Soviets Started First, Still Lead Rocket Booster Field

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP) — After World War II some scientists in both the American and Russian military establishments turned their thoughts toward space.

In December 1948, Defense Secretary James V. Forrestal made a cryptic reference in a report to an "Earth satellite vehicle."

But both countries gave more thought to rocket missiles than to spacecraft. Russia started first and moved faster. She built rockets capable of delivering massive warheads of the pre-hydrogen bomb era. This country waited for a compact hydrogen warhead before going too high near.

So when the space age dawned, Russia possessed boosters at least twice as powerful as America's best and was able to launch tons of instruments into orbit while the United States was firing only pounds. This is still the case, although the saturn may close the gap in late 1964 or early 1965.

In 1955 both countries announced they would launch scientific satellites as part of the program for the international geophysical year (IGY) which ended Dec. 31, 1958.

On Oct. 4, 1957, Russia launched Sputnik I, the first artificial satellite of the Earth, and since then has achieved many other space firsts. They include the first sun satellite, first rocket hit on the moon, first photographs of the moon's far side, first launchings of animals into orbit, and the first recovery of animal astronauts.

The Soviet's latest accomplishment was the launching Feb. 11 of

tion of deep space. This probe, launched into a solar orbit between the paths of Earth and Venus also set a record for long-distance radio communication of 22 million miles.

The country also launched the first prototype weather communication, navigational, reconnaissance and missile warning satellites.

The United States has a 10-year program which calls for putting men in orbit briefly around the Earth this year or next, landing instruments and mobile robots on the moon, launching astronomical observatories, putting scientific satellites around Mars and Venus, having a manned observatory in an Earth orbit, and sending men around the moon and back.

Some time after 1960, hopes to put men on the moon.

Russia has not published its official space program. But U. S. space experts say she could have put men in orbit long since. They expect her to do it as early as last September and wonder why she didn't.

In any case, both countries obviously are aiming at manned exploration of the moon and, some day, of Mars and Venus, too. Their scientists already have proved that space is not empty—it pulses with energetic radiations, and particles, with magnetic and electrical fields and with fast-moving clouds of ionized gas spewed from the stormy sun.

These findings have been exciting. But on Mars, at least, scientists hope and more than half expect to make the most exciting discovery of all—that life can and does exist on another world.

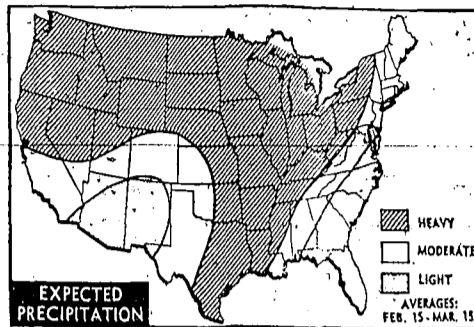

They flew from the Austin Municipal airport to the landing strip at the LBJ ranch Sunday night but turned back because of the weather.

The big, white Convair 240 was apparently being flown to the ranch to ferry Johnson back to Washington.

Johnson went to the scene. "I've lost two wonderful friends," he said.

