TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—President Kennedy is waging a strong and singleminded struggle to stir congress and the country to an appreciation of the critical conditions at home and abroad, urging them to react accordingly and promptly.

With his televised press conferences and his legislative messages, which are his principal weapons, President Kennedy seeks to bring public pressure from back-home constituents on the leisurely and lethargic legislators.

The indifference—and in certain areas, the hostility—must be maddening to such an energetic chief executive. Almost everywhere he turns, he finds bitter opposition from expected enemies, and only lip service to his "new frontier" summings among the rank-and-file of his own party.

With the full acquiescence of the Rayburn-Mansfield leadership, the congress has virtually recessed for two months for purely partisan purposes. The Republicans demanded time off while they celebrated the birthday anniversary of a president who no longer holds the Negro vote in fealty to the GOP—Abraham Lincoln.

And, through early March, the Democrats will absent themselves from capitol hill while they eulogize the era of a man who would not have stood for such political performances in a crisis—Andrew Jackson.

SPECTER OF DEFEAT—Worse still, this bipartisan filibustering, which will delay action on the Kennedy program for at least two months, occurs in the face of the President's request that his major anti-communism measures be enacted by April Fools' day. Otherwise, he warns that the economic decline, with its greater unemployment and more severe hardships, will become so bad that it will continue through the summer months.

Several recent tests convince him that, although the Democrats command a nominal majority in house and senate, his program faces stiff opposition, with possible defeat or emasculation through amendments.

MAVERICKS IN THE HOUSE—The 217 to 212 vote on liberalizing the house rules committee shows that the house cannot be depended upon when it begins belated consideration of specific measures. Many members supported the Kennedy-Rayburn change only on the ground that it made for parliamentary democracy.

President Kennedy, contrary to the general opinion, will have equal difficulty in the senate, despite the growing strength of the liberal bloc on the Republican side of the aisle.

The senate committees constitute the principal presidential hazard. The chairmen of almost every major committee, chiefly southern Democrats, are opposed to virtually all the social, economic and relief measures advanced by the White House to deal with the nation's situation.

They include Ellender, Louisiana (agriculture); Fulbright, Arkansas (foreign affairs); Robertson, Virginia (banking and currency); McClellan, Arkansas (government operations); Byrd, Virginia (finance); Eastland, Mississippi (judiciary).

Even one of these influential legislators will fight the White House on the very heart of his program—civil rights, a health insurance plan under social security and an increase in the hourly minimum wage to \$1.25 in three years.

POWERFUL POLITICO-INDUSTRIAL COALITION—Although the President received a friendly, personal reception in his recent appearance before the National Industrial Conference board, with his plea for cooperation of government, management and labor, the business and professional interests are mobilizing their forces against him.

The lobbies conducted by the National Association of Manufacturers, the United States Chamber of Commerce, the American Medical association and the private utilities have not been so active since Franklin D. Roosevelt's "first 100 days" of the new deal.

With the Dirksen-Halleck-Smith coalition of Republicans and conservative Democrats on capitol hill, they maintain that there is no recession, and, therefore, no need for President Kennedy's emergency measures.

Views of Others

GOING TOO FAR IN MARRIED STUDENT BAN—The Minidoka county school district, plagued like many others by the problem of what to do about the rising number of high school marriages, chose an extreme solution: It ruled in 1952 that no married student may attend high school in the district. Now the ruling has been challenged by the father of a banished high school student, and we suspect the school board will discover that its rule can't be enforced. District Judge Edward Heap has pointed out that similar regulations were knocked down by courts in Texas and Mississippi, and he has responded to a hearing in the Idaho case until the school district's attorney has completed an investigation of a case in Pennsylvania.

Minidoka county probably will come around eventually to the sort of compromise that has been worked out by school boards elsewhere. At Lewiston and Clarkston, for example, married students are permitted to continue in school, on the principle that to kick them out would constitute punishment for marriage, which is not a crime but an old and highly regarded social institution. But on the principle that marriage confers certain responsibilities not shared by others, the married students are not permitted to engage in such extracurricular high school activities as varsity sports and marching band.

