Galbraith, a Harvard economics professor, believes its individual approaches to the economic problems of nations with differing problems. He believes Indian socialism is the opposite of the socialism which the Soviet Union proclaims.

He arrives when the United States has formally endorsed neutrality for one country—Laos—and when the world, as applied to the Soviet Union, has acquired a connotation of some reason and dignity.

All this is coupled with a growing realization in the United States that international friendship is not to be bought, and that foreign aid cannot be a blind operation, but must be conducted as a part of relations with individual countries.

In spite of a great deal of talk otherwise, there has been a strong tendency in the United States to have the kind of world to which we once were accustomed.

Now the idea of working directly for the kind of world in which we wish to live in the future seems to be gaining ground.

British Champ Stops Erskine, Eyes Patterson

LONDON, March 22 (AP)—Henry Cooper, the British and British empire heavyweight champion, Tuesday night stopped Joe Erskine in the fifth round of a title fight and boosted his chances for a crack at world champion Floyd Patterson of New York. The 27-year-old Erskine, a former British champion, "retired" with a closed left eye at the end of the fifth round of the scheduled 15-round before a capacity crowd of 15,000 in Wembley's indoor stadium.

It was the eighth straight victory for Cooper, a 26-year-old London cockney who has gone unbeaten in the last 67 years. He is rated the No. 3 contender.

Cooper's record now is 23-1-1 including 15 knockouts. In boxing up his string he outpointed Zora Polity and Roy Harris of the United States, Alex Mitoff of Argentina, and knocked out Erskine in a previous title fight in the 11th round.

Patterson, after knocking out Ingemar Johansson in the sixth round of their third title fight at Miami Beach, Fla., March 12, said Cooper was "a very worthy challenger."

The 188-pound Londoner cut the 160-pound Erskine's face into a bloody mess with an snapping left jab. He cut Erskine about both eyes and on the forehead. By the end of the fifth round, the Welshman's left eye was closed to a mere slit. His seconds called for a referee over and the fight was all over.

Erskine never had a chance. Cooper, determined to earn a shot at Patterson, stormed right after his opponent. He tipped a vicious left hook to the body and had Erskine retreating. In the second round the blond Englishman again concentrated his attack to the body. In the third round he shifted to the head and started to cut up Erskine with his stinging left jab.

Blood flowed from a cut above Erskine's right eye. All the time Cooper played in with that vicious left.

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Flemming Is For Private School Loan

WASHINGTON, March 22.—Arthur B. Flemming, former Eisenhower administration official, has endorsed loans for private and parochial schools if they truly paid for themselves and were not a drain on the federal treasury.

The former health, education and welfare secretary testified before a house education subcommittee on President Kennedy's 23 billion dollar school aid bill.

Flemming, president-elect of the University of Oregon, also opposed federal aid for teacher salaries, a major point of the Kennedy program.

Approval Qualified

Flemming carefully qualified his approval of loans which are being sought by Catholic educators. He opposed any direct aid for non-public schools.

He said any loan program for private schools should provide funds at interest rates comparable to the government's own cost of securing the money, and leave the way clear for prompt court tests of its constitutionality.

With these conditions, he said, "I believe it would be wise for the congress to give careful consideration to the possibility of inaugurating a genuine loan program."

Another Plan Opposed

But Flemming opposed Kennedy's program to permit states to use federal grants for teacher pay as well as classroom construction. He said a construction-only program would marshal more support in congress and would free local money for raising teachers' salaries.

Flemming also said states and localities "should be required" to provide matching funds equal to federal grants for school construction.

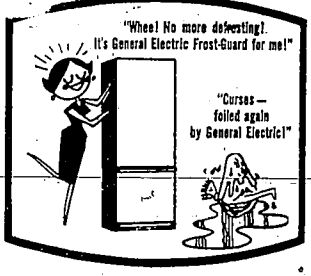
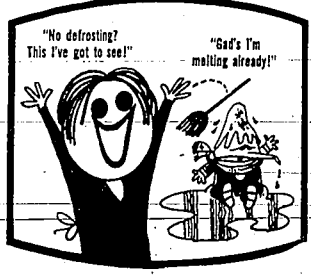