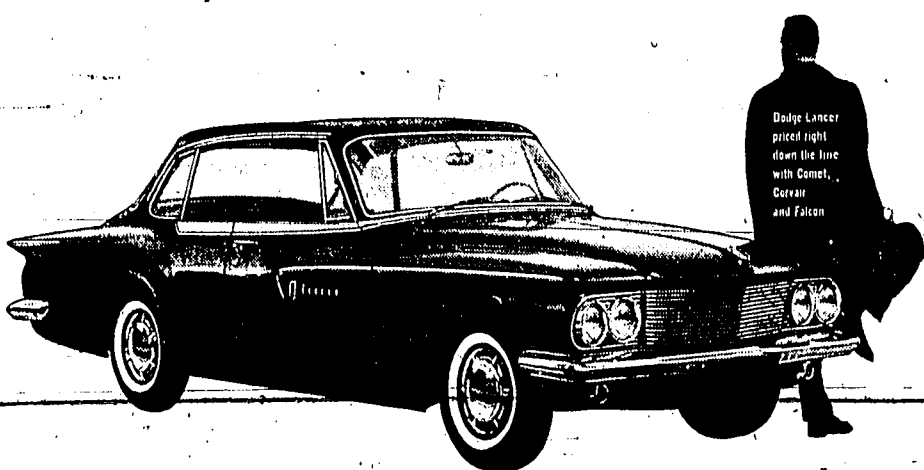
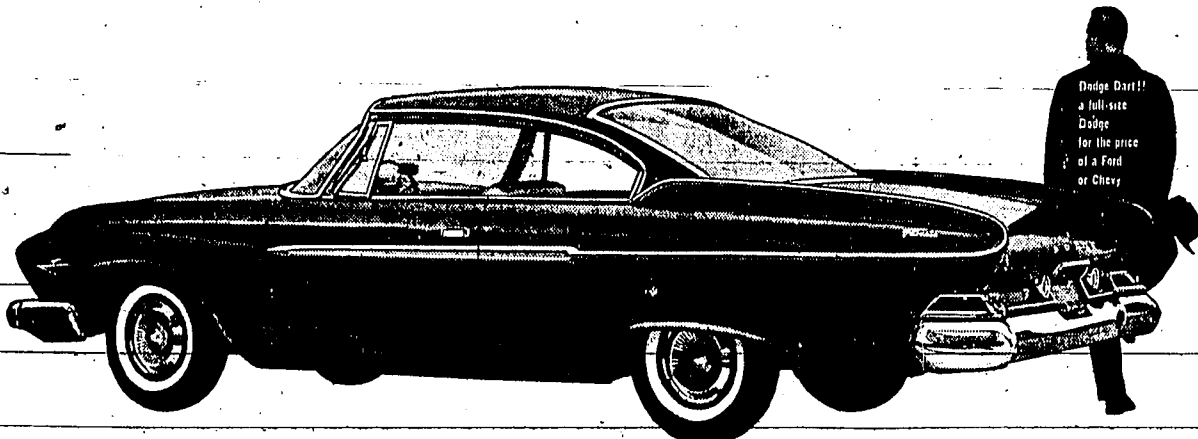

Area C. of C. Opposes Sale Tax at Parley

BURLEY, Feb. 21—The Burley Chamber of Commerce went on Monday opposing a state sales tax and approving amendments which would allow counties to vote.

Bill Parsons, chairman of the legislative committee, reported SB 17 had passed the senate, gone to the house and Leo Handy reported he had been in Boise and felt the bill would pass.

Parsons reviewed the bad check law, trading stamps, school apportionment, lowering age for propagation, lowering age for buying cigarettes, regulations for probate judge, embezzlement of funds by contractors, and establishment of new banks in a community.

James Moore, Cassia county superintendent of schools, stated the education bill of 33 million dollars will not be adequate. He added that since 1953 there had been a decrease in the assessed valuation over the state of seven and one-half per cent per pupil. There is a slight increase now, but there are still far more students being enrolled which does not offset the tax revenue.

He reported an emergency supplemental, minimum education and transportation program has been approved by the senate education committee. It would provide that the state pay for the appropriation of students who enter after the term has started.

Moore said more than 300 pupils enrolled in the schools here after the term started last year and the term paid for these students. If the emergency supplemental bill was presented and passed the state would have to pay, he said.

Handy reported that the 33 million dollar sales tax bill was an increase of six million dollars and that amount 4.8 million dollars would take care of the increased enrollment, leaving only 1.2 million dollars for increased operating costs. The chamber went on record as approving the school supplemental emergency program.

Moore also stated there was a proposed bill coming up which had to do with transferring of school territory from one district to another if both districts agreed.

