Truce Plan, Talks Asked Over Congo

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Feb. 17 (UPI)—Liberia today proposed a 60-day general truce in the Congo while leaders of all the country's political factions come to the United Nations headquarters for peace talks with Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld and the security council. Liberian Ambassador George A. Padmore put before the security council the suggestion first made by President William Tubman of Liberia. It included a proposal that the security council schedule a session in the Congo or in a nearby territory for a first-hand look at the situation.

New Violence Reported for Congo Areas

LEOPOLDVILLE, Feb. 17 (UPI)—New waves of terror and violence rolled across the Congo today. Lumumbist youths attacked Roman Catholic missions and killed and mutilated a priest in Bukavu, a stronghold of Lumumbist forces in the north.

A United Nations spokesman said bands of youths protesting the death of Patrice Lumumba swarmed through the streets of Bukavu, capital of Kivu province, sacked and burned a Roman Catholic mission and attacked priests and nuns.

A group of Lumumba supporters in Stanleyville beat to death a man who had openly criticized his successor, Antoine Gizenga. Ganges of Lumumba youths roamed the African quarters of Leopoldville during the night, attacking supporters of President Joseph Kasavubu and hacking one man in two.

President Kasavubu, who has been cool to United Nations operations in the Congo, did an abrupt about face today and pledged his full support to Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld.

To show his power he sent a battalion of well-armed paratroopers swinging past the U. N. headquarters in Leopoldville. They marched in perfect step and wore immaculate jungle green uniforms.

Kasavubu cabled Hammarskjöld, "At the moment when your person is being violently attacked by different countries we want to assure you again of our confidence and the wish of the legal government of the Congo to cooperate with you."

He hinted he would frown on any U. N. help for Gizenga who has been recruited by the Soviet Union and a dozen Afro-Asian nations as the sole leader in the Congo. He pointedly referred to his own government as the true and legal government of the Congo.

Increases for Use of Water Said Problem

BOISE, Feb. 17 (UPI)—The commissioner of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation said yesterday that the problem of increased use of water "is critical and can become disastrous."

Commissioner Floyd E. Dominy said that many geographic areas of the United States are rapidly approaching the end of the line in terms of economic growth if their water problems cannot be resolved in the relatively near future.

Dominy told the 10th annual irrigation operators' conference here that the total daily water use in the United States is now 170 billion gallons and is expected to reach 600 billion gallons by 1980.

He said a need for water exchange exists in Idaho if the development of one of the largest remaining blocks of potential irrigated land in the West is to be developed.

He was referring to the Mountain Home desert.

"The bureau has laid out a plan for the development of some 130,000 acres in this area," he said. The land would be irrigated by the Guffey project, in which water would be taken from the Boise river in exchange for water from the Snake river to irrigated lands now under the Boise project.

The Angus bull was selected over "Cedar Crest Hawlyn," grand champion female, also owned by the Tews Angus farm. The reserve champion female was "Jilt of I-Del 4," owned by the I-Del Angus farm, Twin Falls. "Rose View Exchequer," owned by the Hanks Brothers farm, Minidoka, was reserve champion bull. Judging started at 9:30 a.m. today under the direction of Mrs. Pauline Hunt, secretary of the Angus Breeders association, sponsor of the show and sale, and Ken Gross, Sacramento, the official judge.

This year's show and sale drew the largest number of entrants in its history, reports Mrs. Hunt. A total of 60 choice Angus bulls paraded through the judging ring Friday morning. On Saturday 80 service age Angus bulls will be auctioned.

The annual event was kicked off Thursday evening with a membership meeting held at the Rogerson hotel. At the meeting Howard Hanks, Minidoka, was re-elected president of the Idaho Angus Breeders association and Howard Kelly, Blackfoot, was re-elected vice president.

Lyle Springer, St. Joseph, Mo., assistant executive of the American Angus association, gave an illustrated slide talk on herd classification to the group. Approximately 75 members and their wives attended the meeting.

New directors elected Thursday evening are A. J. Hendricks, Cambridge, Walter Yarbrough, Grandview, and Robert Grant, Eden. Holdover directors are Clark Holcomb, Caldwell; Clyde McAfee, Barrington, and Vern Westwood, Wells, Nev.

A committee of judges comprised of Dr. T. Donald Bell, head of the department of animal husbandry at the University of Idaho; Harold Smith, Darlington, and Gross became judging the 80 sale bulls at 1 p.m. today.

