Professors Check Records in Beef Research Projects

University Research Aimed at Helping Idaho Beef Industry Adjust to Change

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Feb. 3—Basic information that will assist Idaho's beef cattle industry adjust to constantly changing conditions is the goal of expanded research projects by the University of Idaho agricultural experiment station.

Studies by the departments of animal husbandry and agricultural economics are getting under way in Butte, Custer, Lemhi and Cassia counties. Three to five years will be necessary to secure the basic information. More than 30 range cattle operators are cooperating with the university in this investigation.

"These studies are being undertaken to give cattle ranchers the information they need to meet the increasing competition for the use of rangeland," says R. D. Ensign, associate director of the experiment station. "With one-fourth of the Idaho gross farm income in recent years coming from cattle the research now under way could have far-reaching significance on the state's economy."

"Nearly two-thirds of Idaho's land area is being used in some way by livestock. On the basis of income, livestock production ranks as the largest single enterprise in the state, with beef cattle being the major class of livestock."

"The university research studies, Ensign points out, add up to a broad business analysis of range cattle operations. The goal is to find answers to questions such as: What size ranch operations are most efficient and profitable in the different range types? What range management practices are best? What supplemental feeds are

most satisfactory on the different types of improved ranges? These new projects are in addition to other range research projects in progress, either by the college of agriculture or in cooperation with the university's college of forestry.

"Every year sees a substantial increase in the amount of rangeland privately improved," explains J. P. Baker of the department of animal husbandry, project leader in one phase of the research. "This improvement comes through re-seeding with new improved grasses and better range management."

"Cattlemen are interested in getting all the information they can on how best to use these improved ranges. They are interested not only in top returns each year but in how to get such returns without damage to the ranges themselves."

"The range use studies also include work on supplemental feeding of cattle on the range. Baker points out an acute need for a system of livestock management that will give the highest degree of utilization, the department of agricultural chemistry is cooperating in making the necessary chemical analysis of range feeds."

"Very little data has been obtained in Idaho on the costs of operation and returns from different sizes and types of cattle ranches," says R. C. Bevan of the department of agricultural economics, also a project leader. The study he is directing is aimed at securing this information from about 30 cattle operations of varying sizes and types in Lemhi, Custer and Butte counties. Later the business management study will be extended to other cattle producing areas of the state.

"This information on cost and returns can be used to point out the profitable types of operations," he explains. "It can also be used to compare possible alternative feed combinations, sizes of business, or breeding practices that may be considered by cattlemen in the future."

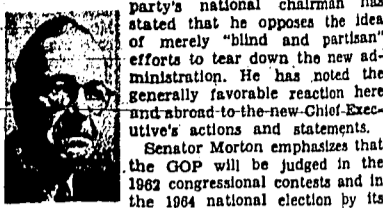

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON — Sen. Thruston B. Morton of Kentucky does not appear to be entirely sympathetic with the house Republicans' frank and open alliance with Southern Democrats to oppose President Kennedy's legislative program before it has assumed definite shape.



In counseling and consulting with Republicans throughout the country since the Nov. 8 election, the party's national chairman has stated that he opposes the idea of merely "blind and partisan" efforts to tear down the new administration. He has noted the generally favorable reaction here and abroad to the new Chief Executive's actions and statements.

Senator Morton emphasizes that the GOP will be judged in the 1962 congressional contests and in the 1964 national election by its record on Capitol Hill through the next two years. It has no other "showcase."

He is extremely anxious to make more gains in house and senate seats two years hence as necessary political vitamins for 1964. The GOP picked up two senate and about 20 house members on Nov. 8, despite President Kennedy's triumph.

THE CONSTRUCTIVE OPPOSITION — In a recent statement, Senator Morton indicated that he was not entirely happy over the deep between House Minority Leader Charles A. Halleck of Indiana and ultraconservative Rep. Howard W. Smith, the Virginia veteran who heads the all-important house rules committee.

"The fact that we lost the election, the closest in history," said Senator Morton, "in no way relieves us of our obligation and responsibility to perform constructively, as we go about strengthening our organization in the precincts."

"We are not obstructionists. We are not calamity howlers. We are not addicted to the panic button. We are not negative thinkers."

THE HARSH REALITIES — This restrained definition of the Republicans' future does not accord with the Halleck-Smith strategy of solidifying a hostile and bipartisan bloc dedicated to the defeat or drastic revision of the President's "New Frontier" program.

In Senator Morton's opinion, and there are many prominent GOP-ers who agree with him, Secretaries Dillon and McNamara, for instance, stubborn opposition for purely political purposes will react against the Republicans. Yet that seems to be the plan of the house members under the Halleck-Smith leadership. They seek to discredit the Kennedy regime with reinforcements from the formidable Southern faction.

Former Vice President Nixon's narrow loss, however, has made a deep impression upon thoughtful Republicans, and taught them several harsh facts of present-day politics.

In this category are men like Senator Morton, his fellow-Kentuckian, Sen. John Sherman Cooper, and Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York.