Palmer Esterstrom announced that William Lott, Rupert, chamber president, would attend next week's chamber meeting and present some new ideas on the airport situation, he added.

A letter was read from Dr. Terrell O. Carver, administrator of the state department of health. It dealt with the critical water pollution of Snake river. He asked that a proposal of reduction of wastes be submitted to the department by July 1. Carver stated that the lagoon type of sewage disposal plant as proposed by the city should be adequate waste treatment.

R. R. Blauer reported Vard Chatham, Cassia county representative, had received only two letters concerning opposition to the trading stamps but had received many letters approving them.

A letter was read from Lloyd Hallinger, chamber member who is in a hospital at Walla Walla, Wash. He expressed appreciation for the loyalty shown him and his employes by the people of Burley.

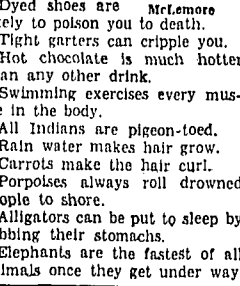

Byrd Seeking Procedures to Aid Economy

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D. Va., has urged congress to tighten up on federal spending by using an annual "general expenditure authorization bill."

Byrd, one of the most outspoken economy advocates in congress, made the proposal in a statement prepared for senate delivery.

He said congress "has lost control over federal expenditures, and it acts on spending legislation without knowing whether it is creating deficits or surplus."

Byrd says he is introducing a resolution which would require congress to enact a general authorization bill each year "in order to recapture congressional control over federal expenditures" and eliminate "backdoor spending" which is authorized outside the appropriation process.

The resolution would require congress to act on the federal expenditure budget "as a whole" as well as authorizing individual spending programs. It would provide for control of expenditures as well as appropriations.

It would, Byrd said, allow congress to set the spending level of the budget with full knowledge of the best available revenue estimates, revised at each stage of the legislative process.

Under the resolution, all spending authorizations would come under jurisdiction of the appropriations committees, and all new spending authority would be provided in the one bill—except as supplemental or deficiency measures should become necessary.

Each item in the bill, he said, would have an annual spending limit, and committee reports would carry tabular data on expenditures authorized.

Kennedy to Visit Canada; 2 Chiefs Study Foreign Policy

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—President Kennedy and Canadian Prime Minister John G. Diefenbaker met yesterday and agreed on foreign policy objectives.

Then Diefenbaker returned to Ottawa and announced to parliament that Kennedy has accepted an invitation to visit Canada.

This is the first such invitation Kennedy has accepted since becoming President a month ago.

The Canadian prime minister flew into Washington yesterday morning and spent three hours with Kennedy at the White House.

After they parted, the White House issued a joint statement in which the two leaders reaffirmed the determination of their nations to work together for peace and

freedom in the world.

Reporting to the Canadian senate and house of commons late in the day, Diefenbaker told of Kennedy's impending visit to Canada.

The Canadian prime minister said he had invited the new President to come north before the current parliamentary session ends. That session is expected to wind up in early summer.

Kennedy was invited to address a joint sitting of the two houses of the Canadian parliament, Diefenbaker said.

Canada Leader's Mother Is Dead

SASKATOON, Sask., Feb. 21 (AP)—Mary Florence Diefenbaker, mother of Prime Minister John Diefenbaker, died last night. She was 88.

Mrs. Diefenbaker had been in the University hospital here for several years. She had a lung infection several months ago and was on the critical list from late November until early January.

The prime minister was not present when she died. He had conferred in Washington yesterday with President Kennedy and reported on his trip last night to parliament.