Each bull is graded individually according to the Idaho standard grading system.

Sale of the graded bulls will start at 11 a.m. Saturday at the Filer fairgrounds.

Consideration for "Right to Work" Bill Is Postponed

BOISE, Feb. 17 (UPI)—The house shouted down a surprise maneuver to bring the senate-approved agricultural "right to work" bill up for a vote today and sent the controversial measure to another committee. Leaders on both sides of the aisle fought the move to vote on the bill today, initiated by Rep. George L. Crookham, Jr., R., Canyon, despite charges they were merely trying to "stall" consideration of the bill. The bill would prohibit compulsory membership in a labor union as a condition of employment as an agricultural laborer. It came out of the ways and means committee—a leadership committee—with the recommendation it be referred to the industry and labor committee for hearings and further study.

Iowa Cashier Given 15-Year Jail Term

SIoux CITY, Ia., Feb. 17 (UPI)—Mrs. Burnice Iverson Geiger, 58-year-old woman who admitted embezzling two million dollars from friends' and neighbors' accounts in her father's bank, was sentenced today to 15 years in prison. Federal District Judge Henry M. Graven sentenced the graying assistant cashier of the Sheldon, Ia., National bank after a prosecutor disclosed for the first time that she speculated for many years on "the board of trade" with bank funds ranging up to \$1,000 a month. Mrs. Geiger, standing impressively with her hands gripping a table, refused to make any statement to the court that might mitigate her punishment and her attorney said "she is resigned to prison."

Theft Charge Against Pair Is Dismissed

RUPERT, Feb. 17 (UPI)—Grand larceny charges against Larry Bell, 20, and Pat Novosel, 22, both Declo, were dismissed Thursday when they appeared for a preliminary hearing before Minidoka county Probate Judge Jake Wall. Judge Wall ruled there was insufficient evidence to establish that the two men had taken a gravel crane boom from the McGill gravel pit near Acquia.

The two posted \$2,500 bond each after their arrest last week. They also are charged with grand larceny in Cassia county, where they are accused of stealing a road grader and selling it for scrap.

They have posted \$1,000 bond each on the Cassia county charges and hearing there is pending.

Driver Jailed, Fined For License Charge

Kenneth L. Hutchins, 21, route 1, Rupert, was fined \$100 and costs and sentenced to five days in the Twin Falls county jail Thursday by Twin Falls Justice of the Peace Robert E. Pence for driving on a suspended license. Hutchins was arrested at 2:10 p.m. Thursday by State Patrolman John Wray one mile south of Twin Falls on a county road. Judge Pence said Hutchins' driver's license was revoked Dec. 1, 1958, for reckless driving. Dennis B. Moss, 2146 Addison avenue east, was fined \$10 and costs and assigned 25 demerits in Twin Falls justice court Thursday for failing to drive in a reasonable and prudent manner in a school zone. He was cited by State Patrolman James Gerke on Second street north.

Speaker Cites Need to Build For Progress

BURLEY, Feb. 17 (UPI)—Need to build toward a "greater and better Idaho," was stressed by William Eberly, speaker of the Idaho house of representatives, at the annual banquet of the Burley Chamber of Commerce Thursday evening.

Eberly pointed out that the state must have a sound economic plan to grow, adding that Idaho will be in a stage of growth for many years and that agriculture is expanding, processing plants are developing, and natural resources are being developed.

"We need to attract the best people to Idaho, list the advantages and disadvantages of our state, and then get a plan of action," he told the chamber members, noting that industry should be encouraged to come to Idaho.

He mentioned that Burley is "one of the outstanding communities of the state of Idaho today," and said that as a youth he had worked on his grandfather's ranch near Declo.

Eberly was introduced by James Annett, local attorney, who served as master of ceremonies.

Lorin Lewis, Cassia county stockman, paid tribute to two of the county's outstanding citizens—David A. Taylor and Roscoe C. Rich. "These men show opportunity where others thought none existed," he declared.

Austin Wallace, past president of the Burley Chamber of Commerce, reviewed activities of the chamber during the 18 months that he presided.

Pharmacy to Hold Opening On Week-End

Grand opening of Kingsbury's Medical Center pharmacy at Shoup avenue west and Martin street will be celebrated Saturday and Sunday with an open house.

Free gifts and refreshments will be given during the open house.

