





### Meet Held on State Issues At Shoshone

SHOSHONE, Feb. 14—The second in the series of meetings to consider current state legislation was attended by 50 persons from throughout Lincoln county Thursday evening.

Meeting with the group at the home here were State Sen. Jack M. Murphy and Rep. Floyd O. Kistling who explained various bills and received instructions from local citizens regarding voting on the measures.

A. M. Derr, Richfield, conducted the meeting. Thursday, The Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring the series each week. Next meeting Tuesday, Dietrich will be the chairman.

Although no definite vote was taken on SB 14, opinion of those present was that it was an unfair proposal to continue unemployment benefits for those who had not received instructions from local citizens regarding voting on the measures.

House bills 13, 209, 210, 132, along with senate bill 22 and 96, all pertaining to higher education, school, right of appeal to district court, bonding issues, reorganization of school districts and duties of school districts, were all explained by Representative Kistling.

Legislators present said that senate bill 21, regarding trading stamps, was in committee Friday, that closed hearings will be heard Monday for opponents and proponents of the stamps.

HB 31 was explained and it was noted that the bill protects the business as well as valuable farm lands in regards to highway construction.

HB 50 was considered one of vital importance since it deals with taxation and a plan to eventually equalize all investments. The average for state assessment runs around 15 with Lincoln county hitting about 17.4 with some public utilities as high as 44. The appraisal of some public utilities has been reduced two per cent at different times with local properties remaining the same.

If a reduction should be made in utilities as the bill proposes, it would necessarily increase local property taxes, the group concluded. A resolution was offered to the effect that if HB 50 does pass, then a franchise tax might be levied on utilities in order to maintain normal level on taxes of local property.

Senator Murphy was instructed to vote against HB 90.

Following a discussion and explanation of the proposed 33 million dollar appropriation for education, the group instructed Senator Murphy to vote against the amount. If this measure fails, Senator Murphy pointed out, the house of representatives will then present a bill calling for 35 1/2 million instead of the 33 million.

Due to current taxation within Lincoln county, it would not cost local taxpayers any more to have the larger amount appropriated. The bill for 33 million would be voted upon Friday morning.

Senator Murphy was also instructed to vote against the proposed \$200,000 for the commission for centennial. They did ask him to use his judgment in voting up to as much as \$50,000 appropriation for the centennial, however.

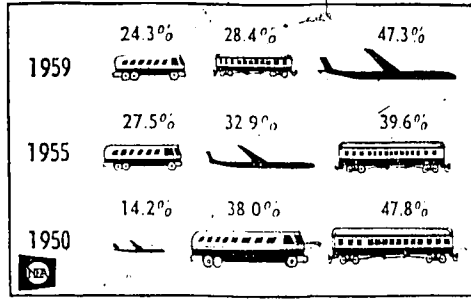
### T. F. Jaycees' Award Dinner Plan Complete

### Hopes Raised For Bans on Nuclear Tests

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14—Key senators saw increased hopes today for progress toward a nuclear test ban agreement as part of Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's "honeymoon" with the Kennedy administration.

These lawmakers also came away from a closed-door session with Llewellyn E. Thompson, U.S. ambassador to Moscow, with the impression that Khrushchev was anxious to reduce tensions at least temporarily to enable Russia to concentrate more on economic development.

Thompson and most members of the senate foreign relations committee were close-mouthed about details of the two-hour and 15 minute session late yesterday.

But it was known that the mood was covered virtually every phase of U.S.-Soviet relations, including the possibility of a meeting between President Kennedy and Khrushchev.

Thompson was said to have shed no light on the possibility of an early meeting, but some senators said they had the impression that Khrushchev was not pressuring Kennedy for an early session and for that matter, not pushing the new administration too hard about anything yet.

John Knowles, president and co-chairman of the orientals committee with Arthur Duncan, read the requirements for new Jaycees officers. Nominations of officers and directors has begun.

