U.S. to Launch Satellite's Signal Clear

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., April 27.—A complex "space telescope" was fired into orbit today to explore radiation mysteries of the universe. The successful shot gives U.S. scientists the world's first astronomical observatory in space. The 95-pound satellite named Explorer XI sped away from this test center at 17,100 miles an hour. All four stages of the booster ignited successfully and propelled the payload into orbit at a nearly 18,000 miles an hour. More than two hours after the national aeronautics and space administration announced that "tracking stations at Johannesburg, South Africa; Woomera, Australia; San Diego, Calif. and East one Park, Calif., confirmed that the satellite is in orbit."

Cuba Invader Avers Forces Badly Beaten

COMPOS CHROTT, Tex. April 27 (AP)—A Cuban invader of the ill-fated invasion of Cuba says that Castro's army left the invading force "in pieces."

"We will go back," said the invader, who was captured near Penabaz, 75 miles from Havana, after the battle rescued him from a life raft in the Caribbean Sea by a United States air ship on Monday.

"I had only a few B20s and they were shot down. Most of them were shot down. We were completely without air support," he said.

"The Oriente province said in the past that they were going to land our troops," the lawyer said.

"When we landed we tried to get the best position we could, but we had no chance," Penabaz said.

"The heavy fire from Castro's army literally ripped the invading force to pieces."

Penabaz speaks very good English, and Castro's forces were equipped with automatic weapons, machine guns and mortars, he said.

Penabaz said he was one of five of which he said came from the Soviet Union or Czechoslovakia.

Castro's plans, Penabaz claims, were to land at the United States and ADG as the planes from the United States. The first plane, the second a World War II light bomber and the third a single-engine attack plane still in the navy.

Penabaz reports said Castro's ill-fated invasion was a Soviet plan, he said.

Penabaz said Castro's forces were made up mostly of boys—16 to 20 years of age—but they had military advisers from the Soviet Communist China and Cuba.

Penabaz would not say from where the invasion was made, except that it was not from the United States.

Penabaz said that as the invasion started to land, two of their planes were sunk.

Penabaz says he was driven back to shore by Castro's heavy fire, he said, he and his four companions were put in a life raft from a Russian ship and put out to sea.

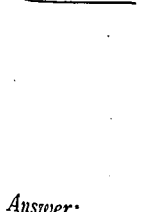

Idaho Orders Support New Racial Laws

BOISE, April 27 (AP)—An executive order directing state agencies to take steps to comply with an act of the recent Idaho legislature which prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color or national origin, signed by Gov. Robert L. Spivey, will go into effect May 1.

The new law prohibits discrimination in employment and in public accommodations because of race, color or national origin. It also prohibits discrimination in housing.

Spivey said the act recognizes the equality of all citizens and the right of each to the same opportunities for employment and in public accommodations. He said the act is a step toward the goal of a state "in harmony" with the federal government.

Responsible heads of the various divisions of state government are to implement the provisions of the law. The act provides anti-discrimination provisions in personnel practices.

Spivey said he is making existing laws to bring them into compliance with the new act.

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Idaho Industry Expansion Hits Near 24 Million

BOISE, April 27 (AP)—Idaho industry spent 23 million dollars in the first three months of 1960, according to the department of commerce and development.

The department said a survey of the state's industry in 1959 resulted in about 2,400 new jobs and additional payrolls of 65 million dollars.

The 1960 outlook for capital expenditures, the department said, "is expected to be higher than in 1959." It said that construction and other planned for construction are in operation before the end of the year.

BATHURST, April 27 (AP)—Residents of Lakeland school district, which includes Rathdrum, Spirit Lake and Albia, will vote on June 1 for the fifth time on a bond issue to finance a new high school and other improvements.

U. S. Newspaper Circulation Hits Peak; Services Stressed

NEW YORK, April 27 (AP)—The circulation of United States newspapers is at an all-time high, 50 million daily, according to Mark Ferrer, president of the American Newspaper Publishers association.

This figure shows "the vitality of newspapers," Ferrer told the ANPA's 75th annual convention.

Ferrer, executive vice president and general business manager of the Scripps-Howard Newspapers, added that Canadian newspapers have reached a total circulation of almost four million, also a record.

He said continuing mergers and consolidations do not indicate a decline of the newspaper's influence.

"On the contrary," he said, "the fewer newspapers are better ones and they are selling more copies than ever before."