The compromise may be far from perfect, but one seldom contrives a perfect solution to a new problem. This is not the first time in our national life when our young people were pairing off and marrying at high school age, but in the past no one believed that every youngster should go through high school as a matter of course. Now, for the first time, universal high school education and a trend to teen-age marriages have coincided and presented a social problem peculiar to our age.

There is another trend working, however, which may reduce any irritations produced by discrimination against married students in extracurricular activities. That is the trend against the activities themselves. A growing number of educators has become convinced that high school education in the United States will not be worthy of the name until we start spending less school time on varsity sports, driver training and baton twirling and more on history, English, French and math.—Lewiston Morning Tribune

THE TAX HEARINGS

The objectors to the governor's three per cent tax on new automobiles called it a "highly discriminatory sales tax" that will add to the problems of the already beleaguered auto industry. In referring to it as a sales tax, the witnesses at the house tax committee hearing are, of course, entirely right.

There will be similar objections when a hearing on the telephone tax is conducted, and it will be no different when the tax on electric bills is considered.

The result of the hearings probably will be increased sentiment in favor of a general sales tax. In fact, several legislators already are advocating a sales levy, and they get few, if any, objections from the public.

The stance taken by some members of the legislature that they oppose a sales tax because their constituents oppose it is not always an accurate picture of the situation. Every time a public group is asked what it thinks of a sales tax, the answer, almost without exception, is that a majority of those expressing their opinions think it must be given serious consideration.

It is time the legislators recognize this. If they don't, they are likely to find themselves again putting together a hodge-podge revenue-producing program which will do nothing to improve the tax climate in Minnesota.—Mankato (Minn.) Free Press.

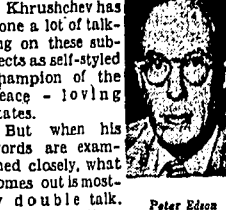
WASHINGTON (NEA) — The Kennedy administration apparently hopes that most progress can be made in negotiations with Russia's Khrushchev on the subjects of disarmament and peaceful coexistence to avoid World War II.

Khrushchev has done a lot of talking on these subjects as self-styled champion of the peace — loving states.

But when his words are examined closely, what comes out is mostly double talk. This was particularly true when he reported on the recent Moscow conference of Communist party representatives from 81 countries.

Here are significant excerpts from his long Jan. 6 speech to illustrate this point:

"Comrades, if the problem of all problems of our times is that of averting a new war, the most radical way of solving it is disarmament... Our struggle for disarmament is not a tactical move. We sincerely want disarmament..."



"Peaceful coexistence with capitalist countries... facilitates the activities of Communist parties and other progressive organizations of the working class. It facilitates the struggle the people wage against aggressive military blocs, against foreign military bases."

"Thus, the policy of peaceful coexistence, as regards its social content, is a form of intense economic, political and ideological struggle of the proletariat against the aggressive forces of imperialism in the international arena."

"There is only one way of bringing imperialism to heel... an all-out unification and consolidation of the world revolutionary movement... to prevent the danger of war."

"The Communist party of the Soviet Union and the Soviet government will continue with determination to do everything to enhance the military might of our country."

