## Foster Parent of Hundreds Is 1961 Mother of the Year

NEW YORK, May 9 (AP)—A Tennessee mother of six who has fostered mother of hundreds of dependent or delinquent children was named American Mother of 1961 today.

Winner of the national selection contest is Leola Sevier-Giddings, 58, of Lookout Mountain, Tenn.

She was cited for rearing her own children—including home tutoring for many years of four boys—and for her devotion to the care of ill health—and for her efforts in improving the housing and treatment of juvenile delinquents, neglected and dependent children, and mentally or emotionally disturbed children, regardless of race or creed.

Her current projects are a residential center for the care of delinquent children; and a home for juveniles returning from vocational training schools.

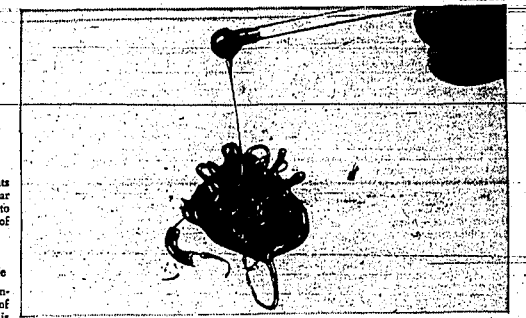

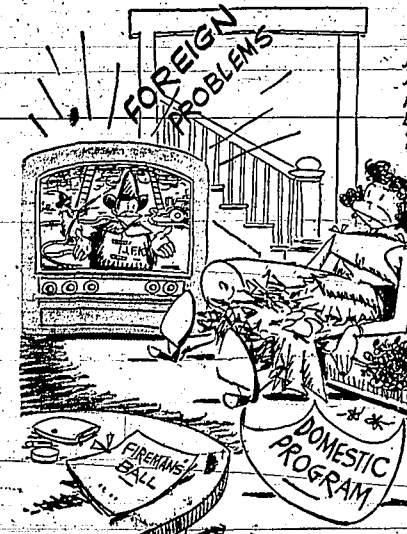

### Budget Deficit May Increase For Next Year

WASHINGTON, May 9 (AP)—Budget director Charles E. Wilson yesterday said the budget deficit next year will be the largest in history, \$2.8 billion dollars more forecast.

For this reason, he told the House Ways and Means committee congress should resist temptation to approve tax changes which would cut revenue and add to the deficit.

Wilson and Secretary of Labor Arthur J. Goldberg testified in support of President Kennedy's proposal to change several major sections of the tax law. Kennedy has said there would be no revenue loss if his entire package is approved.

Everett Hutchinson, chairman of the Interstate commerce commission, opposed one part of the administration's program. Speaking for the commission, Hutchinson said that the proposed 10 percent excise tax on train, bus and airline passenger tickets, he said this week, which would be levied on the passenger, aggravates the mounting "passenger deficit" of the railroads.

Bell said that the administration so far has seen no possible revenue source for the 1952 fiscal year which begins July 1. The forecast for 1952 is \$4.2 billion dollars and revenues of \$1.4 billion dollars.

However, he said three possible bills which could add more than one billion dollars to the indicated deficit of 2.8 billion dollars.

For one thing, Bell said, Kennedy is reviewing certain aspects of the deficit. He said he is likely if he does anything, he likely will call for further spending in these areas.

Also, the budget director said that if congress rejects Kennedy's proposals to raise postal rates, the deficit would be increased by about 500 million dollars.

Finally, Bell said a highway law approved by the committee would add 147 million dollars to the deficit by using some of the treasury's general funds to help finance road building.