Ferrer stressed in his speech that public services that newspapers perform in addition to presenting the news.

"They fall into categories of better government, public health, the welfare of young people and the welfare of the distressed," he said.

He said he had compiled examples of public services by more than 250 newspapers and that they would be printed in brochure form and distributed to libraries and to schools of journalism, colleges and universities "from which will emerge the newsmen and women of tomorrow."

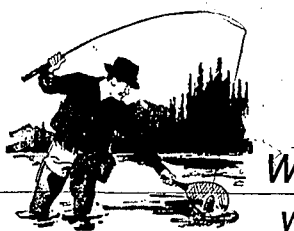

For work or play, for health or happiness, for business progress and profit—people in the Pacific Northwest this spring have more than usual reasons for counting their blessings.

Back east—particularly in the Atlantic states, parts of the Midwest, the Great Lakes area—folks in many places were still wearily digging out from under Old Man Winter's dirty-white blanket right up to Easter time.

Food Stamps Plan Started In Coal Area

WELCH, W. Va., April 27 (AP)—Jobs in the coal area were in line yesterday to get their names on the list for a new kind of government plan to start to feed their families.

Modern Facilities Needed in Buhl School, Chairman Notes

April 27—It might be said that the Buhl high school is one of the best in the state. Many new courses have appeared, especially in the high school curriculum. It has become more comprehensive, and competition for a quality education is more keen.

As a result school classrooms are being adapted to provide the equipment and materials necessary to teaching. Many new types of electronic equipment are being used in the teaching of fundamental skills such as foreign language, laboratory, reading, mechanics, television and the many and varied purposes for demonstration purposes. Brailford said.

It then becomes evident, Brailford points out, that because of these changes more school buildings are needed. Because of overcrowded conditions in the local high school Brailford noted that, "Today we are at a point that we have neither adequate classroom space nor laboratory facilities, both of which are essential

and important to students and parents of this school district." 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2-State West Power Links Are Outlined

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., April 27 (AP)—Giant transmission lines linking electric power systems in Washington and California were outlined yesterday for public power officials.
Speakers at the American Public Power association convention said construction of such lines and another in a party be made to his economical power generation, conservation of natural resources, improvement of the West's economic picture and reduction of southern California smog.
Sol L. Schultz, Seattle, member of a consulting engineering firm hired to study construction

of lines linking Washington and California, said the connections would enable federal power agencies in Washington to sell enough power to end their present deficit operations.

The Bonneville Power agency's revenues were more than 11 million dollars short of the amount needed to meet its obligations, Schultz said.
"The Pacific Northwest contains substantial coal deposits that could be utilized to produce electricity economically in terms of a price of a market," he said, pointing to some of the coal mines still in operation in the state of Washington.
Schultz told convention delegates that the coal mines still in operation in the state of Washington have a combined capacity of 10,000 megawatts, he said, but only 2,000 megawatts are being generated more cheaply than power in Washington.

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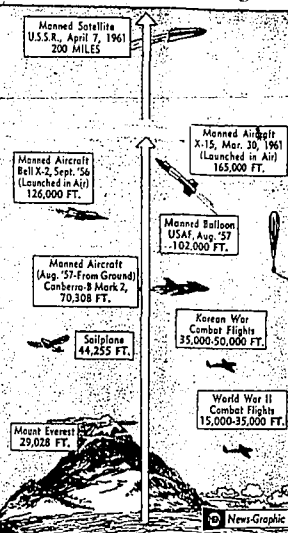

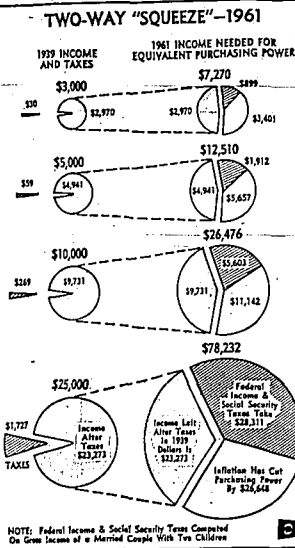
Attendees will explain and demonstrate the equipment, including telephones of the future, a solar battery, and demonstrations of how teletype equipment works.

