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Korean General Pledges Support To Rebel Junta

SEOUL, Korea, May 17 (AP)—Radio Seoul said today that Gen. Lee Han-Lim, commander of South Korea's powerful first field army, has pledged full support to objectives of the military junta now running the government. It is true, this is a setback for both the elected regime of President John F. Kennedy and U. S. Lt. Gen. Charles B. Magruder, the commander of United Nations forces who had urged the rebel junta to return power to the regular authorities. The radio station, controlled by the military committee of Lieut. Gen. Chang Dae-yong, broadcast what it said was a statement of full support by Lee. The statement declared aid to the junta would be given to men under Lee's command, which helps guard the Ka-ri base line as part of the revolutionary task, that was outlined by the junta. Lee also pledged political corruption and ineptness and rebuild South Korea.

Cuba Allows U.S. Citizens To Go Home

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—Cuba has agreed to let 12 U. S. citizens return home Friday, the state department announced today. The 12 will be given their exit permits tomorrow, the department reported.

U.S. Attorney Asks Methods To Cut Crime

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—U. S. Attorney General Ramsey Clark asked congress today to give federal officials a battery of new weapons to fight crime. Clark said that authorities are unable to combat crime effectively because of a house judiciary subcommittee considering a series of bills dealing with the transfer of jurisdiction, which was chief counsel of the senate racketeering committee, said some proposals were new. A number had been proposed in previous years by former officials. Clark said he would like to see a number of bills passed.

U.S., Soviets Meet Head-on In Laos Talks

GENEVA, May 17 (AP)—The United States and Russia collided head-on today over the issue of veto power for an international control commission to police a cease-fire in Laos. The differences were aired when Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko presented plans for a permanent peace to the 14-nation conference on the future of Laos. At the morning session, Rusk called for a strengthened, veto-free control commission to enforce the cease-fire in Laos, where communists and pro-western government are reported to have agreed on the principle of a broad coalition regime. Gromyko came back at the American position by saying that the SEATO alliance, which he pledged to protect Laos and call for a neutral Laos, would be a threat to the settlement in Laos. Gromyko said the commission would have veto power over operations of the commission. This was diametrically opposite to Rusk's position and was certain to be rejected by the United States.

Graham Admires Demo Aid Policy

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—Senator William Graham today admired President Kennedy's stand against federal aid to parsons in "some ways he's turned out to be a 'Baker' president," said Graham. Kennedy is the nation's first Catholic elected to the presidency. Graham commented on the fact that he had attended the ceremony to his daughter's board the Queen Mary for England, where later this month he will conduct the funeral services of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Elizabeth Taylor.

General Warns of Impending Doom Unless Change Is Made

If the United States stays reactionary, the world will become communist and "we will travel the same road Rome traveled," Maj. Gen. Orvil A. Anderson, retired, told persons attending a general membership meeting of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night. General Anderson, respected as an authority on thermonuclear warfare, received a standing ovation after he spoke to some 175 persons at the American Legion hall. "War is a happy combination of offense and defense," the general said. He declared that all U. S. bases on foreign soil are sitting ducks for the enemy and that the U. S. fights the war to a decision it will be an intercontinental war, he stated. He pointed out that the United States can no longer successfully fight a little war, because the enemy's supply of men is unlimited and expendable, whereas those of the United States are limited. An American soldier is worth about \$50,000 if he is killed, because "too many go on lives" to take his place.

Kennedy Discusses Arms, Summit Talk On Canadian Visit

OTTAWA, May 17 (UPI)—President Kennedy today announced the commitment of additional nuclear weapons to North Atlantic defense forces with a view to mutual control and ownership of a special NATO sea-borne missile force. Kennedy, speaking before a joint session of the Canadian parliament, said the United States would commit five "and subsequently still more" Polaris atomic-missile submarines to the NATO command area. At the same time, he announced that the U. S. would build up the striking power of her conventional arms in Europe and called on other NATO members to do likewise with "highest priority."

5-Year-Old Girl Is Drowned in Canal

EDEN, May 17—An airplane was to be brought in this afternoon to aid in the search for the body of 5-year-old Susan McKay, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude D. Strain, who apparently drowned Tuesday evening after falling into the Gooding-Miller canal near her home five miles east of Hazelton and one-half mile south of the Greenwood school. Officers from Jerome, Twin Falls and Cassia counties are aiding in the search which continued throughout Tuesday night. Floodlights were brought to the scene from KEEB radio station. No searchers could be contacted after dark.

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—President Kennedy today declared Arkansas a disaster area and gave it \$24,000 in federal relief funds. The President said that the state was so hard hit by floods and drought that it is a disaster area that it was entitled to the money.

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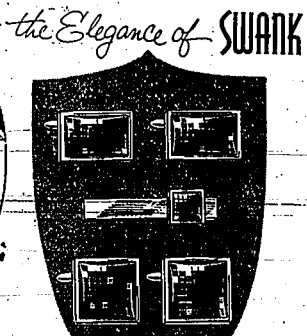
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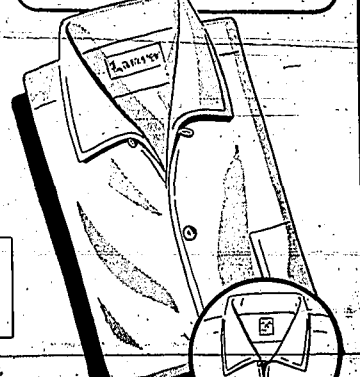

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Uniform Road Devices Said Safety Factor

BALTIMORE, May 17 (AP) — Robert E. Smylie, Idaho state highway engineer, said today that uniform traffic control devices across the country will reduce accidents and facilitate the orderly flow of traffic.

