



### City Resumes Use of Snake River Water

(From Page One)  
Twin Falls can't continue to use Rock creek water, according to the city pumpers, because of the low water in the reservoir. The city will resume using the Snake River water through the high line and low line canals.

The Twin Falls canal company started letting the water out of Murtough lake into the main canal early in the afternoon. It is reported that the H. L. Derrick, Twin Falls city manager, will be in the main canal east of Hansen Wednesday evening.

"The water in the canal was about the color of coffee," Newton said. It was covered with about an inch of yellow light blue scum and in the water there were many floating dead fish.

Thursday morning the dam was pulled out of the high line canal and the water started flowing into the airport and from there through Saturday night the airport received its water supply by tank truck.

Newton said the city planned to let the first flow of water from Murtough lake bypass the filter plant and airport for at least 10 hours on Saturday. The airport is taking the raw water supply from the highline canal Saturday evening.

As the first flow of Murtough lake water comes to the filter plant, the plants intake from the canal will be closed to let the water pass by the filter plant.

From the time the gates are closed, the city will receive its water supply from the Snake River south of town on highway 74. Newton explained, the reservoir, which is about 100 feet high, will be pumped out of the high line canal and the water will be pumped into the airport and from there through Saturday night the airport received its water supply by tank truck.

Purpose of the new citizen-advisory committee will be to advise on conservation programs across the nation. Its basic aim is to achieve even closer relations between the service and the American people who use and visit national forests.

Members of the committee are set for May 2 in Washington, D.C.

In naming the committee, Forest Service Chief Richard E. Anderson said "America's expanding population with its growing need for national forest resources has created a need for a national policy affecting multiple-use management of the nation's forests and in this way the voices of all user groups and the general public can be more effectively heard."

Each committee member is familiar with the needs of the general public as well as with the geographic balance so that the needs of the country will be represented," Dr. McArdle concluded.

He pointed out that each person will contribute his service without compensation. At the first meeting members will draw lots for one, two and three year terms. Each member will serve three years.

Other states represented on the committee include Florida, California, West Virginia, Connecticut, Utah, Illinois, Oregon, Washington, Colorado, Nebraska, Georgia and New Mexico.

Breckenridge, who was born in Twin Falls in 1916, attended Twin Falls schools and was graduated from Bismarck college, Pa., with a degree in chemistry. He has been associated with livestock raising and farming since 1938. 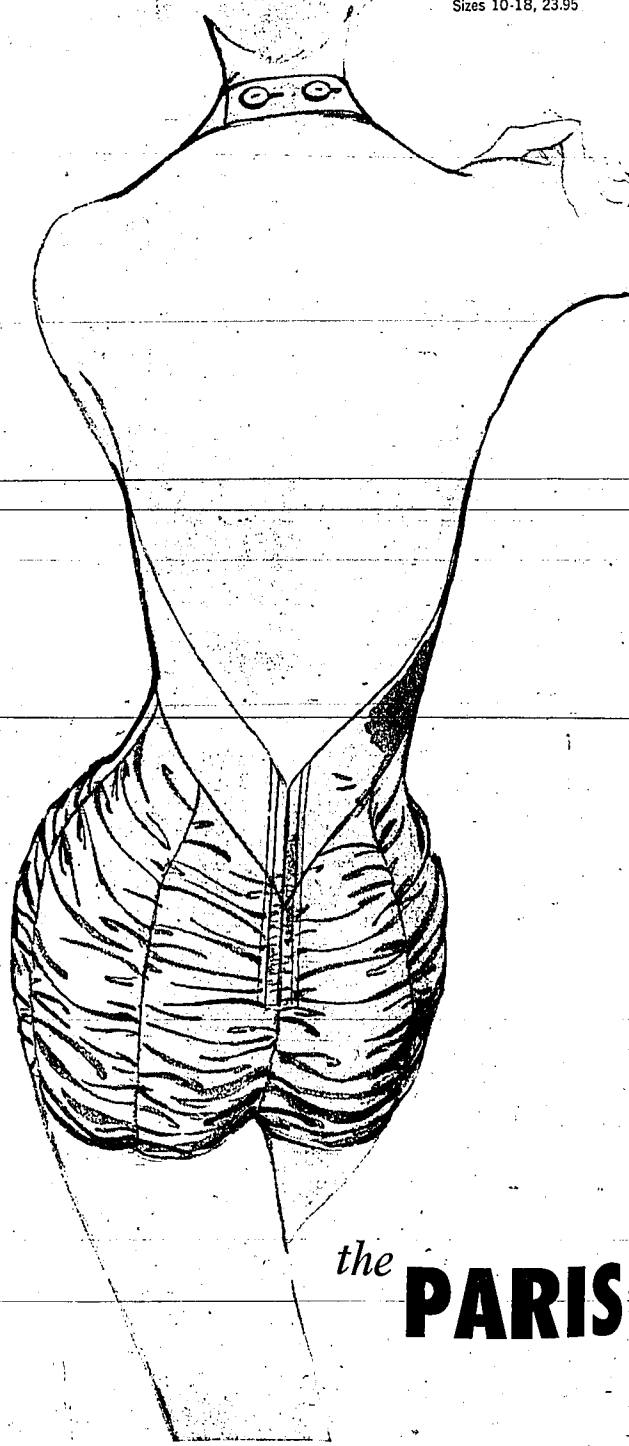

