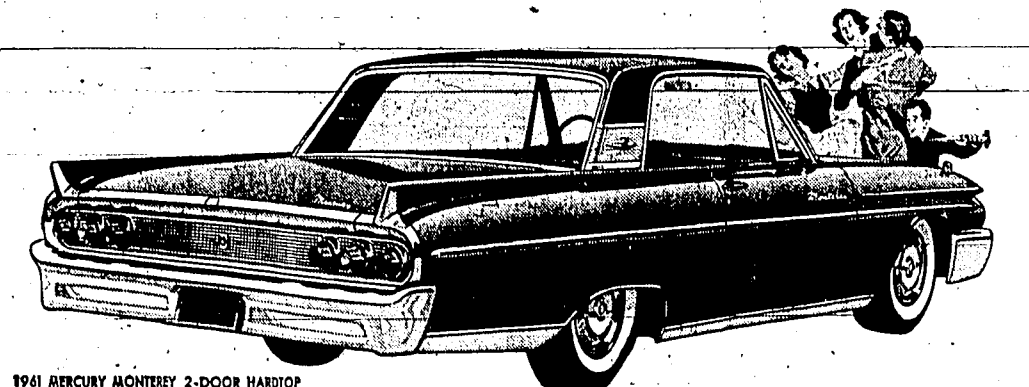

### Probers Hear Charge Hoffa Backed Theft

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—The House subcommittee on the activities of the Communist Party today heard testimony from a New York gangster who admitted he had helped steal and rob if he wanted to, but "don't get caught."

"I don't care how you take the money," Hoffa was quoted as saying. "I don't care how you take it. Get it under the table—get it anywhere you want."

Two Hoffa aides purportedly relayed Hoffa's advice to Anthony (Tony Ducks) Corallo, and their records were said to have been recorded in a room secretly "bugged" by New York City detectives.

The recordings, made on June 30, 1959, also quoted Hoffa as mentioning Robert F. Kennedy as "a damn kid."

Kennedy, attorney general-designate in the new Kennedy administration, was counsel to the senate subcommittee which had been quizzing Hoffa.

The recording was played into evidence before the senate investigations subcommittee, which is exploring alleged links between Corallo in the control of New York Teamsters locals.

New York police Detective Nat. Laurendi testified the voices of the Hoffa emissaries were those of Mack Tane and Bernard Stein, officials of local 239. A third voice was identified as Corallo's.

Hoffa was not present at yesterday's hearing, but is scheduled to testify later in the week. Subcommittee aides have not been able to find Corallo.

The school in Twin Falls is one of several in various parts of the state sponsored by the University of Idaho extension service.

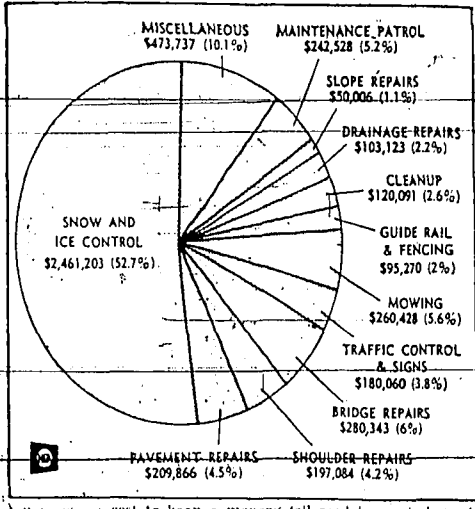

What will it cost to keep a modern toll road in good shape the year round? Well, the New York state thruway authority spent \$4,673,739 in 1959. Far and away the biggest item for the 480-mile road was snow and ice control (see newschart). For example, during the 1959-60 winter season, 53,522 tons of salts and 50,000 tons of abrasives were used to make the pavement safe for the 60 mile an hour limit. Turnpike authorities say these steps and others help the road maintain a safety record far above the national average.

### Haitian Officials Oust Churchman

PORT AU PRINCE, Haiti, Jan. 11 (AP)—The Haitian government, renewing its conflict with the Roman Catholic church, has closed a church newspaper, deported the nation's highest ranking church authority and ordered four other priests expelled.

### Bill Would Stop Dam Construction

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—Sen. Frank Church, D., Idaho, reintroduced a bill that would ban construction of dams on the Salmon river in Idaho until a way is found to get migratory fish, such as salmon, around dams.

"This vast nursery area (the Salmon river) is of immense significance to the great anadromous fish resource of the Northwest," Church said.

The bill is cosponsored by Sens. Clair Engle, D., Calif., and Maurice E. Neuberger, D., Ore. A similar bill introduced by Church last session was not acted upon by the senate.

Miss Hunter was assigned to sprawling Center Myers hall shortly after she and Hamilton Holmes, 18, also Atlanta, completed registration which shattered the racial barrier at the state university.

Although there were a few derogatory remarks made by some of the white students at Center Myers, the general attitude seemed to be that of calm acceptance of Miss Hunter as a fellow student.

### Homes Field Loses Impact On Economy

NEW YORK, Jan. 11 (UPI)—The housing industry is losing its recuperative impact on the nation's economy and will continue to do so for at least the next five years, a real estate executive declares.

Morris Karp, president of Realty Equities corporation, said this situation has become obvious during the current recession. In the recessions of 1950, 1954 and 1958, housing starts rose sharply while the rest of the economy was declining, thereby helping to shore up the decline and support the succeeding economic upswing.

But in 1960, Karp noted, housing followed the sluggish trend of the general economy. He does not see the industry returning to its counter-cyclical role for at least five years.

Karp does not support the belief among many industry and political leaders that the housing decline has reflected a lightness in mortgage money. He said mortgage money has been ample the past six months, and in many areas interest rates have declined somewhat without any stimulating effect on housing.

Basically, he said home building appears to be faltering on a fundamental weakness in consumer demand based on the shifts in the age composition of the U. S. population.

The population is growing fast at both ends—with fewer new households being formed in the middle because of the low birth rates—the 1950's. The housing demands of the elderly and the very young do not call for new homes or large space requirements, Karp stated.
