Albertson's Food Center Is Destroyed by Roaring Nighttime Blaze in T.F.

Smoldering, water-soaked debris and charred skeletal remains of four walls were all that remained Thursday of Twin Falls Albertson's Food center. Fire, apparently getting a foothold in the rear of store and basement Wednesday night, swept through the \$100,000 building which contained an estimated \$200,000 worth of goods and equipment. Everything was destroyed. Intense heat and choking smoke hampered efforts of the Twin Falls fire department to control the blaze which was called to the department's attention about 10:30 p.m. Wednesday by an automatic fire alarm.

Smoke billowed from debris and some small fires burned at the scene Thursday morning as a few firemen and one fire truck remained to watch developments. Twin Falls Fire Chief L. Z. Barlett said Thursday water will be sprayed on the smoldering remains in hopes of putting out lingering fires. He said the fire started in the basement of the store, but it is not certain where it started. Firemen at the scene at 10:45 p.m. Wednesday.

Restrictions Foreseen on U. S. Water

WASHINGTON, March 20 (AP)—The demand for water is becoming so great in this country that it may be necessary to restrict, at least to conserve, natural supplies, a spokesman said yesterday.

The need for such conservation was stressed by speakers at the National Water Research symposium in Ft. Reno, Nev., in Montana state college president, and Wayne D. Criddle, Salt Lake City, Utah state university, were among the speakers.

The conference is being sponsored by the National Research Council and the National Academy of Sciences, Division of Earth and Planetary Sciences.

The determination of which uses and which areas are the most important and consequently are most appropriate for application of water in the absence of achievement of maximum conservation and efficient use of water on arid and semi-arid agricultural areas, the speaker said.

The speaker said the United States is a "long way from running out of water," although "our cheap water is rapidly being squandered and its efficient utilization of this important resource."

The speaker said the question is "how do we pay for the maintenance water remaining to be developed?"

X15 Pilot Soars 31 Miles up in Space

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., March 20 (AP)—An X15 rocket plane soared today to more than 31 miles above the Earth—the highest altitude yet achieved on a manned flight. Radar computations made on the ground showed that test pilot Joe Walker took the research craft to an altitude of 165,000 feet. Near the top of his climb, Walker reported by radio, "It's a nice, dark blue overhead and I have time to look around." As he made the comment, Walker was at the top of his long arc across the heavens and was weightless. He was weightless two minutes, the longest such period ever experienced by a human.

He incurred no apparent ill effects.

The X15 achieved a speed of 2,900 miles an hour. Walker took the rocket plane to the 31-mile altitude in 10 minutes. The X15 is designed to eventually reach speeds of up to 4,000 miles an hour and to fly for 100 miles. Today Walker used only three-quarters power in his steep climb.

The plane burned its fuel for only 75 seconds.

Walker's record eclipsed the old mark of 150,000 feet set in 1960 by an X15 with a less powerful engine.

The plane built for research in the nearby airless fringe of space, set a world speed mark of 2,900 miles an hour on the first of its all-out flights March 7.

One goal of today's flight was the first full-scale test of special jets designed to control the X15 as heighs where air is too thin for conventional controls to be effective.

The crest of the Cedar river flood is here done on Cedar Rapids, Ia., today and hundreds of volunteers responded to a call from the levees.

Work-up started

Upstream on the Cedar, on the small tributaries and along some of the smaller streams, mop-up operations were under way in flood-washed lowlands.

The floodwaters kept at least 3,000 persons from their homes in a north-south strip of area. Another 500 were flooded out farther upstream on the Cedar and some engineers estimated 600-800 had been made temporarily homeless in Wisconsin.

Fifteen families—about 60 persons—already had been moved out at Cedar Rapids. They lived in a low-area between the main-dike and the levee.

Corbett, 32, Is Convicted for Killing Coors

GOLDEN, Colo., March 20 (AP)—Joseph Corbett, 32, was convicted today for the slaying of a wealthy Denver Coors Inc. executive.

Corbett accepted the decision calmly but blurted profanity behind thick glasses and clasped his hands on the table before him.

The dramatic scene ended a trial of two weeks and set in motion what Corbett's attorney offered to defend either him or to attack the state's case at his own specification, conjecture and surmise.

Corbett was accused of slaying Coors on Feb. 9, 1960, in an above-ground building. The prosecution claimed he achieved for two years to about the 44-year-old head of the Adolph Coors company brewery and ransom him for \$500,000.

PRETORIA, South Africa, March 30 — Twenty-eight foes of the government's white supremacy policies were acquitted yesterday of treason charges, ending the longest, most costly trial in South Africa's history.

The defendants were among 160 persons all races arrested on Dec. 6, 1958, in nationwide dawn raids aimed at cracking resistance to the government's apartheid policy — strict racial segregation.

The 28 were charged with plotting to overthrow the government and establish a communist regime. They are accused during the trial of first receiving training in a South African history — that they sought to end apartheid peacefully.

Valuable Ore Expected for Oakley Mine

BURLEY, March 30 — The cross cut to the fault contact of the Oakley mine, 2 1/2 miles south of Oakley, will be completed this week and a valuable ore body should be expected, reports Sam Mullin, Oakley tunnel contractor. Mullin formerly contracted drift work for the Oakley mine, a non-oxidized mine, Kellogg, at the time that ore body was cut. He declares that the formation in which they are now working is indicative of a mineral deposition at or near the fault. A mining crew will drive the tunnel from the surface and will contact this spring, he adds. A silver strike in this area could have captured further prospecting in the area and considerable employment to people of southern Idaho. The richness of the ores at Vipont, silver 6,000 to 10,000 ounces and gold as high as five ounces, is a notable feature, Mullin declares.

Cut Down of Tax Privilege Gets Support

WASHINGTON, March 30 (AP)—Senator William McClellan yesterday said that if all types of income tax were equal treatment, tax rates could be cut about one-third.

In a talk to the National Press Club, the senator said he stands against the oil depletion allowance and the special treatment of dividends paid to stockholders.

He emphasized he was speaking as an individual rather than as a senator.

Caplan said income tax "rates are much too high" but this is because the tax laws are "infused with exceptions and special treatment." He said, "It is that special treatment which has made income tax rates so high."

Caplan said he has no reason why any particular dollar of income should be given different treatment than any other.

The commissioner was asked for his position on "double taxation of dividends" — the phrase often used to indicate that corporations pay taxes on profits, then pay out of those profits dividends on which stockholders also must pay taxes.

Caplan said he sees no difference

between this situation and the case of the man who is paid \$100 a week by a man whose salary is \$1,000 a week. He said the man pays taxes, then pays the man out of taxed income, and he is still taxed.

As for the 27½ percent oil depletion allowance, Caplan said that if there were a shortage of oil and greater production were needed, a subsidy to the oil industry might be in order.

But if there is to be such a subsidy, it should be a direct subsidy, and "the tax law shouldn't be used for this."

In a related development, the finance committee made public a report from Caplan showing little if any improvement in the reporting by taxpayers of income from dividends and interest. The treasury estimates that four billion dollars or more of such income goes untaxed each year.

The report could bolster an expected request by the Kennedy administration for a law to require withholding of taxes on such income. Taxes on wages and salaries already are withheld at the source.

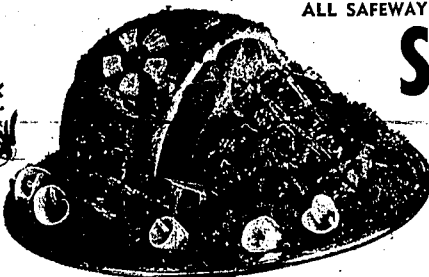
