Twin Falls Spud Processing Plant Plan Announced

Sale of stock will begin this week for a potato processing plant to be built by John W. Warren, Boise, secretary of Northwest Achromic Chemical Corporation, near the town of Northwood. "With the tremendous amount of local interest," Warren said, "we hope to have sufficient money raised to break ground in 30 days." Northwood is approximately 10 miles west of the Twin Falls municipal office. Warren, who is president of Pacific International Securities, Inc., will underwrite the stock which will be sold in blocks of 250,000 shares of stock at \$2 per share. The firm will be able to process between 3,000 and 5,000 hundred pound potatoes daily during a 200-day season. During this season, a work force of 150 will be required.

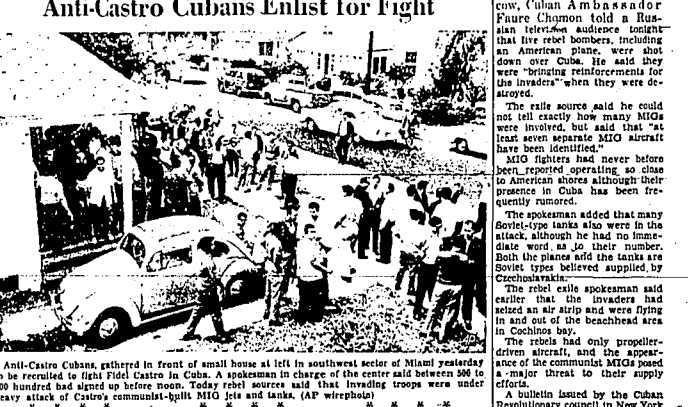

RACIAL BITTERNESS—As evidence of the bitter racial bitterness in the United States, the provisions for penalizing the unions for the political activities of their members are being considered. The unions are being urged to stand against the union officials and membership.

Vice President Johnson's committee will also face difficulties in the Democratic South. Employers will hesitate to employ Negroes except for unskilled work.

Thus the vice president will need all his "powers of persuasion" to "get moving" on this expanded sector of the economy.

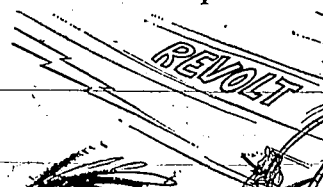

Second Spy Suit Shocks Englishman

LONDON, April 18 (AP)—Britain was shocked today by its second spy case of the year when a government official was charged with espionage. The man was George Blake, 35. He was arrested in London last month after a 20-minute hearing before chief magistrate Sir Robert Blundell at Bow street court.

Details of the case against him were not revealed. Neither was Blake's government post. A reported massive spy-hunt in Britain that included a combing of all trains and civilian employees at the country's air, land and sea forces and establishments.

The spy suit was intensified in wake of the trial and conviction last month of five persons, including two Americans for espionage. The Americans had direct radio links to Moscow. All were sentenced to long prison terms.

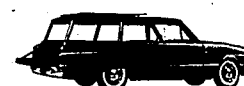

3 Warehouse Contracts for County OK'd

The county weed bureau has the chemicals and equipment available to a farmer at a fee. In the past year, the bureau has treated 140 cases for the first 13 weeks of 1961 compared with 7,073 for the first 13 weeks of 1960.