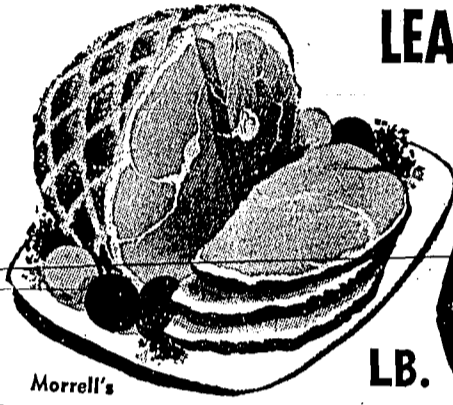

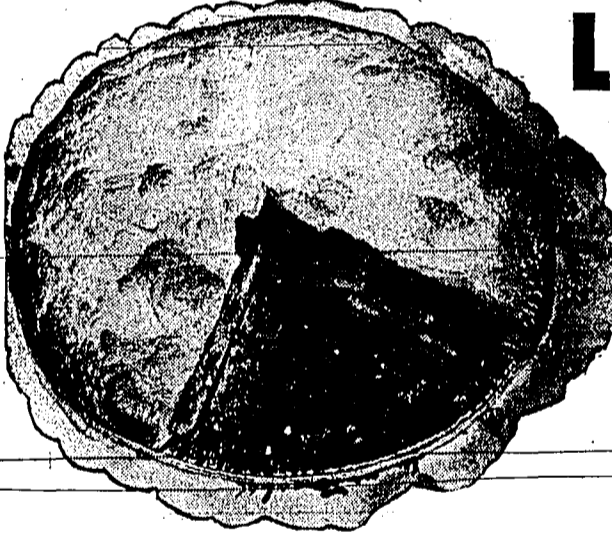

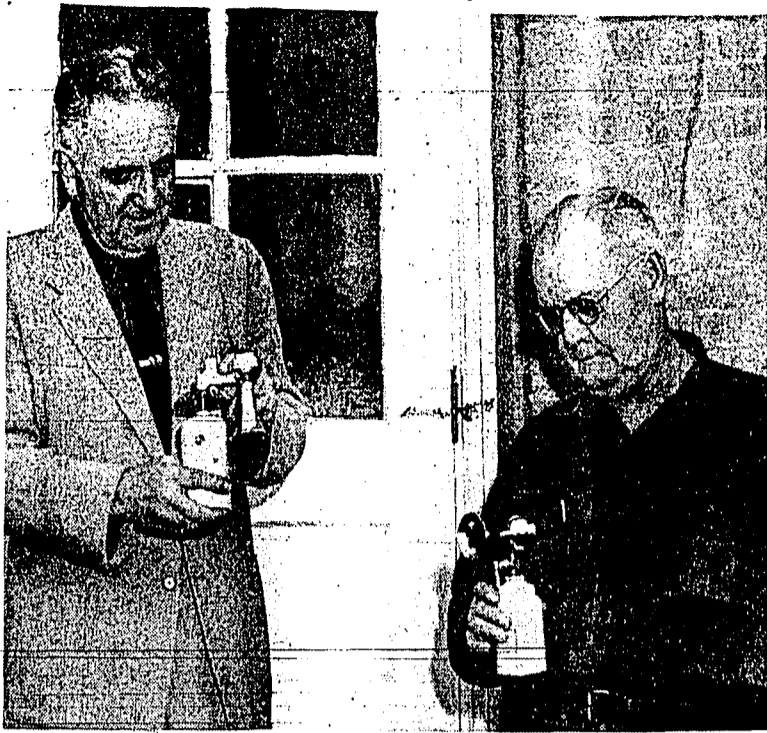

Fire Alarms Installed in All Blaine Area School Buildings

HAILEY, Feb. 23—Paul Dempsey, Blaine county school superintendent, announced Wednesday that the work of installing "Falcon" fire alarm devices in the multi-story school buildings of class "A" school district 61 will be completed this week.

These small devices, he explained, which operate by a multiple fuse system and depend en-

tirely on temperatures, are triggered to sound loud horn alarms continuously for from six to 10 minutes, from two and one-half to three minutes ahead of any actual fire—thus giving occupants of any building in which they are installed, ample time for escape.

The alarms have been installed in the ceilings of the boiler rooms and in the halls of the buildings.

O. A. Neple, Twin Falls, local representative of the Falcon company, who supervised the installation here, states that the device first came onto the market in 1953 and that not one life has been lost in buildings where the alarms have been installed.

He states the Catholic Properties administration have made these alarms standard equipment in all their schools and buildings since the disastrous fire at "Our Lady of the Angels" school in Chicago several years ago.

The alarms are being tried out as they are installed and all students in the buildings have literally "left their seats" at the first blast.

Glance Made At Kennedy's Water Plans

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—Here are President Kennedy's natural resources proposals to congress at a glance.

Water—Establish planning commissions to develop comprehensive river basin plans by 1970 in cooperation with individual states; identify future reservoir sites and reserve them for later use if necessary.

Flood control—All federal agencies concerned are being asked to provide data on flood hazards in specified areas to all 50 states, and to help them in regulating or zoning the flood plains.

Projects—Kennedy rejects "no new starts" policy attributed to Eisenhower administration but defers proposals for specific projects until later.

Water and air pollution—Calls for greater governmental and industrial effort and establishment of special public health service unit.

De-salination of ocean water—The administration is redoubling its efforts to de-salt sea water for drinking and industrial use and will share this country's know-how with every nation that wants it.