The approximately \$50,000 building houses a \$25,000 prescription department which will enable the pharmacy to give a complete prescription service, states Lloyd E. Mason, pharmacist.

Mason stressed that he and C. E. Kingsbury, who are partners in the new pharmacy and the Kingsbury Prescription pharmacy, 117 Main avenue east, will continue to run the downtown pharmacy, which has been in business more than 33 years.

The prescription department of the new pharmacy features three walls and three counters of ingredients to fill prescriptions. Mason noted. The department also has a drive-in window at which prescriptions will be dispensed, he added.

Another feature is a 24-hour answering service, Mason said. He explained that a person may phone anytime to have a prescription filled.

The pharmacy also stocks items such as lotions, shampoos, baby medicinals and non-prescription items for the sick person.

Mrs. Adele Stoddard is bookkeeper at the new pharmacy. She notes regular hours will be from a. m. to 8 p. m.

The building was constructed by Reynolds Construction company and fixtures by Bullman Fixture company.

Funds Asked

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (UPI)—President Kennedy today asked congress for an additional 33 million dollars for unemployment compensation payments for former federal employes and ex-servicemen.

The White House said present funds will be exhausted about March 1. The supplemental appropriation was asked for the labor department which handles the payments.

Industrial Output, Incomes

Lead Lag of U. S. Economy

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (UPI)—Two new government reports show a further lag in the economy with industrial output dropping for the sixth straight month in January and incomes falling for the third month.

In one report, the federal reserve board said that production at mines, factories and utilities dropped one per cent to a point eight per cent below the record level achieved in January, 1960.

In a separate report, the commerce department said personal income dropped by 609 million dollars last month to an annual rate of 409.3 billion dollars. This compared with last October's record rate of 409.7 billion dollars.

The board said a sharp outback in auto assemblies, which has continued this month, was only partly offset by a better than seasonal pickup in steel.

The board's industrial production index dipped by one point in January to 102—only two per cent greater than the average for 1957.

Further declines in production of business equipment, clothing, furniture, auto parts and some nondurables were noted by the board. Petroleum output increased and appliance production held steady. There was little change in activity in mining and utility industries.

The commerce department report said most of the January income decline reflected a reduction in manufacturing payrolls.

New Jersey Library Story Points Out Book Theft Rise

 EAST ORANGE, N. J., Feb. 17 (NEA)—Right from the beginning it seemed tailor-made to be fun and games at the little East Orange free public library. The TV cameras rolled. The flash bulbs flared. And library director Harold Roth behaved exactly like a librarian is supposed to behave after he has signed the necessary papers sending detectives into the night to arrest citizens who have not returned their overdue books. Groups of newsmen smirked at each other behind current fiction. How often do you get a story like this—11 in jail, the town in a race, the mayor promising an investigation, Roth promising more arrests, the magistrate defending public authority. But away from the library, the joke took on a hollow laugh. A spot-check by this reporter of libraries, librarians and library experts around the U.S. brought almost unanimous applause for Roth's firm action. As it turns out in real life. There is a growing and serious disregard throughout the nation for library materials. Outright theft is on the rise. The cost to communities is immense. Suburban East Orange last year lost about \$4,000 of library materials which had to be replaced. Most libraries have no way to enforce their circulation regula-

tions other than reminder cards or telephone calls. Even where community ordinances provide for law enforcement of regulations, the libraries are reluctant to sign complaints and prosecute. Never reported or prosecuted, for example, is a recent case in New England where a man stole nearly \$7,000 worth of irreplaceable books and documents in the past several years. He was left alone because, a library investigator told me, "It's bad public relations to go to court. A library is supposed to be a warm and friendly place." One big chain of leading libraries reports that even with the use of attorneys, only about one per cent of its long-overdue books are returned. "In East Orange," Roth said, "we generally send out six or seven reminder cards over a period of months. If these don't work, an informal court summons is sent asking the people to appear in court. Then we merely take back our books." But in recent years, he said, fewer and fewer citizens have bothered to answer the informal summons. "I got a call," he said, "from the magistrate's court asking me to sign formal complaints. So I did." Unfortunately, serious library men said, the detectives made their arrests at night, giving the matter a dramatic quality it did not justify—and, by contrast, grounds for ridicule. Library school administrators, however, were not surprised at Roth's alma mater, the Columbia university graduate school of library services, Dean Jack Dalton said he was sure Roth had acted justifiably and only after long consideration of this serious problem. In East Orange, however, it was not so agreeable. While congratulatory telegrams were coming in from distant libraries, early newscasts were already out with the obvious. So were the irate in East Orange. Roth was a fool, a communist, a fascist, a publicity-mad librarian. "Be fair," Roth kept saying while the newsmen packed up. "Try to be fair." To a casual observer, leaning against business and finance, it was doubtful if anybody heard him.

