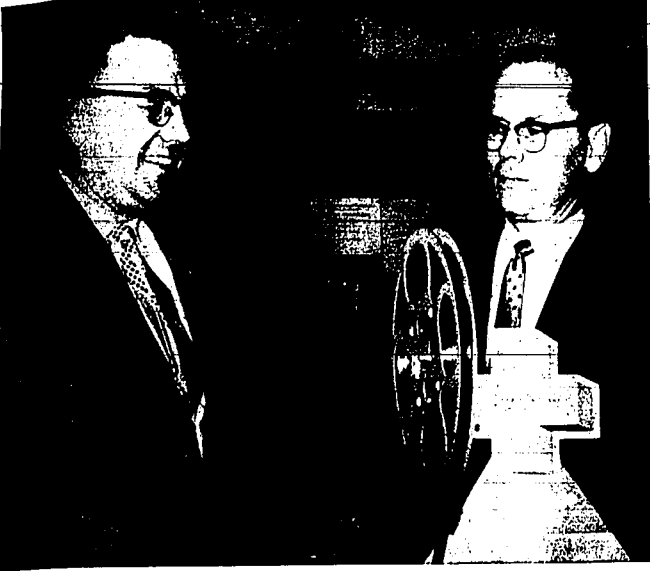

Executive Loaned by Power Firm to Aid Red Cross Here

A "board executive" Thomas Wilkins, employee of Idaho Power company, will give half days to working with the Twin Falls chapter of the American Red Cross for a 10-day period during March, the month of the local fund and membership campaign, announces Robert King, chairman of the campaign.

King states that although this plan has been in use in large cities for several years, it is, to his knowledge, the first time it has been used in Twin Falls. The Idaho Power company has released Wilkins from a portion of his regular duties in order that he be available to assist John Witherspoon, chairman of the advance gifts section of the campaign, both with campaign work and contacts. Wilkins has been assisting with the unique training program for solicitors among other tasks, King noted. A training film is shown four times daily, both for residential and business solicitors, to aid the workers in answering questions of contributors, King explained.

Following the film presentation, solicitors receive their packet of materials and instructions to report at specified times to the captain of their district. In this way, areas which are having difficulty contacting contributors will be known in advance, and plans set in motion for additional workers or a "clean up" crew to work in untended areas. Louis Meigs, who is chairman for the business membership and fund campaign, made arrangements for the training film presentation in the library of the Twin Falls clinic.

