#### **Program for** Mixed Grain Same in '61

The mixed grain program for The mixed grain program for 1961 involving wheat seeded with other grains is the same as it was in 1960, Carl Boyd, chairman of the Twin Falls County ASC committee, said Thursday.

mittee, said Thursday.
When wheat is planted with
barley, oats or both, the harvest
mixture can't contain more than
25 per cent wheat by weight. The
ASC is not able to advise farmers just how much wheat should be planted in the mixture to get no more than 25 per cent wheat at harvest time, Boyd said.

When wheat is planted with rye, Boyd added, the mixture can't contain more than 10 per cent wheat by weight at harvest.

If the amount of harvested wheat is more than 25 per cent, or more than 10 per cent in the case of rve, the crop has to classified as wheat and is counted against the allotment on the farm or against the 15 acres permitted without an allotment.

There is one exception, Boyd notes. This is when the farmer applies to plant wheat for his own use. In this case, a farmer can plant up to 30 acres of straight wheat and mixed grains without penalty. However, none of this wheat can be fed off the farm or sold at any time.



#### Land Held by **United States Has Increased**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (A) — The U.S. government's land holdngs throughout the world increas ed by 400,000 acres to a total of 772 million during the year ended last June 30, the general services administration has reported.

The holdings originally cost 52.6 billion dollars, up 3.4 billion dollars during the fiscal year. The land holdings included 771.5

million acres in the United States or 33.9 per cent of the nation's total land area of 2,273.4 million acres. About 720 million acres of federal land was in public domain,

primarily used as national for-ests, national parks, wildlife refuges and grazing areas.

The federal acreage by state

ranged from 6,575 acres in Con-necticut to 365.4 million acres in Alaska, with federal ownership accounting for more than half the area of five states.
