Fires Cost One Million Per Day

BOSTON, May 4 (AP)—Major fires cost Americans nearly one million dollars a day last year, the National Fire Protection association said today. The non-profit fire safety organization said that during 1960 there were 391 major fires in the United States and Canada, causing a total of \$265,500,000 damage. It was a new record, but only \$100,000 above 1959. Only five fires causing more than \$25,000,000 damage are recorded in the analysis. Missile Base Strikes Spur Tougher Law

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—Testimony that untested strikes at missile bases helped to widen the Soviet lead in the man-made space race has prompted Congress to toughen laws. Sen. John McClellan, D. Ark., of the senate investigations subcommittee, called for testimony from more officials of the General Dynamics division of General Dynamics corporation. They are to spell out how a string of 130 strikes in 13 months affected the company's efforts to develop the Atlas as an intercontinental missile and a vehicle for space flights. Robert H. Biron, a Convair vice president, testified yesterday that there is a "minute gap" in which the Soviet Union holds an edge and that the 120 strikes put the Atlas program behind schedule. "Unless there is marked improvement in the Atlas program, I don't think we will catch up," Biron said. McClellan asked if the work stoppages actually contributed to the communist conspiracy for mastering outer space and developing missile weapons. "That is absolutely correct," Biron answered. Some government-and-missile company witnesses have charged that many of the strikes were copyable to draw overtime pay when work resumed. The subcommittee is investigating labor troubles at the missile bases and their effects on missile programs.

Grave Found

WARSAW, Poland, May 4 (AP)—Polish authorities have discovered the mass grave of about 50 inmates of the Gross Rosen Nazi concentration camp, who were shot or beaten to death, the Polish press agency has reported. 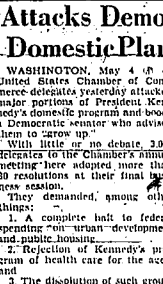

### Tension High As Algerians Hunt Rebels

ALGERIA, May 4 (AP)—Slept-up government forces are hunting rebels who actively supported the military insurrection against President Charles de Gaulle last week, Algerian news agency reports here today.

Rebels slaughtered throughout the city that an estimated 500 armed civilians had fled to the hills (Algeria) in the anti-government struggle here.

The vigilante secret army organization (OAS) has announced a circular a week ago calling on all Europeans to boycott the De Gaulle government and to join the "army of guerrillas" it is organizing. It will fight to the death.

The government dispatched nine extra riot police companies to the city. They joined other companies in carrying out house-to-house searches for weapons and in questioning citizens suspected of having rightist leanings.

Thus far in Algeria, 230 French military officers have been arrested or dismissed and the same fate has overtaken 200 civil servants.

The government has suspended 17 territorial officials of the Algerian districts in which it has proclaimed the OAS. The Algerian Bar association and has banned all but one local newspaper for rightist propaganda.

But the city's Europeans, who had fled to their military installations, returned on April 25 after "four" days, began to show their resentment against the government purge and punishment tactics.

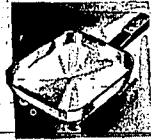

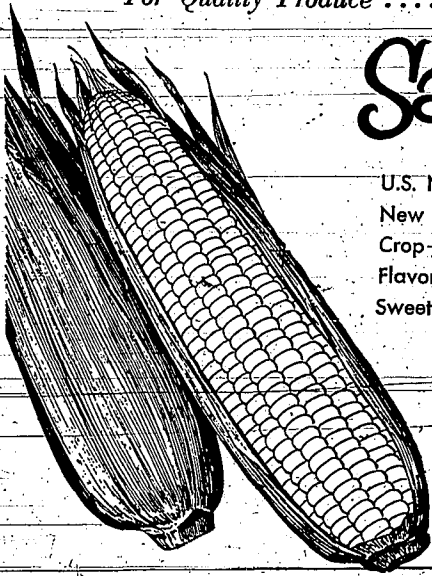

There are always some mothers in the group who understand the situation and cheerfully take on their share of the task of watching. These will always be friendly neighbors.

