## Youth, 20, Dies After Car-Truck Mishap at Bliss

BLISS, April 17—Harold Lloyd Barron, 20, son of State Sen. Lloyd Barron, Fairfield, died about 7 a. m. Sunday following Memorial hospital as a result of injuries received in an auto accident within the Bliss city limits at 6:55 a. m. Sunday. Barron was traveling west on highway 20 and 26 when he apparently "dozed." Gooding Sheriff Keith Anderson reports, His 1950 Chevrolet crossed the center line and collided with a 1950 GMC diesel truck driven by Kenneth C. Kerby, 30, Hazelton, who was traveling east on the highway.

Three passengers in Barron's car, Rodney Brown, 20, Ben Garcia, 22, and Bill Lee, 21, all of Bliss, were treated for minor injuries and released from the hospital Sunday afternoon. Subsequent reports, Kerby was uninjured.

## Eichmann Repeats Not Guilty 15 Times

JERUSALEM, April 17 (AP)—Adolf Eichmann granted out the words "not guilty" 15 times in Israel's monumental judgment naming him as the master destroyer of Jews in Europe during World War II. The prosecution, opening its case, asserted that Eichmann bent a Jewish child to death with his own hands for stealing peaches. "This, the trial of the destroyer." The former Gestapo officer stared back at his captors, unblinking. Spectators in the courtroom wept, swallowed hard as though physically ill, or looked at each other in abashed disbelief as he repeated "not guilty" 15 times.

## Congo Leader To Cooperate For U. N. Plan

LEOPOLDVILLE, Congo, April 17 (AP)—Congo President Joseph Kasavubu announced today his government will cooperate with the United Nations in recruiting foreign technicians and reorganizing the Congolese national army. In a declaration which observers said may well mark a turning point in the relations between the United Nations and the Congo, Kasavubu called for U. N. help in various fields. But he added he hoped the U. N. troops would be sent to help "in several months."

C., of the house agriculture committee.

# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—A sharp controversy has arisen within the administration over the efficacy of the pending legislative program to terminate the recession and to provide productive capacity.

Despite President Kennedy's concentration on this domestic front, the numerous who have forwarded to congress, the critics contend that the proposed program is more palliative than real remedies.

It is argued, for instance, that the proposed increase in the minimum hourly wage may force many small firms to fire rather than to hire additional employees. The 400 million dollars for depressed areas may result in a "pilgrimage" of industries, with firms shifting to places slated to receive federal funds.

**TROUBLED ECONOMY**—The extension of the unemployment insurance payment period from 12 weeks will alleviate hardship temporarily, but it will not provide steady work.

Even the proposed tax relief for business and individuals in the form of depreciation writeoffs and bonuses for expanding productive capacity is criticized. The trouble with the economy, as the steel industry discovered, is the lack of demand that forces them to close down.

Even such a desirable and necessary project as urban renewal has fallen under fire from municipal planners. Clearing out slums forces a municipality to pay higher rents for the new dwellings or to pay higher taxes to the city.

**AVERT CRISIS**—It is not the Republicans or the Democratic conservatives who oppose the efficacy of the Kennedy rescue operation, although many are opposed to the program for the advanced prospect of deficits and unbalanced budgets. They preach greater economy.

Protesters against individuals and elements which supported President Kennedy last fall. They include the Americans for Democratic Action, labor unions, the National Negro Labor Council, the National colored people and a bloc of "liberals" on Capitol Hill.

Severely critic, perhaps, has been Leon N. Keyserling. He is certainly not an extremist, as he is the national labor relations act. He is secretary to the late Sen. Robert F. Wagner, and subsequently headed Truman's council of economic advisers.

**WORSENING SITUATION**—Even Walter W. Heller, who now heads the council, and labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg have asked direct questions. Heller concedes that, even if the unemployment rolls are reduced by several million, there will still be a need to provide for many more.

Secretary Goldberg estimates that there is a current need for seven million new jobs. Others estimate that the need is as high as 10 million.

Since three million, or not quite four per cent, of the greatest work force in the nation's history, is unemployed—the economic problem confronting the nation is generally realized.

**NEW BIBLE—ANOTHER BEST SELLER**

The Bible is always new, and it is, for the fourth English publishing houses increased to print it, possibly the most widely read and most popular of all modern translations of the New Testament, published by the Oxford and Cambridge University Presses.

Over 50,000 copies of the new Bible have been sold, both the public sale and the clerical reception of the new translation can only have been justified an initial print of a million copies. This has been increased still further, for reasons that are not clear.

Despite its initial success, and the permanent welcome that the simple clarity of its language is likely to bring, it is not clear what effect the new version will have on Biblical publishing as a whole. King James' Bible (the "Authorized Version") has been the standard for over 200 years.

The new version is not only popular in the United States, but also in the United Kingdom. It is distributed by the World Council of Churches in 100 countries.

**POTENTIAL RESERVOIR OF MANPOWER?**

A marked shortage of psychiatrists has become a national problem. An alternative to letting things drift until such future time as psychiatrists are in more adequate supply is to encourage the training of new ones.

The Chicago Medical School, the University of Chicago, the University of Illinois, and the University of Michigan, observed that, recent medical school graduates constitute a "potential reservoir of psychiatric manpower." They are planning to train a class to acquire full specialist status in psychiatry.

"Only a few years ago," Dr. Branch said, "general education was the only way to get a man qualified in mental health." But now there is a "tremendous increase in psychiatric education." He says, general practitioners and other health workers should be trained to recognize mental health problems.

WASHINGTON (NEA)—The best reason for celebrating the anniversary of the Cuban Revolution today is that the Cuban anti-Castro factions have finally decided to create a revolutionary council.

Under Dr. Jose Marti and Dr. Fidel Castro admits that an opposition force has been established on the island. And three million Cubans are more determined than ever to force the revolution to back it up.

"Coffee day" was inappropriately celebrated in Washington at the Pan American union with a cocktail party of all things, not a kaffeklatch.

Elsewhere, Pan American week has been celebrated more by words than by deeds. Everybody and his brother seems to be writing a report telling somebody else what he ought to do to solve the Cuban problem.

President Kennedy's White House speech calling for his all-out program to solve the Cuban problem is a 16-page pocket pamphlet with a bright green cover and a handsome companion piece to the 36-page "white paper" pocket book on Cuba.

**HIGH PRESSURE**

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# TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—A sharp controversy has arisen within the administration over the sufficiency of the pending legislative program to reduce unemployment to a normal level of 3.5 percent against the current 6.000,000 seeking work.

It is argued, for instance, that the proposed increase in the minimum hourly wage from 75 cents to 80 cents will result in the loss of 400,000 jobs. The 400 million dollar program for depressed areas may result in a wholesale "pilfering" of the nation, with firms shifting to places tied to receive federal funds.

**TRIOUBLED ECONOMY**—The extension of the unemployment insurance payment period from 26 to 39 weeks will alleviate hardships temporarily, but will not solve the problem.

Even the proposed tax relief for business and industry in the form of fast depreciation writeoffs is being questioned for expanding the tax base.

The trouble with the economy, as the chief industry has disclosed, is not the scarcity of plants and equipment, but the lack of demand that forces them to close down.

Even such a desirable and necessary project as the Kennedy housing program is being questioned. The Kennedy housing program, although they should be at the cost of the program and the amount of money to be advanced.