Electric power—Remaining hydroelectric sites will be utilized and new ones built where warranted; efforts will proceed to achieve economically competitive nuclear power by 1970.

Ocean resources—"Concerted attention" will be given to solving the mysteries of the deep.

Recreation—A long-range federal-state wildlife conservation program has been ordered; congress should enact a wilderness protection bill, and also should establish seasonal and shoreline areas for public use and enjoyment.

Fairfield Girl, 3, Alive and Healthy After Heart Surgery

FAIRFIELD, Feb. 23—Luanne Jewett, 3 1/2-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dean Jewett, Fairfield, is a strong healthy girl today because of modern heart surgery.

When she was about 6 months old it was discovered that there was something wrong with her heart but doctors didn't think it was serious enough to require any special treatment until she was of school age.

By the time that she was about 15 months old she became frail and pale and failed to gain weight as a normal child should.

Her parents took her to many doctors before it was discovered that the valve in the artery between the heart and lungs, which is supposed to close at birth, had never done so. This condition made the heart work double-time and enlarged the left ventricle of the heart.

It became so enlarged that the heart beats could be seen outside under her left arm. X-rays showed the heart was against the left rib cage and that there was need for immediate surgery if the child was to survive. This condition was the first type on which heart surgery was tried, according to the parents.

Luanne was 18 months old when she was taken to the LDS hospital, Salt Lake City, for surgery. The operation to close the valve took three and one-half hours. Only a pint of blood was needed for a

Mrs. Jewett said Luanne was born after a difficult birth and the doctor had trouble getting her to breathe. She said that for awhile she was afraid to have any more children for fear that they would have the same defect. When Luanne was 3 the Jewetts became parents of a husky healthy baby boy without any signs of defects.

The Jewetts are grateful for all the help that they received from the people of Camas prairie when Luanne had her operation. They say she wouldn't be alive today without heart surgery.

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Astronauts Love Earth but Eager to Risk Trip in Space

CAPE CANAVERAL, Feb. 23 (AP)—Each of them loves the rivers and oceans of Earth yet is eager to risk his life to blaze a trail to the stars.

John Herschel Glenn, Jr., 39, spends his spare time boating. Virgil Ivan Grisson, 34, fishes. Alan Bartlett Shepard, Jr., 37, thrills to the speed of ice skating and water skiing.

Some day soon—perhaps within the next two months—one of them will climb into a cramped, bell-shaped capsule on the nose of a Redstone rocket for a flight into space.

The three men were chosen from America's seven astronauts to begin final training for this nation's first attempt at sending a man into space aboard a rocket. It will be a 16-minute flight, 115 miles up and 300 miles out over the Atlantic ocean.

The other four astronauts who

with Glenn, Grisson and Shepard have been training for 22 months, may be used for later ballistic and orbital flights. The three men were picked "after evaluating a large amount of medical and technical information."

The men, by training and background, have a lot in common. Each is mature and highly trained. Each fought in two wars—Glenn and Grisson in the air in World War II and Korea and Shepard aboard a destroyer in the Pacific. Each has made a career of the military and has contributed research and experience to aircraft development. Each is married and each has two children.

Glenn, who will be 40 in July, is a lieutenant colonel in the marine corps and a native of New Concord, O. Grisson, an air force captain, hails from Mitchell, Ind. Shepard, from East Derry, N. H., is a navy commander.

Shepard's mother, Mrs. Alan B. Shepard, sr., Derry, N. H., said she learned a month ago that her son had been selected but that she is resigned to his choice because "this is exactly the sort of thing by son wants to do and is trained to do."

U. S. Policy on Laos Does About-Face Under Kennedy

By United Press International

United States policy toward the little Southeast Asia kingdom of Laos has undergone an abrupt change of course.

From all-out support of the rightist Laotian government which since last November has been battling the Russian and Chinese red-supported forces at the Laotian Pathet Lao, this week it suddenly endorsed a proposal for a neutral Laos whose government, by tacit understanding, would include communist representatives.

By making the switch, the Kennedy administration turned its back on the course which had been followed by President Eisenhower and his secretary of state, Christian Herter, and endorsed the view which had been held all along by Great Britain and France.

No announcement accompanied the U.S. about-face.

