

Sugar Beets in Area Are Killed By Frost, Wind

More than 4,000 acres of sugar beets will have to be replanted as result of frost damage and a gusty 45-mile-per-hour wind in the Burley-Rupert area Saturday afternoon. Fieldmen for the Amalgamated Sugar company, Twin Falls, are still checking to determine the extent of the damage caused by the frost. In the Murlaucht area at least three thousand acres have already been torn up for replanting and going through the procedure of replanting. More replanting is expected within a few days. In the Burley-Rupert area, about 4,000 acres, or 125 per cent, of the sugar beets contracted to the Paul plant of the Amalgamated Sugar company, will have to be replanted as result of frost and wind damage, said Ernest Blauer, manager in that area. The company has 22,000 acres of sugar beets contracted this season in Cassia-Minidoka counties and most of those have already been planted, Blauer reports. Beets damaged were those planted in the early April. Those planted later weren't frost-locked, laying in dry dirt and water, so they are not expected to be damaged. The frost that lay over Cassia and Minidoka counties for four hours, between 8 a.m. and five a.m. last Thursday caused most of the damage. The prolonged temperature was 18 degrees and wind gusts to 45 mph. The frost was Chas. county, but extensive damage also occurred in western Minidoka county, Blauer says. Saturday afternoon, the area received the heaviest rain in over a month. The rain, which was heavy, was blocked in some spots by the snow. The snow-dampened crops in some spots were welcomed. Britain, Soviet Union Agree To Call for Laos Cease-Fire

Blockade Claimed Against Algeria, French Airports Sealed Off

PARIS, April 24 (UPI)—President Charles de Gaulle claimed an economic blockade on insurgent Algeria tonight and cut it off from metropolitan France. Simultaneously, the government closed all airfields in the country for the second night in a row, called up its reserves and mobilized the civilian populace to keep the spreading military revolt in Algeria from reaching France itself. The calm of the daylight hours today gave rise to a general conviction that De Gaulle's stirring call to the nation to help him had secured off the paratroopers in Algeria from carrying out reported invasion plans. Some observers believed that President Kennedy's message of solidarity with De Gaulle also had some effect on the Algerians here. The government took no chances as tension rose again tonight. The blockade announcement was made by government spokesman Louis Terrenoire at a 7 p.m. (11 p.m. EST) news conference. Terrenoire also said that De Gaulle had warned the generals of the "French Algeria" revolt that he would order the use of nuclear weapons to crush the rebellion. The drastic steps were deemed by De Gaulle under the unprecedented presidential powers he assumed last night. 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Fat Particle Goes Against Physics Rule

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—A fat particle, which makes up the bulk of the matter in the universe, was accused today of violating the rules of physics.

The fat particle was returned at the annual meeting of the American Physical Society, an organization of physicists, to a group of men who were studying the properties of atoms and their parts.

It had been thought that there would be no elementary particles that they were the building blocks of matter. The fat particle was found to have a mass 200 times heavier than the electron.

In recent years they have had to give up for nearly 20 additional elementary particles which have enormously complicated life for the physicists. They don't know what to make of them.

Not the least puzzling of the new particles is the fat boy, otherwise known as the fat meson or muon.

The muon's behavior was spread on the record at the physics society meeting by Prof. Steven Weinberg of the University of California at Berkeley.

Weinberg likened the electron and the muon to identical twins, one of whom has made a place of himself since birth.

"Although experiment has shown them to be alike in all basic properties, such as charge, spin and mass," Weinberg said, "the muon is 200 times heavier than the electron."

"The scientist said," Weinberg said, "that one of the cherished conceptions of modern nuclear physics is that symmetry among elementary particles must be reflected by an equality among their masses."

The weight ratio of electron to muon, in other words, ought to be one to one but actually is one to 200, Weinberg said some way may be found "out of this dilemma."

No Limit Set On New U.S. Arms Budget

NEW YORK, April 24 (AP)—President Kennedy has ruled that proposed military budgets shall be prepared without any arbitrary limitation on the amount of spending.

Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara said today.

The defense secretary also said that local or private interests cannot be the major factor in decisions on military establishments and spending.

The administration has announced plans to close 73 military bases including 50 in the United States. McNamara said authorities were trying to reduce the ill effects of base shutdowns on local areas, but he said special interest groups must be related.

McNamara expressed confidence that the American economy could maintain defense spending at levels higher than the current rate if necessary. He said, "We can and must spend whatever is needed to protect the lives and substance of our people."

