House Bill Places Yearly Legislative Issue up to People

BOISE, Feb. 6 (AP and UPI)—Idaho's house of representatives voted today to submit to the state's constitution providing for annual sessions of the legislature. The annual sessions measure was one of two bills which sponsors said would improve the lawmaking machinery. The other would have provided for four-year terms for state senators. It went down to defeat. Rep. George F. Brocke, D., Latah, told the house that the present 60-day sessions every two years do not give legislators enough time to deal properly with the increasingly complex problems of financing state government.

F.F. Man Is Jailed For Drunk Driving

Two Twin Falls men appeared in justice court Monday morning on drunken driving charges. Both pleaded guilty and were fined \$100 each and their driver's licenses revoked for one year. One was sentenced to five days in the city jail. Everett C. Raymond, 41, Twin Falls, received the 15-day sentence in addition to the fine and license revocation. He was arrested by city police at 7:25 p.m. Sunday and argued with drunken driving after being involved in a car accident in the 1800 block of Kimberly road. His 1956 Nash collided with a properly parked 1934 Plymouth owned by Allen L. Price, 1334 Kimberly road. Damage to the Nash was estimated at about \$175. The front and rear of the Plymouth were damaged.

The other man charged with drunken driving was William O. Clark, 39, 1343 Spruce street. He was arrested at 2:30 a. m. Sunday in 400 block of Blue Lakes boulevard north.

Police Sgt. Flint was observed driving in and out of the wrong lane. He voluntarily submitted to a blood alcohol test at St. Valley Memorial hospital at his arrest.

Clayton M. Carter, 43, Burley, was fined \$100 and costs and sentenced 30 days in the Twin Falls county jail Monday by Twin Falls Justice of the Peace Robert E. Crane for driving on a suspended license.

Carter was arrested by State Patrolman James Gerke at 2 a. m. Sunday two miles south of the town of Highway 22 and 74 on Highway 74.

State Patrolman Gerke said Carter's license was suspended for reckless driving on Oct. 20, 1959.

John R. Combs, Paul, was fined \$100 and costs by Justice of the Peace Alfred Crane Monday morning on the charge of being intoxicated while in an automobile on the highway.

Combs had been in a car with Donald MacKenzie, 30, Rupert, who also was arrested. MacKenzie was charged with drunk driving. MacKenzie's license was suspended when he appeared before Justice Crane Monday morning. A date for his hearing has not been set.

Both men appeared before Justice Crane on Friday following their arrest. MacKenzie posted a \$200 bond and Combs posted a \$75 bond.

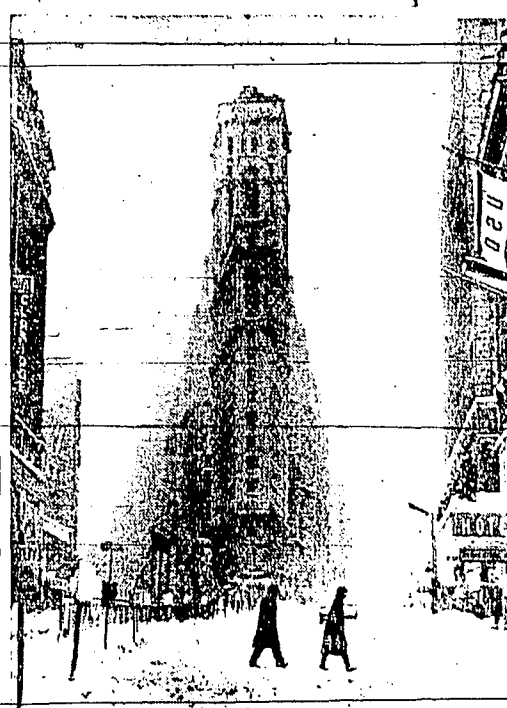

Habits Change
