Godefroid Munongo, the interior minister, told reporters, "I will speak frankly. If people accused us of killing Lumumba, I will reply: 'Prove it.'"

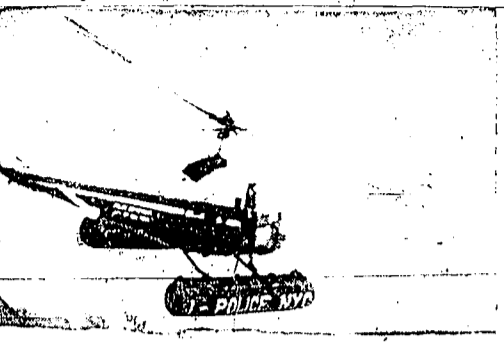

NEEDED AGREEMENT West Germany is the second most prosperous nation in the West and it is altogether fitting that it should help the United States to ease its current international economic difficulties.

# Palmer, Sanders Meet in Playoff In Phoenix Open

PHOENIX, Ariz., Feb. 13 (AP)—Arnold Palmer and a man who infringed his patent on incredible finishes, Doug Sanders, met today in a golf match that seemingly could not be—an 18-hole playoff for the Phoenix Open championship. The winner gets \$4,300, the loser \$3,000, and each takes a fourth of the day's gate receipts. Sanders was eight big strokes behind the front-running Palmer at the start of what was scheduled as the final round.

He proceeded to slash eight off par to set an Arizona strokes off par to set an Arizona Country club course record of 62. The Palmer had to scramble for an even par 70. They pulled into the 72-hole mark deadlocked at the 10 under par for the distance.

Sanders, 27-year-old advocate of the short backswing, was the picture of perfection as he drove out of the fairway only once; hit every green in regulation and rang up a card of 10 pars and eight birdies.

Palmer also parred his holes, but his four birdies were offset by an equal number of bogeys in his worst round of the tournament.

Palmer came into the 18th needing a birdie 4 to tie. His second shot was in the fringe at the left of the green, 50 feet from the pin. He ran the ball up with his putter but hit too strongly and rolled eight feet past. The great pressure player got down from there for his birdie.

Jack Fleck, who won the Phoenix Open last year in a playoff with Bill Collins, finished one back at 271 for third money of \$2,000.

Don January was fourth at 272 for \$1,700. Dave Marr and Johnny Pott tied for fifth with 274, winning \$1,450 each. Collins and tournament tenderfoot Jackie Cupit of Longview, Tex., each took \$1,250 with 275.

## McBeth Wins

The Angels assigned Norris to their Fort Worth-Dallas AA club. He is six feet, three inches and weighs 195 pounds.

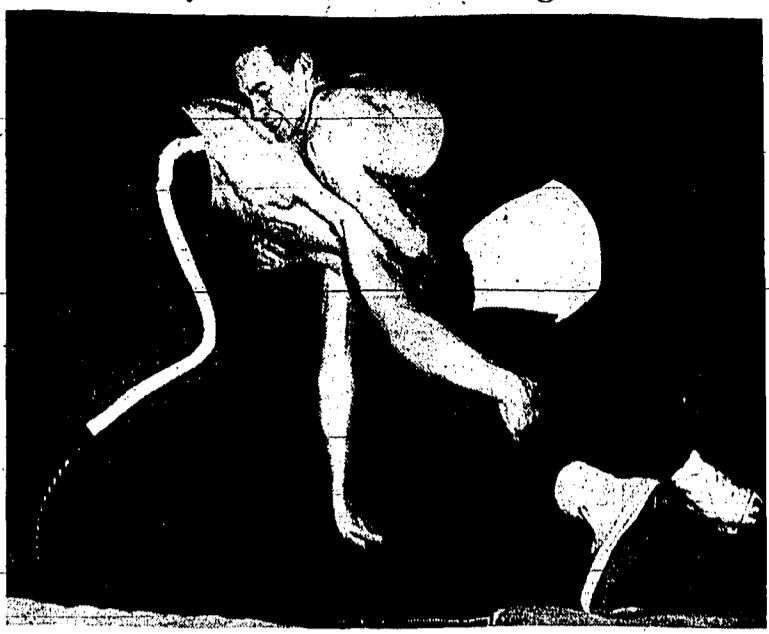

TOKYO, Feb. 13 (AP)—At the urging of former baseball great Lefty O'Doul, baseball executive Nick Morgan, Jr., offered today to underwrite a little world series between the champion of Japan and the Pacific Coast league.

Morgan, new owner of the Honolulu PCL franchise, held a press conference, with old-timer O'Doul doing a goodly share of the talking.

At the outset, Morgan remarked he and O'Doul, a favorite in Japan, came here solely to enhance relations between the two countries. Before the conference ended, he predicted the day will come when U.S. and Japanese teams will be in the same league.

Morgan at first said he would underwrite a series between his Hawaii team and the Japanese champs. O'Doul interjected:

"Nick will invite the champs to Hawaii for seven games. He'll absorb the loss. If there's a profit, he'll split it."

"All you need is money, and Mr. Morgan has the money," Morgan then said sure he would, he didn't care who won the PCL pennant; he would guarantee any loss in a playoff, be it Portland, Salt Lake City, or any other PCL team.

Although he has not yet met with Japanese baseball officials, he indicated a desire to start the playoffs after the 1961 season. They would be in the States this year and Japan the next.

Morgan said minor league baseball now is "stagnant on the mainland" and moving the Sacramento, Calif., franchise to Hawaii saved the PCL.

"We're envious of your baseball success here," he said. "The U.S. will gain more from the Japanese. We hope you accept us."