LEFTWARD HO! FOR THE GOP — Their county-by-county and city-by-city analysis of the presidential returns has impressed upon them that they cannot expect to recapture the White House or gain control on Capitol Hill unless they can build up strength among workingmen and women and various racial elements, especially Negroes.

These voters were once Republicans. Since FDR's day, however, it is estimated that they have voted between 80 and 90 per cent Democratic in local and national elections. It was their support in the great metropolitan centers which gave President Kennedy his small but victorious margin.

The other lesson is that, in view of President Kennedy's success in the South despite the religious issue, the Republicans must write off this section as a triumphant battleground in national contests.

Obviously, in the opinion of this group, the Halleck-Smith union is not designed to win over these types of voters.

VIEW OF OTHERS

A PROBLEM IN REVERSE

One of the speakers at the recent California street and highway conference noted that many California drivers from heavily-populated urban areas are totally unfamiliar with the problems involved in driving on rural and county roads. They expect stop signs, crossing signals and other traffic control devices. They are used to highways designed and built for high speed driving. When they get out on rural roads, and encounter situations with which they are unfamiliar, they become a traffic hazard and accident cause.

This may well be a problem in California because of sprawling cities and many miles of fast freeways. But in Utah and other more sparsely settled states the problem is just the reverse. Utah opened its first section of true urban freeway only a few weeks ago. Many thousands of Utah drivers have never seen one.

They may be thoroughly competent to drive on a county road, a rural highway or even a busy city street. But if they chance to go to California and suddenly find themselves on a crowded freeway, they are in trouble. Either they drive too fast trying to keep up with the freeway traffic, or too slow. In either case they become a hazard to other traffic and to themselves.

This creates a special kind of driver-training problem both for an auto-packed California and a wide-open-spaces Utah. In this modern mobile age, when people move readily around the country, drivers should be prepared to meet all kinds of driving situations. But how is the beginning driver in Richfield supposed to learn how to handle a car on the Los Angeles freeway?

The answer may be in greater use of the kind of driving simulator described to the California conference by Elade Hulbert, research specialist at the Institute of Transportation and Traffic Engineering, University of California. By use of such a simulator California drivers can be conditioned to the different techniques and problems of rural driving. Similarly, Utah drivers could learn what it's like to drive on a busy freeway. —Salt Lake Tribune.

HAIL THE NEW PRESIDENT

John Fitzgerald Kennedy Friday became the 35th President of the United States. In solemn, dignified inaugural services, our new leader gave a vibrant address on our nation's desires and intentions. Forceful, but calm, the young President evidenced the stature and the intelligent understanding that our leader must have.

Gone was the campaigning Kennedy front, the self-assuredness, the impatience to get the nation "on the way." Presented, instead, was the challenge to the world—to Communists and to friendly nations, and to Americans, to join in concerted effort to meet common problems.

Basically, Mr. Kennedy was meeting an enormous test. He met it well. The people of the nation, understanding the many complications facing the new President, will join in wishing him success. They should heed his plea not to come to Washington to ask for something, but to come to help. America has needed that kind of urging for years.

Friday, despite the bitter cold in Washington, was a great day for the Democrats. We fervently hope it leads to a great day for the nation. —Boise Statesman.

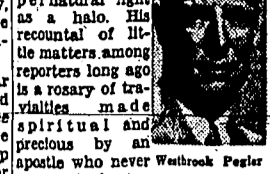

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

Gene Fowler's farewell is here, a story of Park row in the 'twenties, called "Skyline." On my pillow late at night I slowly realized with sorrow that a saintly man whose goodness glows with a supernatural light as a halo. His recollection of little matters among reporters long ago is a rosary of spiritual and precious by an apostle who never Westbrook Pegler knowingly hurt anyone.



Why didn't he wear sandals and a cow? I criticized Gene for condoning guilty wrongs by notorious public men of his time and circle which had an important aggregate harmful effect on the morals of the rabble. He implied that the charm, the shocking abandon of luxurious wantons compensated the harm they did far beyond the company of those who knew them.

I agree with Damon Runyon on the vocation of the reporter and the reporter's duty to walk alone shunning popularity. Which reminds me, there is a studio and factory a block from where I often work on 46th street, where shields, plaques and medals are designed, graven and washed in gold for presentation in considered recognition of the glory of heroic columnists who savagely condemn racism, bigotry and McCarthyism. This is now a commerce. The banquet departments of big hotels run it.

Once, in a thoughtless moment, the honoree of such a tribute invited me to sit among the elect at his recognition in the grand ballroom of the Waldorf on a Sunday night. I had known him in the first war so I accepted. But when I showed up he panicked. The chart disclosed no seat for me in the ranks of the great and he seemed to hope I would get the idea and get lost.

I did get the idea but I did not get lost. I dogged him and his manager until, at last, they wedged in an extra chair in the fifth or sixth row from the front in a rising bleachers about 20 rows deep. I was on the very end until some other Dutchman, as they call inconvenient creatures, came in late and became the end man.