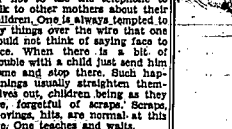
It might help the mother to set definite hours for the visitors and to have some free time for watching. Then she would not get so anxious when she goes to bed.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 4 (AP)—Robert Melsenbach, 23-year-old University of California student, was found innocent yesterday of assault charges arising out of last May's city hall riots against the house committee on un-American activities.

A jury of 10 women and two men deliberated less than three hours before returning the verdict in the court of Superior Judge Harry Weathers.

During the two-week trial, contradictory testimony was presented and prosecution and defense witnesses.

The prosecution sought to prove its claim that Melsenbach struck Police Patrolman Ralph E. Schumeloff on the head with his own rifle during the demonstration.

Defense witnesses testified Melsenbach did not commit the attack—but was victim of three separate attacks by police.

The city attorney received world-wide attention and are the subject of a controversial film, "The Million Dollar Boy," which was made from seized newsreel film.

The film implied that the riot was a communist conspiracy and directed. Critics maintained that the disturbance was a spontaneous demonstration by students against the house committee.

Police arrested 66 persons during the demonstration, 17 of which were against all but Melsenbach were dropped.

Rusk Pushes Longer-Term Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—The Kennedy administration is planning to use its proposed new long-term foreign aid program to promote "social reform" and narrow the gap between rich and poor in the world's underdeveloped countries.

Secretary of State Dean Rusk says the carrying out of such reforms will mean sacrifice on the part of recipient nations and they may be reluctant to take the necessary "radical and difficult steps" unless the United States can assure them of long-term assistance.

In a speech to the United States Chamber of Commerce last night Rusk called for steady and quiet support from the nation for President Kennedy's projected foreign aid operation. It now depends on congressional action on Kennedy's request to make funds for foreign aid loans available over a five-year period.

Rusk argued that in helping countries which are trying to build their economies from the ground up the annual appropriations system no longer is adequate.

### British Demand Overhaul of Intelligence, Security Units

LONDON, May 4 (AP)—Admission by British foreign office employee George Blake that he leaked secrets to the Russians for 10 years touched off angry demands today for a major overhaul of British security and intelligence services.

Blake, 35, was sentenced to 12 years in jail yesterday. In passing sentence Britain's Chief Justice Lord Parker said, "The information communicated... has ren-

The Blake case, coming so soon after the disclosure earlier this year of a spy ring which passed Western naval secrets to Moscow. Some newspapers said Blake caused greater damage to Western security than the Klaus Fuchs atom secrets case of a decade ago.

"After Blake have we any secrets left?" asked the Daily Herald. Members of parliament, particularly the opposition Labor party, were up-in-arms. Prime-1961-1961 shot was MP Richard Marsh who made a motion calling for an inquiry into what he called the "failure" of Britain's security services.

"It does seem that as the two (spy) cases followed so rapidly British has no security services, no security at all," he said. "Both seem to have occurred in the period of the present government and they must accept responsibility for it."

Blake, who was brainwashed by the communists while a captive in Korea, confessed to giving a "mass" of information to the Reds. He said "there was not an official document of any kind to which I had access which was not passed to my Soviet contact."

The Daily Express said Blake

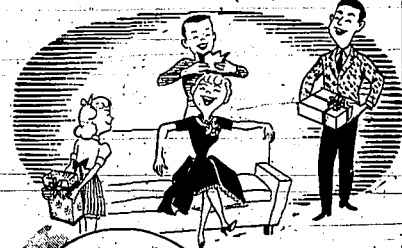

### New Bridge Plans Draw Cost Charge

BALEM, Ore., May 4.—A man who helped design the new interstate bridge at Portland, the Type 6000 narrow bridge and the Chesapeake bay bridge in Maryland said today the Astoria-Meier bridge over the Columbia river could be built for eight million dollars less.

Clayton and Washington have approved a 24 million dollar cantilever span and an agreement between highway officials of the two states went to a suspension-type bridge.

