Transplant of Human Parts Is Possibility

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 20.—A Minnesota scientist today reported development of a technique he said might open the way toward the goal of transplanting entire organs from one person to another.

Dr. Claude R. Hirschback of Minneapolis Central hospital said he and fellow researchers had successfully removed a kidney or lung from baboons and dogs, kept them alive outside the body for periods up to 24 hours, then replanted them in the same animals and found that normal function quickly resulted.

He told a seminar of science writers sponsored by the American Cancer society that the technique—featuring quick cooling of the organs in an ice-cold state and freezing them entirely of blood—might help science in its attempts to change the characteristics of cells within organs of an animal—and eventually of a human—so that such an organ would not be rejected when transplanted into another living subject.

Up to now such transplants can be made only between identical twins, and so far only with kidneys.

Soviets Express Hope for Talks

GENEVA, Switzerland, March 20.—A Moscow radio commentator expressed "a certain optimism" today for success in the three-power nuclear test ban conference, "There are definitely possibilities of progress," once the U.S., British and Soviet representatives get together again after a three-month lapse, the broadcast said. It blamed the Eisenhower administration for past failures.

The East-West negotiators will be trying for a treaty to outlaw atomic and hydrogen weapon tests and set up an enforcement system. Inspection and control have been the biggest hurdles during the 2 1/2 years of talking.

Deficit Arms Spending by U.S. Is Likely

WASHINGTON, March 20.—President Kennedy is reported ready to submit a balanced-budget bill to Congress soon—and then supplement it with a request for at least one billion dollars in deficit defense spending.

Congressional leaders have been informed that the President hopes by making separate recommendations for defense spending increases to drive two points home to the country:

1. That he is making every effort to keep the nation on a pay-as-you-go basis.
2. That the reason he is unable to do so at this point lies in the need for a stepped-up defense effort to which he pointed in the President's campaign.

Kennedy apparently plans five-year changes in the \$60-billion dollar budget that former President Dwight D. Eisenhower sent to Congress in January for the fiscal year beginning July 1. Savings that Kennedy expects have been able to calculate in some areas may be offset by increases in others.

Eisenhower estimated a 3.5-billion-dollar surplus. But this was based on an \$52-billion-dollar budget that Kennedy's advisers doubt will be reached. Even so, he also banked on postal rate increases and hikes in some taxes that sources say may not event.

AEC's Strike Threat Over; Demo Laid

WASHINGTON, March 20.—President Kennedy was credited today with having helped speed settlement of a wage dispute that threatened to shut down a vital atomic energy plant.

Less than five days after Kennedy expressed concern over a possible strike at the Hanford, Wash., atomic plant, the General Electric company reached agreement (Saturday) with the AFL-CIO atomic trades council on a new contract covering 3,200 workers there.

The firm, which operates the plutonium-producing installation under contract with the atomic energy commission (AEC), made a major revision last week of its offer for the first time since negotiations began last fall.

GE granted wage increases greater than were provided under the pattern of settlements with unions in its electrical equipment and appliance plants. It long had refused to budge from this "pattern" offer until the administration moved into the picture.

At Kennedy's request, a strike date was postponed for two weeks to allow more time to negotiate.

President Asked to Get In River Spat

WASHINGTON, March 20.—President Kennedy was asked today to step into a dispute in which the army engineers have been accused of illegally depriving the upper Missouri river basin of water needed for irrigation and power.

The request was made by three Democratic senators who asked Kennedy to order the corps of engineers to "halt the unwise and improper management and release of Missouri basin waters."

Sens. Mike Mansfield and Lee Metcalf, Montana, and Quentin Burdick, North Dakota, accused the army engineers of "continuing disregard" of the law in putting navigation ahead of irrigation and power in their management of river waters.

In a strongly worded letter to the President, the three accused the army of "persistently refusing to obey" the O'Mahoney-Whitman amendment to the flood control act of 1914.

"It is unfair," they said, "that the O'Mahoney-Whitman amendment is enforced."

The charges were similar to those made last year in a senate interior-committee report, which accused the army of "unlawful" assumption of authority and "disregard of congressional intent" in not giving use of river waters for power priority over navigation in the Missouri river.

With less than a month until the April 15 deadline for filing personal income taxes, Charles Olson, internal revenue service special agent in charge of the Detroit office, cautions residents to mail returns directly to the Internal Revenue Service, Boise, for more rapid processing.

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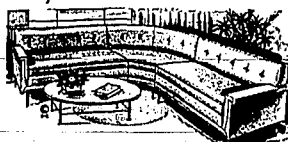


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