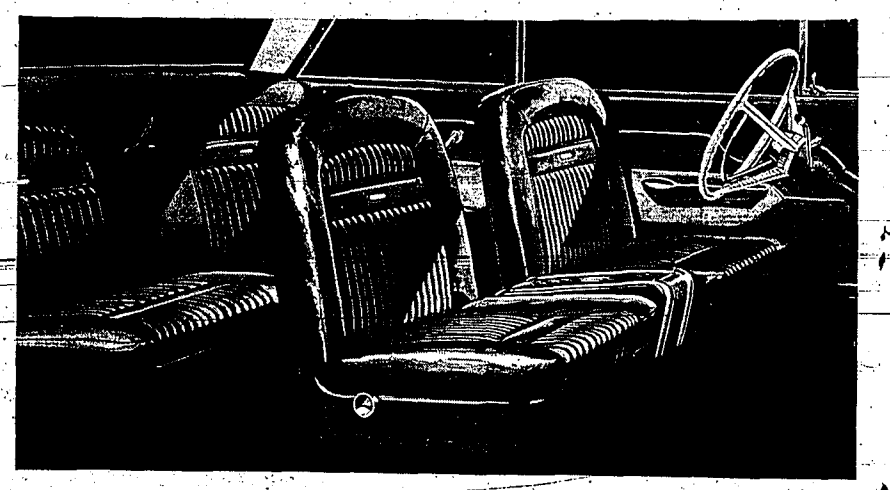

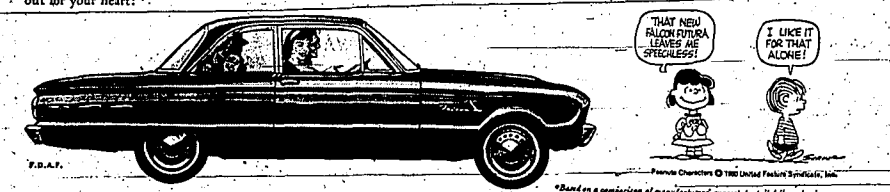

## Forage Crop Testing Lab Project Set

**BURLEY, May 9**—Three committees were named during a meeting here of farm leaders from Gooding, Cassia, and Minidoka counties to study the feasibility of establishing a testing laboratory for forage crops in southern Idaho, according to Glenn Bodily, county extension agent. Howard Roylance, extension agronomist, Boise, showed comparative figures on dairy animals fed with good forage and some that was not quite as good. The figures showed the dairyman saved 11 cents a day per head of stock by feeding the better grade of forage to his animals. The meeting was called by Joe Hall, Gooding county agent, and Bodily. Men of the dairy and beef cattle committees sent trial samples to the testing labs at the University of Idaho last year and information they received from the 40 to 50 samples sent in have proved valuable, it was noted. A committee was appointed of Joe Hall, Bill Hawkes, Lamont Smith, Ron Hawkes, Bodily and Blake to study lab setups in other states and the possibility of obtaining one for southern Idaho. A second committee with C. F. Tolby Schmitt were program chair-

men, Duane Hansen, Bud Wells, Mark Moorman, Arlo Montgomery and Nelson King is to obtain information as to an organizational plan to aid in securing a testing lab.

Bob Hillard, Vance Smith, Ed Koster and Ivan Hopkins will form the education committee and give information to the ranchers and farmers of the area of the advantages of a testing lab. "More information is needed on fertilizing and treatment of forage crops as well as production, harvesting and its storage," Bodily notes.

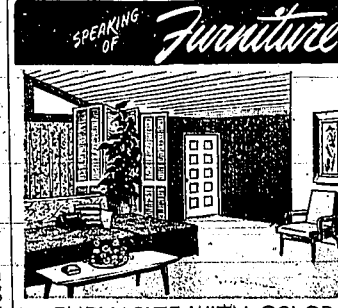

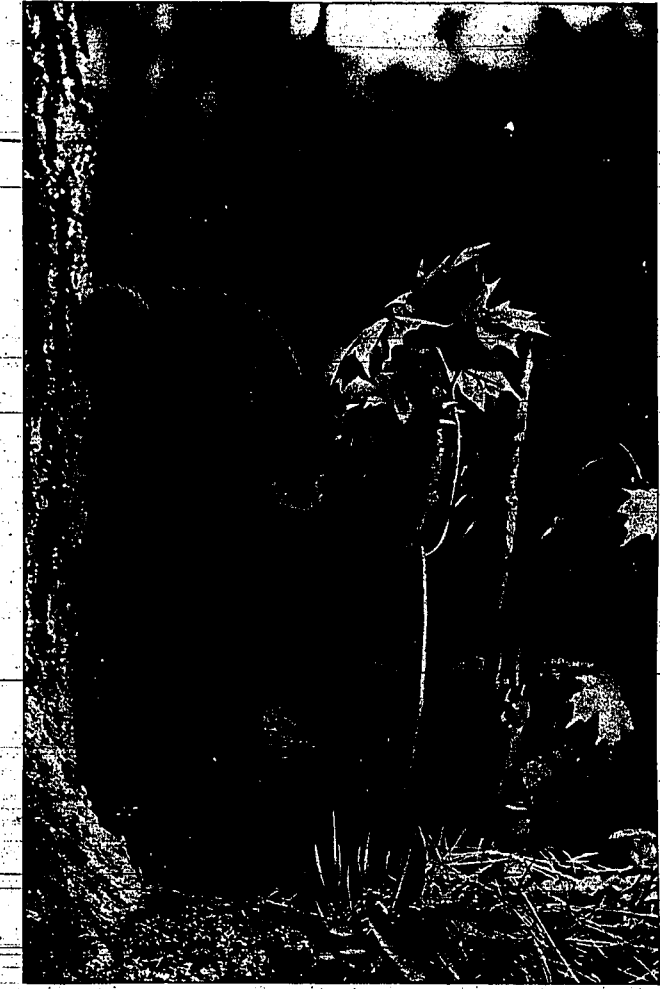

BALMAIN, Calif., May 9 (AP)—The Truckers union has signed one of California's largest lettuce growers and has announced plans to sign 110 more ranchers to farm labor contracts.

That gave the teamsters a jump on the farm labor organizing committee, which for the past year has fought hard to bring farm workers into California's rich agriculture. Teamsters local 800 and Bid Antle, Inc. of Balmain, signed a contract setting minimum hourly wages at \$1.12 to \$1.25. Under piece-work and incentive clauses, field hands could earn as much as \$1.50 an hour. This is the first time local 800, which has contracts covering produce truck drivers throughout California and Arizona, has taken its claims to the field.
