De Gaulle Crushes Troops; Opens Fire

Burely Average Gets New Mayor

ALGIERS, April 26 (AP)—Forces loyal to President Charles de Gaulle crushed the four-day army revolt today with hardly a shot. The man who led the insurrection, Gen. Maurice Challe, surrendered to face trial and possibly a death sentence. Three other retired generals who joined the revolt—Rene Sabin, Edmond Jouhaud and Andre Zeller—were not accounted for. One unconfirmed report said that a Foreign Legion camp at Zareid, 25 miles from Algiers, the French ministry of information said it had limited at a field near Paris. He has been brought to trial on charges of organizing an insurrection and was sentenced to 10 years in prison. Charges have been placed against the three other generals and three colonels. The government has disclosed whether Challe will be tried as a soldier or as a civilian. On that issue could depend whether he faces a firing squad or the guillotine—although the possibility of a death sentence was largely discounted in Paris.

Magazine Says Russ Test Nuclear Plane

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP)—A national aviation magazine reported today that Russia has successfully tested a nuclear-powered bomber. The magazine said that the plane flew without refueling at 2,500 miles per hour with a top speed of 3,500 miles an hour. Quoting "Korean underground" sources, the magazine said that on its first flight the plane flew without refueling for 21 days and is capable of cruising non-stop for 90 days. The report said the Russian nuclear plane has reached an altitude of 85,000 feet. It added that in experimental flights, it broke through the Soviet radar system undetected in 23 out of 25 simulated bombings of 10 major Russian cities.

BOISE, April 26 (AP)—The Idaho supreme court has agreed to hear arguments May 5 on the constitutionality of a bonding law which has caused concern among educators throughout the state. The constitutionality of the law has been questioned by a Chinleau law firm in connection with a bond issue of the Snake River school district at Moreland. The law, passed by the last legislature, increases from 10 to 15 per cent the limit to which a class A school district may incur bonded indebtedness. The law makes payment of the 15 per cent bonding limit for school districts which has been in effect under temporary law passed by each session of the legislature since 1950.

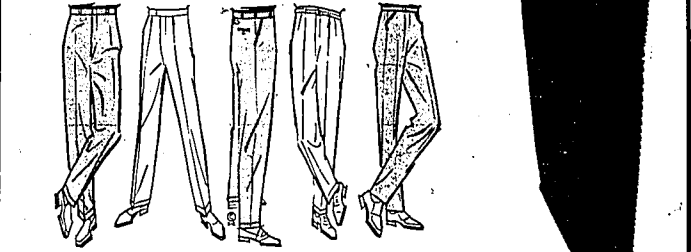

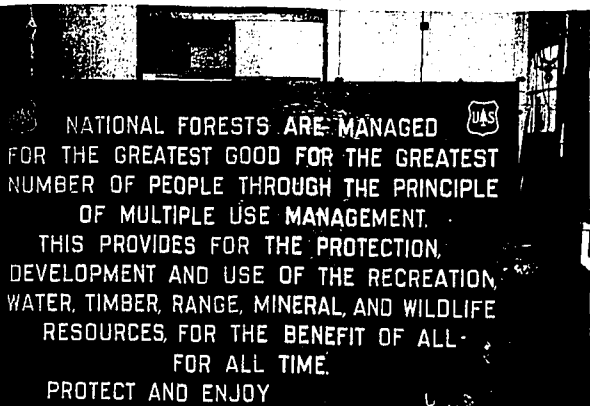

Missile Base Job Disputes Spark Action

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP)—Chairman John L. McClellan of the senate investigations subcommittee said today congressional action might be necessary to prevent work stoppages at missile bases that result in heavy overtime bills. McClellan pointed to the air force testimony that some additional tool was needed to deal with the situation. It has resulted in skilled workers making as much as \$500 a week under overtime provisions to make up work lost in the labor disputes. Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg announced yesterday at a news conference steps which he said might help resolve disputes among unions at missile sites over the right to do work. Goldberg appealed to unions to subordinate their differences to the national interests and avoid such work stoppages. He announced appointment of a three-man committee to try to determine which jobs at missile sites are construction jobs and therefore subject to the Davis-Bacon act. The act divides the secretary of labor to make sure that construction workers on government projects are paid at least the prevailing wage rate. In determining which jobs are construction and which are factory-type manufacturing, the committee may "illuminate the area in which disputes occur" between building trades and construction unions, Goldberg said. The committee, which will hold public hearings, will be headed by Dr. Thomas Hollander, an economics professor at George Washington university. Other members appointed by Goldberg are Lloyd Baller and Peter Belts, both professional arbitrators from New York City.