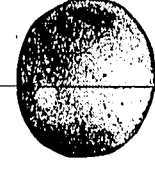

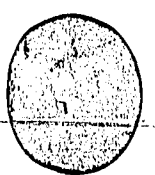

The Pentagon announcement yesterday said Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara has ordered the military services to carry out immediately plans for awarding certain construction and procurement contracts two or three months in advance.

Youth Convicted In Three Killings

ASHLAND, Ala., Feb. 17 (AP)—Twelve fathers convicted Raymond Eugene Brown, 15, in the knife slaying of three women relatives and fixed his punishment at three life terms in prison.

The boy, who was 14 at the time of the slayings last October, was convicted late yesterday on three counts of first-degree murder. He had been accused in the knife slaying and stabbing of his aunt, grandmother and great-grandmother.

Circuit Court Judge A. L. Hardegree will pass formal sentence. The jury sets the punishment in capital cases in Alabama.

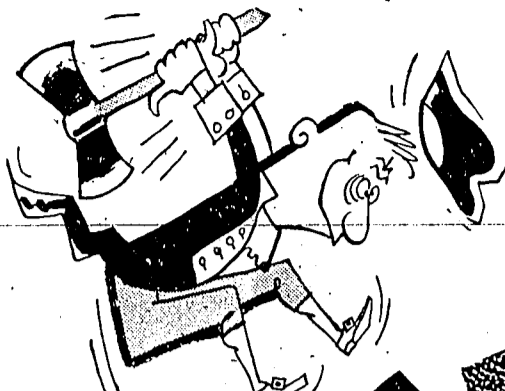
Races will begin both days at 1:30 p.m. and will last for about one and one-half hours. There will be 20 teams and 10 races each day.

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'Human Tank' In Future of U. S. Defense

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17 (AP)—The soldier of the distant future will be a human tank equipped with power steering and power brakes, the Pentagon said yesterday.

Called the "servo-soldier," he will wear a special suit which will have its own engine enabling him to run faster, stop quicker and lift bigger loads than ordinary mortals. What's more, he will be immune to germ warfare, poison gas and the heat and radiation from nuclear blasts.

"The development of this mechanism is believed feasible," the defense department said in listing inventions wanted by the National Inventors Council, which is the official link between civilian inventors and the government. Other wanted inventions included:

- Small arms ammunition which is smokeless, flashless and noiseless.
- A device for driving stakes 12 inches into frozen earth in one minute.
- Plastic cartridge cases stronger than metal.
- A platform equipped with search radar that can hover at altitudes of 20,000 to 100,000 feet.

New Citations To Be Issued For Violators

Magic Valley motorists undoubtedly will greet with mixed emotions an announcement by Twin Falls Police Chief Howard Gillette Thursday. The official said his department would begin using an improved traffic citation form "in the next day or two."

The new citation is longer than the one presently used, the chief explained, and has space enabling an officer to enter additional information. And, by inference, to allow the department to track down delinquent traffic law violators with greater speed and ease.

Both forms have perforations down the center, allowing an officer to tear off part of the ticket for police department files.

The new form calls for the following information to be entered on the department's section of the citation: name and address of the violator, birth date, driver's license number, location of offense, type of vehicle, license number and state, date, time, officer issuing the citation, and four lines to enter necessary explanations.

The old citation has space only for the name of the accused, his license number, date of the offense, the charge and two lines for an explanation.

Canadians Seek Independent Policies, Reject Neutral Role

(Editor's note: As some Canadians see it, they are caught in the middle of a word war that could become a nuclear war—the test of strength between the United States and the Soviet Union. U. S. air bases in Canada and warning systems like the DEW line are parts of the picture. How this affects U. S.-Canadian relations is discussed here.)

OTTAWA, Feb. 17 (AP)—One of the big questions raised by recent developments is whether Canada is simply trying to steer a more independent course in foreign policy and defense.

There seems to be a little of both, although officially neutralism is being firmly rejected in Ottawa.

Many Canadians are unhappy over being so closely linked to