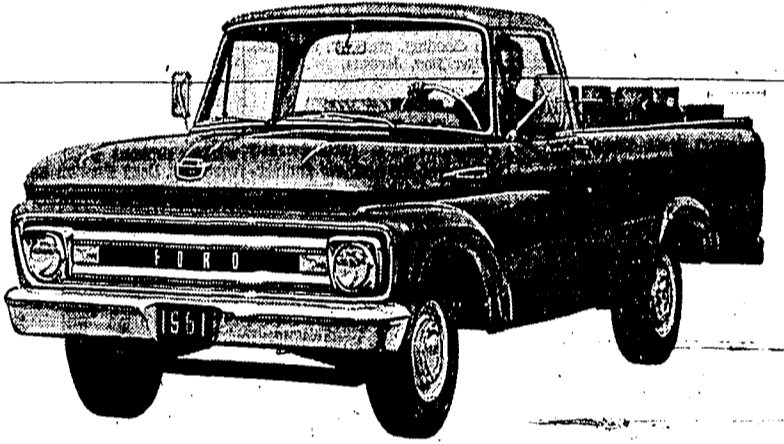

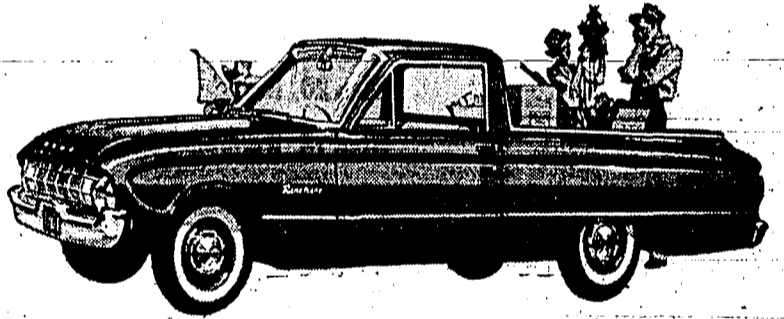

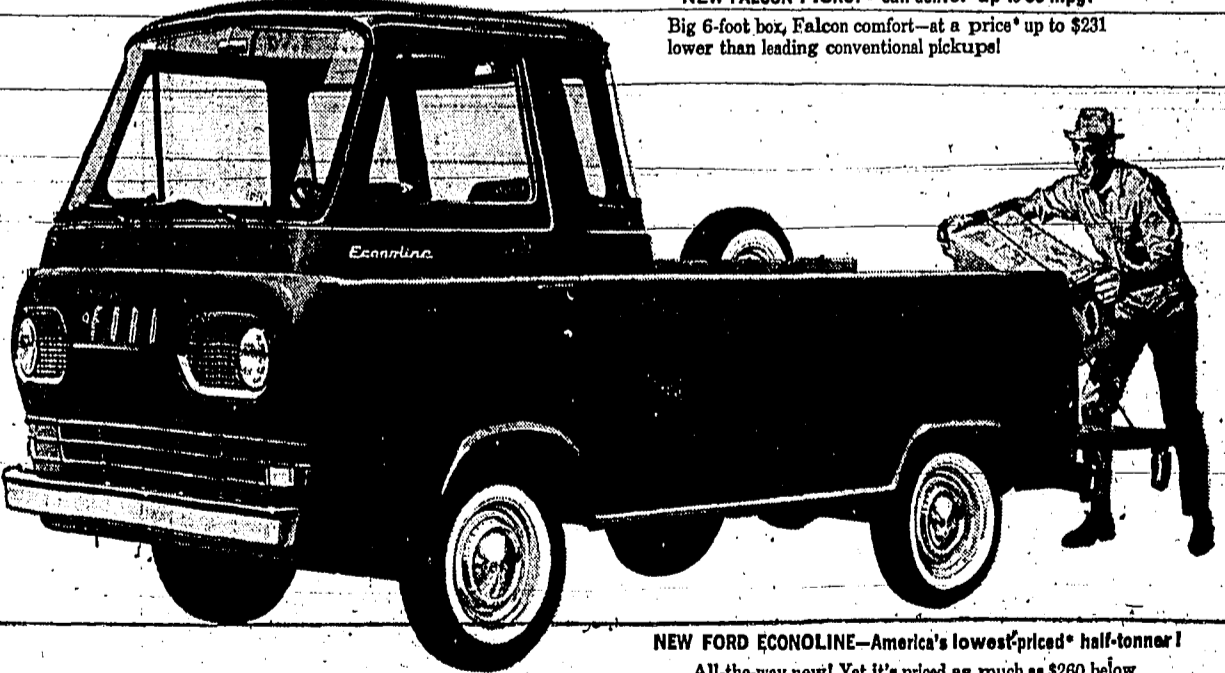
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Care of Your Children

