**Economy Now Out of Cellar**

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—Secretary of Commerce Luther H. Hodges today announced two new signs of economic recovery.

Personal income climbed above the March peak in April, and factory orders and new orders both rose.

Sales by manufacturers rose four per cent from the previous month, Hodges said, a new increase which he said "is a good sign."

The individual incomes of Americans reached \$103 billion last month, he said, a record for the year.

Factory orders were up 1.5 per cent in April over March, and new orders were up 2.5 per cent.

**Rebel Military Junta in Korea Defies U.S. Advice And Claims Full Control**

SEOUL, South Korea, May 17 (Wednesday) (AP)—The rebel military junta, defying American advice to pull in its horns, claimed full control over South Korea Wednesday. Lieut. Gen. Chang Do-Yung said his revolutionary committee has taken over all authority from the elected regime of Premier Chon M. Chang and has formally begun handling affairs of state.

He made this announcement in a midnight broadcast. The rebel junta, avowedly pro-American and anti-communist, seized government buildings in Seoul, proclaimed martial law, ordered dissolution of the national assembly and the cabinet, and established a 7 p.m.-5 a.m. curfew. It controlled Radio Seoul.

**British Propose Laos Neutrality**

### Radio Jockey Convicted on Payola Count

NEW YORK, May 16 (AP)—Peter C. Tripp, an \$800-a-week radio jockey here less than two years ago, has been convicted of taking \$38,000 under the table to plug records. The judge, who claimed, wrecked his career and left him penniless.

Tripp, 35, was among four New York disc jockeys arrested a year ago in the nation's first prosecution over the long-standing practice of paying to have records plugged on the air. He was the first one tried.

A three-judge special sessions court panel was unanimous in finding Tripp guilty of soliciting payola from record firms to promote their discs. Presiding Justice Edward P. Brelin scheduled sentencing for June 20. He may get a maximum of 33 years in jail.

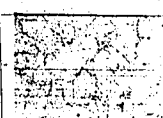

Matthews, who has hit 343 major league homers, has only four homers, two doubles and two triples this season. However, coupled with 27 singles, this averages out to a .324 batting average.

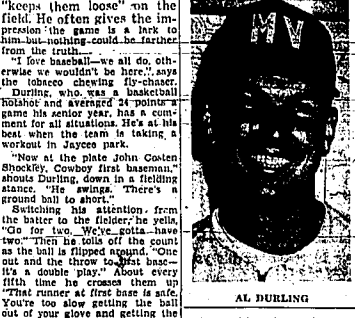
Matthews has hit safely in his last 13 games. Last week, he batted his average 23 points with nine singles in 19 trips.