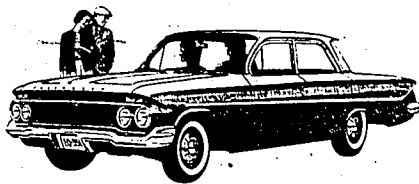

He returned to Twin Falls last fall and resumed the teaching profession after working in the insurance business for three years. He first taught here at the school year 1953-54. He served as dean of boys at the Twin Falls junior high school.

Staudaher was born in Kesmere, Wis. He attended public schools there and was graduated from high school in 1946. He entered the army unit, served with occupation forces in Germany until 1948. School Shops to Be Used by City Recreation Department for Adults

The Twin Falls recreation department has started another program that will enable more interested citizens to use the city's recreation shops.

The department recently started an industrial arts class in the Twin Falls junior high school industrial arts shop. The class is sponsored by the department and class A school district No. 411.

The district furnishes the facilities and the department has hired an instructor, Virgil Cowles, a teacher at the high school industrial arts department, to conduct the classes.

Ernest Craner, superintendent of the parks and recreation department, says he believes this is the first time an industrial arts class has been offered at night in Twin Falls.

The class is open and free to any young man or adult who wishes to work in a fully-equipped shop and get training in shop practice.

Craner stresses that the classes offered for those individuals who don't have access to shop classes during the day.

"We want those young men and older fellows who want a chance to work with wood," Craner says. "The classes will be conducted from 7 to 9 p.m. Wednesday.

Craner says anyone who wishes to start the classes should simply attend the next class and register. They will be offered until the end of the school year.

There is room for about 15 students. If the classes prove popular, they will be offered next fall and then the chances the classes will be scheduled two or three times a week.

Craner says he has discussed the possibility of offering a similar class in metal work at the senior high school shop, to Charles Farmer, the shop teacher, in instructing.

Craner says he would like to hear from interested persons concerning these classes—so that he can get some idea of how much interest there is in the program.

He says larger communities throughout the nation have such classes.

Kennedy Clan Keeps Secret Service Busy

EDITOR'S NOTE:—Like it or not the secret service is marching double-time in the new frontier headed up with the unrelenting, high-flying Kennedy's has the service working overtime, riding to the bonds, baby-sitting and how to hold a 48 ounce wine tin and tins.

WASHINGTON, April 1 (UPI)—Caroline and John F. Kennedy, Jr., will grow up in the White House during the next four years under the watchful eye of a secret service detail.

But the men assigned to the President's children have been warned to stay in the background as much as possible and not to get too attached to the Kennedy children.

Caroline Kennedy, now 3, may one day go to school while her father is president. If she does a secret service man will stand outside her classroom.

He'll be discreet, says the chief of the U. S. secret service, U. E. Baughman, and try not to be too obvious.

John F. Kennedy, Jr., in his baby carriage, will have a constant guard.

Mrs. Kennedy look over as First Lady with the declaration that she would not have her young children to be brought up by secret service men and nannies.

By law the agents are assigned to guard the President. They stick to Kennedy wherever he goes and the President is not permitted to leave his protectors behind.

But the First Lady and the children can dispense with the service if they feel it is oppressive.

Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who traveled widely on her own, refused to have secret service men along with her.

Mrs. Dwight D. Eisenhower always was accompanied by a silent observer and watcher from the secret service, who went to more ladies luncheons than he might care to remember.

Chief Baughman recalls that President Eisenhower once declared: "You don't have to worry about me—but don't let anything happen to my grandchildren."

Not since the era of President Theodore Roosevelt has there been a president's child of the President living in the White House, but the secret service is ready for anything.