It simply came with United States endorsement of a proposal by Laotian King Savang Vatthana for a neutral Laos protected against outside intervention by a watch-dog commission of three neutral nations—Cambodia, Malaya and Burma.

While the civil war between pro and anti-communist forces in Laos has gone on intermittently since the Geneva conference of 1954, the current crisis dates from Aug. 9, 1960, when an army coup led by Capt. Kong Le toppled a pro-western government and established a vaguely neutral government.

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Sales of U. S. Gold Drop to Lessen Crisis

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—Sales of U. S. gold have fallen off sharply since inauguration day. Treasury officials give much of the credit to President Kennedy's approach to the gold-and-dollar drain problem.

In the first four weeks of the Kennedy administration gold sales totaled 115 million dollars. In the preceding month, under former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, gold sales amounted to 457 million dollars and 334 million dollars in the month before that.

Treasury officials said much of the uncertainty about the dollar which boiled up last autumn has evaporated. They said this was indicated by these developments:

—Comments of British and German government officials who have been in Washington in the past two weeks.

—A decline in the price of gold in the London market, an apparent signal that speculation against the dollar has subsided.

—More favorable quotations for the dollar on European money exchanges.

Officials in Washington believe Kennedy has convinced the doubters that he opposes devaluation of the dollar and he intends to shrink, if not wipe out, the deficit in the U. S. balance of international payments.

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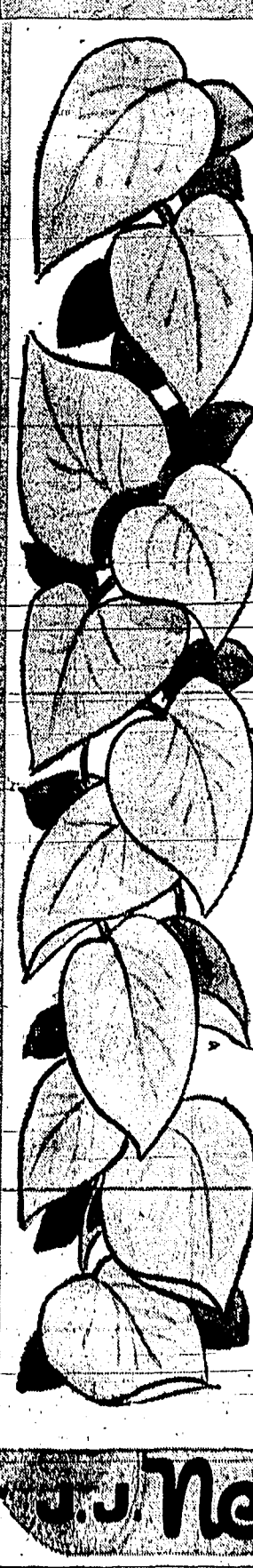