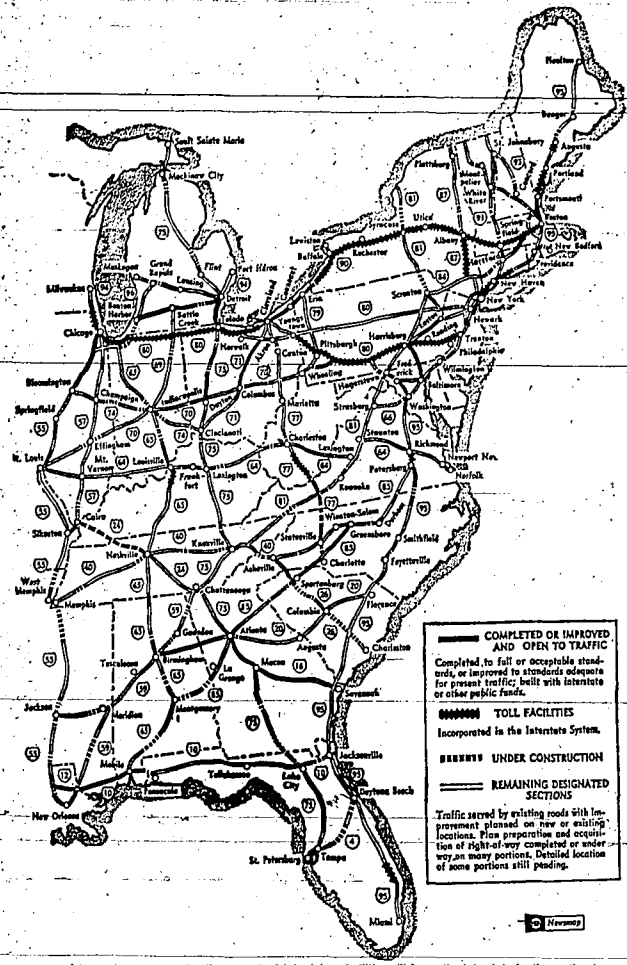

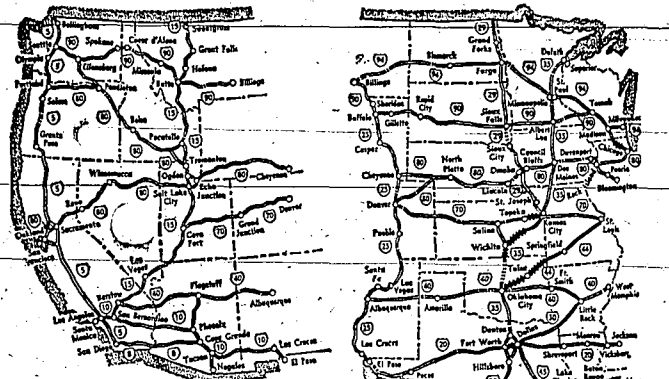

OXBOW. March 11—Construction of Idaho Power company's Oxbow dam reaches another milestone Sunday as the project resumes work—first production of electricity this summer and completion next fall.

T. E. Roach, Idaho Power president, reported Saturday that the dam is expected to be completed by next fall.

The dam is to be located at the confluence of the Snake and Salmon rivers in Oxbow reservoir. The dam is being built in two sections. The first section is being built in a carefully lined program coordinated with the U. S. Water started flowing through plumbing in parts of the Copacabana section of Rio de Janeiro at 7 a.m. The phrase "Water is back!" rising through apartment houses were better than alarm clocks.

Building porters notified each apartment dweller that water would be on for one hour. After nine days of only a few teaspoons of water, the morning shower was ecstatic.


The water came with the return to operation of two pumps at a big water station 15 miles outside Rio. They had been flooded and knocked out March 1 due to what officials said was neglect by municipalities, which when they get back have been closing flood gates.

At a result, Gov. Carlos Lacerda fired his secretary of transport and the chief of the water department. He said they tried to blame and the people when they said the flooding of the pumping station was unavoidable, due to heavy rains.

Lacerda said that with the two pumps going, things should return to normal by Saturday. It takes about 72 hours for the pumps to get large supplies of water into the city. Water will be back to normal when a third pump gets going sometime Sunday.

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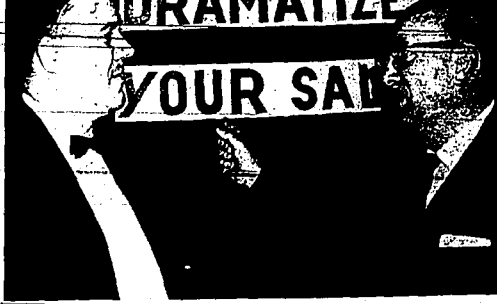