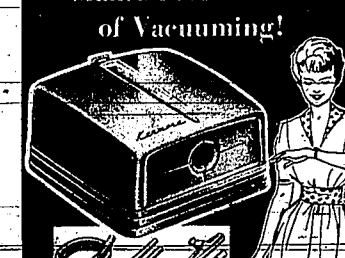

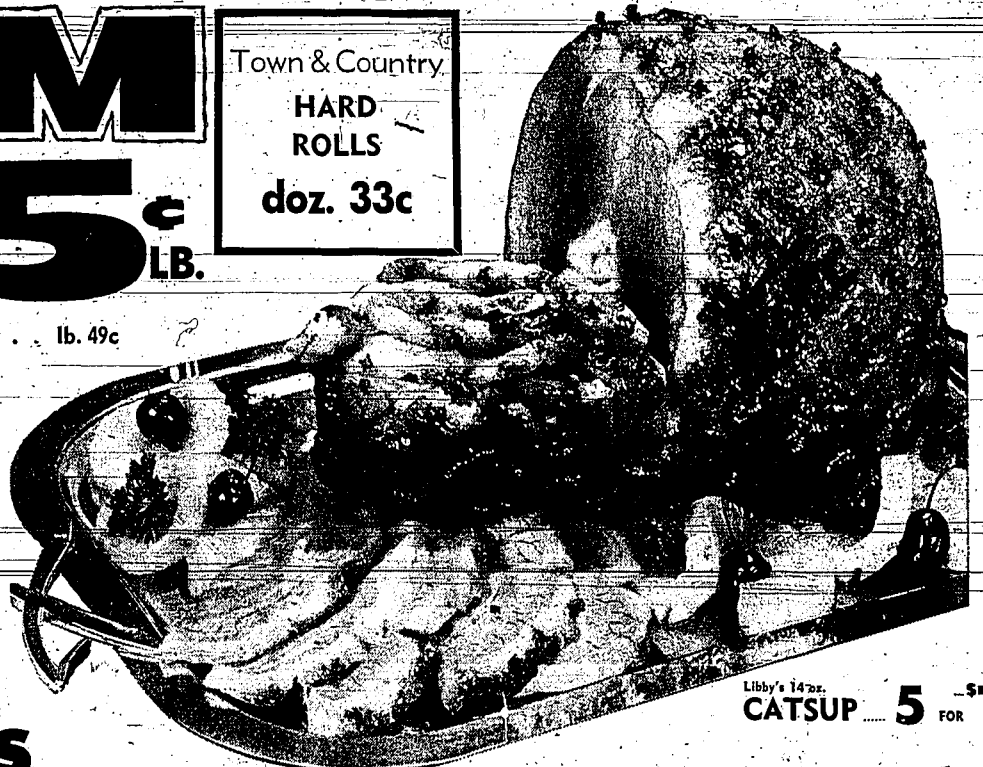

Housewives who use the "beny-meeny" method of shopping for meat will have a tough time this week.

Not only are there a wide variety of types of meat marketed as "specials" but there also is an unusually broad range of cuts available in most types of meat.

Beef, pork, lamb, veal, turkey, chickens and fish are on tap at both expensive and bargain levels.

In beef, the spread runs from chuck roast, 59c to 99c, to a pound in the New York metropolitan area through round roast to standing rib roasts and porterhouse steaks.

Pork cuts on sale include fresh hams in the East, 10c to 15c in the Middle West and Par West and smoked ham in the East.

Chicken also are reduced two to nine cents a pound in New England, the middle Atlantic region, South and Par West this week.

Eggs were down four to four cents a dozen in many places.

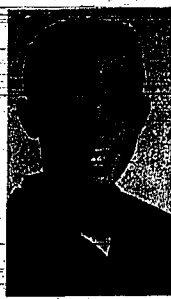
Outstanding bargains among vegetables are less noticeable this week.

Best buys are snap beans, carrots, Chinese cabbage, cucumbers, kale, leeks, large-sized new Texas onions, green peas, old crop potatoes, smaller new crop potatoes and yellow, straight-necked squash.

Good buys are beets, broccoli, fava beans (a King-size variety of the more common and bean), Florida celery, eggplant, escarole, endive, green onions, iceberg lettuce, parsley, radishes, some of the larger new potatoes, green squash and watercress.

Best buys at fruit counters are grapefruit, bananas and oranges. Avocados, pineapple, strawberries and Chilean honeydew melons are good buys.
