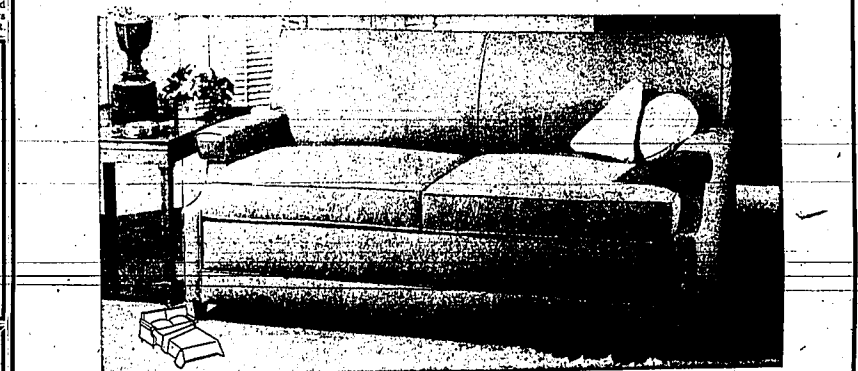

Solon Blasts Opponent of Dam Project

BOISE, March 14.—Sen. Frank Church, D-Ida., said yesterday the Snake River dam project is a campaign of "disinformation" involving the Burns Creek project in eastern Idaho.

Church, in a message from Washington, commended Snake River Watermaster Henry C. Eagle, Idaho Falls, for "relating the UP and LS situation that the bureau of Reclamation had released information water from Jackson Lake and Palisades reservoir for the benefit of water users."

Snake Tactics Claimed
"This is simply another example of the same old snake tactics used by private utilities to scuttle a worthwhile Idaho project, the alleged tampering with irrigation water," Church said.

"The familiar tactics should not surprise us. The hearings will again demonstrate that Burns Creek is vital to the progress and development of Idaho and will be of major benefit to the irrigation, flood providing insurance water for just such a potentially dry year as we now face."

Another brochure sent Rep. Ralph R. Harding, D-Ida., also in a message from Washington, said Utah Power had sent a follow-up letter to a brochure he said had been circulated earlier.

Harding said he had met in his office with E. M. Naughton, president of the Snake River and Naughton used as an argument against Burns Creek the fact that the Snake river was likely to lack 90,000 acre-feet of filling this season.

"It is regrettable and unreasonable," Harding said, "to use this as an example that there will not be adequate water for the Burns Creek project when Idaho has just undergone three dry years."

"Mr. Naughton will know that the purpose of storage projects in the upper Snake river will be to store water for use during such bad years."