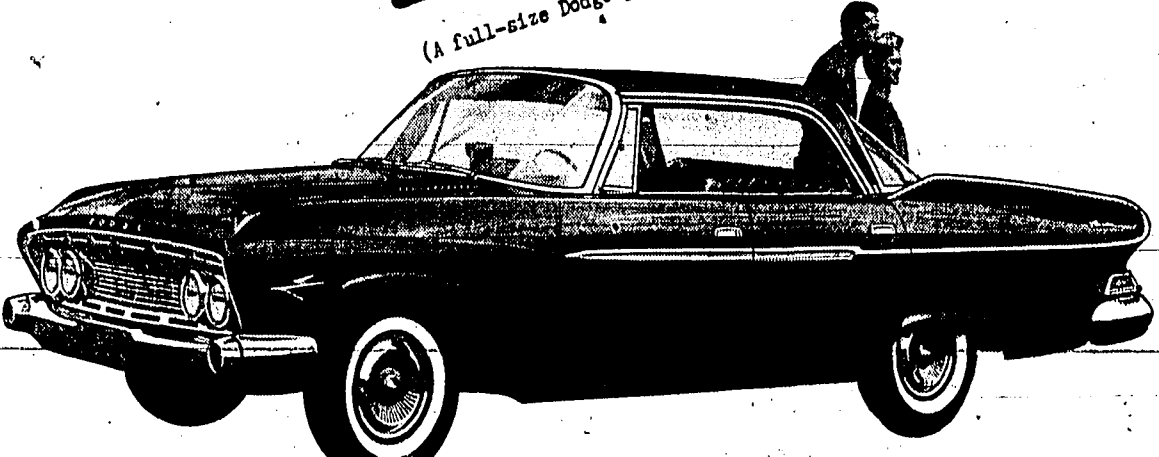

BURLEY, Feb. 14—“People are more important than missiles and gadgets,” asserted George Alexander Bowle, philosopher and lecturer, to a capacity crowd at the Burley-Rupert Knite and Fork club meeting at the Elks hall Friday evening.

“A harsh thought about someone is harder on us than on another, for the one you feel harshly to, it may never know it. It is good company for yourself,” he said.

“Life is personal. You can be in a room full of people and still be alone. Somehow we have the idea in our heads that everyone else is like we are, think and do like we do. What a sad world it would be if this were true. God never intended us to be all alike, for there are no two of us who look alike or even have the same fingerprint. God never intended sameness, for it would take a lot of the spark out of living,” he asserted.

He referred to Mrs. Albert Einstein who had been asked if she understood her husband's theory and she had stated that she didn't, but she understood Mr. Einstein. Bowle remarked that this was far more important.

The philosopher stated that from one family could come a bishop as well as a burglar. These two persons had received the same heredity and environment, but it is “you” that makes the difference, he declared.

“Some people say things for effect, others cover their facts with chocolate, while others just stretch the facts. We judge one another because we are different. Which are the saints and who are the goats?” he asked.

He closed by saying, “Get rid of harsh judgments, for who says we have the right to judge? We need to be spark-proof and give up the idea that people should be like we are.”

NOGALES, Ariz., Feb. 14 (AP)—Sen. Barry Goldwater, R., Ariz., last night accused the new secretary of interior of “cold blooded patronage politics” and coercion of congressmen from western states.

As to Udall's recent tightening up on control of appointments, Goldwater called it strictly a “patronage ruling.”

He referred to Udall's Feb. 6 order directing that all department of interior appointments in Washington above the \$4,500-a-year level and those outside Washington above \$3,885 have approval from his office.

“Mr. Udall said his purpose was to promote more economy and better efficiency,” Goldwater said. “I would like to point out to you that his action is a calculated seizure of patronage.”