Consumption of Paper Hits Peak

NEW YORK, April 25 (AP)—Paper consumption in North America reached a record peak for the second year during 1960, the American Newspaper Publishers association was told today. According to the convention report, economists expect 1961 consumption to be about the same as in 1960 when 1,893,000 tons were used. The figure is an increase of 14 per cent over 1959, the previous peak year. 1960's mills in North America produced 2,722,000 tons of newsprint in 1960, operating at an average of 87.7 per cent of rated capacity. Shipments amounted to 1,893,000 tons. The report said more than two million tons and the largest newsprint mill in the world, the 10-million-ton plant at Grand Rapids, Mich., was identified as the largest. It is owned by the International Paper Co., both Spokane valley.

Attack Upon Indian Office Is Challenged

SEATTLE, April 26—The son of an Okanogan chief who seeks to become commissioner of the federal bureau of Indian Affairs has disputed an Idaho senator's contention the bureau should be abolished.

George Pierre said the bureau needs a "thorough shaking up" but contended elimination of the agency would "not correct the miserable condition which has been allowed to flourish."

Sen. Henry Dworshak, Republican, said in the nation's capital yesterday the bureau should be abolished because it has "wasted" millions of dollars while Indians starved.

The criticism came at an appropriations subcommittee hearing on the bureau's budget request for \$20 million dollars and the bureau received 179 million dollars and Dworshak said many Indians in Idaho and elsewhere are reported to be starving.

Pierre agreed the plight of the American Indian is serious, but advocated discontinuance of what he termed "ill-advised practices" and the placement of some of the bureau's funds with Indian problems.

Should Pierre be named commissioner, Pierre would be the first Indian in 90 years to hold the post.

Clock Divides Whole Nation Early Sunday

By United Press International
The nation Sunday becomes a house divided by the hands of the clock.

States east, parts of 10 others, and the District of Columbia switch to daylight time and their residents turn the clock hands up an hour.

Minnesota and two maverick Montana cities, Butte and Anaconda, follow suit late in May. Twenty-two states and parts of 11 stick with standard time all summer long.

The time change at 3 a.m. Sunday opens the wacky, confusing season when travelers puzzle over timetables, information clerks struggle with bewildered travelers and residents of the 11 states split by local opinion sit the local train: "I didn't know what time it was."

The time confusion includes:—Metropolitan Council, Ida, and the Coeur d'Alene city council put employees on daylight time but mills will remain on standard time;—The boring Benewah county put its employees on daylight time but chose to call it Mountain instead of Pacific time.

The two newest states, Alaska and Hawaii, will remain on standard time, sprawling Alaska already has four time zones—Pacific, Yukon, Alaska and Bering sea.

The state of Washington goes daylight from Sunday until Sept. 24 under an initiative measure approved by ballot last November. Colorado voters rejected a similar proposal and the state will hold to standard.

Switching to daylight time Sunday are Nevada, California, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New York, Delaware, Indiana, Wisconsin, Illinois, Rhode Island, Vermont, Maryland, Maine, Connecticut, New Hampshire, Washington and the District of Columbia.

Glitching with standard time are Nebraska, North Dakota, South Dakota, Tennessee, Arkansas, South Carolina, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, Florida, Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana, Michigan, Arizona, Oregon, Hawaii and Alaska.

Centennial Leader Plans to Develop Do-It-Yourself Plan

HORSESHOE BEND, April 26—The chairman of the Idaho Centennial commission says his organization will move swiftly to carry out Gov. Robert E. Smylie's plan of financing a "do-it-yourself" celebration in 1962.

In a letter to centennial chairman Ted Hoff, Horseshoe Bend, Smylie said he would match private contributions up to \$10,000 with state emergency funds to finance the centennial.

Hoff replied that "the commission will take immediate and vigorous action to implement the suggestions outlined by Governor Smylie."