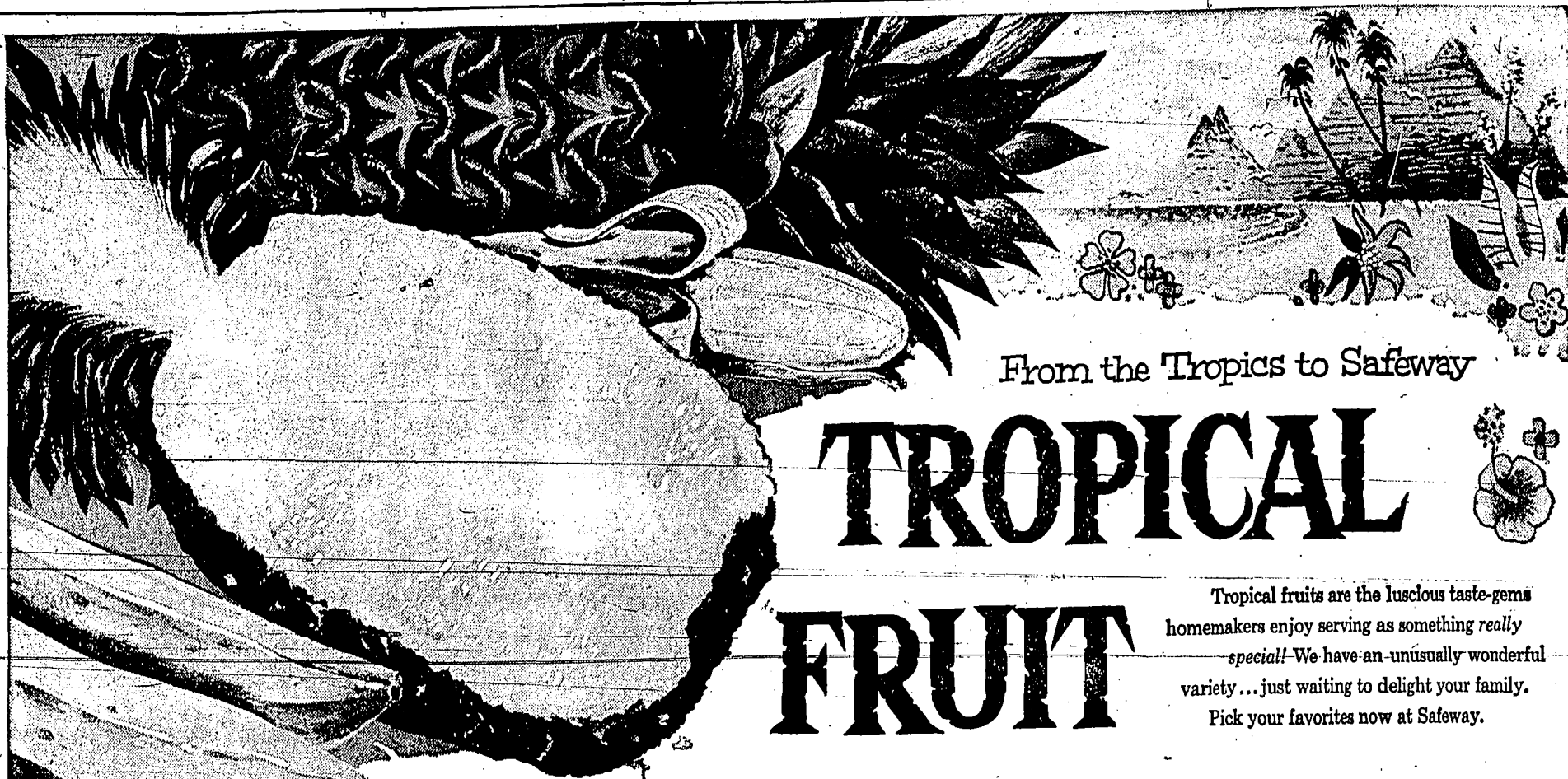

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Feb. 23 (AP)—A navy plane carrying newly appointed navy Undersecretary Paul B. Fay crashed into a bay after overrunning an airstrip in an emergency landing here early today. All eight persons aboard were rescued.

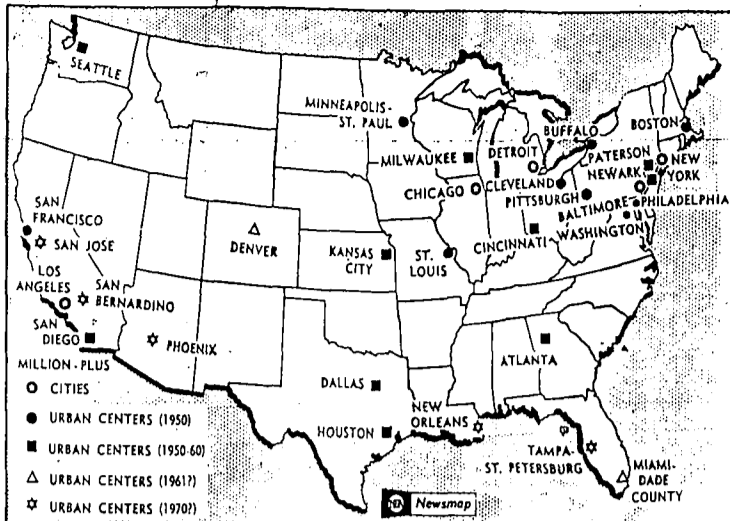

Fay, an old friend and wartime comrade of President Kennedy, was en route from New York to Washington, where he was to be sworn in as Undersecretary of the navy today.