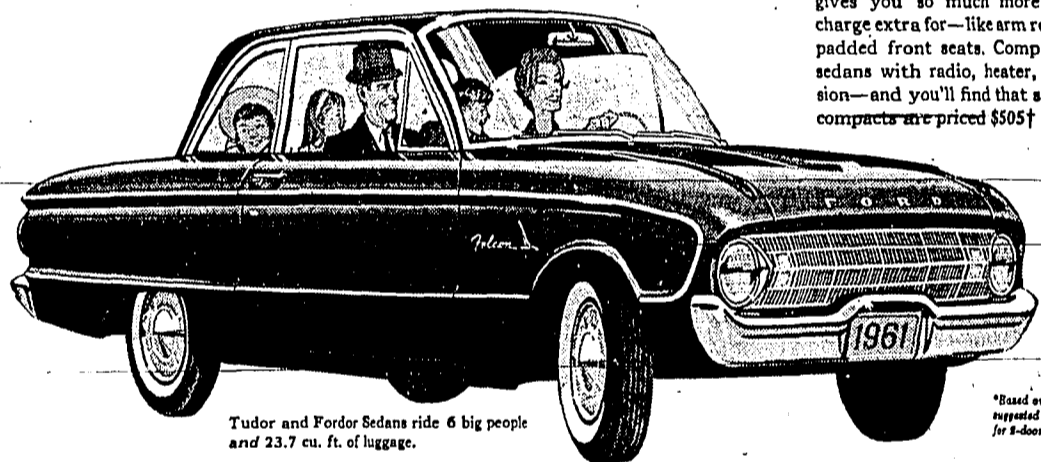

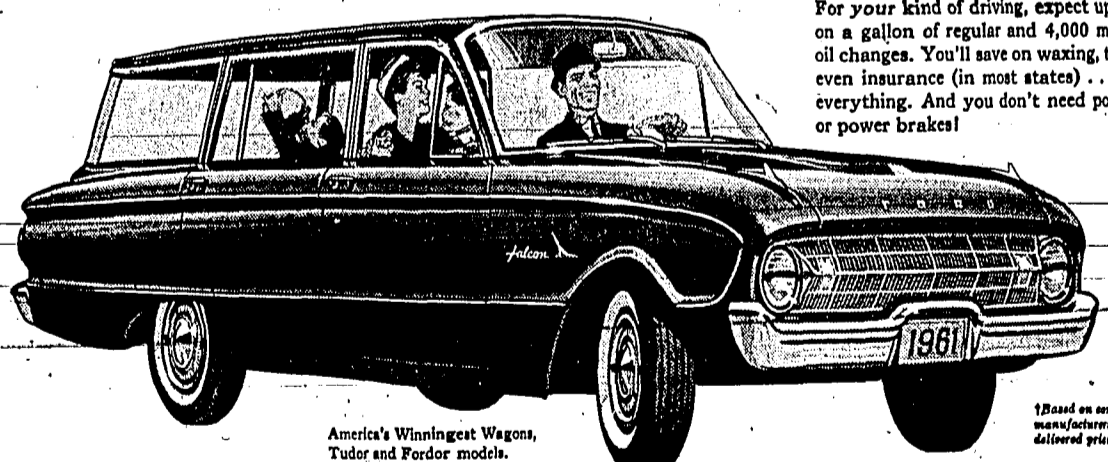

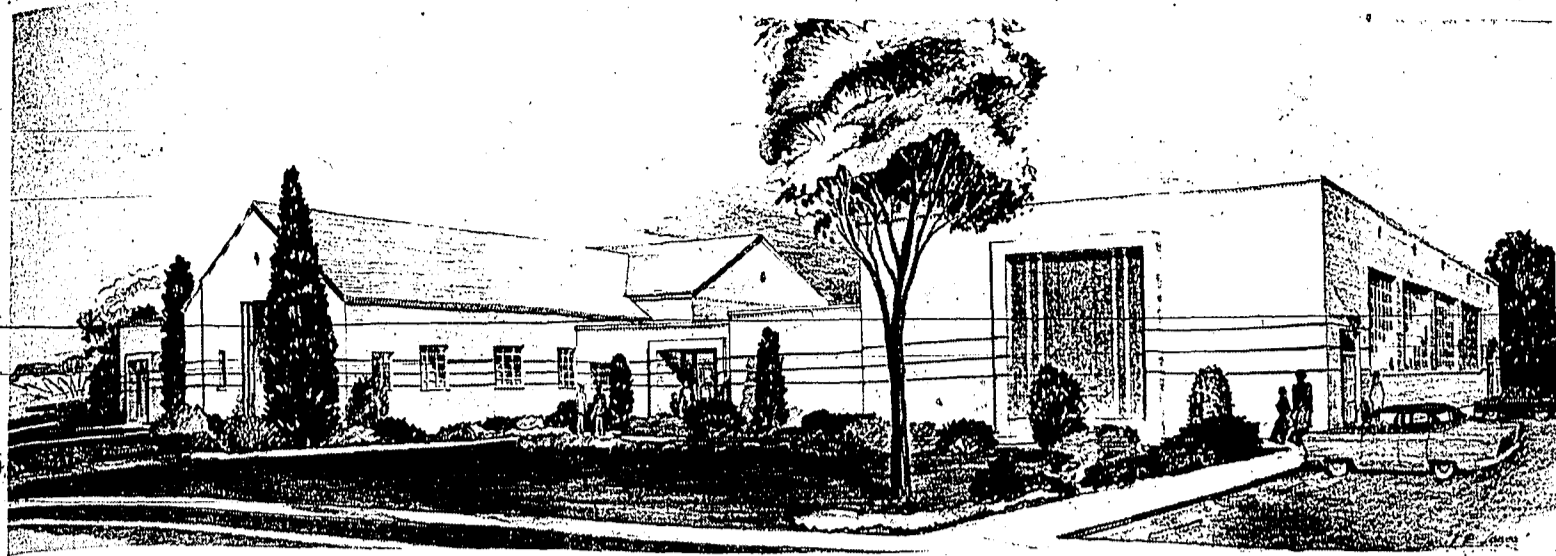

## Terrifying Possibilities Are Suggested After Venus Shot

**WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)** — Chairman Overton Brooks, D., La., of the house space committee said today there were "terrifying possibilities" in Russia's apparently successful attempt to send a satellite toward Venus.

Brooks pointed out that the Russian feat marked the first time a rocket had been fired from a space station in orbit around the Earth.

"If they can aim this instrument-loaded satellite to Venus," Brooks asked, "how long will it be before they can aim a bomb-loaded satellite toward Earth?"

Brooks, who has called for a "full discussion" of the Venus shot at a hearing tomorrow, said in an interview he had long agreed with the maxim that those who control space will control the Earth.

Besides the possibility of future satellite bombs, Brooks saw the Soviet Union's Venus rocket as being a "major step" toward placing a manned station on the moon.

Space experts have felt for some time that using a space station in orbit around the Earth as a launching pad might prove to be the easiest and most direct method of getting man to the moon.

Brooks' forebodings about the Russian achievement were echoed by 40 other members of the house space committee.

Rep. James G. Fulton, R., Pa., said the Russian achievement was "a very big step" toward getting a manned expedition on the moon's surface.

He said the moon eventually might serve as an ideal space platform for "immensely accurate" anti-missile and satellite missiles.

