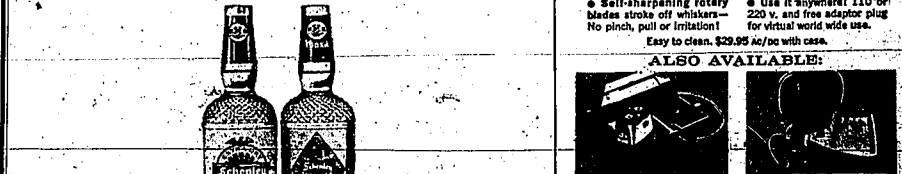

Study Shows Money Loans Are Common

COLLEGE OF IDAHO, Caldwell, May 22—One Idaho family in every five or six borrowed from a consumer finance company in 1959, according to a study of the industry in Idaho recently completed by two College of Idaho professors.

Dr. C. Larry Hagen, head of the psychology department, and Prof. Boyd H. Henry, head of the mathematics department, conducted a year-long study of the growth and operations of the consumer finance industry, analyzed its operations and compared its operations with those of other related industries. The survey was sponsored by the Idaho Consumer PPI association.

Almost 55,000 loans per year are made by consumer finance companies in Idaho, according to the study. Allowing for multiple loan borrowers, probably 40,000 different persons borrow in the course of a year in this state. This amounts to approximately one borrower in every 18 Idaho residents.

Characteristics of a survey were studied through a survey of 721 active accounts, drawn from 39 of the 72 loan offices in Idaho. Four out of five borrowers are married men, for the most part in their 20's and 30's.

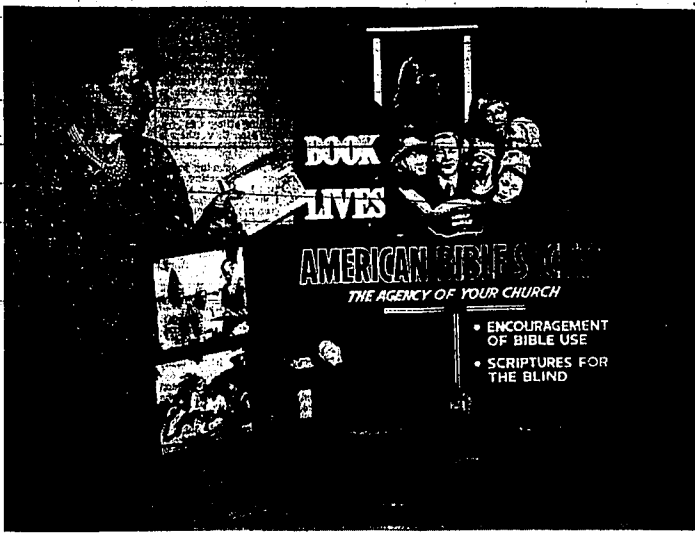
The industry serves all occupational groups, although skilled and semi-skilled workers use this service to a greater extent than other groups. The average size of each loan was about \$450. In most instances the purpose of the loan was to consolidate existing debts. Income of borrowers tended to be somewhat below average, but borrowers having a high income also were common.