Harry Patterson, pilot of the twin-engine R4Y (Convair), said the plane lost power and he could not make his destination, the Anacostia naval station, Washington. So he headed for the nearest airport on his chart—Bader field here.

Fay said Patterson made "a beautiful" landing of the crippled plane. But the runway was slippery from an all-day rain. The plane rolled to the end of the runway and skidded off into the water.

Fugitive From East Library Crackdown Arrives in Rome

ROME, Italy—The first fugitive from East Orange, N.J., reached Rome today.

Still shaken by his close escape from police and library officials, Arthur K. Sloreeder, 46, disembarked from an economy class airplane wearing an overcoat over his pajamas.

"I really made it," he said, "and didn't have time to dress. The police and head librarian came to my house just before dawn, and I made my getaway out of a back window while they were battering down the front door."

Sloreeder told of a pre-dawn flight across the frozen Jersey meadows and a harrowing rowboat ride across the Hudson river. The cops and the East Orange librarian put bloodhounds on his trail, he said, but he lost them by reversing his trail in Hoboken.

"Heaven knows what will happen to my wife," Sloreeder moaned while having an Espresso. "I suppose they will hold Ethel for ransom until I return the books I borrowed in mid-January. I can only hope they will not put her at hard labor, but will assign her to the kitchen or the making of nubbags."



Later, in the reference room of the Rome public library, which has granted him temporary asylum, Sloreeder reviewed his troubles with the East Orange library.

poor Ethel, but I couldn't stand the thought of Vermont at this time of year. It would have been the death of me."

Did he have any immediate plans?

"Not at the moment," the East Orange fugitive said. "Of course I hope to get a job in Italy, and I will do my best to square things with the East Orange library. But by now I must owe several dollars on the books I took out, and besides, I lost my library card somewhere on my flight."

Here poor Sloreeder all but broke down.

"Oh, oh," he moaned, "if only I had taken out smaller books, something like the 'Reader's Digest' or an abridged copy of 'Black Beauty'."

Sloreeder said that other East Orange citizens had fled to Europe and that he hoped to contact them.

"Maybe we can establish a free East Orange organization in Europe and I'd be glad to help," he said hopefully. "Like De Gaulle did for France during World

war II. That's it — a resistance movement in East Orange."

The thought seemed to cheer him immensely.

Ribs of Beef Top Bargain During Week

By The Associated Press
Ribs of beef return to the top spot among meat bargains this week.

In a sharp reversal from last week's emphasis on fish, coincident with the start of Lent, supermarkets and neighborhood stores in the East, Midwest and Far West offer rib roasts as their weekly special. One chain offers the 10-special at 49 cents a pound and inch cut at 57 cents a pound seven-inch cut at the New York metropolitan area. That's roughly 20 cents below year-earlier levels.

Cattle Are Bigger
Part of the reason for the price cuts is to sharpen demand during Lent. Another reason may be that cattle coming to market recently have been bigger than usual, reflecting cheap and abundant feed.

Leg of lamb is featured in a few areas, with similar price slashes of 20 cents a pound from a year ago at 49 cents a pound and 55 cents a pound for oven-ready cuts. Inexpensive pork cuts such as butts, shoulders and smoked picnic are features in other areas. Fish specials include halibut steak, cod steak and swordfish.

Chicken Price High
Price advances of two to four cents a pound make frying chickens unattractive as a bargain item. Topping the best buy list among vegetables this week are beets, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, Florida celery, endive, escarole, iceberg lettuce, medium yellow onions, parsley, peas, potatoes, radishes, rhubarb, tomatoes and the orange Jersey variety of sweet potatoes.

Good buys include artichokes, beans, carrots, cooking greens such as collard, mustard and turnip tops, spinach, corn, green onions, leeks, mushrooms, large yellow onions, peppers, squash, watercress, turnips and rutabagas.

Grapefruit and oranges reign supreme among fruits. Good buys include McIntosh, Rome, red and golden Delicious apples, avocados, limes, small pears and coconuts.