The defense secretary spoke before the annual luncheon of the Associated Press at the Waldorf

Astoria hotel. In his prepared remarks he said he had received three to four instructions from the President:

"Our own national security and our contribution to the reduction of international tensions depends on our military strength. Therefore, our defense program must not be constructed within arbitrary budget ceilings."

"While the size and composition of our military establishment is being examined and reexamined to make sure it is adequate and up-to-date, at the same time every possible effort must be made to eliminate waste, duplication and unjustifiable expenditure."

McNamara said an increase in America's capacity "to deter and defend itself against the risk of future wars, big and little" could be achieved with the minimum increase in cost "if we plan intelligently."

He did not say that our defenses are inadequate to the present danger, he said. "But we must act today to strengthen deterrent power for the future."

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Cuba Is Showing U.S. It's Not Enough to Just Oppose Reds

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—The main lesson from the Cuban missile disaster is that you can't win anything with nothing.

That the invasion lacked was ideas and enough muscle. But the lesson here applies elsewhere.

President Kennedy said last week. There are from this useful lesson. It is clear that the forces of communism are not to be underestimated in Cuba or anywhere else in the world.

At the beginning of the war against Fulencio Batista dictatorship, seemed to have some more than resentment.

It was only after a year of fighting Batista in the mountains that he broadcast an idea to draw mass support.

This was his program of agrarian reform for the landless.

When he took over, even though he became a dictator, he put in the reform and others.

It is easy for Americans, with their dislike for dictatorship, to think that because they despise Castro all Cubans do. But there are two kinds of Cubans.

One is simply repressive, selfish, ignores the people's needs. There is the Cuban people and support with benefits or promises of benefits long overdue.

Castro is the latter kind.

To assume Cubans, after a long history of dictatorship, value freedom above all else when they haven't had the kind of freedom Americans enjoy, is simply to think of Cubans in American terms, not to their terms.

There was some antagonism toward the American central intelligence agency reportedly had advised Kennedy on this—that the Cubans didn't rise up and sink Castro when the invasion began.

There shouldn't have been. The Cubans making the invasion represented shades of thinking from left to right. If they had won, it is easy to imagine the subsequent, and perhaps bloodier, enmities between them for power. But as far as this writer knows they did not try to win the Cuban

masses away from Castro by programs which might make them look more attractive than the dictator.

Castro undoubtedly has broad support for some of his programs in Cuba, even though he may have brought hatred and resentment with others.

As a minimum for winning popular support before the invasion the rebels would have had to promise to keep the good Castro reforms while abolishing the unpopular ones.

Without proclaiming such a program in advance, the rebels seemed to be nothing more than a brand of men who didn't like Castro and whose only program was to get rid of him.

So, before the invasion began, the rebels hadn't prepared the population with ideas. And, as it turned out, from a military standpoint they also were poorly prepared, both in numbers and equipment.

But this disaster raises questions which go further, and are more important, than Cuba alone. The United States, its clear role, helped prepare the invasion.

If this government was so far off base in understanding both the attitude of the Cuban people and what the invasion needed in ideas and muscle, then how much better is it in other areas where it is trying to stare off communists?

If in Asia, or Africa or Latin America the communists promise needed reforms and benefits but this country simply puts its efforts into fighting communism, particularly if it backs reactionary regimes, the outcome looks gloomy.

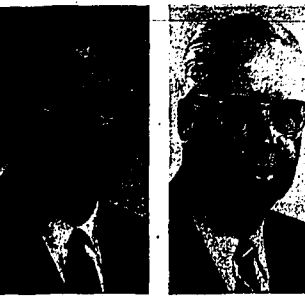

Lifting of Soviet Censoring Works, West Reporters Say

MOSCOW, April 24 (AP) —It was the reaction today of veteran western reporters to the recent lifting of censorship on outgoing news by the Soviet Union. Correspondents now are allowed to send copy to their home bureaus without one jot from the censor's blue pencil.

The new system has been an invigorating tonic for frustrated, experienced foreign reporters, who now can pick up a telephone anywhere or send their cables from Moscow's central telegraph without the censor's prior approval.

The lifting of censorship by the Soviet government already has brought these benefits to foreign correspondents:

- Freedom to file stories on the preparations to send a man into space, including the reports of an alleged space flight earlier than that of cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin.
- Freedom to send stories on the recent Kiev flood disaster.
- Freedom to tell how an apartment under construction for 250,000 workers collapsed.