"The 1959 legislature created the commission and instructed it to prepare a plan for consideration by the 1961 legislature. The commission did so and asked for \$700,000 to finance the program.

But the lawmakers twice rejected measures to provide money. The house approved a \$200,000 appropriation bill but it was defeated in the senate in the closing hours of the session.

Bob Smylie and Hoff said that although the legislature refused to appropriate any money for the centennial, it has not renege the commission of its responsibility to carry out the centennial program in 1962.

"Since the adjournment of the legislature," Smylie told Hoff, "the local-optional groups in many counties have indicated that they intend to go forward vigorously with plans for centennial observance, regardless of the legislative decision."

"In view of this burgeoning interest, and because it is right and proper to do so, I believe it is desirable for the commission to continue its work."

"For that reason, I desire to suggest that the commission, under your leadership continue in existence as a coordinating service agency which can assist in publicizing and planning local observance, and that a stripped-down plan for a significant and meaningful state observance be developed which can be financed with what means are at hand."

"I am happy to pledge \$100 as a start toward making this voluntary do-it-yourself centennial a reality. I am confident that the members of the legislature will desire to contribute too."

"If the people of Idaho support this endeavor with their voluntary contributions, I believe it would be proper to match these voluntary contributions up to \$20,000 with money from the governor's contingency fund. It would be proper to take this action after July 1 of this year if that amount in voluntary contributions is received by that time."

"With funds already appropriated, but unexpended, added to this \$20,000, there would be some \$125,000 to carry on the commission's work. It is also possible that the legislature would change its mind at the next session."

Hoff said that "Governor Smylie in giving the centennial commission this direction, has revitalized the commission and its legislative task of executing a centennial celebration in 1962."

The chairman said the non-profit corporation will be organized immediately to accept donations and supervise the expenditure of funds for the commission.

It is said the corporation's board of directors would be made up of prominent Idaho businessmen.

Rupert Methodists "Dig up" Past History in Construction

RUPERT, April 26—A box containing the history and interesting information was taken from its resting place in the cornerstone of the Rupert Methodist church this week as the present building is being wrecked to make way for a new \$100,000 structure.

The Rev. Raymond A. Thompson, pastor, dug the galvanized box from the masonry after the large stone carrying the name and date of the building was lifted from the foundation.

Among the items found in the box were a Bible, a church membership list of the congregation in 1914, copies of the Rupert Pioneer newspaper dated Sept. 9, 1905, a copy of the Rupert Pioneer Record dated Sept. 10, 1914, a copy of the Christian Advocate, forerunner of the present church magazine "Together," a blueprint of the building, pictures of the members of the church, a list of their names and addresses, and other items, most of which were indecipherable. The pictures were completely destroyed and the book mostly mangled.

Charles B. Roe was listed as the editor of the 1905 paper, which carried a number of interesting incidents in everything, neutral in nature. Subscription rates on the 1914 paper were \$2 per year, and the editor was Joe DeWitt.

Use of Force Considered by U. S. as Last Resort in Cuba

WASHINGTON, April 26—The House today voted to authorize the use of force against the Cuban regime in Cuba if other means eventually fail to put an end to the present pro-communist situation.

Employment of force as a last resort is said to be one of several plans under study by the State Department in Cuba. Other plans include the application of political and economic sanctions against Cuba through joint action with Latin American allies.

Some officials believe that as the situation develops following the unsuccessful rebel invasion of Cuba, other American governments might ultimately be willing to participate with the military forces against Castro. The United States is trying to encourage other nations to join in a coalition to force Cuba as a communist base is a threat to the entire western hemisphere.

One of the possible lines of action is a partial blockade of Cuba, authorized by President Kennedy last year.

Naval blockade in Kennedy's view, this would be an act of war and probably not a very effective move since a blockade is aimed at strangling a nation slowly.

Economic embargo—a partial blockade already in effect. The greatest single diplomatic disadvantage is that it would subject the United States to propaganda charges of starving the Cuban people. Cubans still can buy foodstuffs and medicines from the United States.

Another anti-Castro operation by Cuban citizens—some authorities think such an action might still be the way out for the United States if the operation could be properly organized and supported on a large scale.
