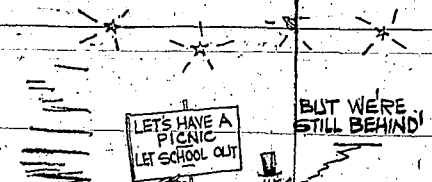

DECENTRALIZATION

Changes in transportation and the resulting differences in living and shopping habits are bringing problems that aren't likely to disappear overnight.

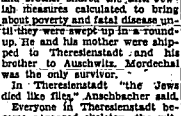

Spectacular Appaloosa Horse Show Is Scheduled at Filer Arena June 10-11

Leary, spotted foals dashing across an open arena to their first-year mates 100 feet behind the finish line will be one of the spectacular planned for June 10 and 11 at the Twin Falls county fairgrounds, Filer, by the Idaho-Oregon-Nevada Appaloosa Horse club. The two-day show of spotted horses from Wisconsin, South Dakota and Colorado, and intermountain states, will show all kinds of horses at halter and at work. It will be the largest Appaloosa "Get-together" since the approaching national in the United States. "In fact," says L. W. (Bill) Moore—Hansen—show chairman, "there will be over 200 horses entered in the show, and it will be the largest assembly of Appaloosa in Idaho since the days of Chief Joseph."

Early settlers used to talk about the spotted horse, characterized most often by a white, spotted blanket over the rump, as a "Palouse" horse. And in time, the horse with spots became known as the Appaloosa. It is therefore an Idaho horse, although spotted horses were painted and written about in early Oriental times and also 1800 B.C. in Austria. The Appaloosa breed is primarily one of the color breeds of horses, with one noted difference. The difference is what tends to make the breed outstanding. At the shows, such as the one that will be held at the county fairgrounds, color will not be the criteria used by the judge in the determination of the best stallions or mares, or futurity winners. The horses, once they are entered and show the characteristic spotted markings, will be judged as horses only. Thus, spectators will be able to see the judge, who will be Prof. John Gorman, University of Wyoming, wrestle with the problem of picking the best horse out of the groups which will have the blood of the quarterhorse, thoroughbred, Arabian or the Morgan. Only in case two horses are considered equal in other aspects, will the judge resort to color to pick his winner. However, since the Appaloosa breed is interwoven with early-

When the studios panicked 10 years ago and cut their roster of actors, ad-faced Henreid was among the first to go. After a few years of second-rate roles which deeply humiliated the actor he turned to directing and found himself happier than before.

"We older stars took a beating," he said at Revue studios during a break from his editorial duties.

Within a year's time the studio turned the industry over to a handful of box office stars—Brando, Sinatra, Holden, Cooper and Kirk Douglas. The rest of us were out.

In the depths of despair the Austria-born performer was recalled as becoming a director.

"It's easy enough to say, but where does one begin," Henreid went on. "I had directed three pictures in the past when studios still sought my talent. But the door was closed."

Thus far Henreid has directed 27 "Alfred Hitchcock Presents" segments in addition to scores of other teleplays, including "Maverick," "Cheyenne," "The Street Girls," "Thriller" and "Hong Kong."

"Hour" Show Will Replace Short Series

HOLLYWOOD, May 12 (AP)—The "Hour" is king on television. Just as all home viewers will be exposed to more hour-long series than ever before, half-hour shows are being dropped or expanded to meet the demand for 60-minute programs by sponsors and networks.

Three familiar westerns, "Gunsmoke," "The Rifleman" and "Wanted," are being stretched to an hour, as is "Robert Taylor Detective."

Half-hour efforts are dying by the score. Among this season's shows to be dusted are "Dante," "Peter Loves Mary," "Bat Masterson," "Aquilone Highway" and such top stars as Ralph Edwards, Lorenz Young, Tab Hunter, Groucho Marx, Nanette LePeyre.

NBC leads its competition in the "Hour" trend with 18 long cuts compared to the half-hour shows. ABC splits its programs 50-50. CBS has increased its hour shows to 14 as compared with 24 30-minute goodies.

Typical of NBC's new policy is its prime time schedule for Sunday, Monday and Tuesday nights. Block programming is the rule, with three one-hour shows in succession.

The parade of lengthy shows is due in large measure to the success of ABC's "The Untouchables." It also gets credit for a rash of new cops and robber thrillers, including "6th Precinct," "Calla 100," "The Investigators," "The Defenders," "The Corrupters" and "The New Breed."

Two new, Tamark adventure series also are on tap. "The Blue Arena" on NBC and "Circus" on CBS. Both run an hour.

ABC will present an hour series titled "Bus Stop," taken from the highly successful movie. "Another popular film series will be shown on NBC when "Dr. Kildare" makes its debut.

