Boise City Clerk Roberta Sharp said voter registrations for the council runoff contest in the city will sit April 18 got under way this morning.

Four persons were vying for the council seats. They are incumbent Vern Morris and Mrs. Anna Heltger and Martin Rust and Edward GZA Estlin.

Other Runoffs Stated  
Maxima runoffs also are slated in Nampa and Idaho Falls.

Nampa's runoff is for the mayor seat and pits Bill Lees against Eric Starr. The incumbent, Tom Lepp, declined to run in the regular election because he had accepted an education post.

There has been a question mark placed in the Nampa runoff for mayor. Three Nampa residents reported they are considering proceeding about being write-in candidates.

Clatskanie Richard Hordan said, however, that he cannot find any provision in the Idaho law for write-in votes in a runoff election.

Boundary commissions from both states agreed to set a new dividing line along the middle of the channel. Carter Lake, Iowa, would become Carter Lake, Neb.

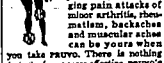

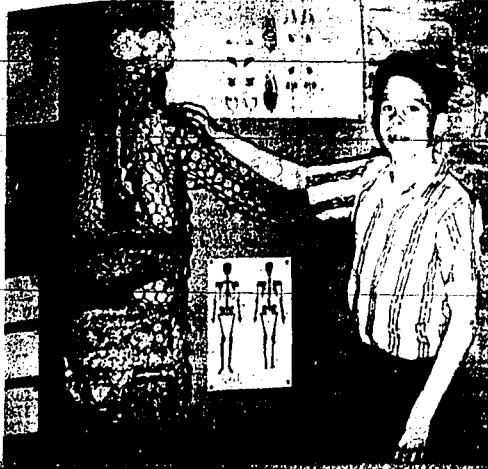

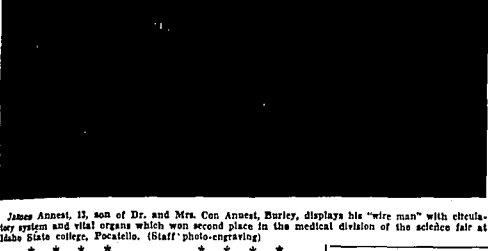