The state highway engineer made his remarks at the annual regional governors conference here while on a panel discussing highway safety.

Smylie reviewed the progress in the adoption of uniform signals, signs and markings.

He said that one of the main places that uniformity must be kept is on the interstate highways now being built across the nation.

"The new super highway system is certainly a most logical place to make uniformity mandatory and thereby insure a big step towards uniformity among the states," Smylie said.

Smylie pointed out that in Idaho as well as other states, all signing and pavement markings are done in the same way. He said that uniformity in construction and installed under rigid requirements.

"In my own state," he said, "we are very fortunate as legislation essentially conforming to the uniform vehicle code has been passed."

The Idaho governor said he was disappointed that in 1959 and 1960 when the American Association of State Highway Officials set down requirements for rural roads only.

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Russ Expense On A-Shelters Claimed Huge

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP) — A secret study shows that Russia is spending from 600 million dollars to 1.5 billion dollars yearly on fallout shelters. It is believed "the great majority" of Russians will be protected from radiation in a nuclear war.

Frank B. Ellis, director of the office of civil defense, told a house appropriations subcommittee on the study in testimony published yesterday. He asked for two million dollars to provide fallout shelters in 29 existing government buildings and 6.2 million dollars to include shelters in planned new buildings.

Ellis described the shelter program as a pilot project and said he hoped it would set an example for Americans generally. Already some builders are offering shelters with homes, he said.

The civil-defense director said most deaths in a nuclear attack would result not from blast and heat but from resulting radioactive fallout, depending on wind and weather conditions. He said most people would have time to take shelter if it were available.

Ellis' proposal ran into hostile questioning by subcommittee members who rejected — as did congress — a similar request a year ago. Members indicated they had doubts about any new information to back up the renewed request.

"I started out with 25 crackers at breakfast, had another 25 for lunch and wound up with 50 for supper," he said.

"I lost weight—a pound a week. I dropped from 170 to 158."

The effort to find a suitable type food with a long shelf life, easy to handle, nutritional, inexpensive and one that didn't prompt an increase in water intake began on a broad scale 18 months ago.

Only surplus foods go into the 20 calorie cracker—wheat, corn and soy. The taste is said to be like "animal crackers."

"I wouldn't advise eating only the crackers for longer than two weeks," Dr. Browne said. "All nutritional authorities say it is all right for two weeks."

Kennedy Sees No Tax Cut or New Spending

WASHINGTON, May 17 (AP)—President Kennedy has ruled out any massive spending efforts or income tax cuts to speed the recovery of U. S. economy.

Kennedy has told Democratic congressional leaders he is going along with a group of his economic advisers who believe the recovery is solidly based despite a hard core of unemployment.

There is a frank difference of opinion among his advisers, however. Some contend the recovery signs of weakness still can only be overcome by increased government spending or by tax cuts.

This group argued that even though factory sales and personal income are improving, the production remained at only about 86 per cent of capacity and little progress had been made in reducing unemployment.

But Kennedy, described as much more optimistic about the economy than he was a couple of months ago, overruled these arguments.

This apparently means he will try to hold the budget deficit for the year beginning July 1 to 2.1 billion dollars—the amount estimated last month by Budget Director David E. Bell—or even to reduce it slightly.

However, he said, he managed to conquer these quickly, and as a blasteroff time drew near he was actually impatient to get going. Shepard details his feelings and experiences in this week's issue of Life magazine. The magazine has an exclusive contract with the seven American astronauts for their personal stories. They reportedly received a lump sum of \$500,000, which they share, but Life gives no figure.

In Shepard's account of his flight to the edge of space he had these among other things to say: 1. He hadn't really expected to be chosen for the first thrust into space, but was excited and happy when selected. 2. While he was confident all would go well, "I had made all the mental arrangements possible for anything happening."

Oregon Fears Washington's Compact Role

BOISE, May 17 (AP)—Oregon's apparent hostility to the Columbia River compact stems from fear Washington will give preference to power generated by dams in the Columbia river system.

The behind-the-scenes report on Oregon's action withdrawing from the compact commission was given to the Associated Press by a recognized water resource authority who declined to be quoted. The compact, the result of 10 years of negotiating between the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Utah and Nevada, is a comprehensive agreement relating to power, water rights and the integrated development of the Columbia river system.

At a recent commission meeting in Portland, Oregon's representative, Freeman Holmer, economic adviser to Gov. Mark Hatfield, told the commission his state would not make any more financial contributions or engage in any commission negotiations in the next two years.

However, observers here felt this was only a token gesture, since the task of the commission in formulating the compact has already been accomplished. The compact as it now stands has been approved by the legislatures of Montana, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming and Nevada. Only Washington and Oregon legislatures failed to approve it at this year's session.

But the Washington commission members, according to reports here, were dissatisfied by their state's refusal to ratify the compact, which died in committee. They were optimistic that with a vigorous information and public education program, their state would ratify the compact at the next legislature.

There is no deadline for ratifying the compact.

Mrs. Donna Blake, office manager of the Lewiston Television Cable company, said the bolt toppled the antenna and made it rattle into flames. She said a radio broke—just 18 inches away from where she was sitting—exploded with a roar as the bolt struck. Officers reported many calls from area residents telling of the bolt and the accompanying thunder clap. One office worker saw the flash, heard the clap and dove under the desk, shouting, "We've been all righted."