As far as is known, no correspondent has been disciplined for his reports. The government, in lifting the censorship, had stressed that reporters henceforth would be responsible for their own stories and subject to ex-post facto discipline.

Speed in reporting is no longer subject to the caprices of invisible censors, but to the limited cable and telephone facilities, far inferior to those available in the United States.

Authorities have promised to try to improve the situation by installing more telephone lines and telex machines.

The inadequacy was demonstrated during Gagarin's space flight and again during the anti-

da workers collapsed. American riots over Cuba when international operators limited phone calls to London to six minutes.

In addition, the old, old problem of new sources remains. The Soviet media hold a virtual monopoly on sources and Soviet officials are reluctant to disclose or comment on anything which has not previously been published here.

Travel restrictions on correspondents remain stringent and it is almost impossible to talk to government officials or organizations without laborious arrangements through official channels.

Doctor Tells Of Danger in Home Poison

BURLEY, April 24—More children die of poisoning in the home between the ages of 2 and 8 than from cancer, meningitis, pneumonia and heart disease combined, declared Dr. Dean H. Mahoney when he addressed members of the Southwest PTA last week.

Medicines cause 41 per cent of the fatalities with household items, 20 per cent; cleaners, 18 per cent, and cosmetics, 11 per cent. A 2-year-old Burley child died this year of an overdose of aspirin, he added.

There are many items in the home that are marked poison, but far too many are unmarked and equally harmful if taken by a little child, internally he said. Buds cleaners are furniture polish and cleaning solutions. Thirty-seven per cent of the child accidents happen in the kitchen, 27 per cent in the bedroom, nine per cent in the living room and one per cent in the basement, he explained.

Aspirin is the most common medication taken by children themselves and now that candies are candy-flavored they are even more of a hazard. Other common medications taken by children are cold remedies and sedatives, he warned.

He criticized manufacturers of medicine who are making medicine to look and taste like candy. "Don't ever tell your child you are giving them candy, when in reality you are giving them medicine," he warned.

The doctor put special emphasis on lead poisoning and how some pills still have lead base. Lead pills are especially dangerous, he said.

Mr. Mahoney admonished parents against putting garden sprays or things such as turpentine in old pop bottles. "You cannot tell if it is difficult to educate those so young, so the burden is on your shoulders to take very strict precautions to take these inquisitive youngsters," he concluded.

The doctor showed some slides prepared by the National Association of Medicine through the courtesy of the Southwestern Medical Center.

WASHINGTON, April 24 (AP)—Last night in a report on personal income and living costs that "real purchasing power was also up in all parts of the country."

Average income per person, the report said, rose four per cent from \$1,516 in 1959 to \$1,582 last year, "although incomes were affected by the downturn in economic activity later in the year."

For the nation as a whole, personal income in 1960 totaled 402 billion dollars, some 21 billion dollars above the previous year.

The preliminary figures were released four months ahead of schedule so they could be used as a guide to measure marketing and business activity on a regional basis.

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Congressmen Ask Probe of Birch Society

WASHINGTON, April 24 (UPI)—Republican senator and Democratic congressman have called for an investigation of the John Birch Society.

Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., and Rep. John F. Shelley, D-Calif., said congress should look into the anti-communist organization. Keating noted that some members of the society had asked for an investigation.

Keating said the senate internal security subcommittee should conduct the investigation. If this committee thinks it lacks jurisdiction, a special inquiry should be made, Keating said.

Shelley said in remarks prepared for delivery in the house today that the society posed a problem of whether it would be best to investigate or ignore it.

He said "extremist forces" for both "left" and "right" often had gained strength after attracting "alarmed interest and discussion." But he said the society should be subjected to "relentless public exposure" because of the tactics it used.

Shelley said the Birch society used the same methods as "the enemy it claims to be combating: Front organizations, pressure campaign, an apparatus of intimidation—with the same hit squads and a crippling of the democratic process its outcome."

Keating said congress should determine whether lobbying laws and the correct practices act should be applied to the society.

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Highway Mishap Toll Is 52 in Utah

A lone driver whose car went out of control and an elderly pedestrian crossing a street in a rainstorm were killed in Utah traffic accidents Saturday night and Sunday.

The deaths increased the state's traffic toll for the year to 82 killed, compared with 53 the corresponding period of last year.
