BOISE, May 18.—The deputy assistant director of women's activities for the office of civilian defense mobilization today told the number one job of American women is to keep their homes ready for emergency.

Mrs. Norton H. Pearl, Battle Creek, Mich., made her remarks at the regional VII civil defense conference which opened here today. Delegates from Washington, Montana, Alaska, Oregon and Idaho are attending.

“If our enemy realized that 80 million Americans would devote the first all-out attack, with an angry determination to fight back, it would be a potential deterrent against launching such an attack,” Mrs. Pearl said.

“If women of our nation will strengthen the spiritual power of the nation, give it underlying vigor, activities Saturday are the best way to do it. We must be ready for intelligent activities whether faced with nuclear war, an extended cold war, or a limited conflict,” she said.

Mrs. Pearl pointed out that “every woman dreams of peace.” She said 40 million homes and 60 million women “will pick up the offensive that is part of the nation's strength.”

No Serious Attempt Expected To Unionize “Family” Farms

WASHINGTON, May 18 (UPI)—Government sources today predicted unions would not make a serious attempt to organize family-type farms but would concentrate efforts on large farm operations.

Spokesmen said the high cost of organizational work and maintenance of organized relationships between farm and city workers in family-type farms made union efforts difficult.

Instead, they said, the unions would focus on areas of concentrated production such as California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and Florida.

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—Red China is in serious economic trouble, according to information received in Washington. American officials said today that the Peking regime was being forced by successive crop failures into greater dependence on Russia. There are some indications that Moscow is making sure that its Far East partner acknowledges this dependence and all that it means to

been concluded. Possibly because of this delay the annual spring announcement of Communist China's production achievements and prospects of the new year still have not been made. Red China's bare foreign exchange reserves and prospects of mounting "large deficits" leave it no alternative but to seek more help from Moscow, U. S. officials said.

Emergency food imports were believed to have nearly wiped out Communist China's foreign exchange reserves, worsening food shortages have forced Peking to

arrange for importation of six million tons of wheat and barley from Canada and 702,000 tons of wheat from Australia over the next two years at an estimated cost of about 450 million dollars. Canada and Australia granted short-term credits for part of these purchases. In 1958 China had a 1.2 billion ruble surplus in its trade account with Russia, much of the surplus going to pay for Soviet aid. In 1959 the Chinese surplus dropped to 200 million rubles. In 1960 the surplus had changed into a deficit of undisclosed size. American officials do not inter-

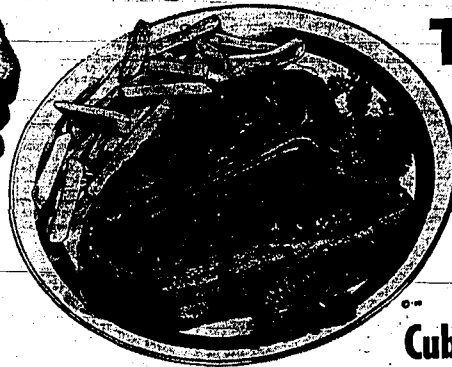

Russ Design Nuclear Plane

Delta wing is believed by the Russians to be the most logical design for an atom-powered plane. The crew would be located in the long forward portion of the fuselage, far from the atom engine. This design appeared in the semi-official Soviet air force publication, "Wings of the Fatherland."

Soviets Expected to Put up Atom-Powered Plane in '62

WASHINGTON—(NEA) — The Russians reportedly will be able to put up an atom-powered airplane by 1962, perhaps sooner. Information based on Soviet research indicates that the first plane would be a "valon" craft, possibly hitting around 300 miles an hour.

Analysis of the Soviet information reveals that the reds may be able to build a practical military atom-powered plane by 1964 with a speed of 500 miles an hour. In contrast, the first U. S. atom plane may be in the air around 1965, flying around 100 miles an hour. By 1966, it could probably be modified for some types of military missions. It is expected to be a better all-around plane than the 1958 Soviet version.

Sandman Is Celebrating Anniversary

NEW YORK (AP)—The world's No. 1 professional sandman is celebrating his 50th year as sleeping adviser to kings and millionaires and even noted clergymen.

Norman Dine, who has no trouble himself sleeping on a king-sized mattress of latex foam, estimates that he has handled a million bed problems during the years he has been running his sleep clinic.

President Eisenhower, for instance, finds it revitalizing to nap with Dine. During the Korean World War II, Dine rushed him on request a special angle board for this purpose.

The late John Foster Dulles liked to sleep with a board under his mattress.

Dine says he made him one that would fold to pack easily for his global flights.

Regular Bath Is Quite New Fad for U.S.

NEW YORK (AP)—Regular bathing is a surprising new fad for Americans, according to a home economist for a manufacturer of automatic water softeners.