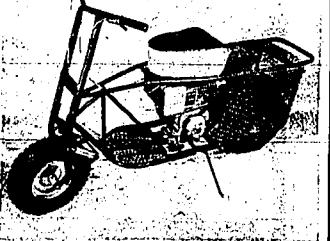

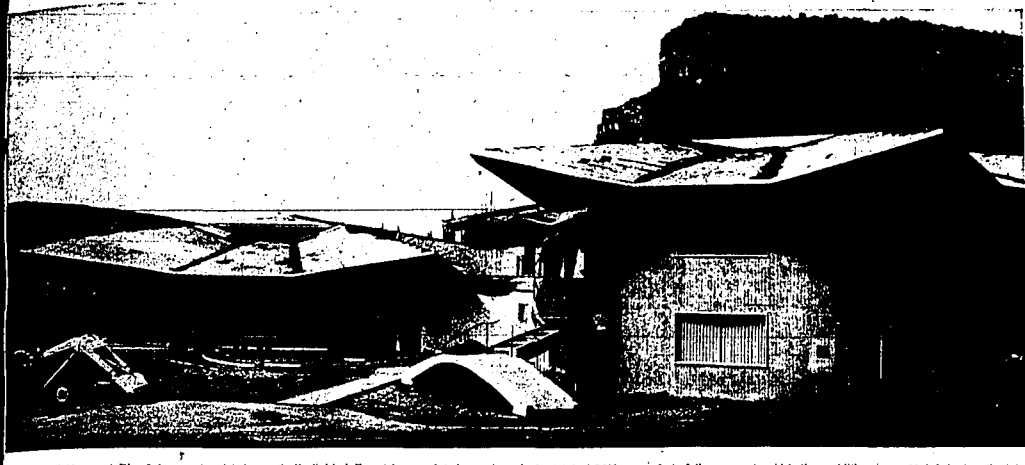

It Can Be Permanent Adequate Air Supply Is Needed for Any Heater

By HAROLD THOMAS HEYMAN, M.D. *Writer for Newspaper Enterprise Association*

Scarcely a day passes without reports of one or more deaths from asphyxiation as the result of a malfunctioning space heater. Since these accidents are preventable, I'd like to tell you what can be done to avert any such tragedy in your home, especially if your living or sleeping quarters are confined, in small rooms of an apartment, flat, house or other fuel, you need an adequate air supply or draft. If you fail to do this, you face at least two hazards:

The first is a less dangerous one—an accumulation of carbon monoxide, a colorless, odorless, tasteless gas that is deadly. It is produced by the burning of carbonaceous fuel and is a common cause of death. It is often called "the silent killer" because it is so insidious. It can be fatal in small doses and its effects are cumulative. It is often found in homes with faulty chimneys or space heaters that do not have adequate air supply.

Dr. Heyman continues to discuss the dangers of carbon monoxide poisoning and provides advice on how to prevent it. He emphasizes the importance of regular maintenance of space heaters and ensuring that they have a proper air supply. He also mentions the symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning, such as dizziness, headache, and nausea, and advises that if these symptoms occur, the heater should be turned off immediately and medical attention sought.

4-H Youth Fattens Steers With Ration Consisting Primarily of Ground Corn

With this amount of corn on hand, and with computations recorded about the four varieties that had been planted, Garnard decided to go further and use this feed on his 4-H steers.

Two 1000-pound and two 800-pound steers were placed in a feedlot in late November at approximately 400 pounds.

They were started on rolled mid-grain, creep feed pellets, and alfalfa hay. Gradually, the steers were introduced to ground corn—and protein—supplements. The hay was decreased during this time.

Presently, Garnard has the steers eating 12 pounds of ground corn, two pounds of commercial protein supplement, and only a little hay.

By this midweek, the steers will be fed more corn and absolutely no hay. No wet pulp is contemplated. It will be worth following the experiment to the slaughterhouse, Garnard had little misgivings about feeding the ration without hay or wet pulp.

The youth has been a member of 4-H activities for many years, and as his father has been a leader in other 4-H projects, including poultry, beekeeping, and raising and caring for calves.

His plans for the 1961 season include the raising of 6.5 acres of corn and the fattening of eight steers.

Chicks Hatched Near Home Considered Best

Chicks hatched close to home are best for poultrymen, said Arren Daigh, Twin Falls county extension agent, quoting Robert Black, poultry specialist of the University of Idaho.

There are many advantages in raising from local hatcheries, said Daigh. One is that the hatchery is familiar with local conditions and what he needs. The hatchery is available for help when needed and can help offer practical advice on a good start.

Secondly, local chicks are less likely to develop disease. Several counties operate under the same and national poultry improvement plans and they are free of healthy chicks.

Chicks shipped in from out-of-state are often exposed to diseases while being transported, the extension agent said.

USA says, however, that the treatment may be practical for potted plants, greenhouse culture, or possibly for garden plots.

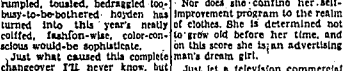