Fulton said he believed the moon would prove to be of "great strategic and tactical importance in the controlling of inter space or that which has relatively close to the Earth."

He rejected, however, the theory that Russia's Venus shot meant that Russia's Venus shot meant satellite bombs could be developed in the near future.

### Foggy Venus Is Sphere of Mystery Still

By United Press International

Venus is a fog-shrouded sphere of mystery spinning through space in an orbit between 160 and 26 million miles from Earth.

Named after the Roman goddess of love, the planet has almost completely defied efforts of astronomers to probe its surface.

The planet is considered of great interest because scientists feel there is a possibility it may either sustain human life or be somewhat similar to the Earth.

The planet is slightly smaller than Earth, with an estimated diameter of only 7,700 miles.

It moves around the sun at an average distance of 67 million miles in 225 days.

The planet, like the Earth, is enveloped in an atmosphere, but unlike the Earth the clouds appear to form a complete wrapping around its surface.

Venus shines with a dazzling light because of the great intensity of the solar radiation present. This radiation is almost twice the amount on the Earth's surface.

Venus' luster, led the ancients to call it *Hesperus* when seen in the western sky in the evening, and *Phosphorus* when seen in the mornings in the west.

The atmosphere of the planet appears to consist mainly of carbon dioxide. For some time it was believed it contained no free oxygen or water vapor.

But in 1959 a telescope sent to an altitude of about 100,000 feet indicated that both free oxygen and water vapor were present, according to American scientists.