Every child has a friend and favorite playmate and, however fond of each other they may be, they will have an occasional spat. The 4-year-old comes in crying, "He hit me. I don't like him anymore," while his mother wipes his face clean and says, "There, there, go out and play nicely with Freddy. I'm sure he didn't mean it." A few sniffs, a few "He did so's" and he goes out and the thing is forgotten.

This goes on from childhood to adolescence and it requires sound common sense and good will on the part of parents to smooth the rough edges and calm the storms that children bring to their attention lest a neighborly friendship be shattered.

Mothers are quick to rise to the defense of their children, as they should be, but the wiser ones think twice and count to a hundred many times before saying a word to the other mother, remembering that this give and take between the children of whatever age, is part of their education in living. This is when they get their first and often their best lessons in human nature and its behavior. Let them have these experiences without interference if at all possible.

Most of the spats children have are nothing more than sharp differences of opinion about whose bike is the best, whose father can fight whose, whose dress is the prettiest, who paid for the sodas last time. If these are left to the children to settle themselves they will do no harm but if the adults decide to take a hand in the matter the real trouble starts.

The telephone is too handy at times, such times as when Johnny comes home with a bloody nose or Katy arrives without a bean, lost in the hassle with the teasing boy down the street. Wait before lifting the phone. The mother at the other end of the line may be patching up her young hopefuls at the same time and not feeling any better for it than her opposite number.

The neighborhood bully is not in question here, just the normal healthy children who are learning by experience how to get along

with the rest of the crowd. The bully is a case for the social worker and the physician whose specialty is mental health. Healthy children are not his sort. Give them a chance to take care of themselves and they will soon know how.

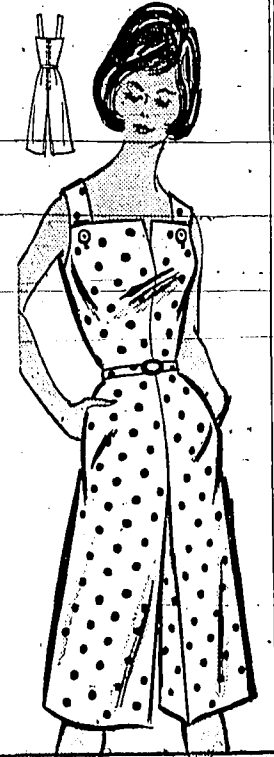

Thomas Plans Heavy Work to Beat Soviets

BOSTON, Feb. 21 (AP)—Unwilling to concede he's second best to Russian Valery Brumel—or anyone, John Thomas returned to the high jump pit Monday.

His philosophy—think in terms of 7 feet, 8 inches. His formula—relentless, hard work.

His aim—beat Brumel. The rematch is this Saturday in the National AAU meet in New York.

A year ago the Boston university student was unchallenged among the world's high jumpers. Yet last Friday night a 7 foot, 1 inch effort, his 58th at seven feet or higher, was well behind Brumel's 7 feet, 8 inches.

Thomas was third behind Soviet Robert Shavlanakdz and Brumel at the Rome Olympics. Minutes after his latest setback, the 6 foot, 8 inch Thomas approached coach Ed Flanagan with the observation: "Coach, we have to start working all over again just like when I first came to BU."