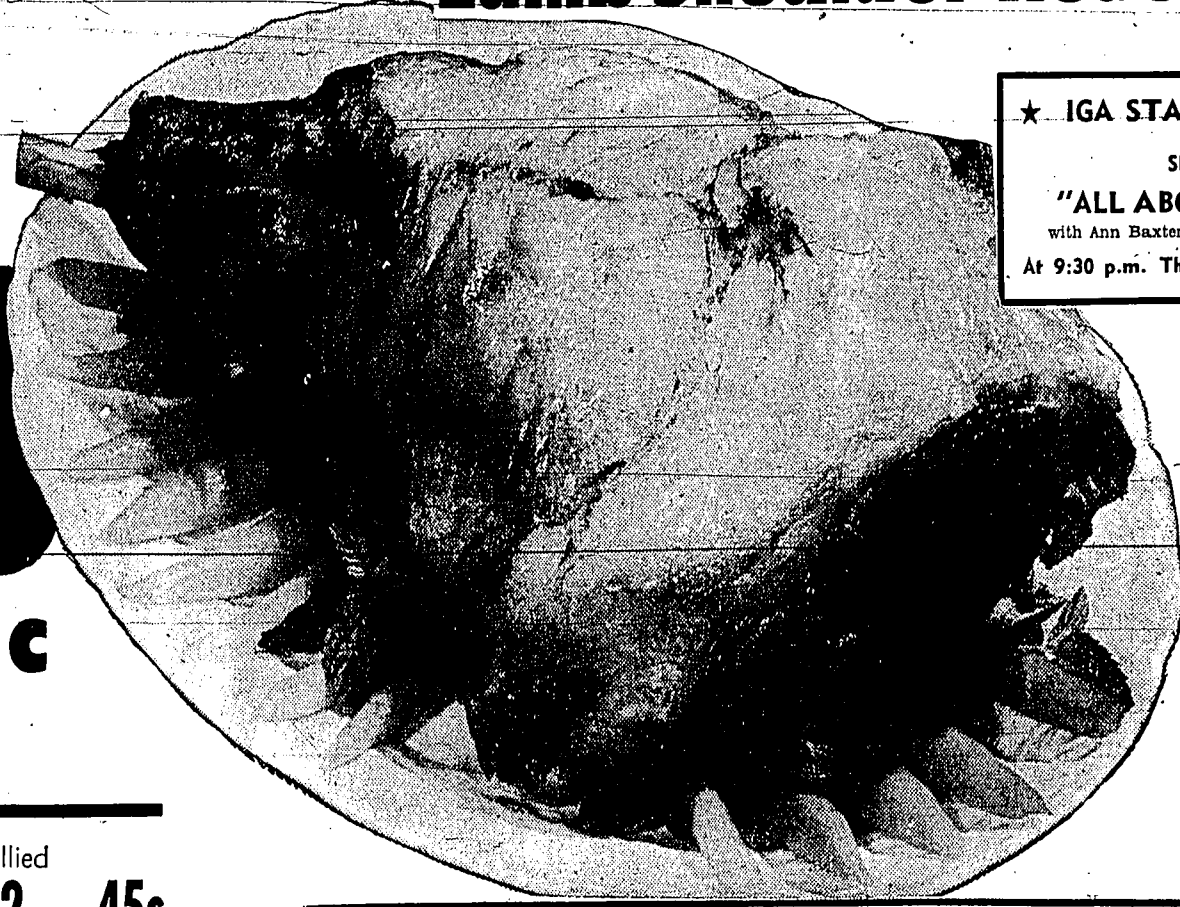

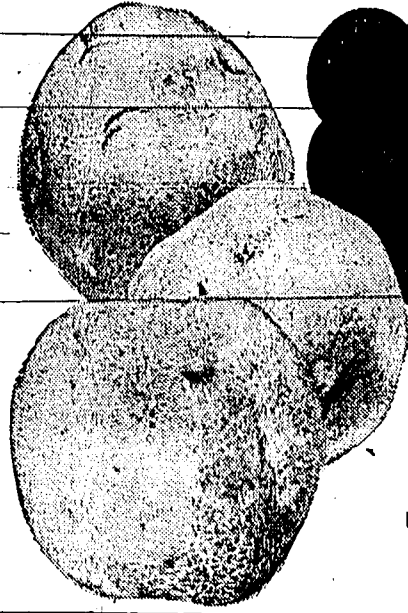

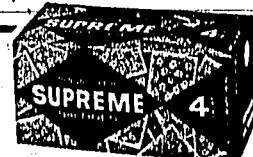