This discovery, while not completely confirmed, would necessitate a complete restudy of the existing theories on the makeup of the planet's surface and atmosphere.

### Three T.F. Youths Are Finalists in National Merit Scholarship Program

William Ellis, Robert Whitesides and Gordon Tobin, Jr., have been named finalists in the 1960-61 National Merit Scholarship program, Kenneth E. Kall, guidance counselor at Twin Falls high school, reports.

The three seniors have been awarded certificates of merit for their accomplishment. They attained finalist status by their performance on two tests and upon endorsement by their high school. About six-tenths of one percent of the seniors in each state received the awards.

An estimated 9,800 in the United States and its territories are finalists in the scholarship program.

The merit scholarship winners, to be announced April 27, will be selected from the finalist group. They will receive scholarships from the resources of the National Merit Scholarship corporation and from sponsoring business corporations, foundations, associations and individuals. In 1959-60, 115 sponsors participated in the Merit program.

Recipients of Merit scholarships and some sponsored scholarships are chosen by a selection committee comprised of experts in academic selection. Recipients of other scholarships are chosen by special judging teams formed by the sponsors of the scholarships.

High school grades, recommendations of high school officials, leadership, citizenship and extracurricular activities are considered as well as test scores.

Merit scholarships are four-year awards which carry stipends that range from \$100 to \$1,500 a year. Each stipend is determined on the basis of each individual's need. The amount is based upon family resources, summer earnings and college costs, all of which vary for each winner.

"The certificate of merit winners represent our most valuable national resource—our talented youth," states John M. Stalnaker, president of the NMSC. "These exceptionally able students deserve the recognition and encourage-

ment of every citizen concerned with the future of America."

The names of all who achieved semifinalist status in the national competition have been published in a booklet which was distributed to colleges and sources of scholarships and financial aid. Previous Merit scholarship programs indicate that more than half of the finalists will be offered assistance from sources other than the Merit program.

The 1961-62 Merit program will begin in March when the National Merit Scholarship qualifying test will be given in high schools throughout the nation. More than 15,000 high schools participated in the 1960-61 program.

BOISE, Feb. 14 (AP)—The Idaho safety council said yesterday it is opposed to the driver training bill which is pending in the 1961 legislature. The measure appropriates \$250,000 from the state highway fund to finance the program and the council said its primary opposition is to that provision.

The council, in a letter to Rep. Grant Gardner, R., Payette, chairman of the State affairs committee, which introduced the bill, said it is in favor of a driver training program.

But it said there are several provisions of the proposed program which it does not favor. It said it opposes use of highway money because "it would tend to create a pattern of successive raids on this fund." The council said it would favor instead either an increase in the driver license fee, now \$2, or by a direct charge for the training.

### Experts Call Venus Probe 'Remarkable'

LONDON, Feb. 14 (AP)—Western scientists have termed the Soviet Union's piggy-back rocket shot at Venus a remarkable achievement that may help plumb the mysteries of Earth's cloud-covered sister planet.

"This venture demands 400 times as much precision as their previous shot at the moon," said Prof. J. H. Oort, director of the Leyden observatory in Holland.

"I am led to believe that the Russians must have developed a highly reliable system of guiding a rocket while it is traveling through space."

French space expert, Prof. Alexandre Ananov, said Soviet scientists seemed to be trying to leapfrog space achievements by firing big space ships with room for two or three men far out into the solar system.

He said it appeared to him that the Russians might leave to the United States the task of putting the first man in space close to Earth.

Finnish astronomy, Prof. Gustaf Jaerfelt, said the feat would be "most remarkable" if the rocket ship were able to take pictures to show what kind of a surface Venus has.

### Shelter Included

THOUSAND OAKS, Calif., Feb. 14 (AP)—Nuclear fallout shelters will come with every home in two new housing contracts in this southern California area.

"This is the first large scale attempt to incorporate shelters as a mandatory element in the home," said Richard Doremus, president of the builder, Exhibit Homes, Inc.

The 850 homes in the two tracts will range in price from \$17,000 to \$30,000 with the shelters coming as a regular part of the house and included in the purchase price. Construction is expected to be completed in 18 months, the firm said.
