

World Spud *Crop in 1960 Is Estimated

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (UPD -The foreign agricultural service (FAS) has estimated world potato production in 1960 at 3.5 billion hundredweight. This compared with 3.2 billion hundredweight in Weather was favorable in most areas, particularly in West-ern Europe, which had a nearbumper crop.

North American production was estimated at 304.7 million hundredweight, compared with 287.1 million in 1959. This crop was below 1958, but above the 1951-55 average. Production in both the United States and Canada increased as a result of larger acreage and favorable weather.

The Western European crop was estimated at 1.7 billion hundredweight, 11.1 per cent above last year's crop and 4.6 per cent higher than the 1951-55 average.

The largest individual Euro pean producer last year was Po land with an estimated 800 million hundredweight. West Germany was second with 546.7 million hun-dredweight, and France third with 355.4 million hundredweight.