She is Linda Scott, home economist for the Lindsay company, which is compiling a series of historical statistics on the various uses of water in its relation to the growth and development of civilizations.

The material will be presented to school home economics classes.

Miss Scott said that a survey in the 1880's revealed that five out of six dwellings in American cities had no bathtubs, and a common belief of the period was that perspiration kept a man clean.

In the course of her research, Miss Scott came up with three other notes.

—Napoleon took a hot bath daily. He was so much a "part" of his tub that he signed the Louisiana purchase while soaking in his hot water.

—In 1828 one childless couple aspired that the public should aspire to daily bathing instead of the customary once-a-year practice. Better opinion when it was "shown" that frequent bathing increased the chances of rheumatism, fever and lung ailments.

—Catherine, the great lover, had a portable bath built for two.

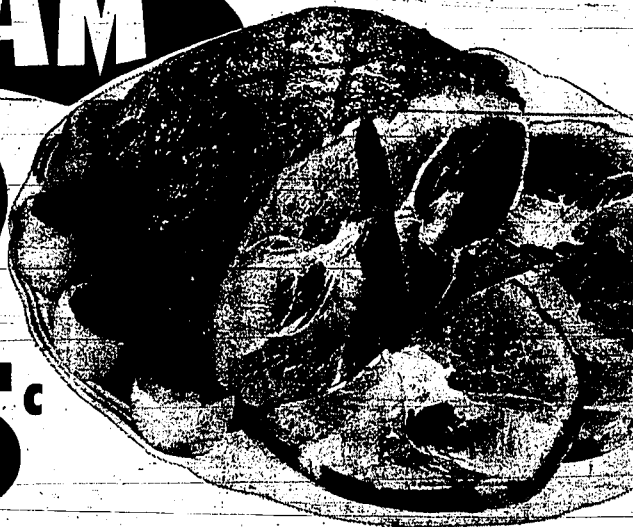

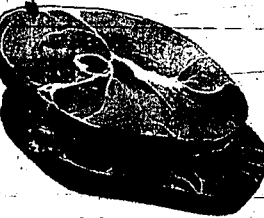

Three States May Sue Idaho Power; Questions Are Piled

PORTLAND, Ore., May 18 — Oregon, Washington and Idaho may sue the Idaho Power company for fish losses at the firm's Brownlee and Oxbow dams on the Snake river.

This was demanded by the attorney general of the three western states here yesterday. The trio, Oregon's Robert Thornton, John O'Connell, Washington, and Idaho's Frank Benson, reached agreement that the Idaho firm should be made to pay for fish losses.

But they said three questions must be answered before any action could be taken.

Thornton listed the questions as: (1) Can the states sue the power company? (2) Can negligence be proven? (3) And how can damages be assessed?

Thornton said the questions would be explored by assignment. All three men will handle the problem of damages. O'Connell will determine the ability to sue and the form of action available and Benson and Thornton will solicit factual evidence of alleged negligence from its fish and game people.

"This is not an easy problem but something should be done to resolve it," Thornton said.

"We owe it to the people of our respective states to get to the bottom of it. If we haven't a court case we'll have to tell the people we don't."

A member of the Oregon fish commission, Robert W. Schuchman, said his department was not interested in money than it was finding a satisfactory way to move fish through power dams.

And Roy Aichison, the assistant attorney general of Oregon, said damages would be hard to assess since it is hard to tell how much fish were lost.

"It's not the fish itself so much as it is the fish's potential for propagation," Aichison concluded.

Pledge Made To Halt Price Fixing System

WASHINGTON, May 18 (AP)—The president of Westinghouse Electric corporation pledged a campaign against price fixing yesterday when told senators he saw nothing wrong with competitors offering the same prices.

"Identical prices are not evidence of collusion or conspiracy in any way," the executive, Mack Cressap, Jr., told the senate antitrust and monopoly subcommittee in a hearing here.

He defended seven sealed bids by Westinghouse and its chief competitor, the General Electric company, for the Tennessee valley substation this year. In each case, the bids were identical.

"This would be very natural," Cressap said, because the bids likely were on standard products in the catalogue of the two companies. On such items, Cressap said, "We met the lowest price of the competition."

But Sen. Estes Kefauver's D. Tenn. subcommittee chairman, said that while identical prices may not be evidence of collusion, they do suggest a lack of competition.

Kefauver brought up the TVA bids because they came after the recent federal price-fixing case.

In that case, a U. S. district judge fined 20 electrical equipment manufacturers and 42 company officials nearly two million dollars allegedly for conspiring to fix prices. Seven officials also were sentenced to 30-day terms.

After the price-fixing case early this year, Cressap testified, Westinghouse instituted a program aimed at preventing further price fixing by its employees.
