

Congo Province Chiefs Released From Jail After One Year, U.N. Declares

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo, March 10 (AP)—Eleven captured leaders of Kivu have been released from a Stanleyville jail where they had been held since leftist seized their province last year, the United Nations said today. While this indicated a change in attitude by the regime, the U.N. committee was unable to confirm reports from the leftist capital that Moscow-backed Antoine Gizenga had been released there. Those reports said either the rebel military commander, Gen. Victor Lundula, or President Jean-Ferdinand Manakala of Oriental Province had taken over both are considered firm supporters of the policies of the late ex-Premier Patrice Lumumba, but both were reported to have vigorous measures to prevent reprisals against whites in Stanleyville after Lumumba's slaying last month in Katanga Province. Manakala is also being tried for his role in the slaying, something Gizenga never would do.

A U.N. spokesman reported the release of Jean Miroho, former premier of Kivu, and six other leaders of the provincial government. Miroho had paid at least 100,000 francs to the central government, and Leopoldville and had retained pressure from Stanleyville in neighboring Katanga Province, which is in a raiding party last December, according to his officials, and took control of Bukavu, the provincial capital.

In Leopoldville, the U.N. Congo mission continued negotiating with Congo leaders on the terms for the return of U.N. troops to the key ports of Kinshasa and Matadi.

The U.N. spokesman told newsmen he could not comment on Congo reports that agreement had been reached on the Congo's return to U.N. control.

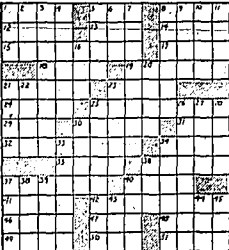

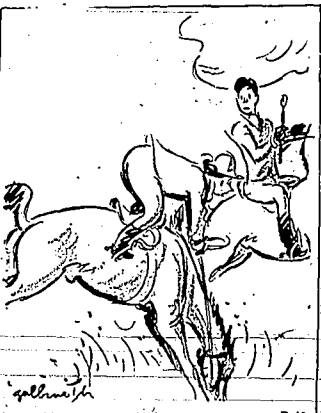

McLemore Decides It's Best

To Speak No Italian in Italy

ROME, Italy—These come a time in the life of every man who takes up temporary abode in Italy when he must decide which is better—to speak no Italian, or to speak a little Italian.

I suppose the faint is true of the man who becomes a temporary exile in France, Greece, Yugoslavia or Brooklyn.

Which makes it easier for him? A complete ignorance of the language of the country, or a dash of it, say.

I have tried both. When I arrived in Rome I was a deaf mute insofar as Italian was concerned. I could neither speak a word nor understand a word. An Italian friend said: "You are going to be a deaf mute here. You don't know whether he is saying good morning or telling me to watch my step when crossing the street."

To remedy this situation, I bought half a dozen books. "Short Cuts to Italian," "Italian in Ten Easy Lessons," "Speak Italian—Before You Know It."

"Italian as Spoken at Railroad Stations, Cocktail Parties, Hotels, Restaurants, Laundries and Museums." I even bought a phonograph record that was guaranteed to teach

me Italian while I shaved or pulled on my trousers in the morning.

After two months I thought I knew quite a bit of Italian. I did, too, but there was only one drawback—no Italian understood it. And for a foreign language to do a foreigner any good in a foreign country, the natives must understand it.

To make matters worse, the courtesy of the Italians prevented them from telling me that they didn't understand a word I said.

This led to much confusion. I would ask for an aspirin tablet in the pharmacy and get a hot water bottle. I would order chicken in a restaurant and get a plate of string beans.

I'd ask the time of day and be led by the arm and directed to a shop that sold gloves.

This not only wore me out, but must have been very painful to the Italians.

So, just as one would give up chewing betel nut, I gave up Italian. I gave up the stuff. Took the pills. I went back to English, and English alone.

Since then I have done much better. No foreign language is twice as good as a smattering of a language.

When I have to find an address, I use a map. When I have to know the time, I walk until I find a clock in a window or on a building.

In restaurants, I sit until someone at another table orders something that looks good. Then I point

to it and then to myself. I have much better meals under this system.

When I shop, I wander behind the counters until I see what I want. Then I lead the clerk to the spot.

At parties in Italian homes—take a paperback book in English and find a nice corner and read. I have been pointed out as a scholar, an American above the idle chit-chat of a cocktail party.

All my Italian language books are up for sale. So is the phonograph record. An Elva Presley disc would have served me better.