The "secret service" is a long known as "the dispenser of death." The whole unpredictable Kennedy regime has put the secret service on its toes.

Pupils Receive Valuable Training In Elementary School Orchestras

One of the unusual educational programs in Twin Falls school district No. 411 is the string orchestra program in the grade schools. The program has been under way since 1955 and each year there are about 15 grade school pupils in orchestras at five elementary schools in the city area.

Only one other school in the valley, Durley, offers training in string instruments in the grade schools, according to Richard Smith, supervisor of instrumental music in the grade schools and director of the junior and high school orchestras.

Each week Smith drives many miles from school to school directing the orchestras. He visits each school three times a week for one class period of orchestra rehearsal. This is in addition to rehearsing the junior high school and high school orchestras.

Three times during the year of orchestra students have an opportunity to perform before an audience at a special PTA concert at the individual schools, a special school assembly and at the Civic Orchestra festival which will be held at 7:30 p.m. April 18 at the Twin Falls junior high school.

The cost of playing in the orchestras is small, Smith says, but about 40 per cent of the students rent instruments from the school district. They rent \$3 per year. This pays for re-stringing and general maintenance.

Smith says it is not necessary to start them young so they will develop proper musical habits. The drop-out rate among string players who start late is high, because they have developed set musical habits that aren't conducive to string playing.

The orchestra is strictly a string orchestra. This consists of violins, violas and cellos. Smith says if there is a student in grade school who is an extraordinary musical talent, he will sometimes accompany the orchestra.

Richard Smith, supervisor of instrumental music in the grade schools and director of the junior and high school orchestras, helps David Matsonka, a student at Lincoln school. Smith visits each school in the community three times a week.

Last year he bought a small ranch near Tuttle, and when he built following the rodeo circuit he is busy building corral and making general improvements. He has high points score (the cowboys get a point for each dollar they win) also placed him as runner-up to the all-round cowboy, the most coveted title awarded professional cowboys.

Robinson says he moved to Magic Valley because of the mild winters in the area, which enable him to work outdoors when he can be home.

He was an active contestant in amateur rodeos throughout Idaho from the time he first entered a rodeo. Shortly after he started competing, he started placing.

When he was graduated from high school in 1951 he was offered football scholarships at the University of Idaho and Utah State university, but he decided to farm near Rockland with his father and enter regional rodeo. In 1953 he traveled about 90,000 miles in 1950, so Robinson keeps busy.

### MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT Twin Falls Fire Chief Has Spent Most Of His Life as Member of Department

L. Z. Bartlett, Twin Falls fire chief has spent most of his life working for the city. He has been a member of the fire department since 1924, except for three years, from 1928 to 1930, has always worked in the department. He was made chief in 1932. He started to work for the city of Twin Falls after working in Burley following graduation from Burley high school in 1924. Bartlett is responsible for the training of the firemen, so the department and the maintenance of the expensive equipment at the fire house. He supervises the work and assignments to his crew. Bartlett points out that the job of chief and the members of the department is not so much fighting fires, as it is preventing them. This is done through speeches and regular inspection tours of the public and business buildings in the community. "In the years that I have been here, the Twin Falls citizens have been wonderful in their cooperation and have always complied with our recommendations concerning fire safety," the chief declared. "I've enjoyed working for the people and I hope you never served them satisfactorily. "In addition to supervising fire fighting, Bartlett supervises the daily schools. He notes that it takes about three years to develop a good fireman, so the amount of training given is extensive. "Everyday they have plug school, the memory drill where the firemen learn the exact location of the fire hydrants throughout the community. In addition to this there are classes where the men are brought up to date on new methods to fight fires. "In the summer the department practices new methods of fighting fires in fireproof buildings. Bartlett notes that the methods of fire fighting are constantly changing and the firemen have to constantly practice and study to keep abreast. Bartlett keeps up on new methods by reading and by attending two major schools a year—the three-day Idaho state fire school and an annual week held in some Idaho community, and the Pacific Coast International Fire Chief's association school. The latter convention held for the chiefs that brings them up to date on the newest methods of fighting fires. Bartlett says new methods always are being sought to quell fires with a minimum of damage to the building. Within the month the new substitution will be finished. Bartlett says the city is getting ready to buy another fire engine. They are expensive, but the better the department in a community, the lower the fire insurance rates. Bartlett says, "Actually dollars paid out for good equipment are dollars saved in the long run. Additional dollars are saved in the way they pay."