It is not vanity, I assure you, but irony which reminds me after all this time that, although the occasion was loaded with leaders of the Roosevelt cult, when our names were called, only Jim Farley's decibels measured up to mine.

Jack Lemmon Gets Big Kick Out of His Rise to Success

NEW YORK, Feb. 3 (AP)—Success takes all the fun out of life for some people.

It turns them sour and gives them a grudge against the world. Stardom has worked the other way for Jack Lemmon, who last year became one of the top 10 film box office draws. He still gets a huge kick out of his rise to celebrity status, but isn't overly impressed with it.

Jack came here for a brief fun ride on the Manhattan roller coaster—after completing his latest movie comedy role in "The Wackiest Ship in the Army."

Asked if success had made any dramatic change in his life, Lemmon, who happens to come from a wealthy Boston family, made a mock grimace and said, "Success is a very tricky word. It is already someone else's opinion of you—and not your own."

"A man who makes a million dollars isn't really a success in his own eyes unless he feels happy and fulfilled."

"You have to do things to fill your own needs—if you want to stay healthy."

At 33, the slender, dark-haired actor still admits to a "cooped-up" repressed desire, neither of which, however, is exactly making him miserable.

He'd like to write a hit song, and he'd like to appear in a hit Broadway play.

Jack loves what he calls "plano doodling" and the result is some 400 unpublished tunes.

Jack's two stabs at Broadway fame have been almost as unsuccessful as his songs. His most recent play, "Face of a Hero," folded after seven weeks. But he wants to try again next year.

"No one blames you personally if a stage play flops," he said. "It isn't a career handicap anyway, it's good to get out of a lousy play for a while."

"When you're on the stage and fluff a line, there's nobody to say, 'That's okay, let's do it again, Charlie.'"

"You've got to make it alone—and that's good for you—if you've been used to working in the movies, doing a sustained role in a Broadway play is like going into a gym and working out."

It gets an actor back into shape, as training does an athlete. It doesn't matter whether the play hits or misses. He has been helped.

Lemmon isn't exactly dazzled by his present ranking as a big-money comedy film star.

"It means one thing—that you can go to the bank and get money for another picture," he said. Here's Jack's own capsule philosophy of living:

"Be happy in yourself. Put the field you like best, and work at your peak ability. If it's only playing bricks, lay them as best you can—and you can't really lose."

Russians Say Article About Airmen False

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (AP)—The Soviet Union has told the United States that a communist magazine article reporting the capture of 11 U.S. airmen by Soviet authorities more than two years ago had made "an incorrect presentation of the facts."

The state department made public yesterday an exchange of notes with the Soviet foreign office concerning the fate of the 11 Soviet-held airmen. The information about the men previously had been reported informally by the department.

This latest exchange in the case came about as the result of an article reprinted in the Soviet magazine Ogonyok. This article originally appeared in an East German communist magazine.

The article concerned the shooting down of a U.S. air force C130 transport on the Soviet side of the Turkish-Soviet border in September, 1958. The United States claimed at the time that the plane was off course and probably had been lured over Soviet territory by false radio signals.

The Soviet government subsequently returned six bodies but said it could provide no information on the fate of the 11 other members of the 17-man crew.

The article published in Ogonyok alleged that the aircraft was engaged in spying and said that 11 of the 17 crewmen "were parachuted onto Soviet territory" and were "captured in the vicinity of Yareven."

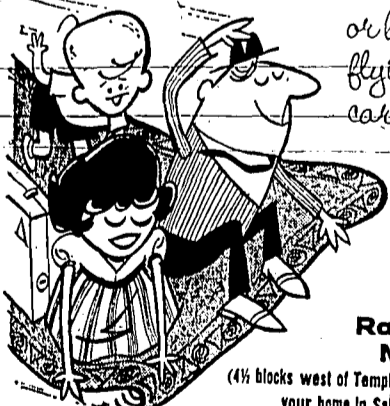

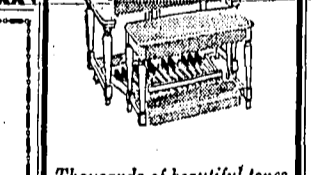

Agency Plans "Chatterbox" Satellite Shot

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3 (AP)—The space agency plans to launch another Explorer satellite next week; a new type of orbiting chatterbox broadcasting on six radio frequencies.

Analysis of the intensity of the radio impulses as received on the Earth may tell communications experts much that they do not know about the ionosphere and why it occasionally interferes with radio transmission.

The national aeronautics and space administration, disclosing plans to launch the satellite from Cape Canaveral, Fla., within a few days, said today it will be a cooperative international project with New Zealand, Canada and Peru.

The 74-pound satellite will range between altitudes of 240 and 1,600 miles, sending signals of varying power to receiving stations around the world.

Until it has been launched successfully and named Explorer IX, the new payload is known as Ionosphere Beacon satellite C15.

NASA said it looks very much like the Explorer VII and Explorer VIII satellites, having two cones back to back.