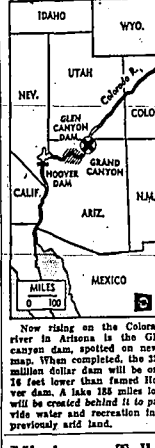

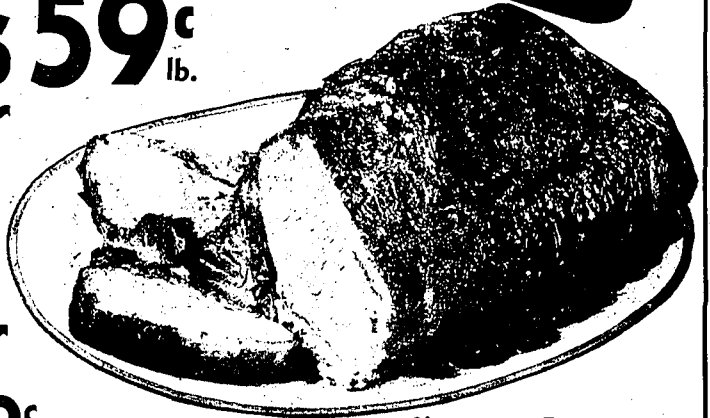

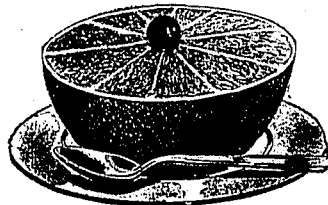

Fresh Foods Supplies Fill Market Bins

By The Associated Press

Continually increasing supplies of fresh vegetables and a wide variety of meat specialties make the food shopper's task of selection a bit more serious this week.

Bargains in meat are scattered both by type and by geography. In New England, the New York metropolitan area and Midwest leg of lamb and frying chickens are popular. The latter also pop up in the Far West, reflecting a four-cent price decline. Fryers of a cent or two in some other sections.

Round roast is frequently offered in the middle Atlantic and southern areas, while smoked butt, a less expensive pork cut, is marked down in the Midwest and East. Fish features are somewhat sparse.

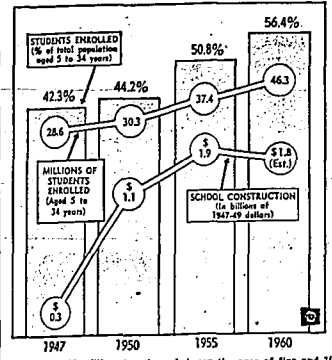
New arrivals in vegetable markets this week include New Jersey spinach, parsley, asparagus and collard greens; Virginia parley and swiss chard; Georgia cabbage; Pennsylvania spinach and watercress; South Carolina lettuce, beets and cabbage; California squash and North Carolina cabbage, beets and a smattering of asparagus.

Since supplies of these are just beginning, some are fairly expensive.

The shopper can find outstanding buys among items already in good supply such as snap beans, beets, broccoli, regular and Chinese cabbage, eggplant, iceberg lettuce, green peas, old crop potatoes, radishes and escarole.

Fruit bargains remain relatively scarce with bananas, pineapples and grapefruit considered the best of the lot. Avocados, oranges, lemons and watermelons are good buys.

46 Million Enrolled in School



More than 46 million Americans between the ages of five and 14 were enrolled in school in 1960. These 46.3 million students represented 56.4 per cent of the total population in this age group. By contrast, in 1950, 39.3 million—or only 44.2 per cent—were attending kindergarten, elementary school, high school or college. School construction in 1947-49 totaled slightly from a record high amount of two billion dollars in 1957 to an estimated 1.8 billion dollars in 1960.

'3 Is Crowd' Is Not True For Salmon

LONDON, April 27 (AP)—The old saying that "two is company while three is a crowd" may be all right for the human race, but it doesn't hold true for the salmon family.

Science has exposed the sex-life of the salmon by solving the century-old mystery of the presence of a third salmon when two salmon were mating.

This obliging fish apparently teaches the facts of fatherhood to a younger male salmon who assumes the role of an innocent bystander.

But sometimes, the observer is as innocent as he looks. The young male salmon or parr, as salmon are known in the next-to-last stage before adulthood, often learn so quickly that he actually helps his tutor—and may even fertilize some or all of the female eggs himself.

In Britain, a pound of fresh salmon often sells for about \$250 while smoked salmon may go as high as \$5 a pound.

The female salmon cuts a nest with her fins and is helped along by sharp bites from the male if she dawdles. Then the young parr appears and hangs around until the spawning is completed.

Salmon spawn in fast-moving water, and if the adult male's sperm is swept away, the parr may succeed where his older teacher failed.