# 5-Pound Trout Is Result of Food Formula Experiment

## Purina's Trout Experimental Farm in Snake Canyon Is Only One in Nation

Since June, 1958, the Halston Purina company has worked on a research project in the Snake River canyon near the Blue Lakes trout farm. During the year about 50,000 trout were raised at the experimental farm and at times the trout will eat nearly a ton of prepared food a day.

The trout experimental farm is the only one in the United States established by the company and run by state and government. One of the few farms devoted to discovering more about the intricacies of trout farming, a comparatively new science.

"Jack Coates, a fisheries research biologist, is in charge of the farm and research. He is aided by Don Smith, assistant manager, and Ed Ferris, Jr.

Coates notes that the science of fish culture is new, and relatively little research into habits of fish has been done until the last few years. He says this farm is a purely commercial trout experimental farm in the United States located in the Snake River canyon because of the temperature and the mineral content of spring water.

He says the Purina company leased facilities from the Blue Lakes trout farm and started the experimental farm because it wanted to manufacture a food that would produce trout economically.

The company needed a place for controlled experiments and Twin Falls was the logical location because the canyon area is the center of the world's fish farming industry. And the warmer 58-degree temperature is conducive to trout farming, especially raising them for market.

For the past three years Coates has conducted hundreds of experiments with the fish. He tests about 60 rations with the control groups each year. There are a myriad ways in which rations can be administered to the control groups to record growth rate.

Coates says science really doesn't know much about the nutritional requirements of fish and the experiments are geared to test various feed formulas concocted by the company's mill in Topeka.

The formulas are designed with various proportions of vitamins, proteins, minerals, carbohydrates and fats. The effect of the formulas is studied and the interrelationships of the different components are studied to note how they affect fish growth.

"The whole purpose is to design a feed that will produce a healthy fish rapidly, at a minimum cost," Coates says.

The company has been marketing fish food for about six years, according to Coates. "It is now marketed the second formula, one tested and devised at this farm."

Coates points out that fish can be raised in a comparatively small space, in a short time.

"You can raise more protein food in an acre of seawater than on an acre of land. This is important, especially as the world becomes more crowded."

It is Coates' job to design the experiment, control them while they are under way and evaluate them and make reports on results.

The fish are purchased as eggs from a fish hatchery in the eastern part of the state where the water is cooler and more suitable for spawning. They are trucked here and hatched in an incubator.

Then the small fish become a part of an experiment. They might be fed one formula throughout their life span, or the formulas might be varied at different age levels. Most experiments last about 12 months. If the formula is promising, the test might be carried out for another year. Then, if it still looks like a good formula, it might be shared with other research fish farms throughout the nation so it can be tested in other environments.

In addition to testing the formulas, Coates points out there are other factors affecting fish growth. For example, he notes that fish, like any other animal, will develop better in a sanitary environment.

Experiments with food formulas will be continued indefinitely, but Coates adds that other experiments will start soon. These will test how such things as sanitation and general management affect fish growth.

## Salary Hike Of Teachers Is Approved

RUPERT, April 1.—A teacher salary increase ranging from \$50 to \$400 was approved this week by the school board. Officials said the raise would average about \$200 a teacher.

Donald Meyer, county superintendent, said that the county will receive \$920,000 from the state under the new contract, adopted by the recent sessions of the legislature, and that the large sum is the reason for the present teaching staff, but to take care of the six new teachers to be added for the next school year.

The salary schedule is based upon "state" recommendations. Meyer said under this new set up a teacher with two years training will receive \$2,000, and will get \$3,800 with nine or more years of experience. The beginning teacher with three years of training will start at \$2,500, and those with nine years experience will receive \$4,000.

The teacher with a degree will start at \$4,000, and with 12 years of experience, will receive \$6,800. The teacher with a degree and 10 hours of graduate work will start at \$4,500, and with 12 years of experience, will receive \$7,400.

Meyer said under this new set up a teacher beginning with a master degree—Meyer said—will start at \$4,500, and at the end of 12 years experience will receive \$5,270.

Meyer said that Minidoka county, with one of the lowest adopted evaluations per number of students in the state, is one of a minority receiving grants for the purpose.

In other bodies, the board discussed the addition of a driver-education course to the curriculum at the high school. In keeping with the law passed by the last legislature requiring such training to be offered in all high schools in the state by July 1, 1961, Meyer said that the board is trying to work out a program for integration of the course as stated.

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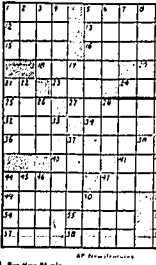