Most puzzling development is a new show that can't make up its mind—"Alcoa Premiere" which starts on ABC as a half-hour.

One week the program will be a half-hour, alternating between the two time allotments.

Sponsors prefer the hour format because it gives them a longer time to establish a "corporate image" of the product they are attempting to peddle. Networks concur because one sale takes the place of two.

Viewers also endorse the longer programs, as reflected in the many rating services.

The new trend will work a hardship on old movies, overworked writers and stars who must double their work load.

Sitcoms, comedies will suffer most. Few are funny for even a half hour and it is doubtful if any of them could garner laughs for an entire hour.

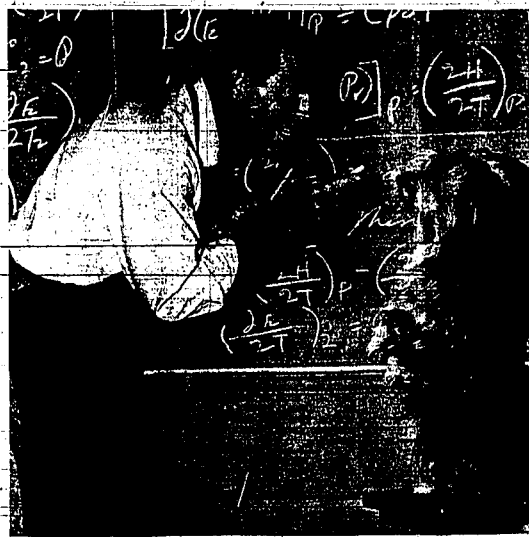

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FCC and TV Square Away On New Quiz

The FCC grants licenses to stations on the basis of program content. However, using a relatively new power called by-congress last year, it recently has put some radio outlets on "short term" licenses. That is, for less than the usual three years, pending further observation of the stations' operations.

Bowler Gives Pointers for "Good Game"

HOLLYWOOD, May 12—Eddie Lohanski, one of the 100 best professional bowlers who will be shooting for the \$15,000 first prize in the Professional Bowlers Association national invitational tournament which ABC-TV will televise Saturday on "ABC's Wide World of Sports," points out two principal pitfalls in the average bowler's game.

"A faulty approach and failing to have a ball which fits properly are the two greatest faults of the average bowler," Lohanski points out.

"Learning a proper pushaway and how to take your steps is number one. And even if you bow only once a week, you should have your own ball," declares the Detroit star who was Bowler of the Year in 1959.

"Keeping score during practice is also a mistake. 'If a bowler forgets about keep-

ing score and just rolls to frames, he will concentrate more on the details of delivery than on the details of scoring. This is the time to work on the pushaway, taking the proper steps, releasing the ball correctly—and developing a steady approach speed," Lohanski adds.

"When you perfect the mechanics of the game, the scores will come," he sums up.

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

How can parents teach little children, the pre-school group, free for the first time, to ride their bicycles on the street "as far as the eggbar and back and be sure not to cross the street," to refuse strangers' offers of candy or gum, or even a ride in his car? One does not want to frighten children so that they panic when a stranger speaks to them but one feels the necessity to protect children from the perverts—the do-gooders who might do them harm. I do not know the answer because each child is distinct from all the others and reacts differently to instruction. Also the circumstances of each child, as well as the community organization, differ. And each mother views the situation separately.

But something must be done for the protection of these little ones. It is always safe to teach children that they must say, "No thank you," leave the spot quickly and get back home. No child, no young person, should accept a ride from a stranger. No matter how well dressed and well-mannered he may be, the answer is always, "No thank you" followed by a fast retreat. That teaching, and not frightening children so that they fear even the stranger who comes as a guest. It will put them on guard. It will draw and draw them, it will have an influence here. If a child lives in a crowded city, the streets are full of strangers. He must stay at home until his mother or some other responsible person, takes him to live in a suburban town, things are better. He can have the limited freedom the conditions allow.

low but it still must have the training essential to his safety as to traffic and the odd stranger. Neighbors can be a great help to the mothers of runaway children if the mothers invite their cooperation. If Benjie is told "You must always do what Mrs. Kindly says, just as if I told you. She's our friend and looks after you," this fact is impressed on him. A child, thus trained and taught will not say to a Mrs. Kindly, "You shut up, you're not my mama." And he will be safer on the block where he plays.

All runaway children should have a label in their coats giving the father's name and the home address and telephone call. Even when these children are taught these facts they are likely to forget them in a time of stress. If they are on him somewhere those who are trying to help him have a better chance to do so. This label is essential because the best-intentioned child sometimes forgets and hides himself in trouble.
